



USI THEATRE PRESENTS *THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK*

Fifty years after the fact, a young Jewish girl's diary of how she and her family endured 25 months in hiding in Nazi-occupied Holland during World War II continues to remind the world of the tragedies which befell her people, her country, and the world.

USI Theatre will present *The Diary of Anne Frank* as its first spring production, marking the 50th anniversary of the year the Germans learned about the Franks and took them from their warehouse hideout to a concentration camp. The production is being presented in conjunction with the exhibition, *The Anne Frank Experience*, which opens March 15 at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Science.

The USI play will be presented at 8 p.m. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, February 17-18-19 and 24-25-26, and at 2 and 7 p.m. Sundays, February 20 and 27, at USI Theatre at Barker and Igleheart avenues. Anne's father, Otto Frank, survived the war and was given his daughter's diary and notes when he returned home. He first made copies for distribution and later published the diary as a book at home and in Germany. It

SHROUD OF TURIN SYMPOSIUM. A free symposium on the Shroud of Turin will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday, February 12, in Forum I. The public is invited. Featured speakers will be Dr. Faustino Cervantes of Mexico City, who will discuss what is known about "The Crown of Thorns;" Dr. Leoncio A. Garza-Valdes of San Antonio, who will present science-based responses to the medieval radiocarbon date for the Shroud; Prof. Giovanni Riggi of Turin, Italy, who will discuss his role as the person who cut the Shroud samples for the radiocarbon dating; and Dr. Daniel C.
