



NEW NONCREDIT COURSES OFFERED. Several new courses are included in the fall series of noncredit courses offered by the Office of Continuing Education. The courses are presented in a noncompetitive informal atmosphere where interest in learning is the primary consideration.

The new courses offered this fall include six aquatics classes made possible by the opening of the new HPER Building. Others are

"Ballet," "Basic Bicycle Maintenance and Repair," "Boys Gymnastics," "Buying and Caring for a Vintage Home," "Design Your Own Kitchen," "On the Back," "Pre-Season Athletic Conditioning," "Private Pilot Ground School," and "Weatherization." Another new innovation is the "Saturday Seminars for Singles" which enables singles over 21 years of age to choose four seminars to attend out of a possible 26 on October 18.

For ISUE students and employees, Continuing Education will offer a 12-week noncredit course in Women's Weight Training beginning September 29. Participants will be shown the correct procedures for using the Universal weight training equipment in the HPER Building. Instruction will be given on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 4:45 - 5:45 p.m. during the first week. After the first week, instruction will be given on Monday and participants will have the opportunity to utilize the facility for two additional exercise periods each week. PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. SANDRA POWELL BARBER, academic systems analyst, and CHARLES T. BARBER, associate professor of political science, have written a 24-page professional paper entitled "Levels of Violence in Regional Conflicts: The Middle East and Africa." Their paper was read on August 31 at the 75th annual meeting of the American Sociological Association.

ANDREW JORGENSEN, assistant professor of chemistry, recently presented a paper to the Second Chemical Congress of the North American Continent held in Las Vegas, Nevada, on August 24-29, 1980. His paper was entitled "Determination of Accurate Differential Cross Sections for Reactive Scattering of $H + H_2$ on an LEPS Potential Surface." Co-authors for this paper were ERIC HILLENBRAND, an ISUE student, and Professor Eric Gislason of the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle. The basis of the report was extensive calculations performed on our CDC Cyber 171 computer system during the spring semester of this year. The authors were invited to contribute a chapter about their work to the monograph: "Potential Energy Surfaces and Dynamics Calculations." This volume will be published by Plenum Press in early 1981.

ROBERT E. MAYS, director of field experiences and coordinator of graduate studies, and CHARLES J. BERTRAM, chairman of the division of education, recently had an article published in the Journal of Children and Youth (Spring, 1980) titled, "The Gifted and Talented: Implications for Teaching."

CHARLES F. PETRANEK presented a paper to the Indiana Academy of Family Physicians, which was entitled "A Study of Family Practice Residents in Indiana" this summer. In addition, he also attended a two-week seminar at the University of Michigan on applying simulations, gaming, and computers to classroom learning.

ROBERT L. REID, vice president for academic affairs, reviewed in the June issue of The Journal of American History a book by Ronald Cohen and Raymond Mohl entitled The Paradox of Progressive Education: The Gary Plan and Urban Schooling.
