



## EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

The recent tremor, measuring 4.6 on the Richter Scale, reminded us of the importance of emergency preparedness, whether it be for a tornado or other weather-related incident, a chemical accident, or other events.

To better prepare the USI campus for a response to any disaster, a University committee is being formed to draft a comprehensive disaster plan. Any employee who has an interest in working on this committee is encouraged to call the University Relations Office, extension 1755.

The tremor also raised questions from employees about what to do if an earthquake occurs. Attached to this issue of University Notes is a sheet which each person should study and save -- even post -- for your area. Remember -- an earthquake occurs without warning. If one occurs, remain where you are if possible until the initial shock has ended. If indoors, take cover under a desk, doorway, or table, or move to an inside wall. Move away from windows and try to protect your head from falling debris.

Immediately afterward, evacuate buildings calmly and orderly. Faculty and staff members should be responsible for directing the evacuation and will designate someone to assist the physically disabled and injured during the evacuation.

### DO NOT USE ELEVATORS.

In a severe earthquake, students should not try to leave campus immediately, because highways and bridges may not be useable. Students also may be needed for first-aid assistance or to help with other campus needs. Under emergency conditions, city and county emergency response teams will be overloaded, making it necessary for people on campus to be self-sufficient in handling the situation for a period of time.
