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HUMANITIES FORUM. *TOM RIVERS*, Assistant Professor of English, will speak on "Book Burning and Banning: Should Censorship be X-Rated?" at the Humanities Forum today in the Rare Books Room. *DR. RIVERS* will explore the areas of censorship. Although he is opposed to legal censorship, he does see the need for censorship in a general way by self restraint or by persuading people away from harmful books and shows. He will offer advice regarding what

families should expose themselves to in the areas of books and films.

The forum will be held from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

The show will open on March 5, 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and will run through March 26. The public is invited. This is the first time the Blue Room will be used as a gallery.

CAMPUS LITURGY. The ISUE Campus Ministry has scheduled a Liturgy for noon today in Room L119.

DIMENSION TELEPHONE SYSTEM - PHASE II, Phase II of the Dimension telephone system is scheduled for completion on March 15, 1977. Phase II will add the Direct Inward Dialing (D.I.D.) and Automatic Identification of Outward Dialing (A.I.O.D.) features to the ISUE Dimension telephone system.

You are encouraged to give your direct dial number to your frequent callers. An example of D.I.D. would be that extension 1701 could be reached direct by an off-campus party if they dialed 464-1701.

The A.I.O.D. capability will identify all long distance toll calls made from each individual station on the University's system. The telephone billing will list each station and all toll calls made from that particular station. Each division/department will remain responsible and be charged back for the long distance toll calls made from each station assigned to their division/department. The pink record of long distance call slips will not be needed after A.I.O.D. is installed.

We hope these two features will improve the ISUE telephone service for the University employees and incoming callers.

FLASH, ISUE Library Services now in control of nearly 3 MILLION TITLES--everything but the books themselves, that is. By means of a new terminal located in the Acquisitions Department, the campus can call up bibliographic information for any of these millions of titles ranging from books and periodicals to all forms of media. The terminal is already enabling the library to order and catalog more efficiently. Since owner libraries are also identified, interlibrary loan procedures can also be speeded up. Eventually ISUE's own holding will be similarly indicated, as the campus joins other member libraries in expanding the already large data base of the Ohio College Library Center (OCLC). The name is rather misleading since OCLC's nearly 400 members are spread over 30 states. OCLC's next major goal, in which ISUE librarians and staff are most interested, is the development of a means of reference service via the terminal.

ALUMNI SPONSORING ANNUAL TELEFUND, The Indiana State University Evansville Alumni Association is sponsoring the annual telefund on March 1, 2, and 3. **STEVE BOHLEBER**, ISUE 1972 graduate and Chairman of the 1977 telefund, estimates that over 2,000 alumni will be contacted on these three evenings. Sixty-two alumni have volunteered to do the calling. A goal of \$7500 has been set for the '77 telefund. Proceeds from the telefund will benefit the alumni scholarship program and other activities of the ISUE Alumni Association.

Formerly a speech clinician with the Evansville Association for Retarded Citizens, *JEAN* accepted her position at the Children's Center when it opened in 1974.


She places emphasis on continuity when searching for ideas to create activities for the children. Most of her lesson planning is done in the summer while the children's center is closed. She admits to finding ideas in places as varied as the ISUE Learning Resources Library and the neighborhood supermarket. New innovative approaches to child care are also available in pre-school readings. From these latest attitudes and ideas *JEAN* finds a theme for the upcoming nursery school session. Throughout the year she works from the major focuses in her plan and zeroes in on particular points she wants to stress.

"When I first began here at the Children's Center, I tended to be much more rigid with my scheduling of activities," *JEAN* admits. "That was a carry over from having worked with the pre-schooler as a speech therapist. There my teaching was mainly in the language development of the retarded child. It never ceases to amaze me still, how fast the normal child learns."

JEAN builds a balance between the organized, structured activity and the alternative "free choice" time in her daily nursery school planning. Each child is given the opportunity to choose what he/she wants to do during "free choice" time. The supplies are available and the teacher acts as a motivator not instructing, but suggests new ideas. *JEAN* feels this approach offers the greatest learning and that morning "free choice" offers the greatest learning time, because the children are rested and receptive.

JEAN received her degree in speech pathology from the University of Wisconsin at Madison. She is a Wisconsin native who speaks enthusiastically of returning home and snow skiing over the Christmas holidays. Here in Indiana she seeks free time to read, sew, knit and play tennis.

JEAN is the mother of three children: Julie, 13; Peter, 10; and Eric, 7. Her husband *DAN* is an Associate Professor of Art at ISUE. The *ENGELKE'S* were chairpersons for the Ohio River Arts Festival Craft Fair at the Riverfront last Spring. As a family they enjoy music and the theatre.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. *ROBERT E. MAYS*, Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, was recently appointed Graduate Advisor and liaison to the ISU-Terre Haute School of Graduate Studies and Office of Academic Services and Special programs. *DR. ISUE CHEMISTRY STUDENT TO PRESENT PAPER. An ISUE senior Chemistry major, *MICHAEL KROEGER*, will be presenting a paper entitled, "Computerized Visual Aids in Introductory Molecular Orbital Theory" at the Second National Student Affiliate Research Symposium at the American Chemical Society's National Meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, on Tuesday, March 22. *MR. KROEGER* will be accompanied to New Orleans by *HOWARD E. DUNN*, ISUE Associate Professor of Chemistry, and four other Chemistry students.

The research work was carried out over a one-year period by *TIMOTHY MCGRATH* and *MICHAEL KROEGER* under the direction of *DR. DUNN*. *MR. MCGRATH* graduated in the spring of 1976 with a major in Chemistry. A paper is presently being written for publication in a leading technical journal.

FOURTH OFFICE STAFF TRAINING SESSION MARCH 10-11. The fourth in a continuing series of training sessions for clerical and secretarial personnel will concern University Telephone Courtesy. One session will be conducted March 10, 1977 from 2:00-3:00 p.m., followed by a second identical session on March 11, at the same time. Both sessions will be held in Room A34. ISUE STUDENT EARNS TABLE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP. In recent ACU-1 (Association of College Unions-Intercollegiate) competition held at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, ISUE sophomore **GARY GONNERMAN** claimed the Regional title as Table Tennis Champ. As winner of the Regional Tournament, **GARY** will continue on to the National Championships in Denver, Colorado where he will compete against table tennis representatives from ten regional districts.

These tournaments, sponsored by the Student Union Board of each university, are designed to stimulate interest in the development of recreational activities which can supplement the academic life of the university student and which have lasting carry-over values throughout adult life.

The Carbondale tournament hosted twenty-two schools from Indiana and Illinois, excluding the Chicago area. An estimated 350-400 students competed in the SIU Regional tournament.
