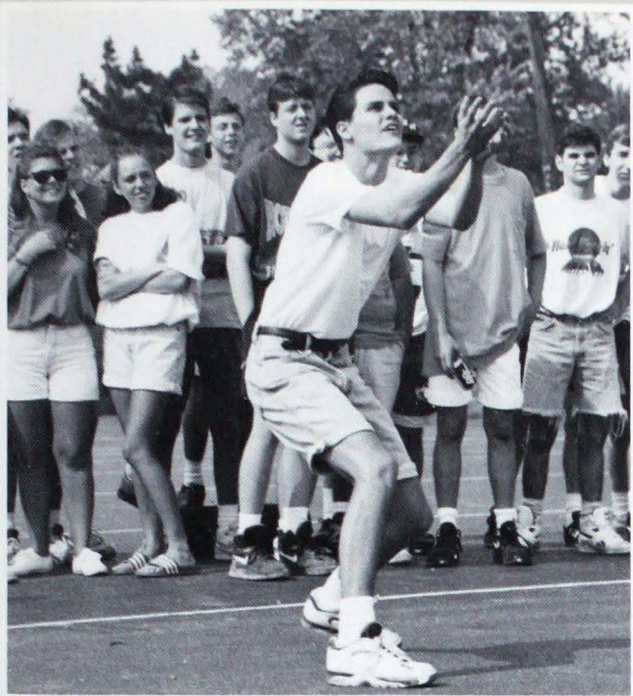

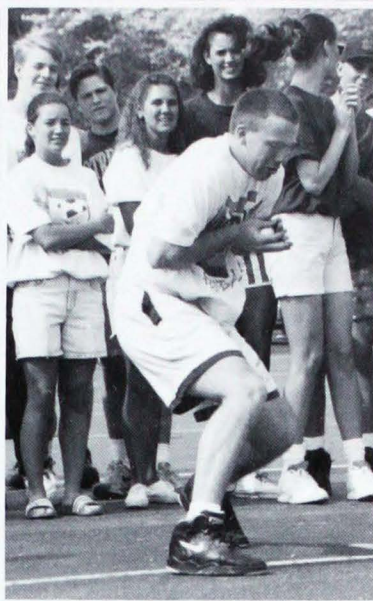

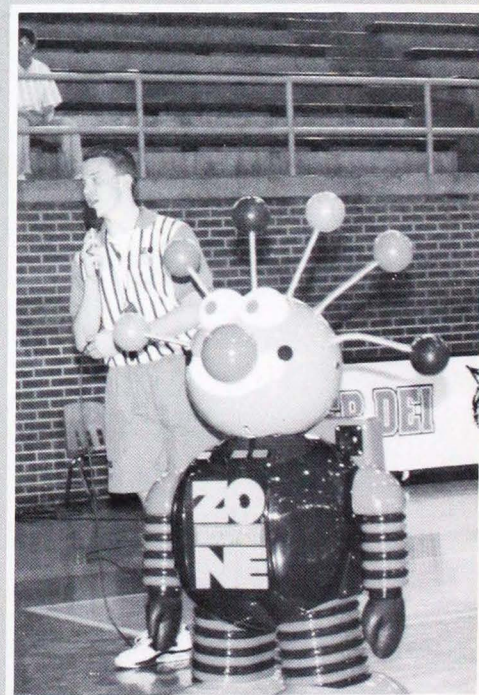

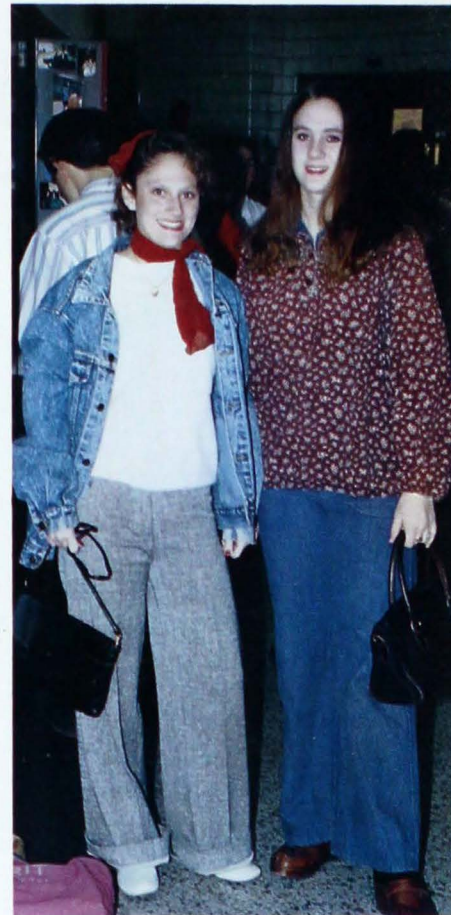

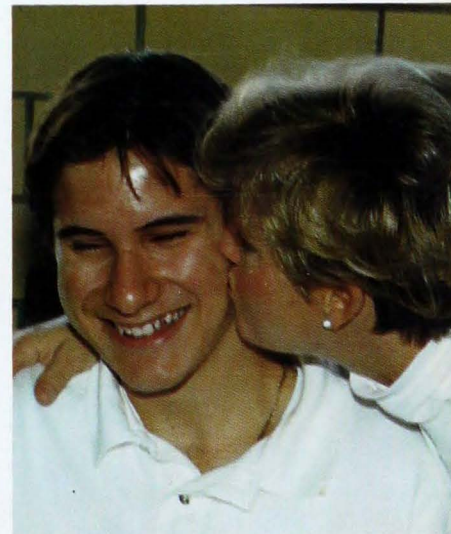

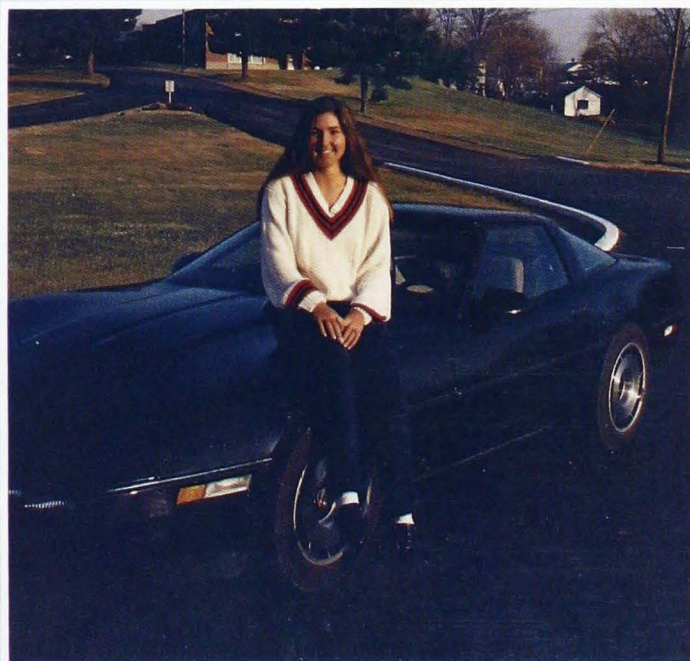

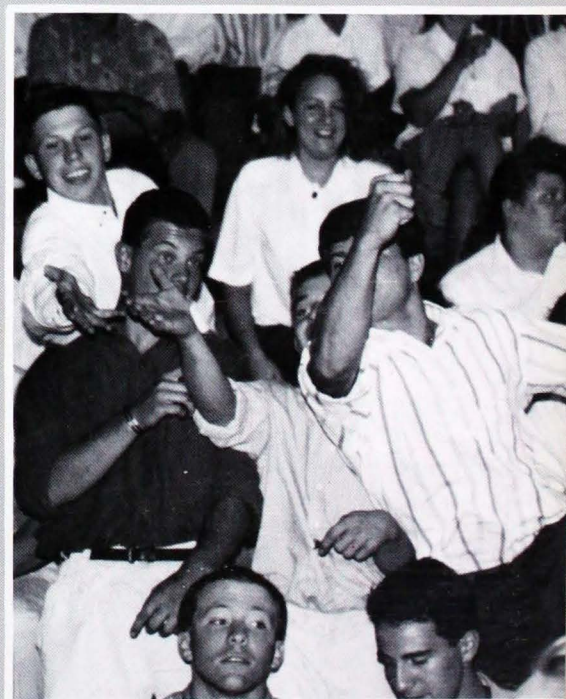

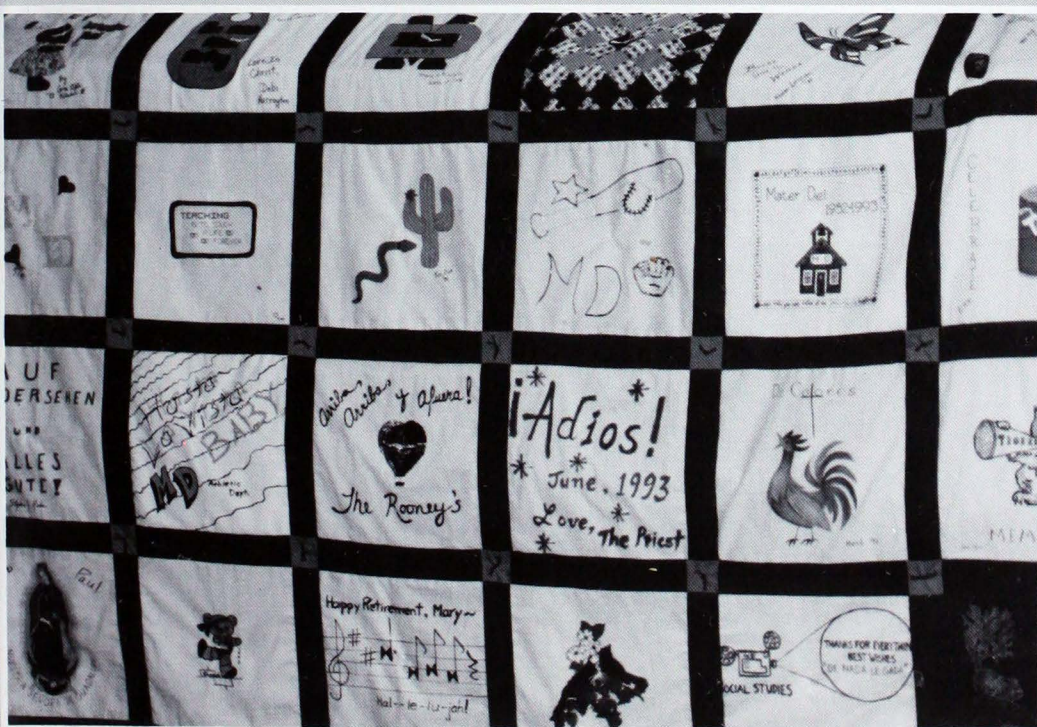

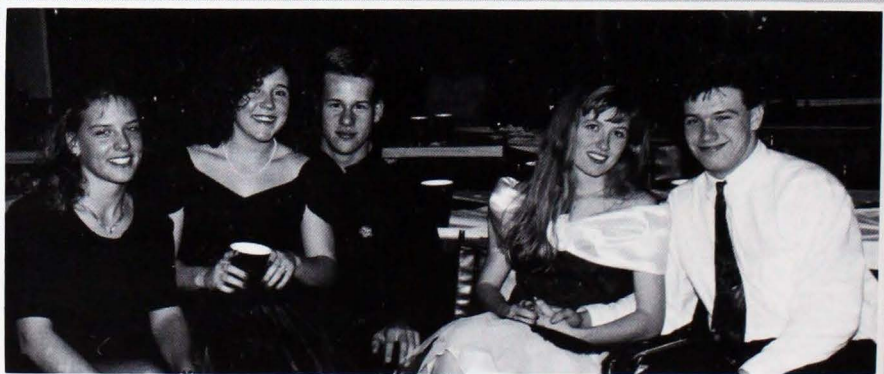

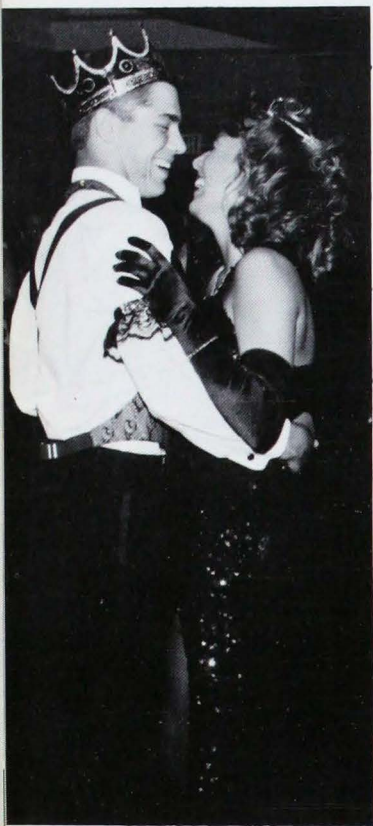

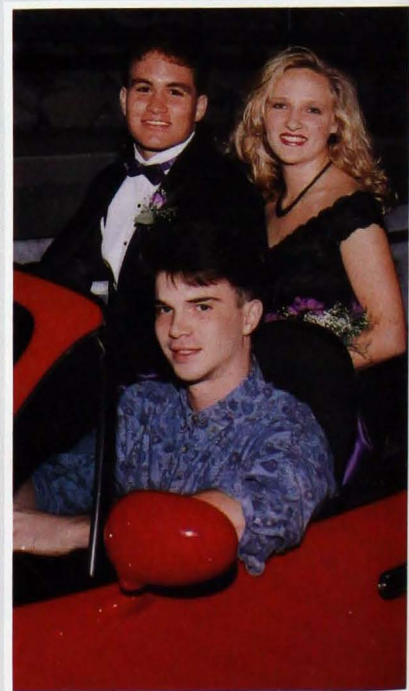

We think we have a book to be proud of; we hope you agree.

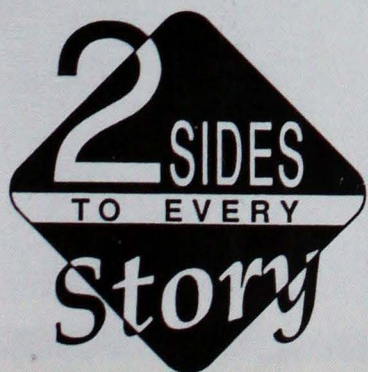

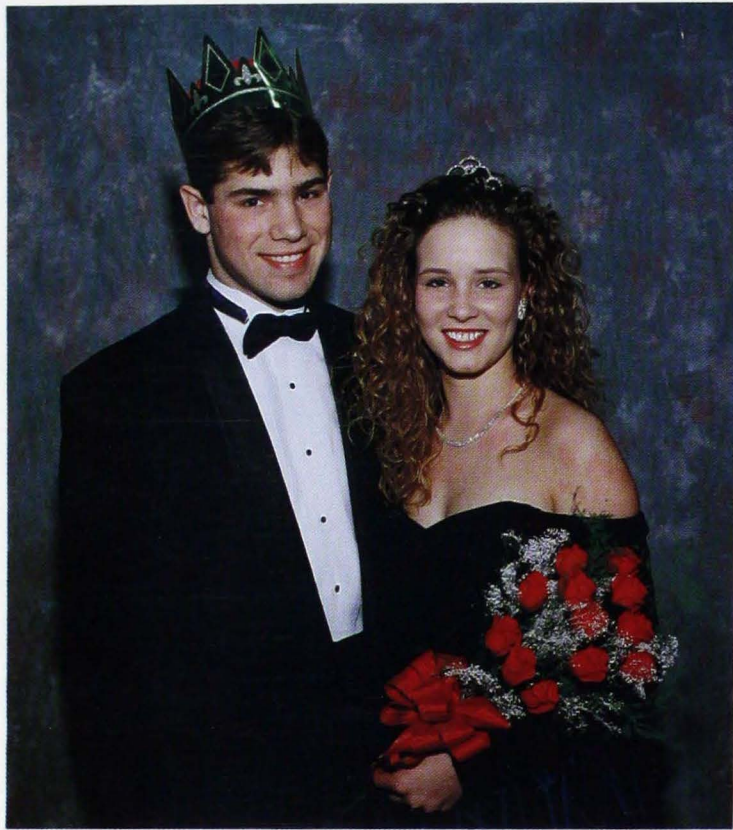

The students heard the real truth about what can happen when you mess around with drugs and alcohol.

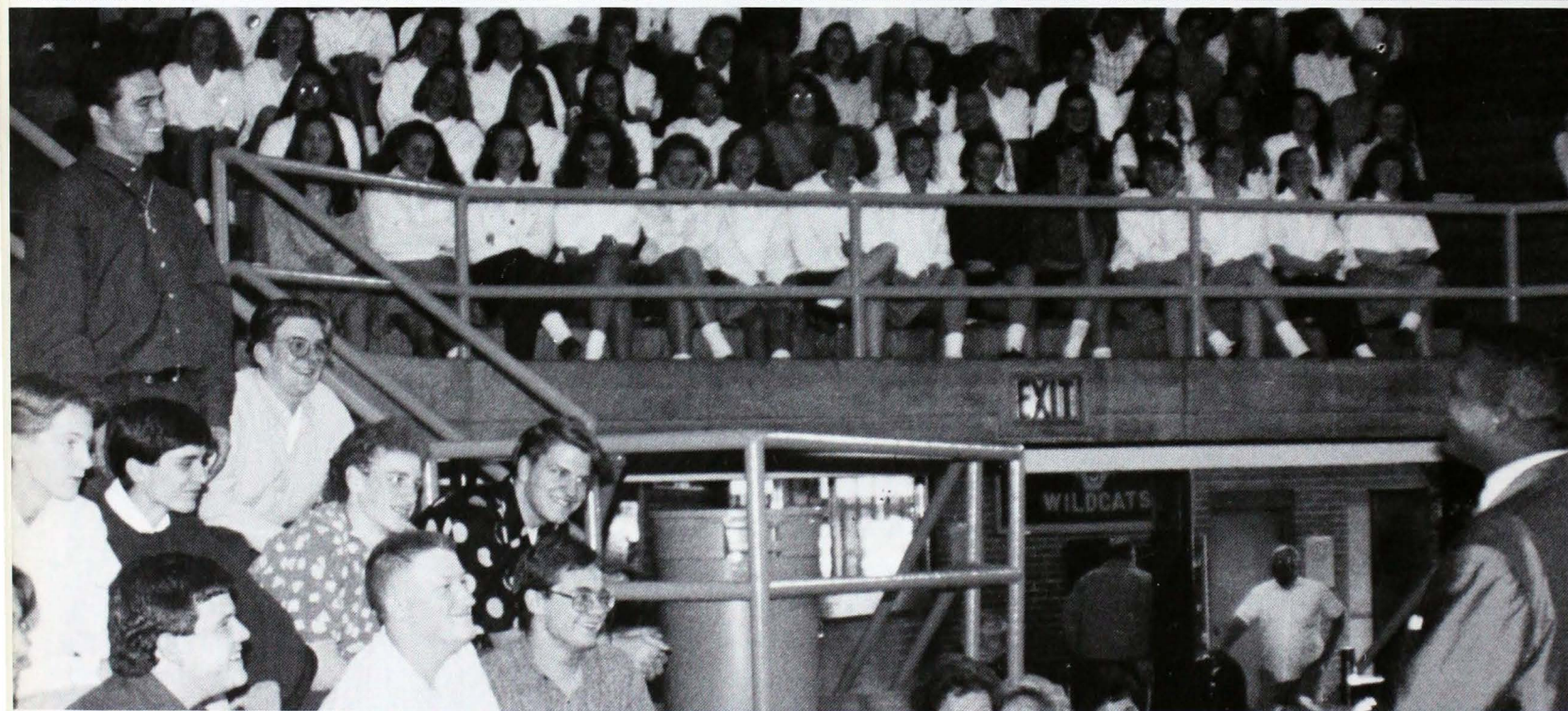

Changing times

During the school year, Mr. Herb Neighbors, principal, said, "As we look to the 21st century, education is and will be undergoing vast improvement and change."

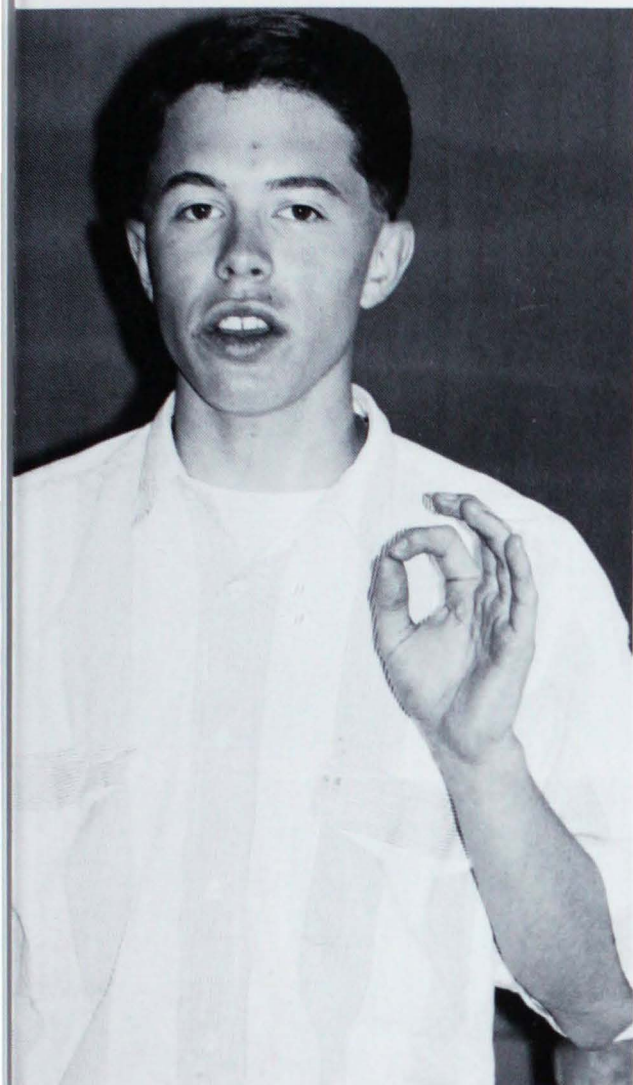

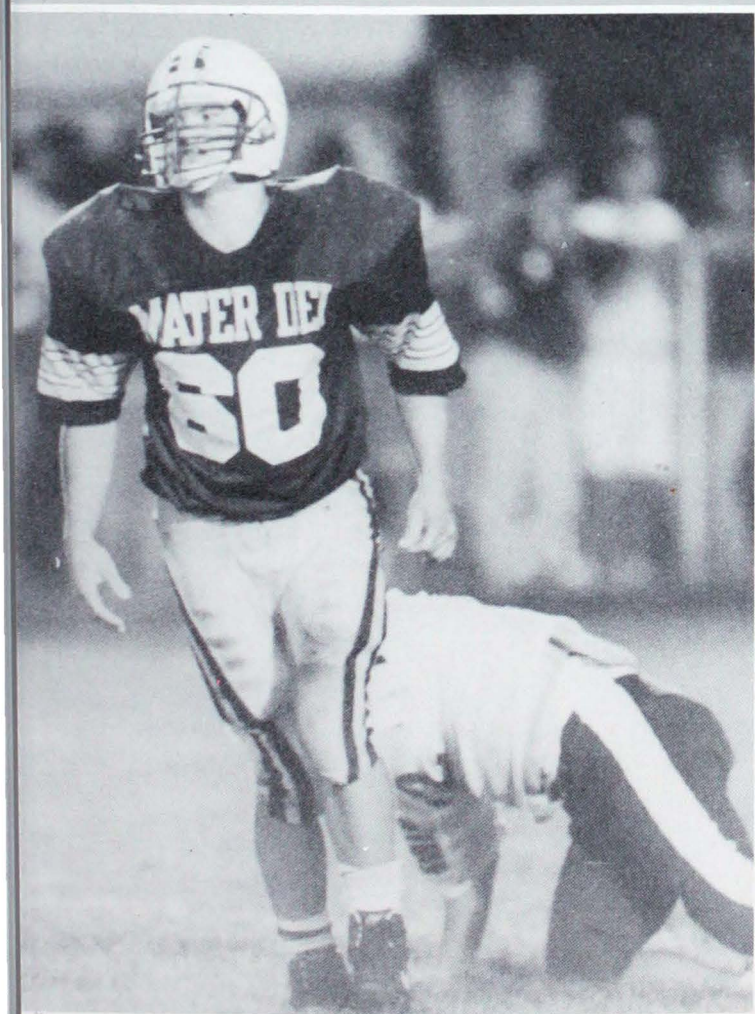
Tim finished the season 9th in the state with 694 receiving yards and was honored as the Cats' best receiver.

Senior Jay Adams finished 3rd in the state by passing for 1,646 yards. He was named the team's best offensive player. He completed 167 passes in 287 attempts.

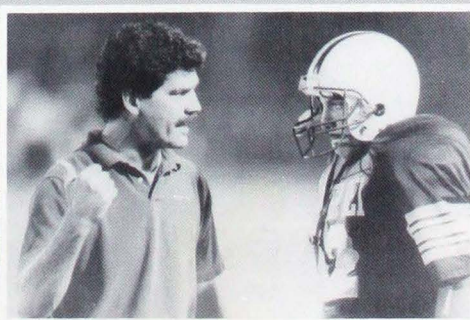
Another strong offensive player was Kevin Wilson, who caught 38 passes for 277 yards. He also rushed for 161 yards and received the mental attitude award.

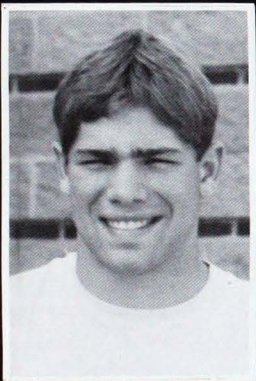

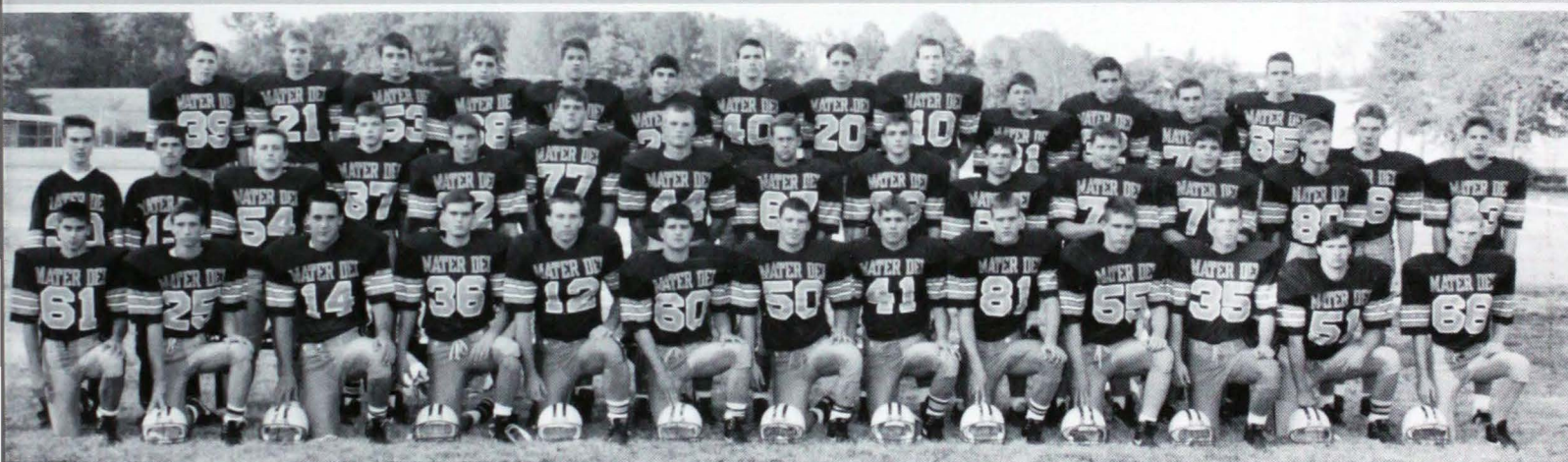

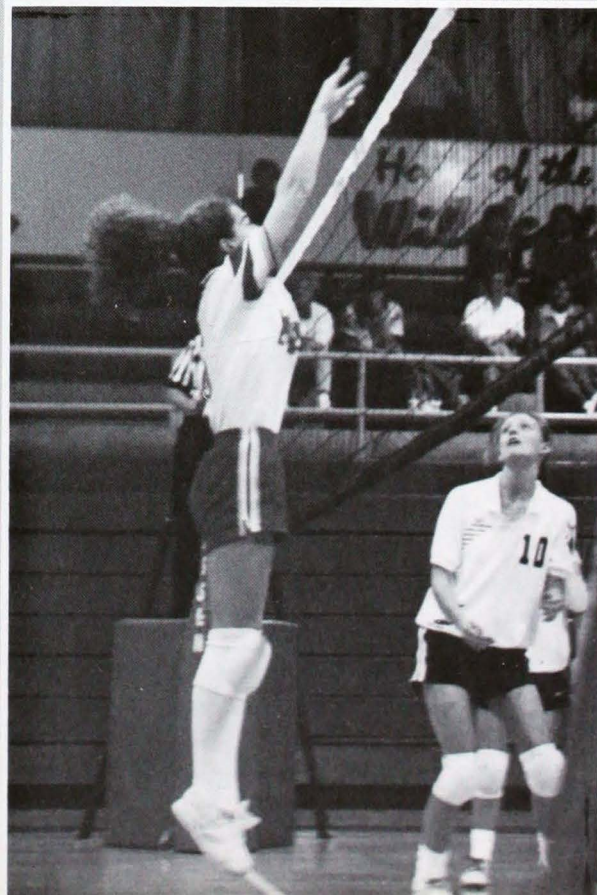
They put their motto — Never Say Die — into effect and captured the regional title.

It was Miss Darlene Rooney's fifth season of coaching the Volleys, and she was named coach of the year.

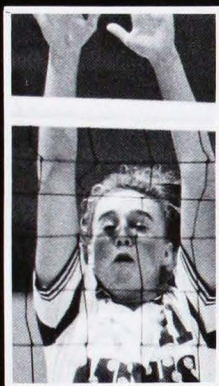

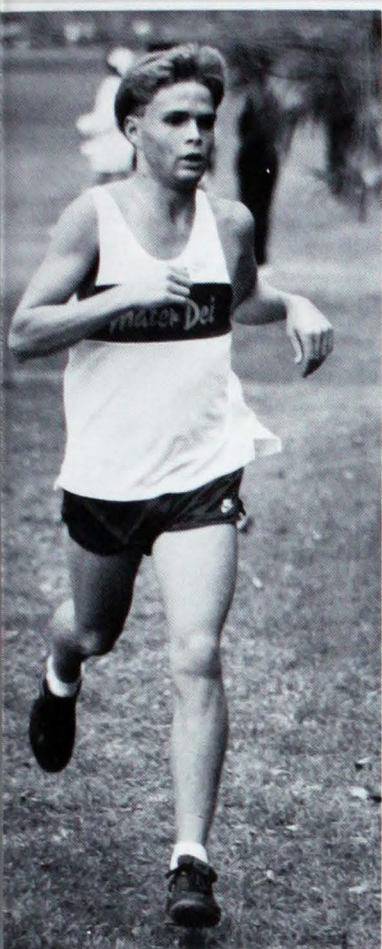
Ellen didn't start running cross country until her junior year. But in her senior year, she set a course record of 16:51 in a meet against North Posey and Tecumseh.

Coach Moll said Ellen advanced quickly because she's stronger than most of her competitors.

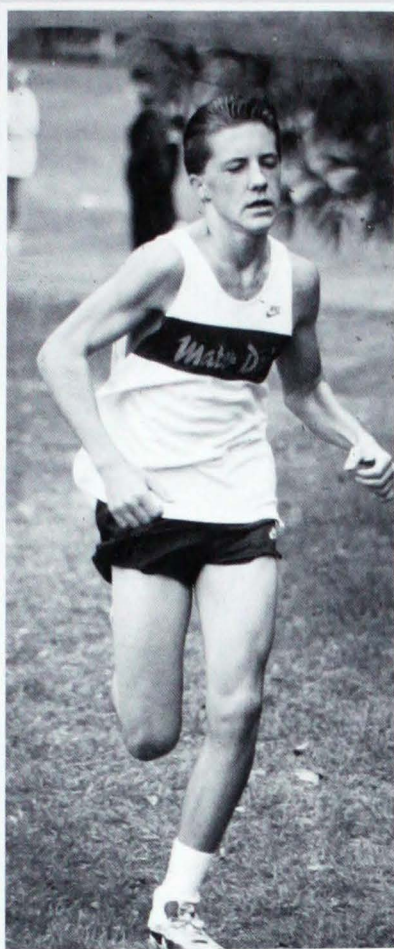

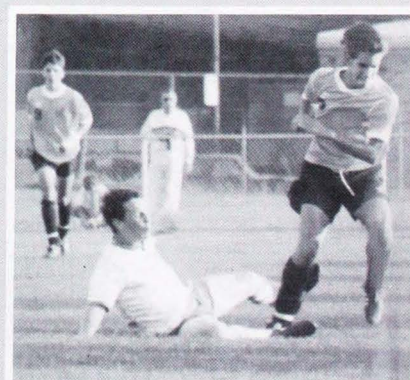
Mater Dei's boy soccer team finished the season with a record of 7-7. The Wildcats started off slowly, but by mid-season they were showing their true talents.

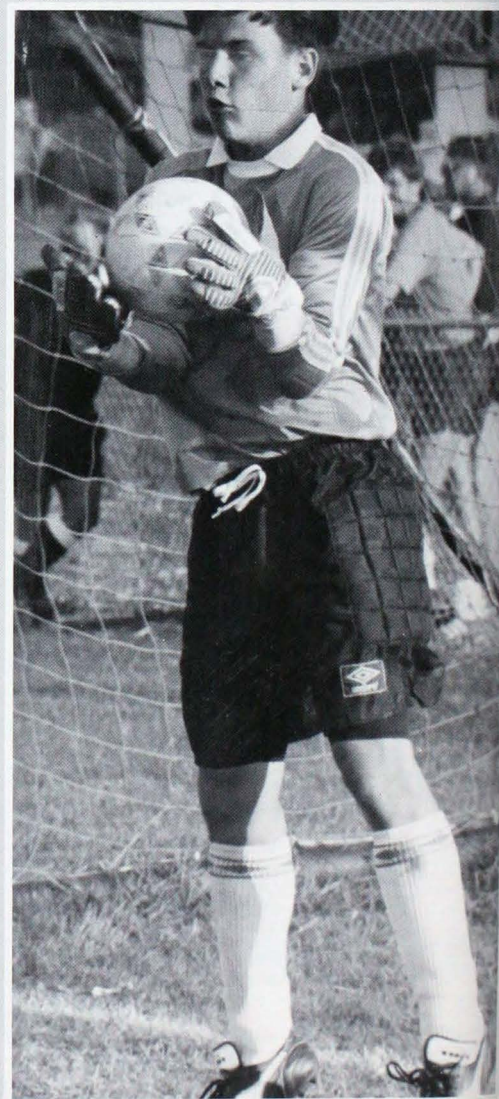

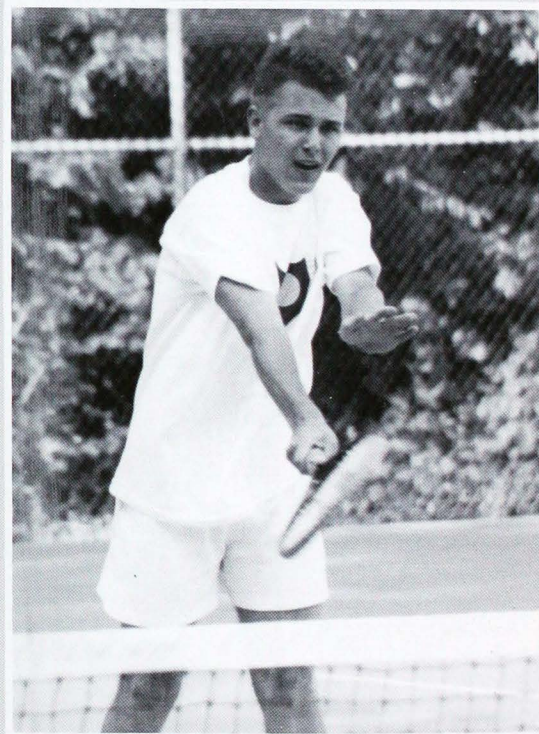
Although the record did not prove it, the boys tennis team showed much promise. The team finished the year with a 4-7 record.

With games, assemblies, camp, and friends, cheerleading is the perfect combination of hard work and fun.



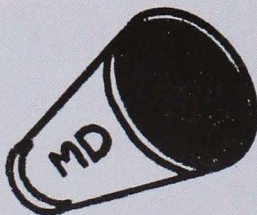
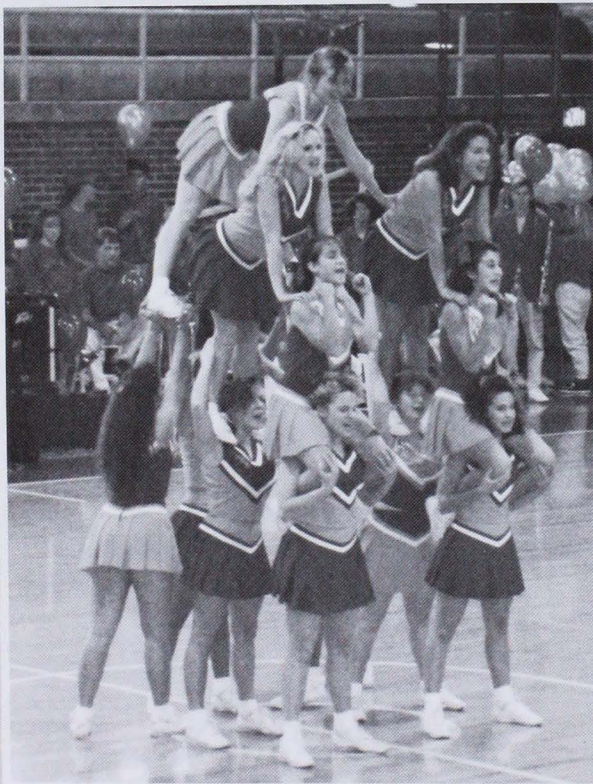

Mat Cats are Indiana's Best

This would be the year for the fall of the Mater Dei wrestling dynasty. According to the so-called exerts, Central and Castle would be too tough for the Mat Cats to continue their reign. They couldn't have been more wrong.

The Mat Cats took a first at Floyd Central, the Jasper Invitational, the Holiday Classic, Indiana's Best, and the Brentwood, Tennessee Classic.

On Jan. 7, our gym was packed like never before, with over 2,300 anxious fans cheering on their team in the biggest dual meet of the season. It was Mater Dei vs. Central. Our wrestlers didn't let us down; they came out on top 30-16.

Because of their No. 1 state ranking during the regular season, the Mat Cats were the Dual Meet Mythical State Champs. It was during the Indiana's Best tourney that the Cats really started flexing their muscle. They defeated 5th-ranked Belmont 30-25 to

end Belmont's 59-match winning streak.

Then Mater Dei won its 31st City title and its 20th SIAC crown. In this "down year," the Mat Cats won their Sectional for the 22nd time and their Regionals for the 15th time, a state record.

To cap the season, Matt Armentano won the state championship in the 152-pound class. He became the school's first state champ since 1988. Armentano, who had a 39-1 record, said, "This is something I've dreamed about. I visualized this every day."

Matt said that during the summer he would wrestle with (former Mater Dei wrestler) Eddie Goebel, and Goebel would pretend he was the announcer and say, "Matt Armentano, state champion."

Junior Scott Rogge took a second at state. His only loss after 39 wins came in the state finals.

Also qualifying for state were 130-pound senior Matt Bishop and 140-pound senior

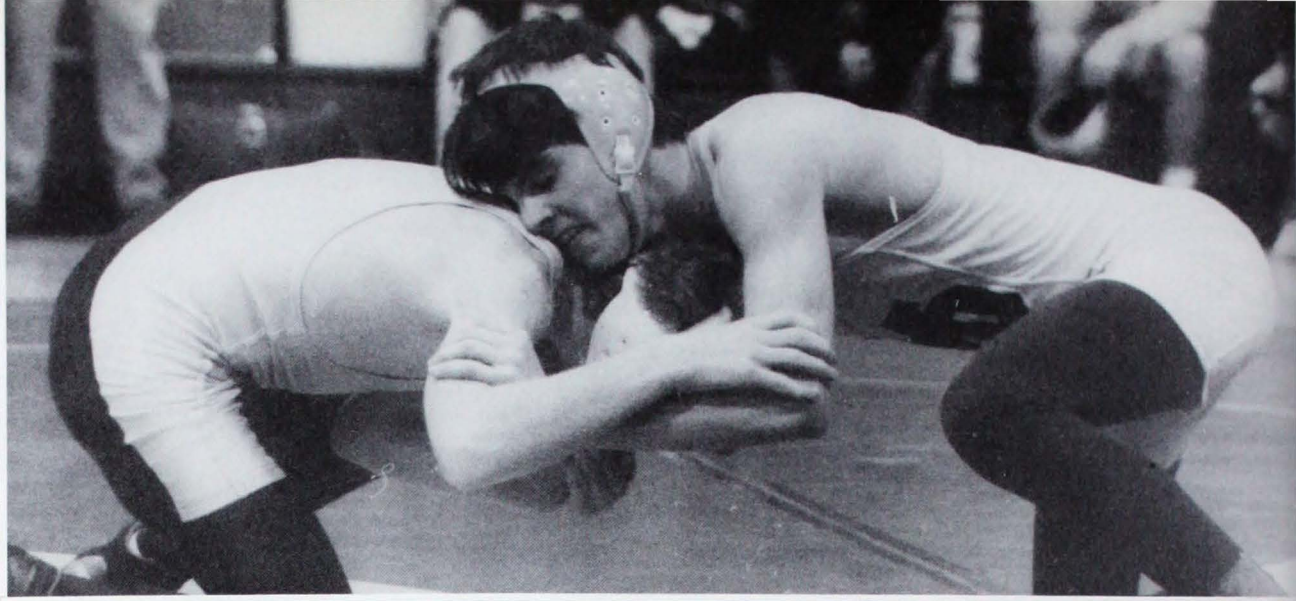
Ray Happe. Bishop finished 31-7 and Happe ended with a 32-6 record.

The Cats' victory in the Regionals probably reflected the kind of determination Mater Dei had best of all. Mater Dei was down by 19 points after the semifinals and by 6 after the consolations. But then the Cats won five of its six title matches to clip Central 161-159½.

According to coach Mike Goebel, it was the Mat Cats' greatest comeback win. "You can't measure how big a heart this team has. They wouldn't give up."

The reserve Mat Cats also continued to dominate. They outscored their opponents 1,524 points to 65 points, in going undefeated again. Coach Randy Helfrich achieved his 200th consecutive victory in the process. Tim Ritzert led the reserves in takedowns and Steve Winiger had 14 pins.

Matt Armentano: State Champ!



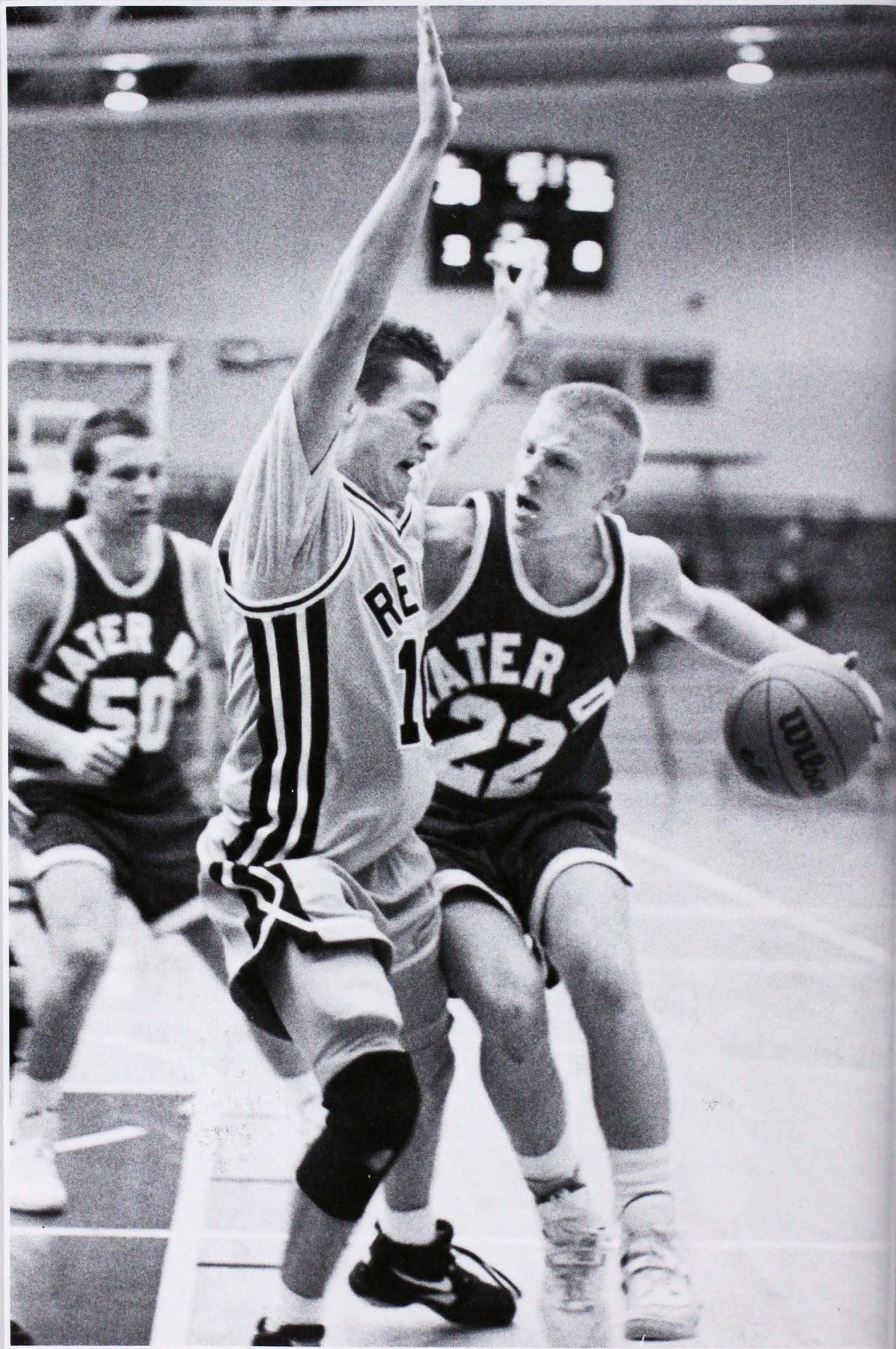

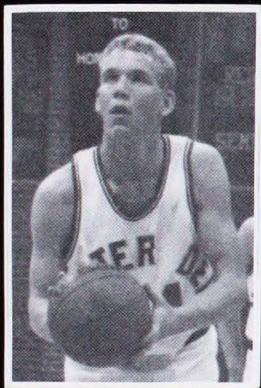

Katie led the team in rebounds with 12 a game. Heather Kissel led the team in free throws with a 72 percent average.



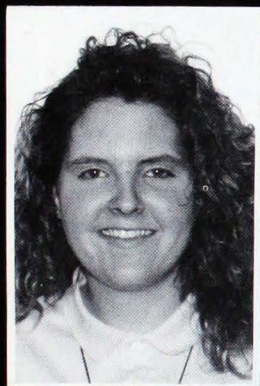

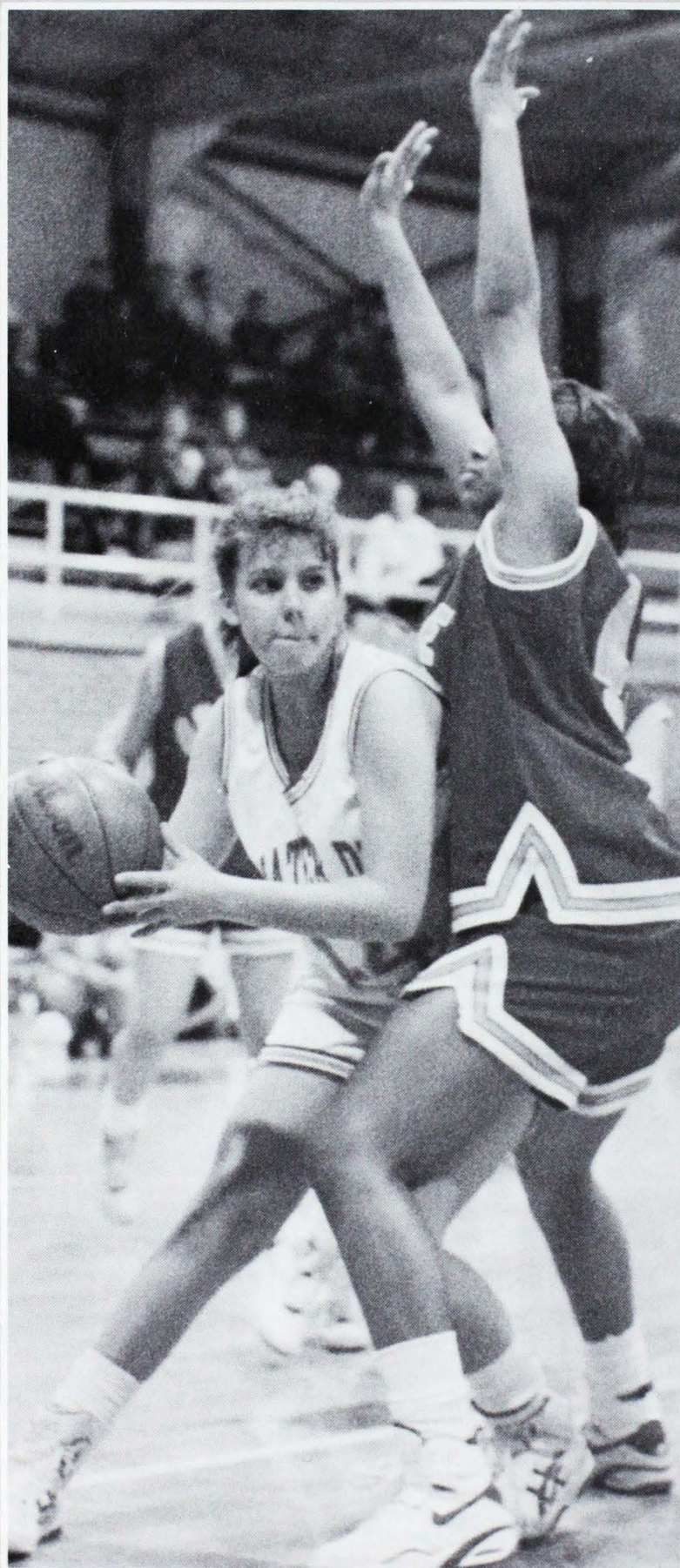

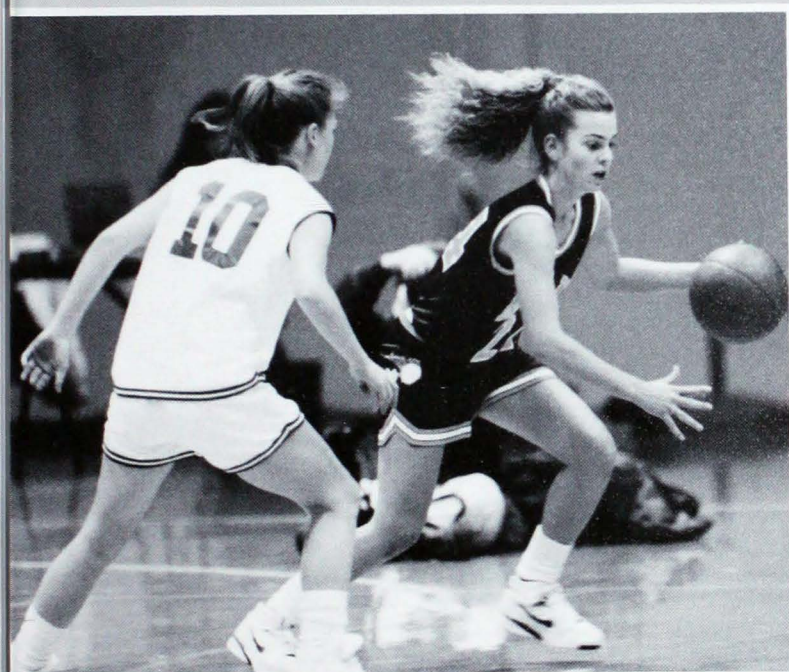

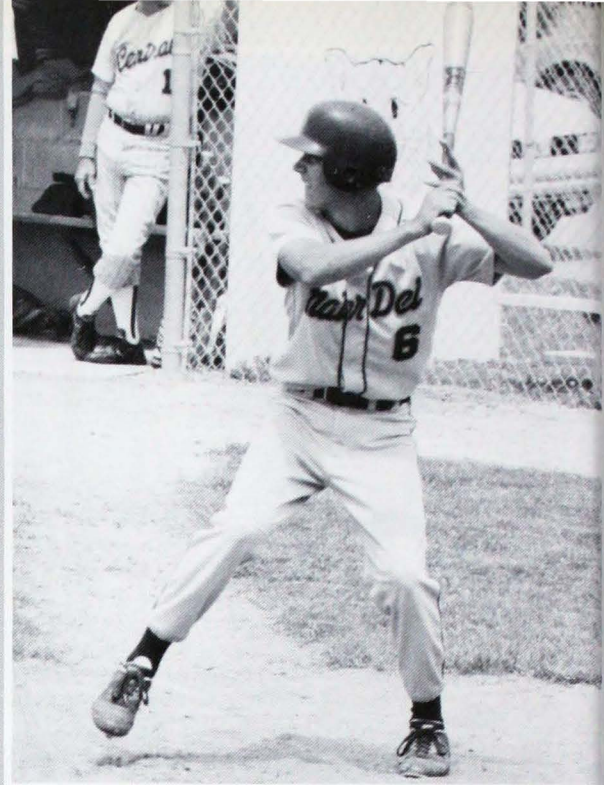

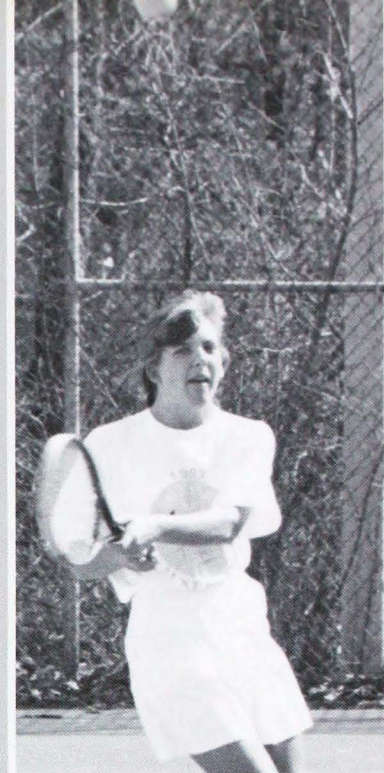
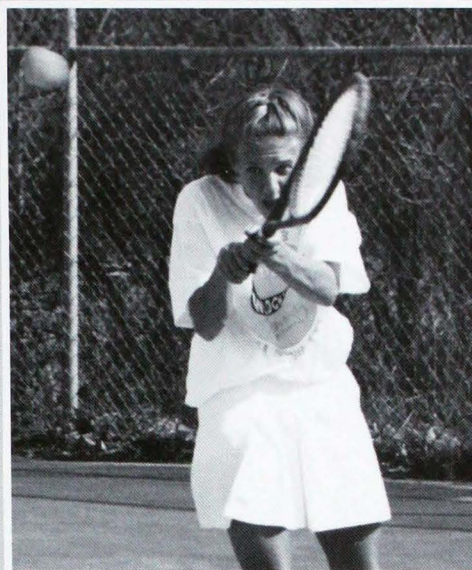
For coach Becky Larson's girls tennis team, it was like starting from scratch. Not a single letter winner was back.

Despite the lack of varsity experience, however, the girls ended up with four victories, including wins over city rivals Harrison and Bosse.

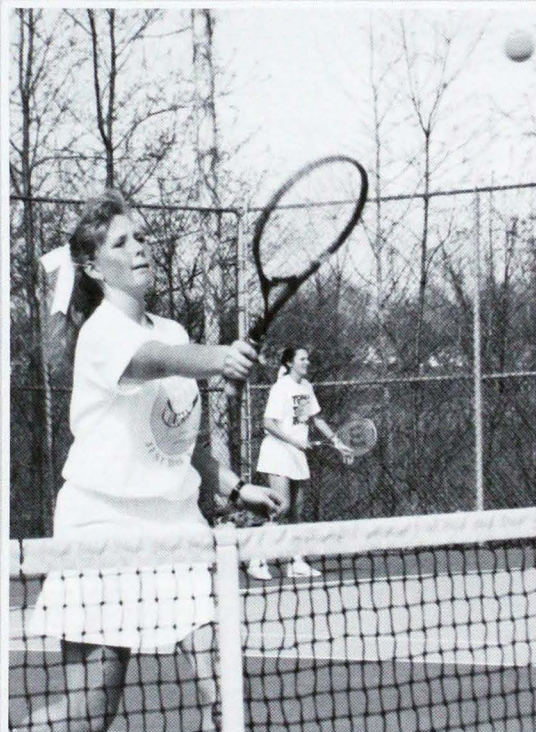
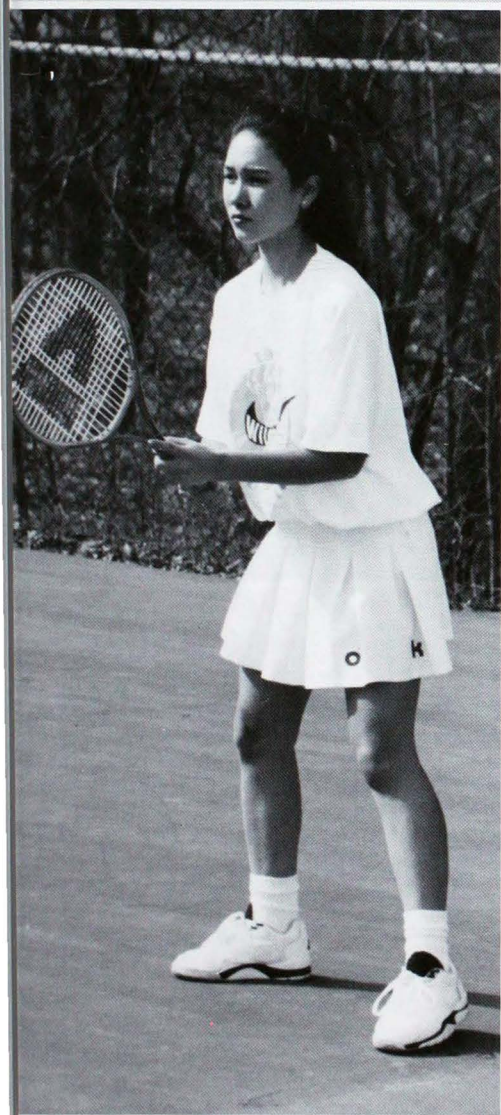
All this came with only two seniors, Lisa and Lana Schenk. Coach Larson said the Schenk twins' leadership was a big factor in the team's success.

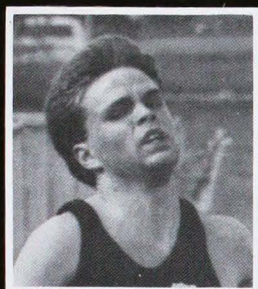
With low numbers, sickness, and a delayed start in training, the boys track team was mostly limited to individual successes.

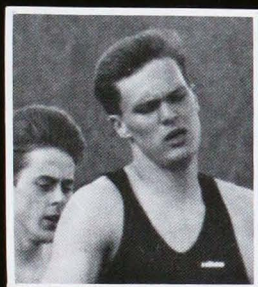

Toby Winiger said coach Traylor "did a tremendous job of coaching. He was an excellent role model for me and the rest of the team."



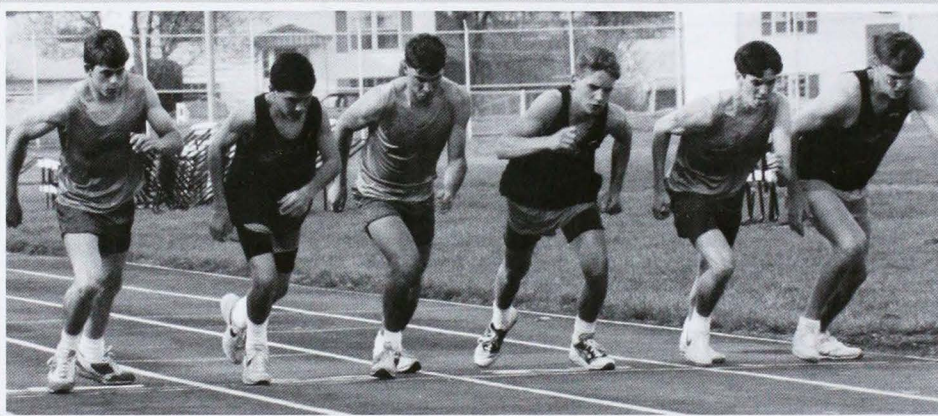

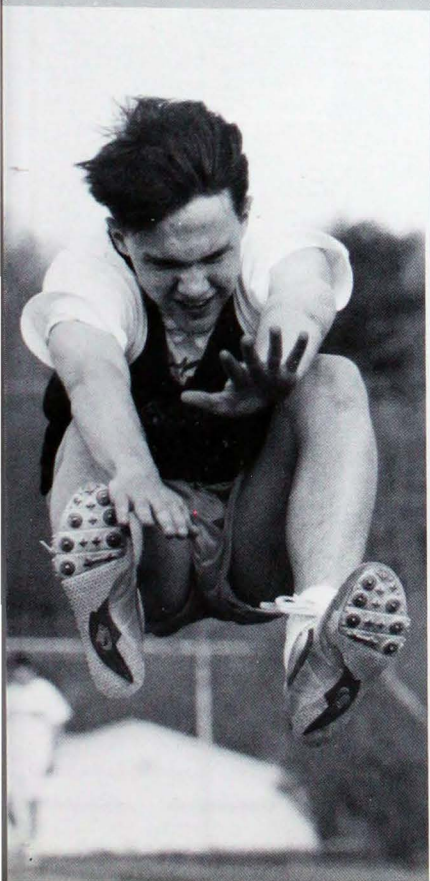

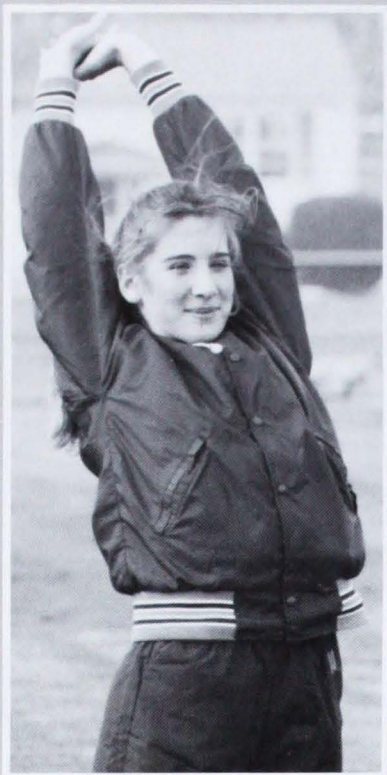
Sophomore sprint star makes it to state

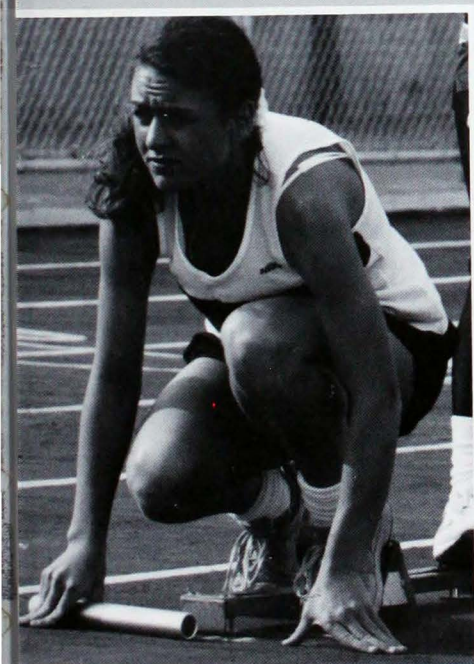

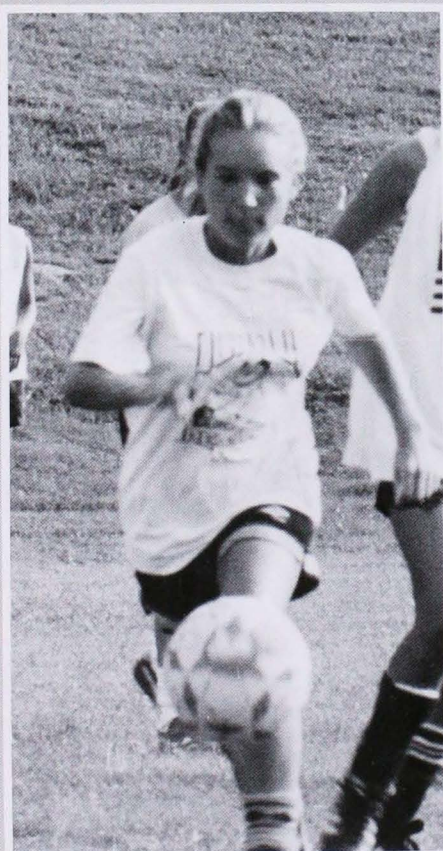

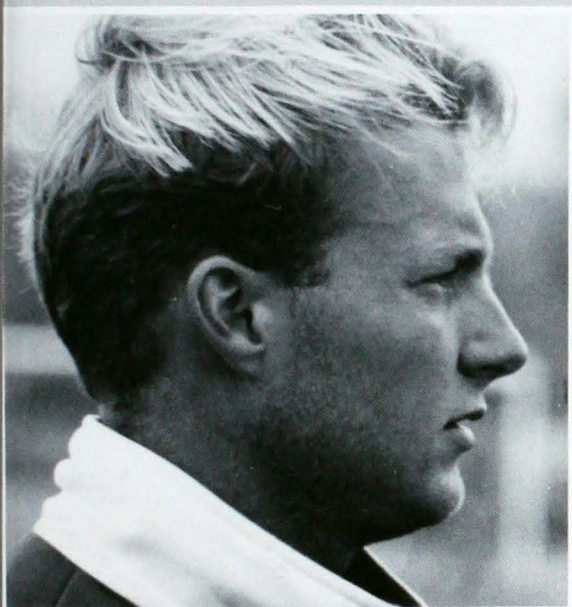
Making up the defense were Jennifer Freeman, juniors Emily Stansberry and Stacey

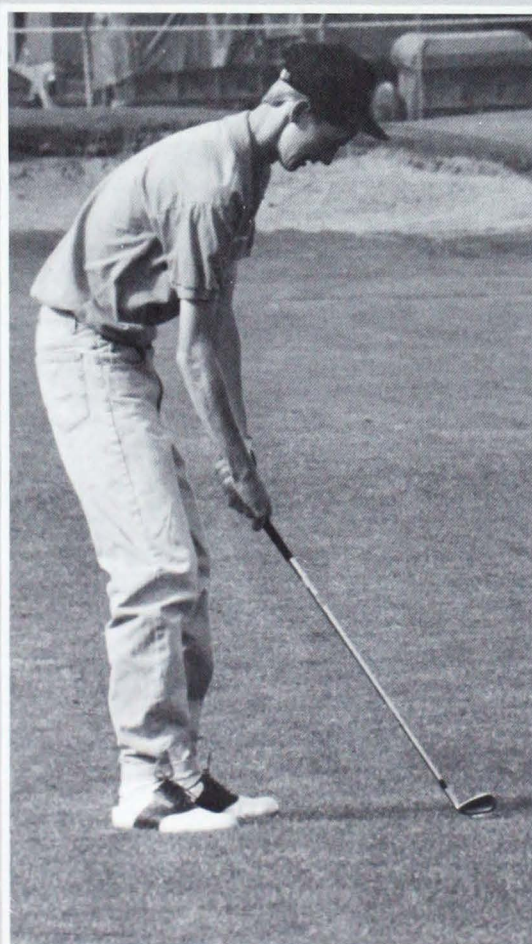

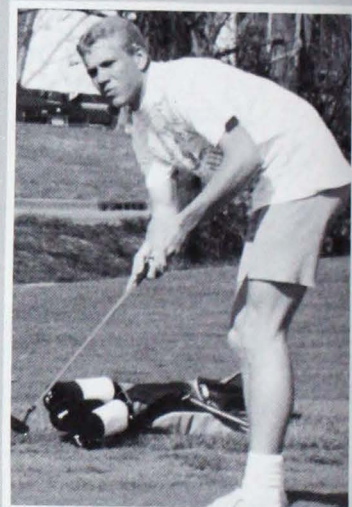
Titzer shot a 74 at Helfrich Hills to become city medalist. He said, "I played so well, I felt I couldn't miss."

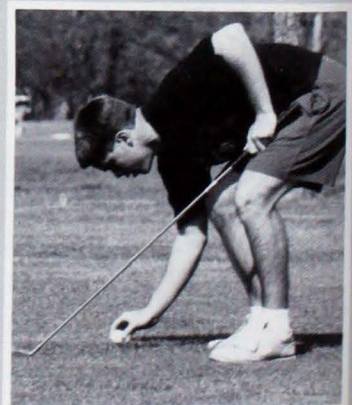
Coach Paul Dayton said the Cats were much improved over the previous year. Proof, he said, was that the team averaged about 20 strokes lower per match.

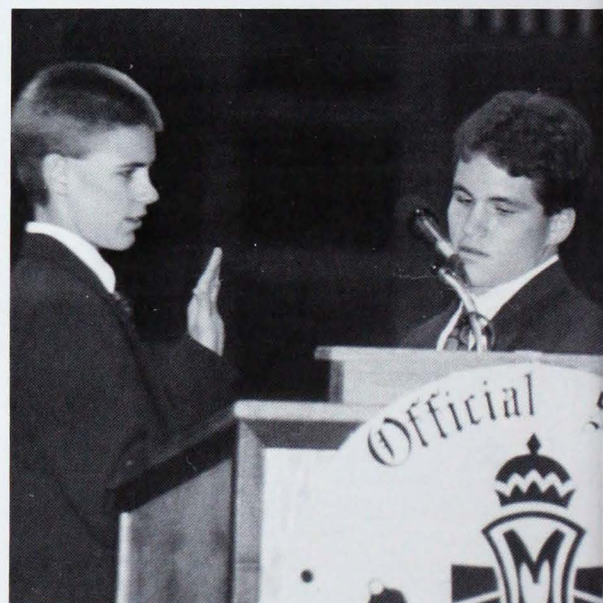

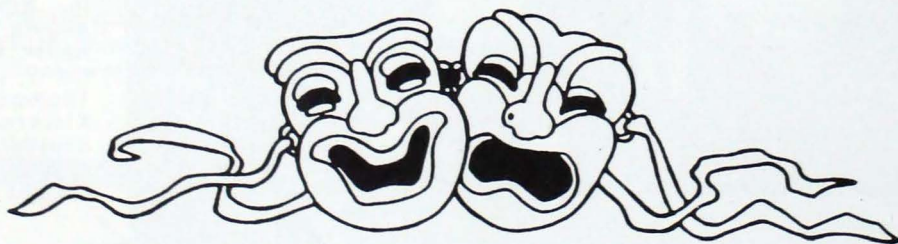

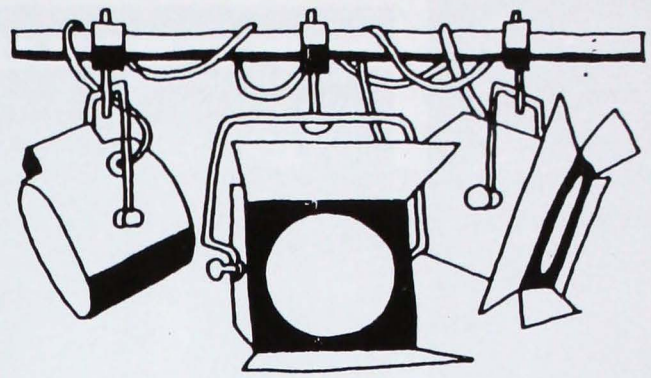

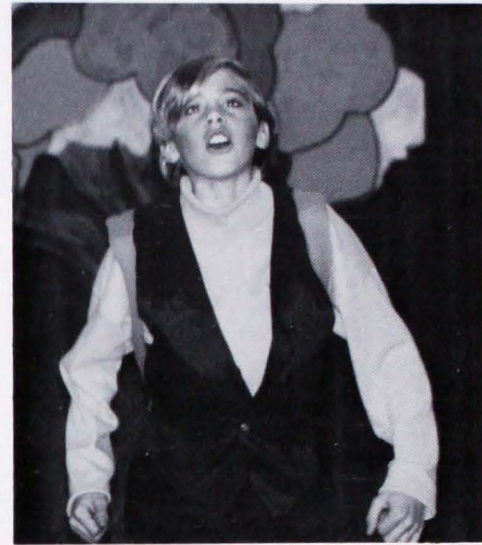

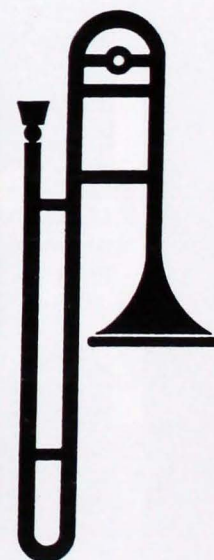
