EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT, *ROBERT E. MAYS*, Associate Professor of Education and Director of Student Teaching and Laboratory Experiences, joined the ISUE teaching staff in 1973.

DR. MAYS conceived and designed a new minor for the Division of Education called the Metro-Core Educational Development Program. The Metro-Core Program is an innovative program for teachers preparing to work in the inner cities.


DR. MAYS also designed a four-year laboratory experiences program to provide sequential laboratory experiences for all students throughout the Teacher Education Program. The program is based on the assumption that meaningful laboratory experiences provided at the same time the student is pursuing professional education and coursework are necessary to maximize teacher preparation. To accompany the laboratory experiences program, *DR. MAYS* has written a lab manual which outlines the program in detail and serves as an aide to college faculty and public school personnel who work with ISUE students. This program is recognized by the Indiana State Department of Public Instruction as being one of the "top" programs in teacher education.

An Evansville native, *DR. MAYS* received a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education in 1964 from the University of Alaska, a Master of Science degree in Education in 1968 from Indiana University, and a Doctor of Education in Curriculum and Instruction in 1973, also from IU.

An accomplished individual, Dr. Mays was chosen as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America in 1975, and was selected to appear in International Men of Achievement, Third Edition. He was also named recipient of a Distinguished Service Award for Outstanding Volunteer Service to Project Head Start in 1975. More recent honors include being named 1976 recipient of a plaque for Outstanding and Dedicated Service to Project Headstart and the Community Action Program of Evansville; and 1976 "Most Distinguished Alumnus" of the North Central Province of Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity for Outstanding Achievement in Education and Community Service.

DR. MAYS also devotes time to the publication of his written work. Periodicals which have published his work include American Magazine, Hoosier Schoolmaster, Teacher Advocate, Indiana Mathematics, and The A.T.E. Newsletter, to name a few. His most recently published work is Opening The Public School Curriculum, a paperback text published by Kendall/Hunt Publishing Co.

When asked what motivates him to devote so many hours and to be so totally dedicated to the field of education, *DR. MAYS* replied that his motto has always been "to think, to work and to serve--and that goes for any job, in order to do one's part."
