



FALL SEMESTER NEARS; ORIENTATION GROWING

The first day of fall classes -- Monday, August 26 -- is less than three weeks away and the University-wide effort to welcome new and returning students and faculty is under way.

The fall Faculty and Administrative Staff Meeting will be held at 9 a.m. Monday, August 19, in Forum I. Coffee and rolls will be available by 8:30 a.m. Faculty/staff photographs will be taken in AD119A, starting at 7:30 a.m. New faculty orientation is planned for 8 a.m.-12 noon Tuesday, August 20, in Forum I.

Student orientation will get under way Sunday, August 18. Religious services will be available in the morning. Family orientation will start at 1 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center and wind up around 4 p.m. with a reception at the University Home. The movie *Flatliners* will be shown at 9 p.m. in Forum I.

Dr. Will Keim, a Corvallis, Oregon, minister who is active as a campus minister and residence hall director at Oregon State University, will be featured at orientation activities for new students, starting at 8 a.m. Monday in PAC122A. Adult student orientation will be available at 1 and 6 p.m. Monday in Forum II. The AMIGOs will sponsor a Hawaiian luau at 6:30 p.m.

Activities on Tuesday, August 20, include placement testing from 8 a.m. to 12 noon in Forum I, an Ohio River cruise during the afternoon, and a possible group trip to see *Young Abe Lincoln* that evening. New student registration will get under way at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, August 21, in the PAC, with open registration to start at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, August 22, in the schools. *The Naked Gun* will be the "outdoor movie" at 9 p.m. Wednesday outside the PAC. Thursday events will include tours at Historic New Harmony at 12 noon and the AMIGO's "Wacky Olympics," starting at 4 p.m. on campus. On Friday, August 23, there will be a "Surfin' USP" beach party at Burdette Park and the Orientation Dance, starting at 8 p.m., on campus.

"ALWAYS A RIVER" IS ELDERHOSTEL THEME

The summer 1991 project, "Always a River," is the theme for the 1991 Elderhostel program sponsored by the Office of Continuing Education. The group of 36 seniors, age 60 and above, will gather Sunday, August 11, for a week of studying the Ohio River.

They will hear from **Dr. Robert L. Reid**, vice president for Academic Affairs who edited the official *Always a River* book which accompanies the exhibit now making its way downstream; **Dr. Frank L. Stanonis**, dean of the School of Science and Engineering Technology who will discuss physical attributes of a river; **Dr. Donald E. Pitzer**, chair of the History Department who will discuss how civilization spreads along a river; **the Rev. Anthony Kissel**, director of Campus Ministry who will discuss rivers and religious symbolism; and **Mr. Augustine J. Fredrich**, chair of the Engineering Technology Department who will discuss river engineering. The group will tour the exhibit aboard the Lilienthal, a Corps of Engineers barge slated to dock at Evansville from Thursday, August 15, through Sunday, August 18. They also will tour downtown Evansville, including a trip to Willard Library where **Mr. Larry D. Goss**, professor of engineering technology, will discuss how tracing family trees often means following a river. Although it wasn't on the original schedule, **Mrs. Linda Cleek**, Elderhostel coordinator, said she plans to invite the group to the Big Band Dance on the Riverfront Friday night, to celebrate "graduation."

The barge, carrying an interactive exhibit in which visitors will experience the story of the Ohio River, also will be at Tell City, Indiana, August 8-10; Owensboro, Kentucky, August 12-13; Henderson, Kentucky, August 20-21; and Mt. Vernon, Indiana,

August 23-24. The exhibit will close Labor Day weekend, September 2-8, at Cairo, Illinois.

Evansville Center City Corporation is planning a three-day festival to coincide with the Evansville docking that includes the Big Band Dance Friday evening. Mt. Vernon will include the barge in its 175th anniversary celebration.

"Always A River: The Ohio River and the American Experience," is sponsored by the humanities councils of Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia, and supported by a \$175,000 Exemplary Award grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The project focuses on the way the river has shaped the personal experiences, commercial life, technological development, settlement patterns, and artistic vision of the people of its region. Inextricably linked to this is a consideration of how the people have changed and shaped the river and related to the primal natural forces which give it its special character and power.

In addition, 600 attended the public performance of communal music of and by the Moravians, Shakers, Ephrata Cloister, Padanaram Settlement (near Bedford, Indiana), and a 90-voice youth choir gathered from all seven eastern Hutterian *bruderhof* communities in the U.S.

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, USI professor of history, director of the Center for Communal Studies, and president of the international association, presided. He also presented "The Theory of Developmental Communalism" in a session in which others gave the most recent evidence regarding this new approach to communal studies from their contributions to a book he is editing. Mr. James A. Sanders, director of
