Derek Bosier to be Visiting Artist

Mr. Derek Bosier, an international artist best known as one of the founders of the British Pop Movement, will be a visiting artist at USI February 20-27, when he will work on a series of linocut prints. His visit is sponsored by the Robert Lee Blaffer Trust.

Mr. Bosier will give two lectures, the first "Derek Bosier, His Work, 1956-1996," to be presented at 6 p.m. Tuesday, February 25, in Forum II at USI. In "Misericords - Medieval English Woodcarvings" at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, February 26, at The Athenaeum at New Harmony, he will examine the intricate, rare, secret carved seats which can be found in choir stalls of Medieval churches.

Mr. Bosier also will work closely with Mr. Larry Hortenbury and his students in an evening printmaking class in the USI Art Center and will make himself available for USI classroom visits and discussions on student work. Mr. Hortenbury is an Evansville artist who is substituting while Mr. Michael Aakhus, professor of art, is on leave this spring.

Mr. Bosier attended the Royal College of England (1959-62) and has worked in a variety of mediums, including painting, printing, film, pho-
