USI Theatre will open its spring season February 16-26 with *The Seagull* by Mr. Anton Chekhov, to be presented February 16-26 at the theatre at 3001 Igleheart Avenue.

This classic observes the familial relationships and personal struggles of a younger generation in pursuit of dreams for success and desire for love. Set within the social malaise of the Russian gentry's historical decline, Mr. Chekhov's unique artistry casts an oddly comic light upon a world of petty pretentiousness, a world where love and indifference, passion and despair must coexist like members of an eccentric family, where even the purest impulses must succumb to uncertainty — a world where hearts can only break.

Mr. Elliot Wasserman, assistant professor of theatre, is directing the

State budget hearing planned at USI

Indiana House Ways and Means Committee members will hold a "town meeting" in Evansville on February 17 (delayed from the February 10 date listed in the University Notes calendar) to seek public comment on the state's two-year \$14-billion budget and other issues facing the 1995 General Assembly.

The 25-member House committee will divide up for visits to seven Hoosier communities, with members who stay in the capitol city joining the road group via a videoconference hookup. Meetings will be held in Fort Wayne, Lafayette, and Terre Haute on February 10, and Evansville, Gary, New Albany, and South Bend on February 17.

The Evansville hearing will be from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in UC350 at USI. The public is urged to join local government/school officials who are expected to participate in the two meetings.

Eagle rankings

The USI men's basketball Eagles won two GLVC games on last week's road trip -- Ashland and IU/PU-Fort Wayne -- and climbed to a fourth-place national ranking in NCAA Division II, No. 1 in the Great Lakes Region. The Eagles started the season as No. 1, but were knocked out of the top 20 by two early losses. They now are 15-2 for the season.

The Lady Eagles, meanwhile, lost both games on that same road trip, putting an end to an unbeaten season. The losses dropped them from No. 3 to No. 7 in NCAA Division II national rankings, but they held onto No. 1 in the Great Lakes Region. The Lady Eagles had held the NCAA No. 3 spot for three weeks. The road losses put them at 15-2 for the season.

While the Lady Eagles were losing as a team, forward/center LeAnn Freeland was breaking school records: she scored 46 points in the Ashland game, 50 against IU/PU-Fort Wayne. GLVC Player of the Week honors went to Freeland and to Stan Goward, junior forward on the men's team who scored 51 points and took 17 rebounds in last week's road games.
