SEDER SUPPER AT ISUE. The Seder Supper, the traditional Jewish Passover family meal, will be performed by Mrs. Sadelle Berger Tuesday, March 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the ISUE Dining Room. The Jewish Passover traditionally marks the exodus of the Israelites from Egyptian bondage.

Mrs. Berger will lead the religious ceremony at the supper which combines prayers with the eating of symbolic foods. These foods - bitter herbs, hard boiled eggs, parsley, haroses, salt water, and religious wine - are symbolic reminders of the slavery of the Jews in Egypt. However, the intensely spiritual tone of the Seder is mingled with bursts of good humor. The serious observations on Jewish life and destiny include comments in a lighter vein and the poetry readings are both serious and playful.

In addition to the symbolic foods of the Seder, persons will be served a menu of salad, matzo ball soup, roast chicken, matzo stuffing, broccoli, macaroon and a fruit cup.

Sponsored by Campus Ministry and IXOUS, the Seder Supper is open to persons of all faiths. The Seder is a family meal, so families are encouraged to attend. According to ISUE students JULIA GRANNAN and DAVE SCHMIDT, coordinators of the Seder, "The sponsoring organizations hope to expand the public's awareness of other religious ceremonies and rituals."

HUMANITIES FORUM. Sponsored by the Humanities Forum, Ann Braden, a journalist active in Southern civil rights, civil liberties, anti-war, and labor movements will speak Wednesday, March 15 at 11:00 a.m. in the Library, Room 100. Her address is titled "School Desegregation In Louisville: An Historical Overview on Three Decades of Civil Rights Movement Activity."

Born in Louisville, Kentucky in 1924, she received her B.A. degree in 1945 from Randolph-Macon Women's College in Lynchburg, Virginia. In the 1940's, she left daily newspaper work to become a journalist and organizer for labor unions and civil rights groups. During the years 1957 - 1973, Braden worked for the Southern Conference Educational Fund developing the civil rights rebellions of the 60's, the Southern anti-war movement, and the early labor organization efforts of the 70's.

Braden now serves as co-chairperson of the Southern Organizing Committee for Economic and Social Justice and is a consultant on racism to the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. In addition, she is vice-chairperson of the National Alliance against Racist and Political Repression. In 1975-76 she supported school desegregation in Louisville and was active in the interracial movement during the busing crisis.

She has published three books, The Wall Between, HUAC: Bulwark of Segregation, and The Southern Freedom Movement in Perspective in addition to numerous pamphlets and articles.

The lecture is free and open to the public.

SECRETARIAL SEMINAR. High school juniors and seniors and business education teachers from the tri-state area have been invited to ISUE Friday, March 17, for a secretarial seminar.

Dr. Margaret A. Morton, a stenotype author, will be the featured speaker at the seminar

HUMANITIES GRANT AWARDED. ISUE has been awarded its second consecutive grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities (ICH) to support the University Outreach Program. ISUE received \$2,226.00 from ICH for the program.

The topic this year is: "The Changing American Family." University Outreach is designed to provide an educational lecture/discussion series in an informal, comfortable setting away from campus. A series addressing five issues of parental concern will be presented by ISUE professors who will travel on a circuit to five Southwestern Indiana locations. Included are Tell City, Boonville, Newburgh and two Evansville locations.

Topics will revolve around the project theme--families and their search for values. Contemporary issues and the implications and impact of choices, values, and decisions on the quality of life will be the basis for each session.

"The program will provide the opportunity to engage in stimulating, thought-provoking discussion of some of the major concerns of parents in their sometimes uncertain roles as value arbitrators," says SYLVIA WEINZAPFEL, Assistant Director of Continuing Education. According to WEINZAPFEL, the Outreach project is a way of expanding community service programs of the University.

ACU-I REGIONAL TABLE TENNIS TOURNAMENT WINNER. For the second year in a row, GARY GONNERMAN, an ISUE junior, has captured the ACU-I (Association of College Unions International) regional table tennis tournament.

The tournament was held at the University of Illinois in Champaign on February 10 and 11. GONNERMAN defeated five other players on his way to the championship title.
