HONORS DAY. Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, professor of history long active in University and community affairs, and Mrs. Gloria Gail Moore, a 42-year-old grandmother who is graduating magna cum laude in her quest for a "major change in my life," were named recipients Thursday of the top honors in the 1989 Honors Day Ceremony. Dr. Bigham was presented the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, the faculty recognition for colleagues who have demonstrated dedication to teaching and a quest for excellence. Mrs. Moore, a firm believer in the Liberal Arts education which has her considering an offer to be a researcher in Time magazine's Tampa, Florida, office, was presented both the President's Medal -- an award established by the faculty to recognize a graduating senior who has excelled academically and has given service to the University and community -- and the 1989 Liberal Arts Award.

Dr. Bigham was graduated magna cum laude from Messiah College in Grantham, Pennsylvania, with a B.A. in history. He studied theology at Harvard Divinity School for a year before going to the University of Kansas to work on his Ph.D., which he received in 1970. He joined the faculty of USI that year and has been active in numerous University, professional, and community organizations. During his 1976-77 sabbatical, he served half time as executive director during the formative years for Leadership Evansville, Inc., and stayed with the program through 1978. In 1986, he became director of the Historic Southern Indiana Project, a program to preserve, promote, and develop historic sites and resources. He is the author of two books on Evansville area history: We Ask Only a Fair Chance: A History of the Black Community of Evansville, Indiana, 1812-1945 and An Evansville Album: Perspectives on the History of a River City, 1812-1988, published by IU Press in 1987 and 1988, respectively. Dr. Bigham and his wife, Polly, have two children.

Mrs. Moore enrolled in USI planning to become a teacher, but switched to Liberal Arts in her sophomore year and is graduating as a history major with an English minor, having maintained a 3.85 cumulative grade point average. She has been active with several campus scholastic honoraries and the Student Government Association, but the group which gave her the most personal satisfaction was NOVA, an organization that encourages older people to enroll in university courses. Mrs. Moore said her longterm goal is to write. "It may be presumptuous, but what I'd really like to do is create a whole new genre," she said, adding she still has a lot more studying to do and expects now that "I'll always be going to school." Mrs. Moore lives in a MASH apartment with her 18-year-old daughter, Elizabeth. She also has a son, Adam, 15; a daughter, Anne-Marie, 20, and 3-month-old granddaughter, Lauren Ashton. Mrs. Moore has been night manager of the University Center for two years and has continued to be active in community school and service organizations. A brother, Mr. Mark Grassman, 21, also is a USI student. USI COMMENCEMENT. The 1989 Commencement will be held at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, May 13, in the Physical Activities Center. More than 600 students, a record number, are eligible to receive degrees, including six candidates for master's degrees. Ninth District Congressman Lee H. Hamilton, a former Evansville resident who is the senior member of the Indiana Congressional delegation, will bring the Commencement address and will be awarded an honorary Doctor of Civil Law degree in recognition of his many achievements in public service. Other honorary degrees will be conferred on Mr. D. Mead Johnson, former president and chairman of the board of Mead Johnson & Company, and Mrs. Carolyn S. Georgette, manager of residence services in Evansville for Indiana Bell Telephone Company.

NEW HARMONY GALLERY. "From the Poet's House: A Portrait of New Harmony" -- 40 works by Mr. John Hubbard -- will be the featured exhibition in May at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, sponsored by the Robert Lee Blaffer Trust. The exhibition will open with a reception for the artist from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 7, and continue through June 14. Mr. Hubbard created pastel and charcoal drawings of many sites throughout New Harmony while living there in October 1988. When he returned to Dorset, England, he completed a suite of 12 small etchings inspired by drawings he had done in New Harmony. This suite will be included in the exhibition. Mr. Hubbard is a Connecticut native who has a B.A. degree from Harvard University and studied at the Art Students League in New York and with Hans Hoffman in Provincetown, Massachusetts. He moved to England in 1961 and travels extensively, having done a series of drawings and paintings of sites throughout Europe and also designed costumes and sets for the Royal Ballet in London.

NAMES IN THE NEWS. Ms. M. Felicia Cavallini, women's basketball coach and instructor in physical education, has been selected as an Outstanding Young Woman of America for 1988 in recognition of her outstanding ability, accomplishments, and service to the community.

Dr. Charles F. Petranek, chairman of the Sociology Department, participated last week in a National Issues Conference in Washington, D.C., in which senators, representatives, and national leaders were invited to discuss whether democracy is working. The National Issues Forum has dedicated itself to discussing major issues in a town meeting format, this one conducted by **Mr. Hodding Carter** of public television, and will be aired in June on WNIN. Last January, Dr. Petranek led a town meeting discussion on campus in conjunction with Leadership Evansville on the topic of AIDS. At the Washington conference, Leadership Evansville received an award for its fine first-year participation. Dr. Petranek will lead discussions on campus next year on the issues of child cars, drugs, and the environment.
