H. Ray Hoops, *President*



H. Ray Hoops became the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in July 1994. During his tenure, he has forged important community partnerships and has overseen dramatic growth in the University's enrollment, facilities, and academic programs.

A native of Illinois, Dr. Hoops received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from

Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named Fellow of the Association.

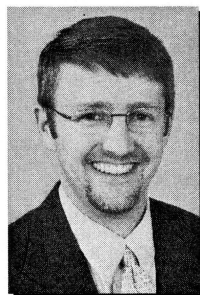
His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education,

and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University, and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the president of the University of Southern Indiana, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at Ole Miss, Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

President Hoops serves on the Deaconess Hospital Board of Directors, the Welborn Foundation Board of Directors, the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, and the WNIN Board of Directors. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves as the chair of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education.

Jon Mark Hall, *Director of Athletics*



Jon Mark Hall was appointed to the position of director of Athletics in January of 2002. He moved into the position after spending seven years as the assistant director of athletics. He is the second director of athletics that USI has had.

Under his direction, USI was the 2003-04 GLVC All-Sports and Commissioner's Cup winner and is the host of the 2004 NCAA Division II Cross Country national championships.

In addition to his duties as director of athletics, Hall also is the chair of the NCAA Division II men's and women's tennis committee. He has served on the Great Lakes Valley Conference Executive Committee and the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional women's basketball committee.

Hall joined the USI Athletic Department in 1995 as an assistant athletic director and men's tennis coach.

As the men's tennis coach, no one did it better in the GLVC than Hall. He was named the GLVC Coach of the Year five times, directed the Screaming Eagles to four GLVC regular season titles and GLVC Tournament crowns and set a 123-47 record (.724).

During his final season as head coach, Hall led the Eagles to their third straight appearance in the NCAA II Tournament and their first victory

in the post-season. In 2000 and 2001, Hall put the Eagles on the national map with their first two invitations to the NCAA II Tournament in the 27-year history of the program.

Hall came to USI after a tenure at the University of South Carolina-Spartanburg as an assistant athletic director, where he was the NCAA compliance coordinator, oversaw the academic support service program for student athletes, and coordinated the Athletes Can Educate (ACE) program. He also assisted in fund-raising and promotion activities.

The native of Murray, Kentucky, is a 1990 cum laude graduate of Murray State University, with a bachelor's degree in business administration. While at MSU, Hall was on the tennis team for two seasons, earning Academic All-Ohio Valley Conference honors in 1987. Hall received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio State University in 1992.

In 1998-99, he completed the Sports Management Institute Executive Program at the University of South Carolina and the University of Notre Dame.

Hall and his wife Patti reside in Evansville and have two sons, Nathan and Garland, and daughter Mary Claire.

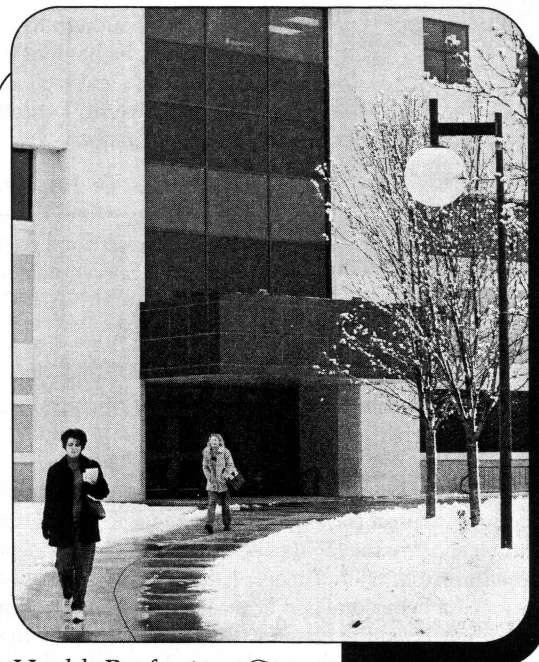

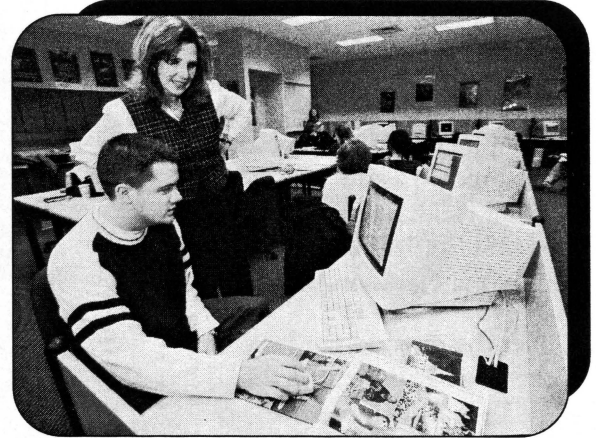

2005 Softball



A new era in University of Southern Indiana softball history is about to take place as the Screaming Eagles open a new home in 2005. The Screaming Eagles, who posted a 144-50 record at the original USI Softball Field, have moved to the new USI Softball Field at the USI Intramural Fields on Broadway.

Under the direction of Head Coach **Sue Kunkle**, the Eagles were 38-6 at their old field and expect to continue that success when they open their home schedule March 23 against McKendree College.

Kunkle, who is 84-60 in three seasons at the helm of the USI softball program, will have a big challenge in 2005 as she must replace her starting infield from a 2004 squad that was 26-24 overall, 11-7 in the GLVC, and finished third in the GLVC Tournament.

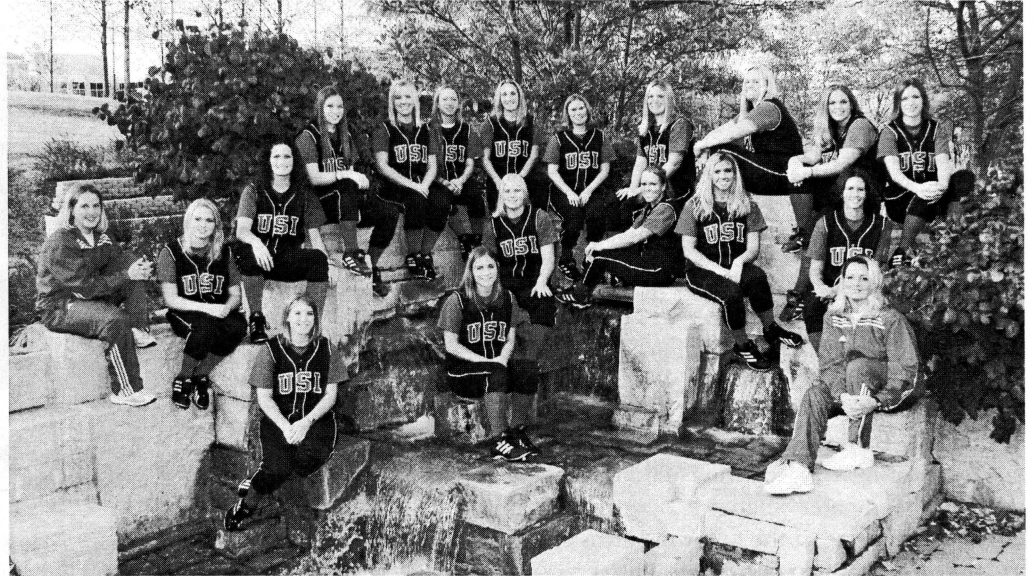
Leading the returnees in 2005 are All-GLVC performers **Sunny Oelling** and **Lisa Anderson**.



Sophomore catcher/designated player **Lisa Anderson** hit .361 with 24 RBIs and a team-high five home runs in 2004.

Oelling, a senior centerfielder, earned All-Conference honors for the second consecutive season after hitting .278 with 10 RBIs.

Oelling, who hit .401 as a sophomore in 2003, will join Kunkle and assistant coach **Annie Medico** on a USA Athletics

International squad in Holland this summer.

Anderson, a sophomore catcher/designated player that earned All-Region honors last season, was one of the top freshmen in the GLVC in 2004 after hitting .361 with 24 RBIs and a team-high five home runs. She will see more time as a catcher in 2005 with the graduation of former All-Conference catcher Kristen Houseworth.

Leading a new-look pitching staff into 2005 is junior hurler **Missy Grover**. Grover is 23-17 during the last two seasons. She started 25 games and had four shutouts in 2004.

Expected to make a significant impact to the squad this season is senior outfielder **Nickole Henson**. Henson played in 42 games and made 37 starts as a junior in 2004. Fellow classmate Stephanie Brown, who saw action primarily in pinch-hitting and pinch-running roles a

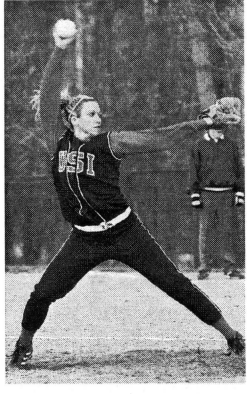
year ago, will add depth to the outfield in 2005.

Sophomore outfielder/pitcher **Nikki Nichols** also is expected to make a significant impact in the outfield and will provide depth to USI's pitching staff this season. Nichols hit .258 as a freshman in 2004, while making three starts from the pitcher's circle.

A year ago, sophomore infielders **Kerrie Burton** and **Jennifer Mullikin** both saw significant time as freshmen. Burton played in 34 games, making 10 starts, while Mullikin saw action in 29 games, making 26 starts.

Burton will be counted on to shore up the void left by former All-GLVC performer Brooke Biggs at second base, while Mullikin could see an expanded role at third base with the graduation of former All-Conference performer Shannon Emmons.

Giving the Eagles more depth behind the plate and an experienced bat off

the bench is sophomore catcher **Alia Whitman**. Whitman hit .222 in 16 games for the Eagles in 2004.

Kunkle will have eight newcomers—five transfers and three freshman—to work with in 2005.

Junior **Lindsey McNaughton**, will give the Eagles a proven arm in the pitching staff after posting a 16-13 record with a 1.82 ERA in two seasons at Hillsdale College. McNaughton also hit .262 with a home run and 16 RBIs during her two-year stint with the Chargers.

One spot the Eagles had to find help at was at shortstop after losing Nichole Pike to graduation. Junior shortstop **Krista Nugent** could be the solution at the position after transferring to USI from Western Nebraska Community College where she was an All-NJCAA I Region IX performer.

Junior first baseman **Angie Davis** will be a strong candidate to fill the void left by four-year starting first baseman Monica Tepe after transferring from Wabash Valley Junior College. Davis hit .313 with 21 RBIs as a sophomore in 2004 and helped WVJC to the 2004 XXIV Region championship and a sixth-place performance at the NJCAA Division I National Championship Tournament.

Davis will be challenged by sophomore catcher/first baseman **Kristy Groves**. Groves, a graduate of Heritage Hills

High School, led NCAA Division I Norfolk State University in 2004 with a .289 batting average and was second on the squad with 16 RBIs. She hit at least .400 in each of her last three seasons at HHHS.

Coming across town from the University of Evansville is sophomore utility player **Audra Lindenschmidt**. The Harrison High School graduate hit .235 with three RBIs as a freshman for the Aces in 2004 after earning first-team All-State honors as a senior at HHS in 2003. Lindenschmidt will see significant playing time in the middle infield.

Providing depth to the pitching staff in 2005 will be freshman lefty **Kathy Wood** and freshman right-hander **Kristin Eickholt**. Wood, who also will see playing time in the outfield, graduated from Tecumseh High School

where she was a four-time All-Conference selection as well as a second-team All-State selection as a senior in 2004.

Eickholt, who will see significant playing time at third base, comes to USI from Crestview High School in Convoy, Ohio, where she was a three-time All-State and four-time All-Conference and All-District performer.

Rounding out the newcomers and USI's freshman class is catcher **Valerie Hale**. Hale will give the Eagles a good bat off the bench and depth behind the plate after hitting .368 with a home run and 21 RBIs as a senior in 2004 for Gibson Southern High School.

USI starts the season February 25 at Kennesaw State University.

USI Head Coach Sue Kunkle



Sue Kunkle enters her fourth season at the helm of the University of Southern Indiana softball program after leading the Screaming Eagles to a third-place finish in the GLVC Tournament in 2004.

Kunkle's Eagles battled some of the top teams in Division II and jumped out to an 8-0 start in conference play before finishing the 2004 campaign with a 26-24 overall record and an 11-7 mark in the GLVC. USI also finished third in the GLVC Tournament in 2004.

With a three-year record of 84-60, Kunkle needs 35 victories to become the second winningest head coach in the program's 28-year history. She is currently fourth all-time at USI in wins and second all-time in winning percentage (.583).

In 2003, Kunkle directed the Eagles to a 27-18 overall record and a 13-7 mark in the GLVC. That squad produced six All-GLVC and four All-Great Lakes Region performers.

During her first season, Kunkle led the Eagles to a second-place finish in the Great Lakes Valley Conference Tournament and to within an eyelash of a berth in the NCAA Division II Tournament. Kunkle also set the USI record for wins by a first-year coach with a 31-18 overall record, 10-7 GLVC.

Kunkle was named head softball coach in August of 2001 after a tenure at The University of Akron. In addition to leading the softball program, Kunkle teaches in the USI Physical Education Department.

Kunkle helped to develop some of Akron's best hurlers, including 1998 UA Female Athlete of the Year Shelby Howell (1995-1998). Kunkle was responsible for recruiting and coordinating the team's travel arrangements. Her duties also included organizing the Zips camps and clinics, the Dugout Club, and alumni relations.

Prior to her tenure at Akron, Kunkle began her coaching career as a volunteer assistant at California University of Pennsylvania. She gained a year of coaching experience

at Morehead State University in Kentucky, before being named assistant coach at Bethel Park.

A four-year starter at California, Kunkle became the winningest pitcher in school history with a career record of 54-12 from 1990-94. The Vulcans earned PSAC West Championships in Kunkle's last three seasons, and were the conference's overall champs in 1991. An All-Region pitcher as a junior, she earned All-Conference and All-Regional Tournament honors as a senior, while leading her team to a regional championship and California's first ever appearance in the Division II College World Series.

Kunkle, who resides in Evansville with her daughter Morgan, earned a bachelor's degree in education from California in 1994. She received her master's in sports science and coaching at The University of Akron in May of 2001.

Annie Medico enters her second season with the USI softball coaching staff. Medico will assist Head Coach Sue Kunkle in all facets of the USI softball program.

“Coach Medico has done a tremendous job with our program,” Kunkle said. Along with on-field coaching, Annie

assists in many areas such as recruiting, charting the academic progress of our student-athletes, and the conditioning and weight training of our student-athletes.”

A 2003 graduate of Southwest Missouri State University, Medico spent the 2003 season as a student assistant for

the SMSU Bears. She helped direct the Bears to a 29-25 record.

Prior to serving as a student assistant, Medico was a two-time All-Missouri Valley Conference performer for SMSU. She appeared in 201 games during her SMSU career, recording 125 hits and driving in 56 runs.

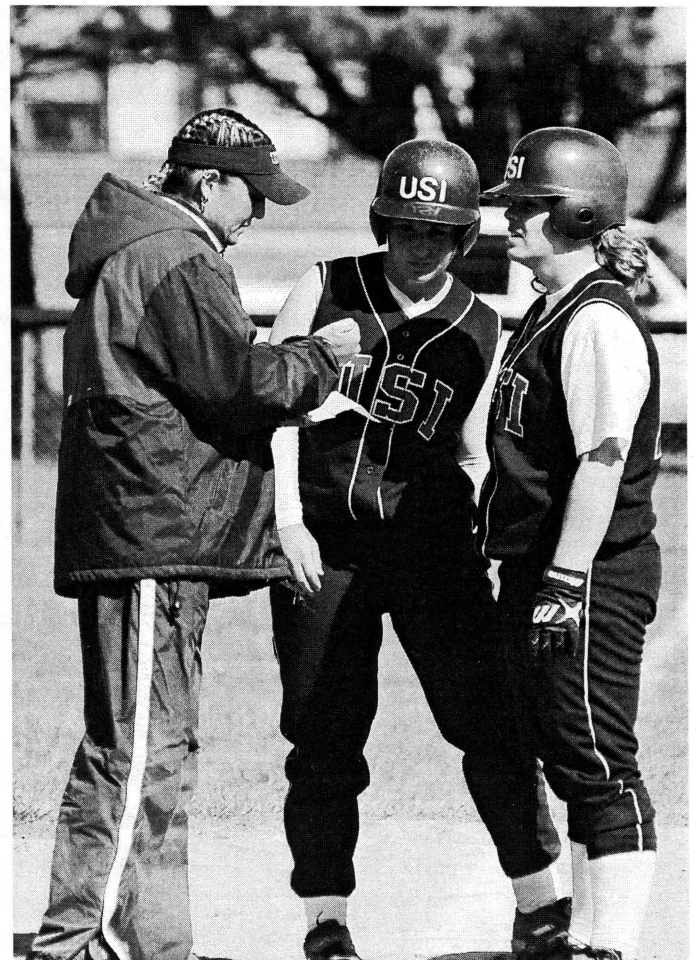
Kunkle, Medico to coach in Europe

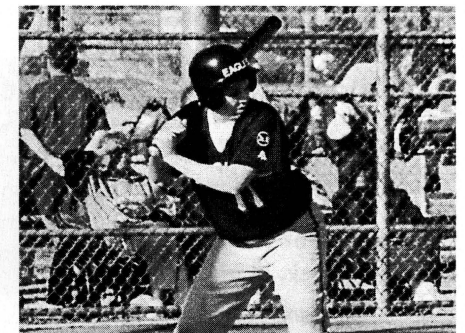

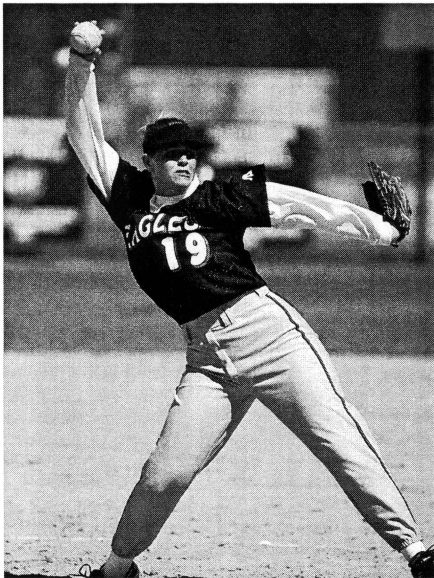
