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PICNIC TO CELEBRATE USI INDEPENDENCE. Monday, July 1 -- the first official day for the University of Southern Indiana -- will be celebrated by employees with a picnic on the University Center Mall. The event will be held from noon to 1 p.m., and will feature lunch, a USI independence program by the Childcare Center, and the setting loose of helium-filled balloons over the community. The balloons will carry tickets that may be redeemed on campus for small tokens of USI's new status in the community and state.

The lunch will include meat trays, cheese, bread, plates, napkins, and utensils provided by the University, with participants asked to bring a covered dish -- either a vegetable dish, salad, or dessert. All persons planning to attend are asked to turn in reservations with their division offices by 2 p.m. Friday. (The picnic has been approved by the Personnel Office.)

HELP USI RETAIN ISUE'S "SPIRIT AWARD." It happened last year at the Freedom Festival's Chili Cook-off -- ISUE's chili met a sad fate, but the cooks and their supporters from the University family took first place in having fun -- they won the Spirit Award. And **Mr. Tim Buecher**, director of admissions and chairman of the USI cook-off team, says they will be working extra hard to keep the award with USI for 1985. The official cook-off time is listed as 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., but Buecher says the USI crew will be on hand from 8 a.m. on and welcomes help with an assortment of tasks -- serving refreshments and promoting the new "U" -- throughout the day. The date: Saturday, July 13. The place: Freedom Park at 7th Street and the Walkway, opposite the Civic Center. Get in on the fun now by calling Buecher at extension 1765 for a committee assignment, or show up on the 13th and catch some special entertainment by the USI team.

A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST. Cannons and Muskets will return to the University campus again this year for two days of fascinating Civil War Era activity, including re-enactment of a battle. They will start at 8 a.m. Saturday, July 6, with the raising of the colors at the USI

Administration Building flag display. There will be Artillery and Cavalry competitions at 11 a.m.; a Fashion Show at the Herb Garden and the Enlisted Men Field Uniform Competition in the University Conference Center at 1:30; Ladies Tea at the Grimes Haus and the Day Dress Competition (in case of rain, at UCC) at 2 p.m.; the Infantry Field Situation Course Competition will run from 2 to 5 p.m., starting at the tennis courts and moving into the woods; dinner (for Cannons and Muskets participants only) will be at 5 p.m. on the Mall; the colors will come down at 6, and at 8, the full-dress Military Ball will get under way, also on the Mall.

Sunday, July 7, will be equally fascinating -- the colors will be raised again at 8 a.m.; breakfast will be served at Westwood Lodge at 8:30; a church service will be held in the Amphitheater at 9; at 10 a.m., re-enactment participants will receive their powder issue at the Eicher Barn, at the same time the Officers' Call is being held in the President's Suite, UCC; at 12:30 p.m., there will be an Arms Inspection at the battleground, and the battle will be joined at 1:30 in the area between the University and Technology centers.

The public is invited to watch all of the activity and participate in much of it, including the Ladies Tea and the Military Ball. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Charles F. Petranek, associate professor of sociology, and Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, professor of history, presented papers at the International Conference on Kibbutz and Communes, held May 19-22 at the Tabenkin Institute, Eyal, Israel. Dr. Petranek's paper was titled "Education and Socialization in the Unification Church" and Dr. Pitzer's was titled "Patterns in Education in American Communal Societies." Dr. Pitzer also was selected to serve on an interim committee created by the conference to form an International Communal Studies Association.
