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NEW VICE PRESIDENCY APPROVED. The USI Board of Trustees has approved a status change for **Mrs. Sherrienne Standley**, assistant to the president who will become the first woman vice president of the University, effective July 1. She will be vice president for university relations, with her responsibilities for public information programs being expanded to include administration of development and alumni affairs programs. Mrs. Standley joined the USI staff 10 years ago as director of publications. She became assistant to the president 18 months later. She formerly was director of development for Northern Kentucky University and director of public relations for the Indiana Democratic Central Committee. She is an active member of numerous community and professional groups, including her recent election to a two-year term on the board of the Indiana Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (ICASE).

PROMOTIONS APPROVED. The USI Board of Trustees at the May meeting approved the promotions of **Dr. Wanda B. Hibbitts**, **Dr. Oscar Ozete**, and **Dr. Thomas M. Rivers** from associate professors to professors of business, Spanish, and English, respectively, and the promotion of **Dr. Sherry B. Darrell** from assistant to associate professor of English. The Board also approved emeritus status for **Dr. George S. Abshier**, professor of business whose retirement was effective May 10.

CLASSROOM ADDITION STATUS. The Indiana Commission for Higher Education has approved USI's request for \$60,000 to initiate architectural planning for the \$7.8-million classroom addition needed to accommodate continued growth in enrollment. A proposal still must be taken to the Indiana General Assembly for construction funding; if approved in the 1987 legislative session, the facility could be completed by the 1989-90 academic year. The building is included in a 10-year Capital Improvement Plan which the USI Board of Trustees approved at the May meeting Friday. Medium- and long-term items in the capital plan -- all of which are subject to regular review and alteration -- include proposals for structural and road improvements, state-of-the-art heating and air-conditioning equipment, classroom and library equipment, and further campus expansion. In the latter category are proposals for University Center expansion, an auditorium, and facilities for a Computer Center and a Health Professions Building.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Charles T. Barber, professor of political science, attended a conference for collegiate instructors on "The Strategic Defense Initiative," held May 9-10 in Worthington, Ohio, under sponsorship of the National Strategy Information Center of New York City and the Mershon Center of Ohio State University, Columbus. Presenters included political scientists from the University of Wisconsin and England, physicists from Washington, D.C., and Amherst, and a U.S. Air Force major general.

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history, is one of three judges who will select recipients for three \$10,000 Whirlpool Corporation scholarships made available to children of Evansville Division employees. Dr. Bigham also is one of three professional historians chosen to select two recipients of \$4,000 dissertation research grants in Indiana history, offered by the Indiana Historical Society.

Mr. Matthew Graham, assistant professor of English, has been invited to participate in the Golden Jubilee program of the Iowa Writers Workshop, to be held May 23-25 at the University of Iowa at Ames.

Dr. Robert E. Mays, professor of education, was guest speaker at the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation's annual Kindergarten Roundup, held May 5 at Cedar Hall Elementary School. His topic was "Parents as Image Makers."
