## Historic Southern Indiana to host NEA workshop on rural community planning in New Harmony

Historic Southern Indiana (HSI), a heritage-based regional development program, was selected to host a workshop on rural community planning November 12 - 14, in New Harmony. The workshop,"Your Town: Designing Its Future," sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and the National Trust for Historic Preservation, is designed to increase awareness of the role of planning in rural communities. The NEA, concerned that rural areas of the country rarely have ready access to sources of design assistance or information on the application of design to community problems, has funded workshops across the country. The Indiana site is the eighteenth workshop held nationally and the first in the Midwest.

Participants from Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin have been chosen to attend the workshop in New Harmony.

Dr. Darrel E. Bigham, director of HSI, said the purpose of the workshop is to introduce the role of design in community planning. He said, "American communities face many critical problems like heavy out migration and loss of jobs, rapid growth from suburban sprawl, or location of a new business. Such issues affect community vitality. Workshop emphasis will be on problem solving using a hypothetical town with realworld problems. Other partners in the project are Historic New Harmony, Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana, and Purdue University's Department of Landscape Architecture.

Indiana's First Lady Judy O'Bannon will be the keynote speaker on November 12. Mr. Michael P. McLaughlin, coordinator of Millennium and Leadership Initiatives for the NEA, will welcome participants. Other presenters will be Mr. Kent Schuette, Mr. Jeff Rapson, and Mr. Bernie Dahl, Purdue University; Ms. Anne Gryczon, Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana; Ms. Shelley Mastran, rural preservation consultant; Ms. Connie Weinzapfel, Historic New Harmony, and Dr. Bigham. Ms. Leslie Townsend, HSI program coordinator, is coordinator of the workshop.

Session topics include design changes, the design process, natural and cultural resources inventories, getting and managing design assistance, local case studies, and communicating your vision. The National Trust for Historic Preservation and State University of New York (SUNY)-Syracuse originally developed the program.

Historic New Harmony, whose board for years was led by Mr. D.W. Vaughn, has named its endowment fund to honor the late civic leader. The Vaughn Endowment Fund in the USI-New Harmony Foundation will provide a perpetual source of funds for the operation of Historic New Harmony whose mission is to preserve and educate people about the history of New Harmony.

Ms. Connie Weinzapfel, director of Historic New Harmony, said, "This is an appropriate memorial to a man, who, in so many ways, strived for long-term stability for the town and the organization. ## USI chemistry students celebrate Mole Day on Friday, October 23

USI students and teachers will celebrate National Mole Day, a chemistry holiday, today. Festivities will begin at 8:02 a.m., with refreshments and demonstrations from 10 a.m. to noon in the Redwood Lounge of the Science Center. Students will celebrate chemistry, remember the mole concept, and honor the mole concept creator, Amadeo Avagadro. To appreciate the mole number, students are encouraged to do things by the mole. USI students will identify one mole of various compounds, guess how many moles of M & Ms are in a container, observe some demonstrations, eat mole cupcakes and drink Witches Brew.

The mole is a unit of numbers - 6.02 times 10 to the 23rd. Chemists use the mole to describe a number of atoms, molecules, ions, or electrons in counting terms. The annotated method is used to describe this number because the number is so large. Chemists use the mole like individuals use dozen to describe 12 or a ton to weigh 2,000 lbs.

Dr. Bob Everson of Purdue University's Animal Disease Diagnostic Lab gives an example of the size of a mole, "It is difficult to imagine such a large number as Avogadro's number. Some idea of its magnitude is given by the following calculation. Let us suppose that the entire state of Texas, with an area of 262,000 square miles, were covered with a layer of fine sand 50 feet thick, each grain of sand being 1/100th of an inch in diameter. There would be Avogadro's number of sand particles in this immense sandpile. There would be the same number of molecules of water in one mole of water — 18g, 1/25 of a pint."

Amadeo Avogadro was an Italian scientist noted to be one of the founders of physical chemistry. He received no recognition for his discovery during his lifetime. His work was recognized nearly fifty years after he made his hypothesis.

The National Mole Day Foundation established Mole Day in May 1991 and it is officially celebrated from 6:02 a.m. to 6:02 p.m. on October 23.

## **Educating Health Care Professionals**

Designed for educators of health professionals in academic and health care settings, the Third Annual Nursing and Health Professions Educator Conference is slated for 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday, October 27, in Carter Hall. This daylong conference will focus on such topics as problem-based learning, clinical preceptors, instructional technology, and community-based learning.

Keynote speaker Charlotte Brasic Royeen, Ph.D., O.T.R., is professor and associate dean for research in the School of Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions at Creighton University. Her topic will be "Scholarship Revisited: Expanding Horizons." Once a research analyst for the U.S. Department of Education, Dr. Royeen is a fellow of the American Occupational Therapy Association. Known for her expertise in areas as diverse as educational design and evaluation, neuroscience, research methodology, pediatrics, and sensory integration, Dr. Royeen is the author of 14 books, seven book chapters, and more than 30 research articles in refereed journals.

The conference offers continuing education credits of 5.1 contact hours for nurses.
