



Indiana State University Notes Evansville Campus

THE INDEPENDENT EYE. On Monday, January 17, the Student Union Board will sponsor the appearance on campus of Conrad and Linda Bishop. The husband and wife team known as "The Independent Eye" will be appearing in Room A126 at 3:00 p.m.

"Dessie", the program they present, deals with the problem of child abuse. It dramatizes an abusive mother's inner and outer existence and is designed as a stimulus for discussion of the subject of child abuse. "Dessie" has been performed over one hundred times, before community

organizations, church groups and social service organizations. The Bishops have been active in drama since high school, preparing for a joint career in theater. Conrad Bishop earned his PhD at Stanford and then taught and directed for five years.

CONTINUING EDUCATION ADDS COURSES. Eight new courses have been added to the non-credit course schedule by the Office of Continuing Education. The new courses are French for Tourists, beginning January 24; Business Update for Women, January 27; Anthropology for Beginners, January 27; Beginning Yoga, February 22; Creative Writing Workshop for High School Students February 5; Beginning Guitar for Teachers, February 3; and Appreciating Music: The Art of Listening, and Parenting, February 1. SPECIAL COURSES OFFERED BY TELEVISION AND NEWSPAPER. Roots: The Black Experience In America, a tele-course planned during spring semester, is a narrative based on Alex Haley's novel Roots. The course is a comprehensive history relating the drama of one family--Haley's--which unfolds as the universal saga of Black Americans from "freedom to freedom".

The credit course is composed of three required meetings on campus, a 12-hour series of dramatizations to be telecast by ABC, the book Roots, an anthology, and a student guide. The course is being offered in cooperation with WTVW, Channel 7. The series will be telecast on eight consecutive evenings beginning January 23 at 8:00 p.m.

The first class meeting, an organizational meeting, will be Wednesday, January 19 at 7:00 p.m. in the ISUE Library, Room 107. The course carries three credit hours.

Also to be offered through the ISUE Office of Continuing Education and the University of Evansville in cooperation with The Evansville Courier, will be a course entitled "Moral Choices In Contemporary Society". The course will provide an opportunity to earn college credit by studying articles printed in the local newspaper. A series of 16 articles will be published in The Courier beginning Monday, January 24, 1977. Three required class meetings with the instructor will be held in Conference Room A, Student Union Building, on the University of Evansville campus. An organizational meeting will be held Thursday, January 20 at 7:00 p.m. The course carries two semester hours credit.
