AMERICAN ISSUES FORUM, R. Buckminster Fuller, famous architect and educator, will give a public lecture at ISUE on the evening of February 25 at 7:30 p.m. in Room Al26. His lecture will be on a bicentennial theme, "Utopia or Oblivion in America's Third Century." He has concluded that man's technological development has brought him to the point where he can supply his needs or destroy civilization itself.

Mr. Fuller, a mathematical genius and an engineer of rare and extraordinary foresight, has been a pioneer of revolutionary technical inventions, with his most famous creation being the geodesic dome. He is interested in using the dome to enclose entire communities, permitting total climatic control.

At age eighty, Buckminster Fuller is one of the nation's most sought after lecturers and authors. Currently, he is World Fellow in Residence at the University of Pennsylvania, Haverford College, Swarthmore College, Bryn Mawr College, and the University City Science Center in Philadelphia. He is a Professor at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois.

HUMANITIES FORM. John Gottcent, Associate Professor of English, and Dale Shook, Assistant Professor of Business, will be the featured speakers for the next Humanities Forum scheduled for Thursday, February 26 at 1:00 p.m. in Room A28. "Advertising in America: The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly," will be a formal debate between Dr. Gottcent and Dr. Shook to examine the pros and cons of advertising as a modern cultural phenomenon. The initial argument will be for the necessity of advertising in the business process, and the rejoinder will be for the necessity of recognizing some of the abuses in recent advertising.
