November workshop to help high school students with career planning

“College-bound high school students are often uncertain about career choices and what to study in college,” said Tim Buecher, director of the University of Southern Indiana Career Counseling Center. “Many of the undecided students graduate from high school and enroll in college. Unfortunately, without a good idea of why they are in college, many of them fail.”

His office hopes to slow that trend and aid high school students by sponsoring Career Planning 101 on **Saturday, November 4** in the Liberal Arts Center at the University of Southern Indiana. In the workshop students will be guided through a career counseling system and receive a well-researched, personal plan for what careers and college majors are best suited for them. They will discover the best sources of career information, how to research careers properly, and how to link their interests, values, skills, and personalities to compatible careers.

Professional career counselors will supervise testing and counseling. University career advisors, with assistance from high school guidance counselors, will interpret the results of career tests with each student, individually and in small groups.

The program, limited to the first 50 registrants, will begin with registration at 8:30 a.m.; lunch is included in the \$50 registration fee. Students should pre-register by calling the USI Office of Extended Services, 464-1989.
