

Class by class, teacher by teacher, we filtered out of the doors. It soon became obvious this would not be an easy task.









In its 175th year as a city, Evansville has experienced vast growth and change, but the real excitement lies ahead of us when we meet the challenges of the future.



Commenting on Student Council Club, Mayor John Goebel stated that clubs gave the Student Council extra time for planning rather than their coming in at 7:00 in the morning.


One problem involved the study clubs. At first, plenty of people (and not just freshmen) were walking around in confusion trying to find where they belonged.







A few teachers were asked what they felt the strengths of the English Department were.


Mrs. Lisa DiGiacomo answered, "The English Department here is well organized and supportive of each other, and we have similar goals."


Mrs. DiGiacomo agreed and added, "The size of the department is so small I think they are limited in having a forum to practice the types of writing they would do in college."





"All of them," he answered. "We try to


encourage as much math as possible."


Several students and teachers were asked if there were any math classes they would like to see added to the curriculum. The most common response was Computer Math.

"I think the Math Department here at Mater Dei adequately prepares our students for college. The students who take math all four years do exceptionally well in the math courses they take in college."



The horizon looks promising. According to Junior Katie Cavera, "The band will be really strong next year because a lot of our members will be returning as experienced seniors."



The Science Department does a very good job preparing students for college classes.


Mrs. Donna Carney asserted, "Students who have graduated from Mater Dei with a strong science background feel that they have been well prepared for college."



"That's going to be their future. There's not going to be any occupation not touched by the computer," explained Sister Mary Francis, when she was asked why students should take computer courses.

Mater Dei students can, in fact, take three computer courses to develop their skills for both their personal use and future business needs.

One course taken by just about all Mater Dei students is typing. "It's a fact of life," said Mrs. Carol Hudgions, "You have to have typing skills." Mrs. Pat Welsh stated that "thanks to the Friends and Alumni Association, we now have state of the art electronic typewriters that can be adaptable for computer class later on."

Several sections of accounting are offered each semester. Mrs. Hudgions felt that "because the field has opened up, accounting is a good career for both boys and girls."

Mr. Darryl Meyer taught a one-semester Business Law class to seniors. His goal was to give the students a "basic background in laws, a practical knowledge that they'll be using some day, such as when they're buying a home, signing a contract or starting a business."

The Business Department offers a variety of classes to students who want skills that will prepare them for life.

Government, which is a required course for seniors, is designed to give a basic understanding of the workings of the three branches of the federal government, as well as state and local government. "It is the study of our Constitution," stated Mr. Mike Goebel, head of the Department of Social Studies," and how we became the nation we are today."

As a part of that study, Mr. Goebel had his government classes see the Magna Carta, which was on exhibit at U.S.I. "It was impressive to see a document that set the groundwork for our Constitution, which we take for granted," said Mr. Goebel. The Magna Carta, as he noted, was a "meaningful step toward democracy."


History courses taught at Mater Dei are World Culture, World History, Advanced History, and U.S. History.

Although Mr. Dave Wathen spends a great deal of his class time discussions the family in his sociology classes, his course is a survey of all the five main institutions: family, education, religion, politics, and the economy. "It's hard to discuss one and not the other." As he pointed out, "They're not mutually exclusive."

He tries to take theory and relate it to his students' lives. For example, his classes watched a Donahue show about early childhood development, specifically birth order. "I liked that one," said Junior Cindy Herrmann. "We all related to it."

Sociology, as Mr. Wathen explained, "is a survey of what's going on."


Mr. Bowman & Mr. Neighbors:



The Man Behind the "Pink Slips"
















One thing that can be said about Mater Dei fans is that they are loyal. Rain or shine, snow or sleet, Mater Dei fans will be there.

Some new faces and great senior leadership gave the Wildcats their finest season ever. Congratulations on a tremendous performance!



"I had no real goals at the beginning of the season. I didn't expect to get that far at all," commented Bornefield.


Kaiser captured the State championship and emerged as the team leader. He also became known as the local nut.


Junior Scot Lady stated, "He knows how to play a really good kazoo."

Angeles, California.



"He has done what no other Evansvillian has done," stated his Coach, Herb Neighbors. "He has won state titles back to back in cross country and track."

"I set my goal early for the cross country state win," explained Jim, "but I really didn't realize I had the potential for the 3,200 until after I had won cross country. Then I knew. I had to go for it."

Jim, in fact, now holds the city record for the 3,200 (9:18).

He continued to win at the Sectionals and at Regionals.

To top off his high school career, Jim ran the fourth fastest race in the state's history (9:04:52) to capture the state title.

But there's more.

On June 23, Jim competed against 90 other runners from 45 states at the Ninth All-American Prep National Cross Country Championships in New Orleans.

"It was a hard run," stated Jim, "though it had a more relaxed atmosphere that at State."

Because he didn't feel the pressure he had at State," it was hard to keep up for it, but I didn't want to get blown away."

He was definitely not "blown away," as he finished the race in 16"20:02 to place sixth on the National First Team. He was subsequently named All-American.

His other honors include Indiana Runner of the Year, First Team All State and First Team Academic.

Jim will be attending the University of Kentucky on a full scholarship this fall.

"These last 10 years (as coach) have been a tremendous experience," asserted Mr. Herb Neighbors, Assistant Principal and former cross country and track coach.

This past year has, of course, been "just outstanding," according to Mr. Neighbors, "because of the girls cross-country performance and Jim Kaiser."


He continued, "This has been the highlight of 10 years of coaching. I'm going to miss it a lot."

Jim went on to say, "Mr. Neighbors gave more than I had a right to expect. He really sacrificed a lot of time."


For his efforts, Mr. Neighbors was named by the City as Cross Country Coach of the Year, a great way to finish — at the top.







"We played really well," explained Will. "We outplayed them everywhere except on the scoreboard."










Right: The Wildcat defense lines up against Tell City. Above: Junior Brian Goebel makes a spectacular catch during the Tell City game.





Who would have known?



"We were a good, balanced team. Even though we lost six seniors, we could have been at the State Finals," stated Coach Darla Edwards.


"We did better than we or anyone else expected us to do, commented Junior Melissa Thompson.






This could be referred to as a new beginning for the basketball program in many ways.


According to Coach Sills, "There were about eight times when I thought we were really shaping up. If we have the same good attitude we had last year, the added experience will take us a long way."



Though some people were disappointed in the finish of the past season, the Matcats still accomplished most of what they set out to do.

Take these facts for example: SIAC, Sectional, Regional and Semi-State titles: One State champion (Scnur): A dual meet victory over Delta, the #1 ranked team in the state at the time.


"We wrestled pretty well against Cathedral. We could have beaten them if a couple of matches had gone the other way," stated Goebel.

Mater Dei finished second in the State tournament, capping off a fantastic season


"I was pleased," said Junior Steve Fitzer. "But you can't beat a team you don't wrestle." Champion Bellmont faced MD only once and had no individual champions.









Junior Sarah Titzer stepped in and posted a shutout versus Reitz.



With only three seniors graduating, the outlook for next year is positive.









After a tough doubleheader loss to top-ranked Castle, the Batcats traveled to Indianapolis for the Whiteland Tourney. There they posted victories over


Barr-Reeve and Indianapolis Brebeuf.


The Batcats finished the season 16-9. Junior Joe Dippel was named All-City and All-SIAC.

"I was pleased," concluded Voegel. "We had some seniors who took charge and led the team. It was a good season."









Junior Julie Halbig, #3 singles player, remembers her last match before Sectionals. "I played my best match against North and won."



Mater Dei lost to North in that match. However, they faced the Huskies in the city tournament and the result was a little different.


"We were ahead after the first nine," explained Coach Kurt Wambach. "But they (North) passed us on the last nine."


Because Linda missed the touch pad at State, her time of 1:03:7 (which would have given her a 16th and qualifying place) was not accepted.

Gary has been involved with the Boy Scout program since age 11 and was a Cub Scout before that. He is now working towards becoming an Eagle Scout.


To acquire this highest rank, he must earn 21 merit badges and also plan and organize a community service project which must be approved by a troop leader.

Said Gary, "I'm glad I'm still doing it. I learned a lot of things that I wouldn't have otherwise."



Luckily, Theresa had never had to save anyone. "I never went off the chair all summer."




What began as a dare is now an expensive hobby. Bill and his family invested around \$1,500 into racing his Kawasaki KX105.

Jenny is also involved in volleyball and plans to play soccer next year.



Modeling schools and several work shops have taught her to present her dresses better for competition.



New Mater Dei junior, Bernard Bartholome, first started dee-jaying during his freshman year at Central High School.


"A friend of mine got me interested in deejaying and I've been doing it ever since," explained Bernard.

"It was really lot of fun playing with the rest of the guys in the band," Lee commented.


Lee's biggest influences have been his father and his older brother, a fellow "Non," Carl, who are musicians also.











The program concluded with remarks by Bishop Shea.






