## Students conduct school government

Modeled after the government of the city of Evansville, Mater Dei-ville's Student Council operates on a very efficient level. Chosen in the spring of the preceding year, the elected and appointed officials' terms commence at the beginning of the school year. Inauguration marks the official takeover of the new government.
(1) The first duty of Judge Steve Koewler was that of swearing in Mayor Dave Wolf. From that point on, his job became more difficult. Presiding over the student court, Steve had to ensure that the courtroom was kept in order and that justice prevailed.

Before beginning their terms of office, they were sworn in at the inauguration ceremony.

## Loss of classmates saddens seniors
