



**ISUE SGA PRESIDENT ATTENDS WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE.** On Friday, February 15, Student Government Association president TONY SCALES joined approximately 200 student leaders from across the nation at a White House conference on foreign and domestic policy issues.

Leading the briefings were senior members of the White House staff, members of the National Security Council and Domestic Policy staff.

Scales, a senior business major, personally met President Carter, National Security Advisor Zbigniew Brzezinski and Senator Richard Lugar. He was interviewed by the Evansville Press Washington correspondent and other members of the White House press corps.

Overall, Scales felt the trip was well worth the effort. "The whole thing seemed really positive," Scales told the Evansville Courier. "Most students there were pretty supportive of the things he's (Carter's) doing."

**MID-AMERICA CONFERENCE ON COMPOSITION AT ISUE.** On April 11, 1980, the Mid-America Conference on Composition -- attended by regional college and high school teachers -- will be held at ISUE from 9:30 a.m. until evening.

The featured speaker on this year's program will be Father Walter J. Ong of St. Louis University, an internationally known scholar of language and communication and member of several national committees on the humanities -- including Presidential commissions, the National Endowment for Humanities, and the prestigious Modern Language Association of which he was president in 1978. Father Ong is known world-wide as a lecturer, especially upon the influence of writing and electronic media on the modern mind. He will be speaking at the conference on "Writing as a Humanistic Technology."

In addition, several other panels and speakers at the conference will address the general theme of "Composition and the Humanities."
