






Looks like we made it
















Students help keep government alive

(6) The world's largest donut was made at the Forensic Stromboli Party. Bob Michilini, John Schneider and Jim Seibert displayed the record



girl selected for the court.



(1) Mrs. Karla Carlile, new choral director, brought spark and enthusiasm to the choir groups and helped them make it together.




Gridders join forces for good season

Boys improve under new coach























In school or out, religion important




Prom provides precious memories

work, building and painting the


gazebo, decorating the Dining Center, and a lot of the little things that help make the Prom enjoyable.














Frosh get involved in student activities
