



USI TO HOST NIKKI GIOVANNI, ENLOW DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR

Ms. Nikki Giovanni, one of the most exciting and dynamic poets of the twentieth century, will visit USI on Thursday and Friday, April 19-20, as the School of Liberal Art's 1990 Enlow Distinguished Scholar.

Ms. Giovanni, professor of creative writing at Virginia Polytechnic and State University in Blacksburg, Virginia, will deliver a reading from her works at 8 p.m. Thursday in Forum I. A reception and booksigning will follow in UC308. On Friday, she will make informal presentations during two classes, 9 and 10 a.m., in Forum III. All three programs are free and open to the public. Ms. Giovanni's style captures the moods and feelings of our society with such a clear sense of reality that her work is truly exceptional. She discovers and uncovers people, feelings, and situations across a wide spec-

trum of life. She discusses candidly the roles of daughter and mother, the joy of feeling love, and the despair of loneliness. She talks about the homeless, Aretha Franklin, crutches, Africa, and bell-bottom jeans. Her humorous, brutally honest look at her life and the world around her makes her our

most widely-read living black poet. Ms. Giovanni also will attend the USI Sigma Tau Delta chapter's 1990 initiation ceremony at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 19, in UC308 and become an honorary member of the USI chapter. New members will be initiated and new officers will be installed.
