Location

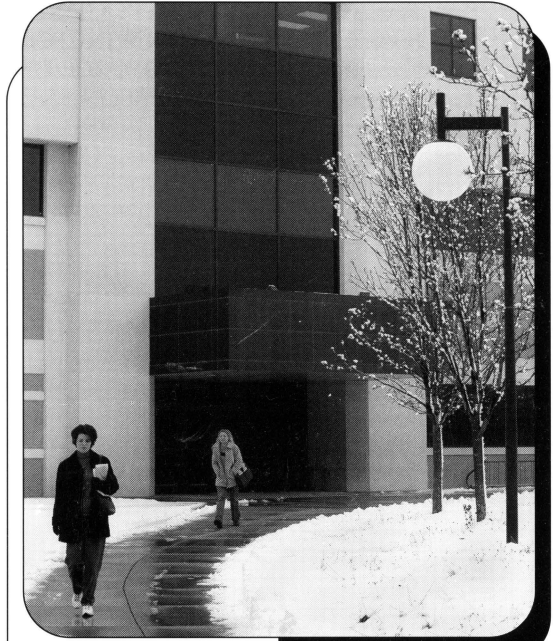
Founded in 1965, the University of Southern Indiana is located in Evansville, the state's third largest city. From its picturesque site on the Ohio River, Evansville is a comfortable drive from the major metropolitan areas of Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Louisville, Nashville, and St. Louis.

Academic Life

The University enrolls 9,675 students and offers undergraduate majors in 60 areas of study. Several graduate degree programs also are available.

Campus Life

Beyond the classroom, students have opportunities to participate in more than 80 organizations offering co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Special interest clubs, student government, sororities and fraternities, music and drama groups, and other organizations enable the students to enjoy and contribute to campus life.

USI offers two kinds of housing. One is the conventional apartment and the other is suite-style housing in a residence hall. Computer labs, laundromats, a convenience store, outdoor recreational areas, and student lounges contribute to an efficient living environment that has proven overwhelmingly popular with students. 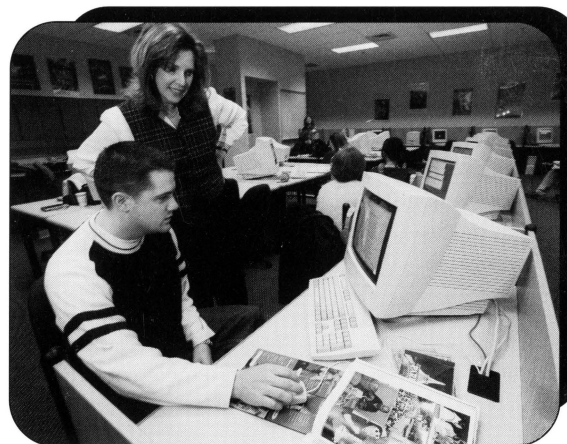

H. Ray Hoops, President



H. Ray Hoops became the second president of the University of Southern Indiana in July 1994. During his tenure, he has forged important community partnerships and has overseen dramatic growth in the University's enrollment, facilities, and academic programs.

A native of Illinois, Dr. Hoops received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Illinois University and master's and doctoral degrees in Audiology and Speech Sciences from Purdue University. He also completed an M.B.A. at Moorhead State University.

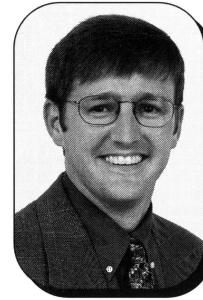
His career as a scientist and educator has included a faculty appointment jointly at the University of Michigan and Wayne State University. He published extensively and was nationally recognized for his contributions in the areas of rehabilitation of post-surgical patients with cancer of the larynx and in the analysis of language dynamics resulting from brain damage. Among his numerous publications in a variety of behavioral and medical journals was the report on a study which received the National Research Award, the highest honor of the American Speech and Hearing Association. Dr. Hoops also was named Fellow of the Association.

His administrative appointments included the directorship of the Division of Marketing in the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. He received two national service awards for that work. He also was a Senior Fulbright-Hayes Research Scholar in the College of Medicine at the University of the Philippines. Other appointments included dean of the Graduate College of the University of Northern Iowa, associate vice chancellor for Academic Affairs for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, vice president for Academic Affairs at North Dakota State University and president of South Dakota State University.

In the six years prior to becoming the president of the University of Southern Indiana, Dr. Hoops served as the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Mississippi. While at "Ole Miss," Dr. Hoops received the National Council of State Governments Association Award for his pioneering work on Project '95, a blueprint for the reform of education in the state of Mississippi. He also received the Peterson's Guide Award for contributions to the education of minority students in the innovative and highly successful graduate participation initiative.

President Hoops serves on the Deaconess Hospital Board of Directors, the Welborn Foundation Board of Directors, and the WNIN Board of Directors. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves as the chair of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education.

Jon Mark Hall, Director of Athletics



Jon Mark Hall was named director of Athletics in January 2002.

Hall joined the University of Southern Indiana Athletic Department in 1995 as an assistant athletic director and men's tennis coach. As an assistant athletic director, Hall was the assistant administrator for internal affairs, oversaw budgets, was the compliance coordinator, and oversaw game management operations.

As the men's tennis coach, no one did it better in the Great Lakes Valley Conference than Hall. He was named the GLVC Coach of the Year the past five years and directed the Eagles to four GLVC regular season titles and GLVC Tournament crowns.

During his final season as head coach, Hall led the Eagles to a third straight appearance in the NCAA Division II Tournament and their first victory in the post-season. In 2000 and 2001, Hall put the Eagles on the national map with the first two invitations to the NCAA Division II Tournament in the 27-year history of the program.

Hall's Eagles have won 58 of 75 dual matches in his final three years, including 34 straight GLVC matches. USI was 16-4, 8-0 GLVC in 2001-02; 22-7, 8-1 GLVC in 2000-01; and 20-6, 9-0 GLVC in 1999-2000.

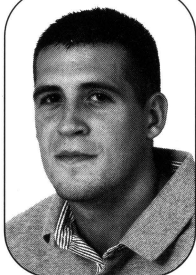
Recognized as one of the top coaches in Division II, Hall was invited to participate in the 2001 NCAA Yes Clinic at the Division II National Tennis Championships.

Hall came to USI after a tenure at the University of South Carolina-Spartanburg as an assistant athletic director, where he was the NCAA compliance coordinator, oversaw the academic support service program for student athletes, and coordinated the Athletes Can Educate (ACE) program. He also assisted in fund-raising and promotion activities.

The Murray, Kentucky, native is a 1990 cum laude graduate from Murray State University, with a bachelor's degree in business administration. While at MSU, Hall was on the tennis team for two seasons, earning Academic All-Ohio Valley Conference honors in 1987. Hall received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio State University in 1992.

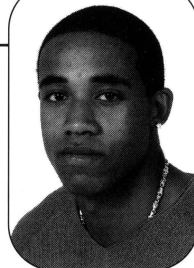
Hall and his wife Patti reside in Evansville and have a son, Nathan, and a daughter, Mary Claire.

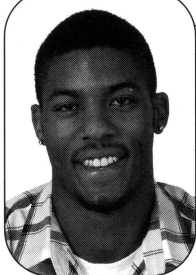

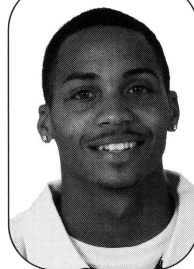

Most NCAA Division II men's basketball programs only dream about putting together a streak of 10 straight 20-win seasons. In 2002-03, the University of Southern Indiana will be after its 11th in a row.

The Screaming Eagles, considered a break-out team by *Street & Smith's College Basketball*, have won at least 20 games each season since 1992-93 and averaged 25 victories a year since 1993-94. USI, with a record of 253-54 (.824) over 10 seasons, also has produced nine NCAA II Tournament appearances, the 1995 NCAA II National Championship team, the 1994 NCAA II Finalist team, four Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, and five GLVC Tournament appearances.

Returning for his second season is USI Head Coach **Rick Herdes**. Herdes tied the USI record for a first-year coach, leading the Eagles to a 22-8 overall.

Herdes and the Eagles started slow with a 5-4 record in the first nine games, but overcame adversity to win 17 of the last 21 games. USI, 14-6 in the conference last year, also stayed in the hunt for a fifth-straight GLVC top two finish until the final week of the season.

Despite the graduation of four players, including two starters, Herdes has the shelves stocked for another shot at the GLVC crown and a run in the NCAA II Tournament.

Herdes returns eight players, five of whom saw significant action in 2002-03.

USI will lean heavily upon three returning starters, led by the GLVC Freshman-of-the-Year and sophomore guard **Cris Brunson** (Evansville, Indiana).

Brunson, an honorable mention All-GLVC selection a year ago, was second on the team and 17th in the GLVC with 13.4 points per game and ranked first in the GLVC in free throw percentage. He also was fourth in the league for three-point field goal percentage.

With Brunson on the outside, junior forward **Billy Harris** (Carbondale, Illinois) is underneath. Harris was right behind Brunson as a sophomore with 12.2 points per contest and ranked ninth in the GLVC with 6.6 rebounds per game.

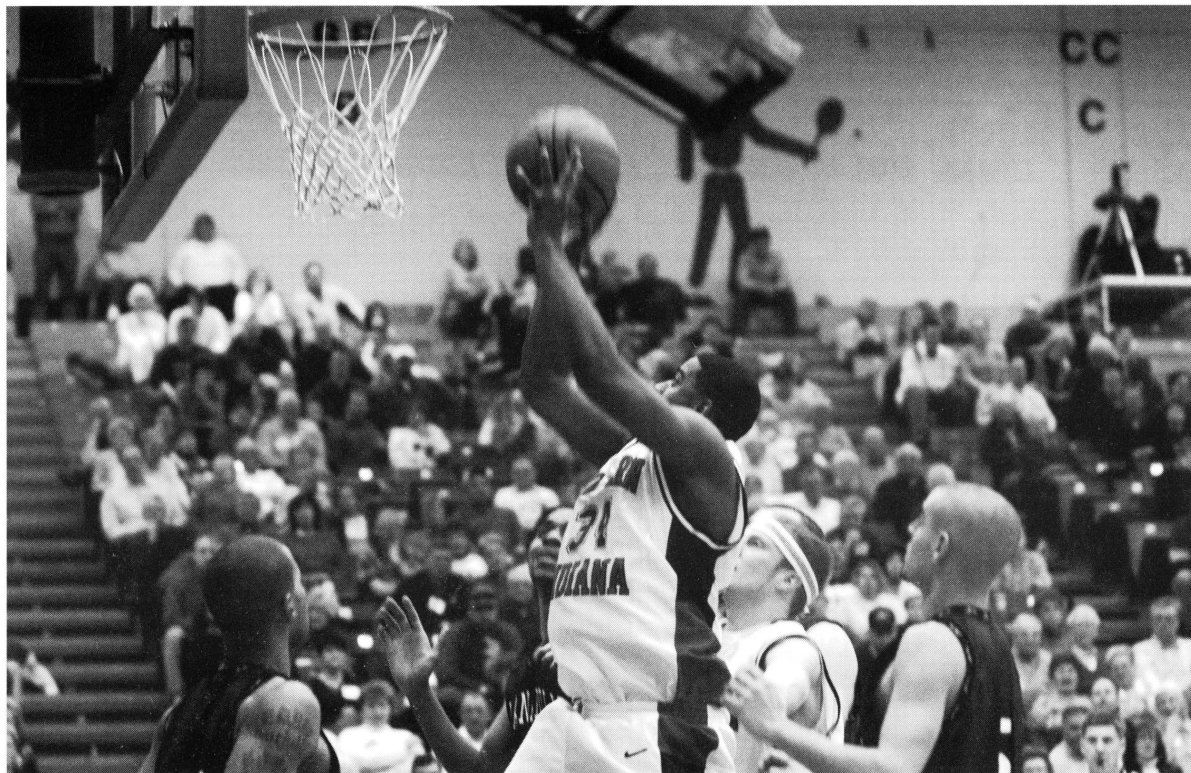
Harris made an impact late in the season, averaging 16.3 points in the final six games of 2001-02.

Getting the ball to Brunson and Harris is returning point guard **David Ragland** (Evansville, Indiana), who averaged 3.6 assists per game. The senior, who averaged 8.2 points in his first season with the Eagles, ranked among the GLVC leaders for assists and assist/turnover ratio.

Off the bench, the Eagles have a pair of solid returnees who also saw action as starters last season.

Senior forward **Diond're Givens** (Mt. Vernon, Indiana), who has started 29 of 91 games in three seasons with the Eagles, came off the bench to average 8.1 points and grabbed 4.0 rebounds per contest.

Backing up Ragland at the point is junior **Mike Arnold** (Indianapolis, Indiana). Arnold was third on the team with 2.7 assists per game and averaged 15.9 minutes of action as a sophomore.

Junior forward **Travis Farmer** (Wadesville, Indiana) returns to join Harris and Givens in the frontcourt. Farmer played in 24 games, averaged 1.5 points, and grabbed 1.4 rebounds per outing.

To supplement the returning players, Herdes recruited some diamonds to fill the holes. USI welcomes a senior, four juniors, three sophomores, and two freshmen.

Joining the Eagles' ranks for his senior campaign is guard/forward **Alan Goff** (Terre Haute, Indiana). Goff returns to Indiana from Lehigh University in Virginia where he averaged 7.2 points and 2.9 rebounds in two seasons. He began his college career at Vincennes University, averaging 14.0 points and 4.5 assists per game.

USI's leading recruit is sophomore forward **Dennis Coutee** (Jeffersonville, Indiana), a *Street & Smith's College Basketball* Preseason honorable mention All-American. Coutee, who had originally signed with the University of Louisville, averaged 19.8 point, 6.0 rebounds, and 2.4 assists in 37 games last year for Riverside Community College. The All-Orange Empire Conference performer ranked third in the conference in scoring, while his 33 points in a single game ranked fourth.

To bolster the USI defense and rebounding efforts the Eagles have increased their size around the bucket, averaging 6' 8" among the newcomers.

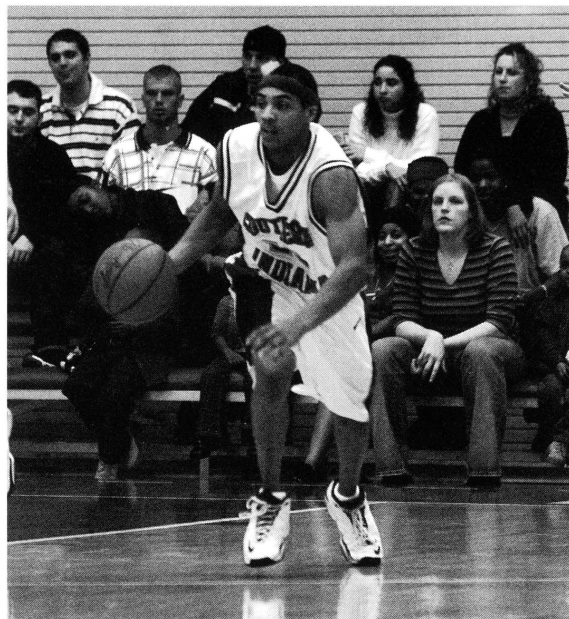
Center **Ronald Roundtree** (Philadelphia, Pennsylvania), a 6' 8" junior, joins Coutee in the cross country journey to Indiana from California. Roundtree was honorable mention All-Orange Empire Conference as a sophomore at Riverside, averaging 15.2 points and 6.6 rebounds per contest.

Herdes had only to cross the Wabash River to pick up junior forward/center **Sam Beyer** (Roanoke, Illinois) from Illinois Valley College. Beyer, a 6' 9" two-year player at IVC, averaged 7.0 rebounds and 7.9 points per contest last season.

The Eagles traveled to Florida to recruit 6' 8" junior center/forward **Reque Newsome** (St. Petersburg, Florida) and

6' 6" junior forward **Clarence Chillers** (Glendale Heights, Illinois). Newsome averaged 5.5 points and 4.3 rebounds over two seasons for Central Florida Community College. Chillers helped lead Pensacola Junior College to a 21-9 record in 2000-01, averaging 10.9 points and 6.6 rebounds per outing.

Beginning his first year on the varsity is sophomore forward **Antonio Andonov** (Macedonia), who transferred to USI from Lincoln Land Community College. He played

one season for Springfield College, before the program was cancelled, and for Williamsville High School in Williamsville, Illinois.

Out front the Eagles added a good mix of experience and youth.

Transferring to the program is junior guard **Kendrick Carr** (Bloomington, Illinois) and sophomore guard **Ayton Branch** (Bloomfield, New Jersey). Carr comes to USI from Illinois

Valley College where he played for two seasons. Branch played last season for Sage Junior College of Albany (New York), averaging 13.0 points and 7.0 assists per outing.

Entering their collegiate careers with the Eagles are freshman guards **Ronnie McClendon** (Mitchell, Indiana), **Lincoln Hay** (Henderson, Kentucky), and **Jed Davis** (Grayville, Illinois).

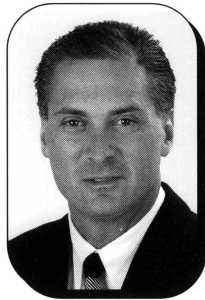
The regular season starts with a pair of non-conference home games with the Eagles hosting Wilberforce University on November 23 and Henderson State University on November 26. Henderson State, a Division II institution in the Gulf South Conference, was an NCAA Division II regional semifinalist with a 21-7 record last spring.

In addition to Henderson State and Wilberforce, the non-conference schedule includes a trip to Las Vegas, Nevada, for the High Desert Classic (teams to be determined) on December 14-15; and home games with Oakland City University on December 18, Lock Haven University on December 29, and the University of Illinois-Springfield on February 8.

The Eagles face one of the toughest Great Lakes Valley Conference schedules ever as the team plays four of the first six league games and four of the last six conference contests on the road. USI embarks on its quest for a GLVC title on November 30 at the Sportscenter in Owensboro, Kentucky, against Kentucky Wesleyan College.

The first GLVC home game is December 5 against the University of Indianapolis. USI hosts KWC, the Division II Tournament runner-up, on February 8 and Lewis University, the NCAA Division II Great Lakes Regional runner-up, on February 22. The GLVC Tournament is March 5-8 at Roberts Stadium.

USI Head Coach Rick Herdes



University of Southern Indiana men's basketball Head Coach **Rick Herdes** (Noble, Illinois) had a record tying first season at the helm of the Screaming Eagles. Herdes led the Eagles to a 22-8 overall record, tying the USI record for wins by a first year coach.

Herdes also led the Eagles to a fourth place finish in the Great Lakes Valley Conference with a 14-6 mark, advancing to the semifinals of the league's post-season tournament.

He had been with USI for nine seasons as an associate head coach and assistant coach before being tapped for the top position in 2001. The native of Noble, Illinois, was widely known as one of the best recruiters and top coaches in Division II basketball. The Eagles' successes since Herdes' arrival reflect his abilities.

In his nine seasons at USI, Herdes has helped direct the Eagles to a 231-46 overall record (.833), the 1995 NCAA II National Championship, the 1994 NCAA II National Championship game, three Great Lakes Valley Conference Championships, nine consecutive NCAA II Tournament appearances, and nine straight 20-win seasons. USI has averaged over 25 victories a season since 1993-94.

USI's point man on the recruiting trail, Herdes brought in nearly all of the key players who contributed to USI becoming a national power in Division II. Some of those key recruits were two-time NABC/NCAA Division II Player of the Year Stan Gouard, All-American and GLVC Player of the Year Chad Gilbert, Division II Bulletin All-American Jeremy Pearson, and 2001 first-team All-American Derrick Lyons.

Herdes came to USI from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, where he was an assistant from 1986 to 1992. While at SIUE, Herdes helped Head Coach Larry Graham lead the Cougars to a 127-56 (.694) record and three NCAA tournament appearances. He was responsible for coordinating recruiting. He also was academic advisor to the basketball team and director of summer camps and fund-raising events.

In 16 collegiate basketball seasons, the programs Herdes has been involved with have a .770 winning percentage (358-102).

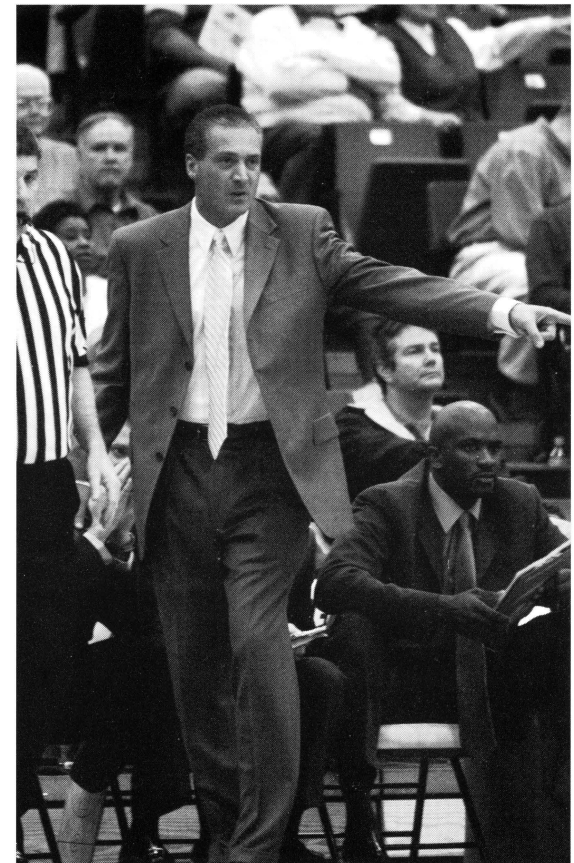
In 1991 and 1992 at SIUE, he was the head coach for the Illinois Prairie State Games, Southern Open Men's Division. His 1992 team received the silver medal.

Prior to working at SIUE, Herdes was an assistant basketball coach and physical education instructor at Lawrenceville (Illinois) High School, where he worked for current Indiana University assistant coach Ron Felling. LHS was the Illinois Class A State Champion in 1982 and 1983 and had a 68-game winning streak. Herdes was inducted into the Illinois High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 1998.

Herdes graduated from Graceland College in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education.

As a player, he led Lincoln Trail College to a ninth-place finish in the national tournament and helped lead Graceland to its first-ever appearance in the NAIA Tournament.

Herdes and his wife Sarah reside in Evansville with his two children, daughter Taylor, 10 and son Connor, 7.

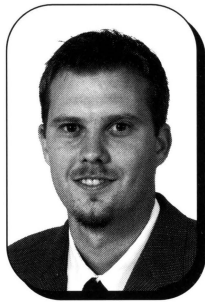

Marc Hostetter (Lyons, Indiana) returns for his second season as an assistant coach to Head Coach Rick Herdes.

Hostetter rejoined the USI program after spending two seasons as an assistant coach to Mike Leeder at Longwood College in Virginia. In 2000-01, Hostetter helped lead the Lancers to a 23-8 overall record, Longwood's first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference championship, and an NCAA Division II Tournament appearance.

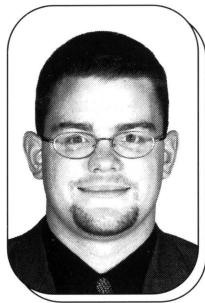
"Marc has the complete package, both as a person and a coach," said Coach Herdes. "His knowledge of the league and Division II basketball helped make an easier transition from Coach (Bruce) Pearl to myself. I recruited Marc to USI and his knowledge of the system and University will be a great asset to my program."

The Lyons, Indiana, native returns to the USI program he helped lead to the 1995 NCAA Division II National Championship. He posted a 105-17 record in four seasons as a point guard. During Hostetter's four seasons, the Screaming Eagles were ranked number one nationally at some point during the season in three of four seasons.

After his playing days, Hostetter joined the staff of former USI Head Coach Bruce Pearl for two seasons as an assistant coach. During his two seasons on the bench, USI finished as the GLVC Tournament runners-up twice while making a pair of NCAA II Tournament Sweet 16 appearances.

A 1998 USI graduate, Hostetter returns to Indiana with his wife, the former Nikki Jordan.

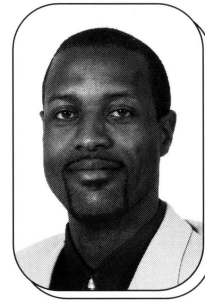
Student Asst. Coach Mark Hinkey

Assistant Coach Jesse Watkins



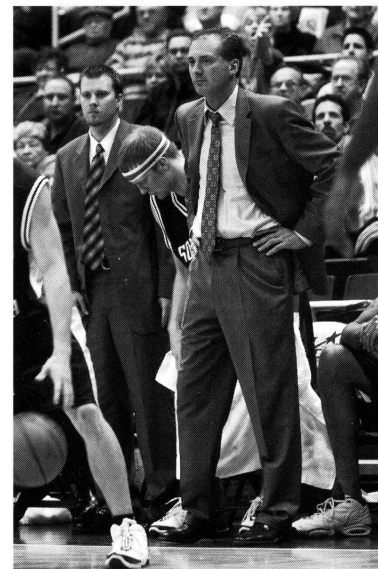
Jesse Watkins (Screven County, Georgia) enters his first season with the Screaming Eagles.

Watkins joined the USI staff after spending the previous two seasons as an assistant at Wabash Valley Junior College in Mt. Carmel, Illinois. He helped lead Wabash Valley to a 69-5 record (36-1 in 2000-01; 33-4 in 2001-02) in those two seasons and to the 2001 and 2002 Great Rivers Athletic Conference regular season championships as well as the 2001 and 2002 GRAC Conference Championship.

Regionally and nationally, Watkins helped direct the Warriors to the 2001 and 2002 Illinois Regional Championship and the 2001 NJCAA National title.

Watkins, prior to coaching at Wabash Valley, played and coached at Lincoln Memorial University. He helped lead LMU to a number five national ranking in defense as a player in 1992-93 as the Railsplitters finished 17-9. Watkins returned to LMU in 1996-97 as a coach and helped direct the Railsplitters to a 34-19 record over two seasons and to its first ever appearance in the Gulf South Conference Tournament in 1997.

"Jesse is a quality young man with a tremendous work ethic," said USI Head Coach Rick Herdes. "He has a knowledge of the southern states and has contacts at all levels of basketball. Jesse is a great addition to my staff."

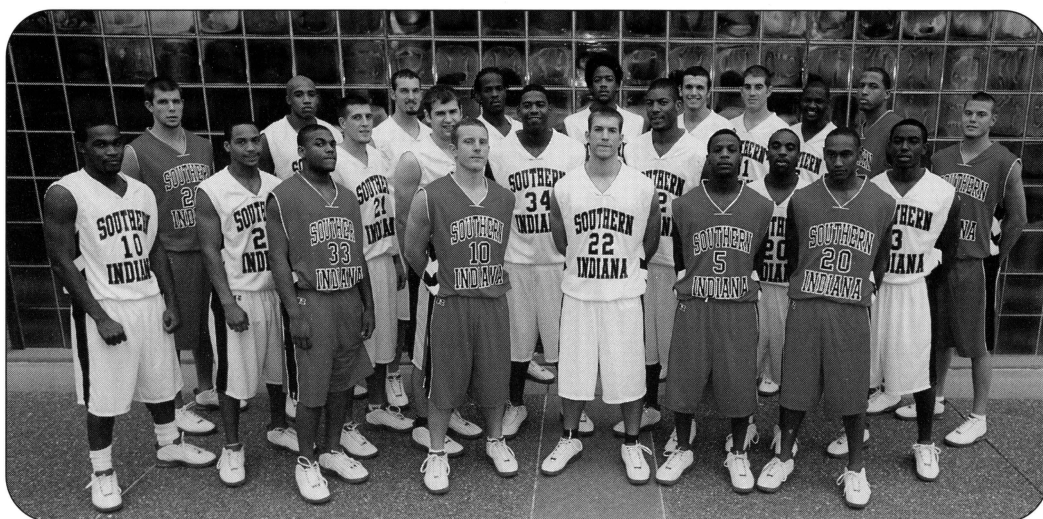


Head coach **Rick Herdes** and assistant coach **Marc Hostetter** have led the Eagles to 180 wins in seven seasons together.
