ATLANTIC CITY. (ANS) — In a recent letter received from Edward Perkins, wealthy, white booking agent of name theatrical acts, Princess Orelia and Pete, internationally famous Cuban rumba dancing stars now appearing at Charlie Johnson's Club Harlem in Atlantic City, were lauded by Elisa Cansino, noted instructor in Spanish and Latin dance routines.

## RASH FERGUSON LECTURES SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

The Baptist Ministers and Deacons Union held its weekly meeting at the Eastview Baptist church, 619 Olive street, Monday, Rev. S. B. Dulin and Rev. Jeff Dixon conducted the devotional services. The following churches reported: Eastview, St. Paul of Corydon, Ky. and Zion Baptist of Owensboro, Ky.

The protest was made in connection with the effort of Andrew S. Johnson, of Athens, Ga., to get work as a Junior Seafood Inspector with the Seafood Inspection Service of the Food and Drug Administration.

In bringing the case to the attention of Mr. McNutt, William Y. Bell, Jr., executive secretary of the Atlanta Urban League, stated his hope that Mr. McNutt would use every resource to see that the officials responsible for this discrimination should learn that it is inconsistent with the aims of the life and death struggle in which the country is now engaged.

The action came in the face of an implied threat from producers that it would result in a "milk strike," or diversion of their products to manufacturing centers; and also predictions by distributors that a milk shortage in the city would result.

The statements of producers and distributors came during an afternoon caucus in the mayor's office, where it was agreed to adopt three amendments, two of which placed more "teeth" in the enforcement provisions, and one which lowered the permit fee charged against distributors.

The first amendment requires that the health officer in charge of making inspections and re-inspections must file a monthly written report with the city council informing them of results of his inspections.

Paul V. McNutt, War Manpower Commission Chairman and Federal Security Administrator, announced appointment of Edgar S. Westmoreland of Washington, D. C., as U. S. Office of Education Special Representative, to assist in the development of training activities for colored in the vocational training program for war production workers.—The Department of Justice announced that a Federal Grand Jury sitting at St. Louis, Mo., last week handed up a special report in the Sikeston lynching case describing the occurrence as a "shameful outrage" and censuring the Sikeston police force for having "failed completely to cope with the situation." The Grand Jury sought to determine whether any Federal statutes had been violated, but "with great reluctance, has come to the conclusion that the facts disclosed do not constitute any federal offense." No indictments were returned. The case involved the lynching of Cleo Wright, by a mob at Sikeston, Mo., on the night of Jan. 25 — 20 industrial plants, half of which recently upgraded or introduced colored workers, have been awarded the Army-Navy Production Award in recognition of outstanding performances on war work. Indiana companies include E. I. DuPont de Nemours Co., (Indiana Ordnance Works), Charlestown, and Whittington Pump & Engineering Co., Indianapolis.—Residential rents will be ordered cut back and established in 18 more defense-rental areas, including 8 with large colored populations, Price Administrator Leon Henderson announced. Maximum rent regulations, effective Aug. 1, will be issued for these areas shortly, as will the names of the Rent Directors who will administer the regulations. — Colored civic, religious and fraternal organizations have been giving valuable assistance to the Office of Price Administration in the development and administration of the price, rent and rationing programs, Miss Frances Williams, Senior Consumer Relations Officer on the OPA Washington staff has revealed. Miss Williams cited the cooperation of the National Urban League, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the YMCA, the YWCA and colored churches, lodges, sororities and fraternities.

The Evansville Argus has entered a turtle in the Tenth Annual Junior Chamber of Commerce Turtle Derby at Enlow Field, August 16th. The entry will be known as "The Evansville Argus." This is the third annual derby in which the Argus has had an entrant. All of the Argus entries, unfortunately, have been "just rans."—Extension of education in better farming to colored families in South Carolina is meeting with excellent results, a recent visitor found. Colored farmers are adopting improved practices in agriculture. They are practicing crop rotation. They are increasing the number and quality of their livestock. They are selling more hogs at the markets. They

are producing a larger part of the food they consume and in a greater variety. They are gradually improving their homes and in some cases building new homes. At this time of year they are to be seen at work at daylight and at dusk, Sundays and holidays included, striving to increase farm production and help to win the war.—The War Production Board now asks Indiana businesses and industries to surrender about one-fifth of their typewriters. The armed forces need 600,000 . . . Indiana's share is about 33,000.—The Indiana Police have turned in reports of speeders and other drivers who were unnecessarily injuring tires to the Office of Price Administration. These reports have gone to the local War Price and Rationing Board . . . such will be taken into consideration when drivers come up for new tires or recaps.

All new passenger buses not yet sold by manufacturers were frozen by the War Production Board this week and placed under control of the Office of Defense Transportation for assignment to areas where transit emergencies develop. — An increase of "at least" 14 cents a quart in the retail price of domestic gin, and varying increases in prices of domestic whisky, cordial and liquors were authorized by the Office of Price Administration, it was announced this week. The hike is to compensate producers and distributors for added costs resulting from conversion of distillers to war work. The order became effective August 5. The increase will be at least 14 cents per quart plus 7 1/2 cents per quart for rectification tax.

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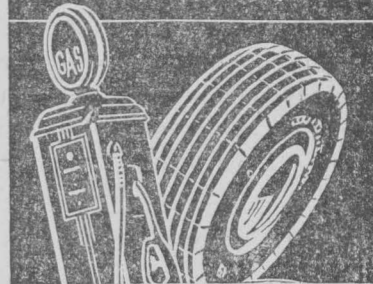
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# JUST GABBIN'
