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# Volunteer Services Program announced

The Volunteer Services Program has been made operational, with Mrs. Nancy B. Johnson, director of Alumni Affairs, to serve as director. Her office has been renamed Alumni and Volunteer Services.

"Start small and grow with success' will be the watchwords of the USI action plan, as we phase in USI's volunteer program," Mrs. Johnson said. "First, we will establish the structure and formalize current volunteers into the program. To ensure consistency and full use of volunteer talents, we then will blend in new volunteers. The end result will augment USI's mission."

The Volunteer Task Force, originally convened by USI President H. Ray Hoops, has evolved as the Volunteer Advisory Council (VAC) which will develop and carry out the necessary steps to make the program operational. An action plan, which included a time frame, has been developed. VAC has been divided into six subcommittees: policies and procedures, needs assessment, recordkeeping, marketing, recruitment and selection, and retention and evaluation.

VAC members want to officially thank Mrs. Joanne Wright for her leadership as chair of the Volunteer Task Force. Her guidance in developing a comprehensive program will assist faculty and staff in enhancing services to USI students. Volunteer management is an innovative concept for higher education. USI's program will become a model for other universities to emulate.

# **Student Press Day**

USI communications students will interview USI President H. Ray Hoops during the first annual Press Conference Day slated Wednesday, February 28. in Mitchell Auditorium.

The event will open at 11 a.m. with a 10minute presentation by Dr. Hoops, followed by a 30-minute question/answer session between Dr. Hoops and the students. WSWI 820 AM will air the conference live, and it may be televised. USI faculty and staff are welcome to attend, and are asked to leave the questioning to the students.

"We hope this one-hour conference will help the students feel like a meangingful part of our large department," said Mr. Ronald C. Roat, assistant professor of journalism who organized Press Conference Day. "We're grateful that Dr. Hoops has agreed to play the leading role in our first news conference." The Communications Department has 375 students with majors in six sequences: theatre arts, radio and television, journalism, public relations, advertising, and interpersonal-organizational communication. Enrollment grew 10 percent this year.

Mr. Roat said communications faculty will spend two weeks coaching students on ways to ask meaningful, mature questions about USI, its programs, and education in general. Three students have joined Mr. Roat to make up an informal committee to handle arrangements, with plans that students handle all arrangements for future events. # Honor Symposium slated

The 1996 Honor Symposium will be held Saturday, February 17, in the University Conference Center, this year featuring 25 students who were nominated by their professors to participate in this 12th annual event honoring USI's academic elite.

The morning's activities are informal, opening with a continental breakfast and words of welcome from USI President H. Ray Hoops; Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Jennifer J. Williams, assistant professor of computer information systems and Honor Symposium chair.

The students will be divided into teams for an Academic Super Bowl competition. University professors have been invited to submit questions which have been culled to produce a list that probes the depth and breadth of learning among the students, who represent all disciplines at USI. The bowl will culuminate in a roundtable discussion among students and participating professors. Lunch will be followed by presentations to students of Honors Symposium commemoratives.

More that 150 students were nominated for the 1996 Honors Symposium. Since the event is usually limited to 40 or fewer participants, the symposium committee decided to alter criteria -instead of a 3.5 or better grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) and at least 35 hours of course work completed, 1996 participants have a 3.8 GPA or better and have completed at least 100 hours
