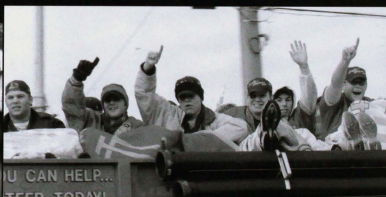

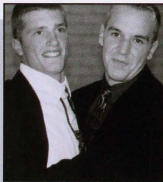
OUR tradition. High school is the time to live and build our future. Our experiences during these self-discovering four years give a redefined mean-

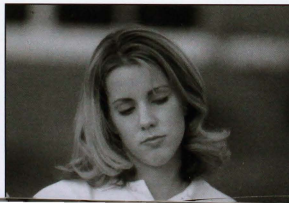

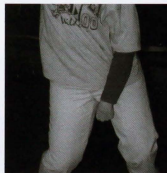

ferent countries and cultures and even talked a little about how they celebrate mass. A few select students were chosen to read the gospel in not only English, but also in German and Spanish.

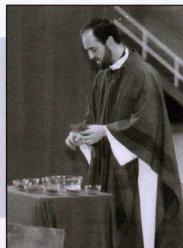

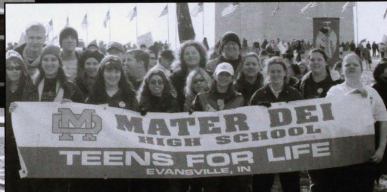

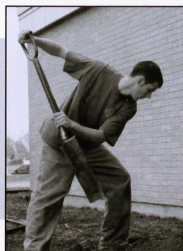
Club with a Cause

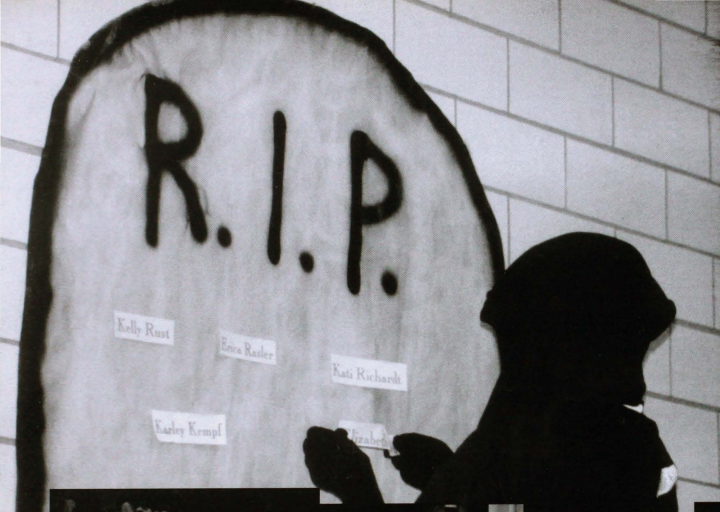

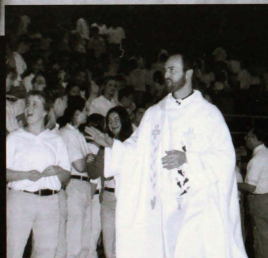

The kids see us when we're in our own social scene too, so it's more than just being a good

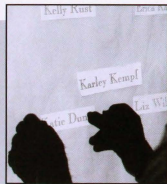

Basketball season has also been busy. The senior members made each varsity player their own giant poster to encourage them as they practice for a winning post-season.

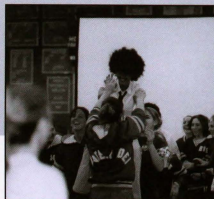
We tried to have frequent meetings to get ideas for game themes and assemblies. I am proud to see school spirit is back here at Mater Dei.

Dancing has become a big part of my life in the last few years. I have

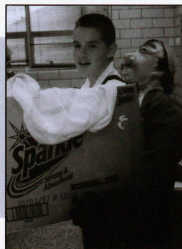
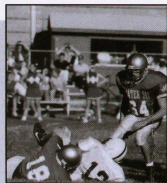

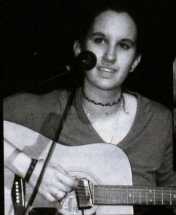

What happened to the dance? There's usually a dance afterwards, but the past

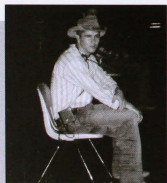
two years the dance has not existed. Otherwise this is a great way to have fun on a Friday night.

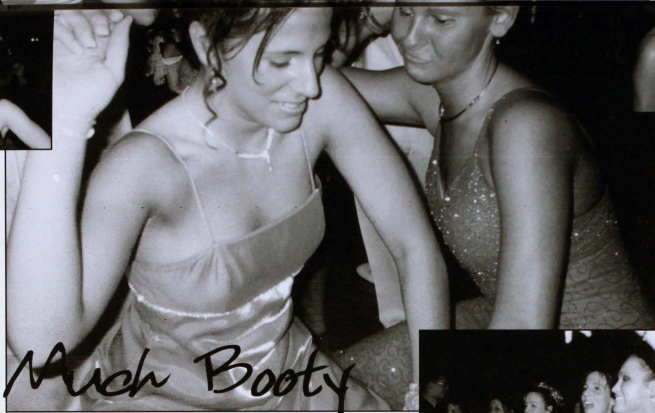

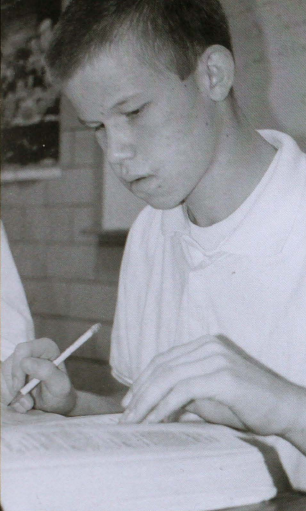
Makin' the Grade

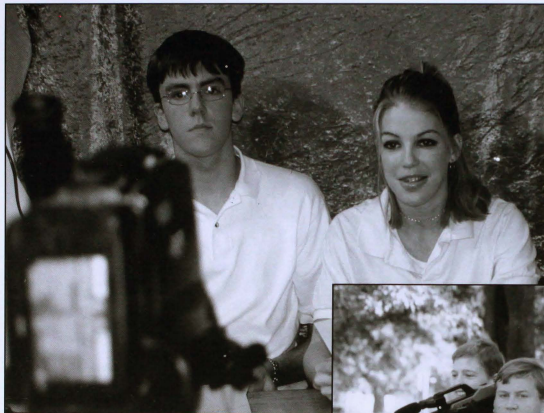
When I signed up for Mass media, I was told that the class read the daily announcements. I didn't know that we had to do a live broadcast shown throughout the school.

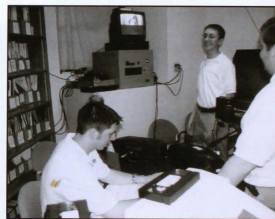

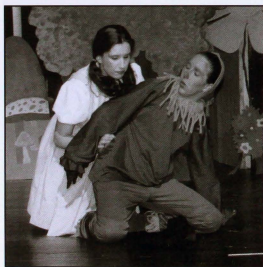
This year, however, marked the return of Mr. Jason Broshears as head director. When he suggested that we do the Wizard of **OZ** last December, the

No matter what sporting event you attend, there's bound to be a copious amount of people dressed in the red and gold insignias of Mater Dei. The Wildcat fans have proven their strength

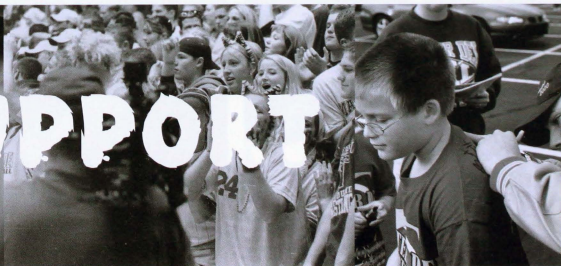
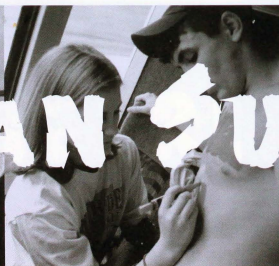

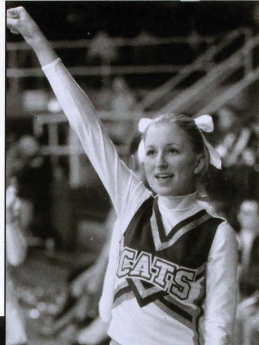

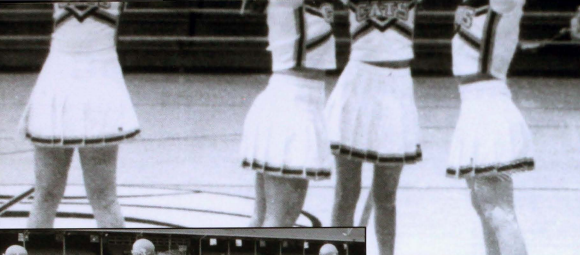

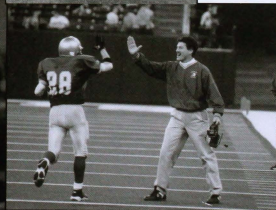

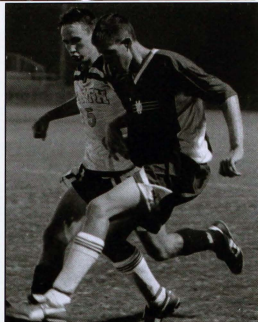

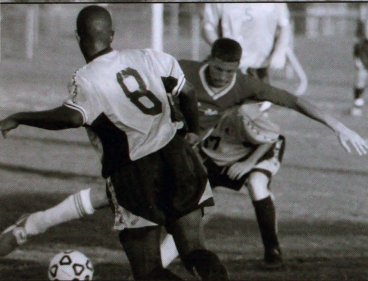

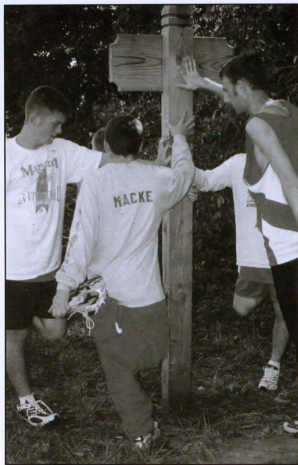

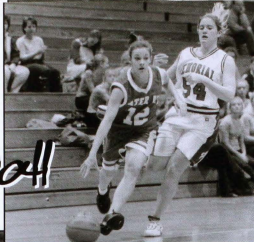

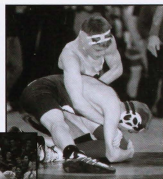

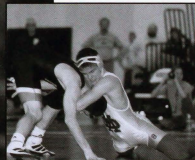

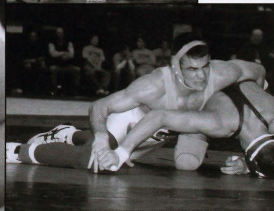

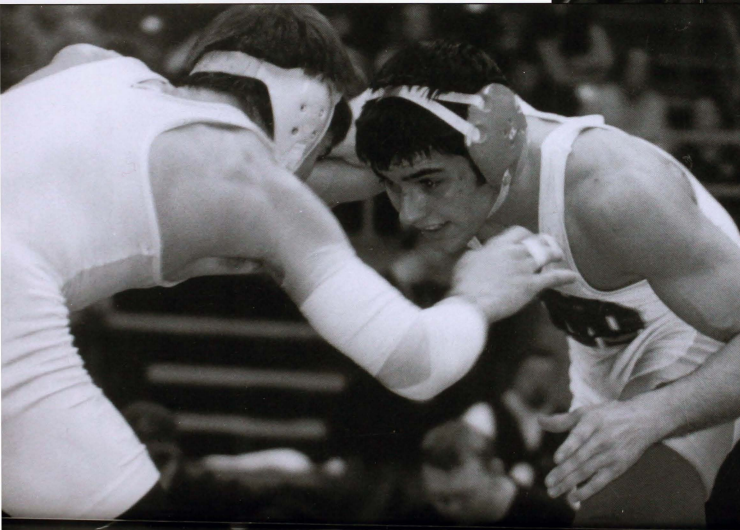

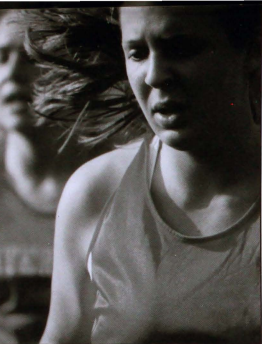

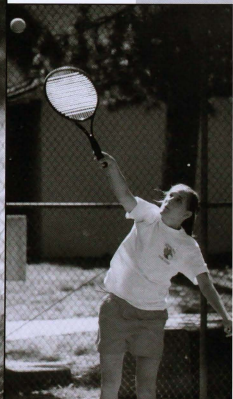

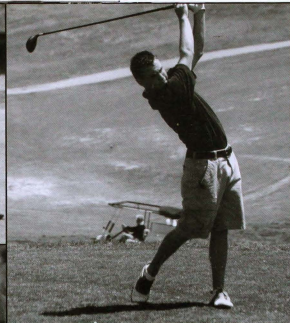

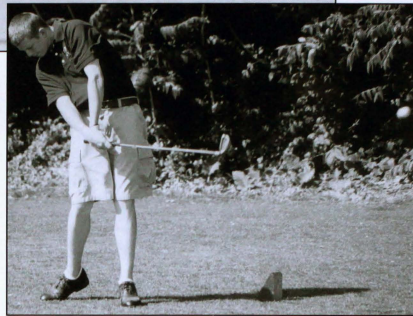

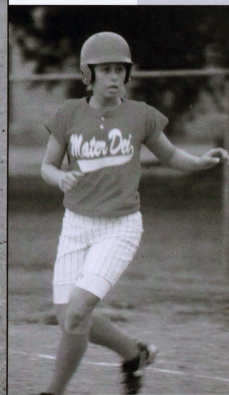

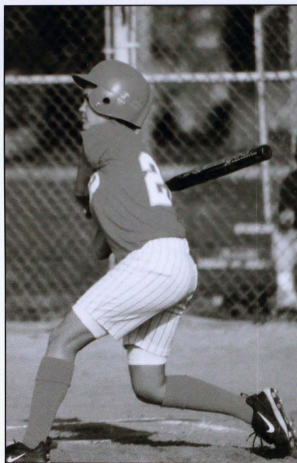

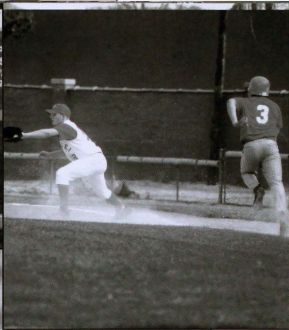

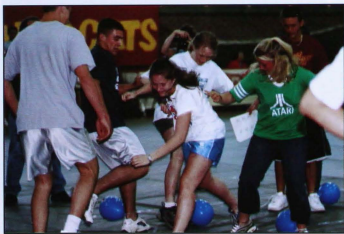

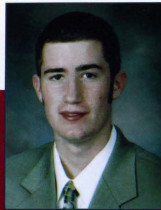

Once we hit the **Dance** floor, it was all good. The DJ's did a good

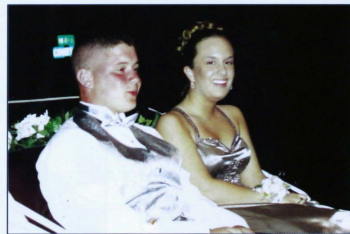
job droppin' beats and everyone was bringing the house down on the dance floor.

Time to Remember

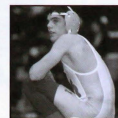

I can not say enough about how well this staff took on these challenges and put together an awesome

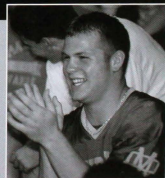
book that is extremely creative and showcases some of the best talents at Mater Dei.

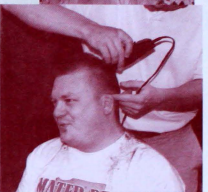
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
