## Study of novels, movies related to present-day life

In an otherwise technological world, the English Department, under the leadership of Mr. Stan Singer and Sister Mary Donald, places the emphasis on humanities and liberal arts. The English staff includes seven teachers. Mr. Singer, who holds a Masters Degree in English from Indiana University, teaches senior World Literature and sophomore and junior English. Sister Donald, who graduated from St. Joseph, Rensselaer, Indiana, teaches composition and handles three English classes, while Sister Mary Esther, with a Masters Degree from Notre Dame, teaches one class of sophomores and two classes of seniors.

Father Hamel, an alumnus of St. Meinard, handles sophomore English IIA, along with Sister Mary Sharon, a graduate of St. Benedict College. Also teaching English classes and taking care of the speech course is Mr. Gary Kuhlenhoelter, also an Indiana University graduate. The two journalism classes, which publish the school paper and yearbook, are under the leadership of Mr. Steve Halbig, a graduate of the University of Evansville.

During the year a wide variety of top-quality movies were viewed by the English students. Among these were "The Hunchback of Notre Dame," "Midsummer Night's Dream," "On The Waterfront," "Kidnapped," "The Prince and the Pauper," "Sea Wolf" and "Anthony Adverse." Among the required reading for the English classes were such selections as "Hunchback of Notre Dame," "Brave New World," "Catcher in the Rye," "The Dwarf," "She Stoops to Conquer," "1984," "Lord of the Flies" and "How Green Was My Valley." Students were also given a chance to attend three University of Evansville productions. The plays were "The Plough And the Stars," "Slow Dance on the Killing Ground" and "The Miser."

A lot of hard work and preparation goes into making a yearbook. Yearbook editor, Jo Lynn Franks attended a yearbook workshop at Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana in order to learn about the fundamentals in organizing a yearbook.
M.D. Hi-Lights newspaper merited first in the city at Journalism Day at the University of Evansville. Judy Englert received a $\$ 150$ scholarship from the University of Evansville for writing a news story on a speech given earlier in the day by Mr. Leonord Krueger, Editor of the Courier. Mr. Steve Halbig, head of the Journalism Department and staff advisor, is a graduate of the University of Evansville and is working on his master's degree at Ball State University.

To supplement the department, a new darkroom has been added, where all yearbook and newspaper pictures are printed. School photographers also have some of the finest professional cameras available, with access to a Yashisca 120 and a 35 mm Pentax with a telephoto lens. Journalism I students concentrate on theory while the Journalism II class puts out the newspaper and yearbook.

During the first semester, Ed Stone headed the staff as presiding Editor. Gary Metz served as Managing Editor, while Steve Sammet was the Sports Editor. City Editor, Joe Ellert, took over the job of Newspaper Editor during the second semester.

## Physicists use siren disc in explanation of sound



Students delve into the unknown through mathematics, ranging from the simple to the complex. Seven phases of the world of numbers are offered here, supervised by Mr. Paul Ellert and Sister Melvin, department heads. Freshmen are greeted with the choices of General Math, Pre-Algebra and Algebra I. Triangles, circles and theorems enhance sophomore Geometry, while juniors encounter the more complex Advanced Algebra. Advanced Math and Trigonometry, along with the one-semester Calculus, provide additional background for senior mathematicians.
The department was equally represented at the school's annual Science Fair, where top honors in the math division were taken by freshmen Ann Tavormina and Ed Johnstone and junior Teresa Tavormina. Awards in Geometry, Advanced Algebra and Advanced Math were featured at the annual Academic Monogram assembly. The winners were sophomores Karen Koch and Darrell Hupfer in Geometry, juniors Katie Wambach and Thom Liffick in Advanced Algebra and seniors Kathy Guntel and Mike Martin in Advanced Math.

## Tom Dick heads award-winning science program

In today's world of techniological advances it is very important to have a knowledge of Science. Students of Mater Dei can receive a basic knowledge in either Chemistry, Biology, General Science and Physics.

One of the various activities for the science-minded students at Mater Dei is the annual Science Fair, which is the first step to the National Science Fair.

Another is the Science Club, which organized and helped carry out this year's Science Fair, with senior Pat Vollman as President and Mr. Tom Dick as Staff Advisor.

Besides being Science Club advisor, Mr. Dick, who received his masters degree from Indiana University, is also head of the Science Department.

Biology, both Modern Biology and Biological Science for Curriculum Study, are taught to sophomore and, for the first time, to freshman students who qualify. Mr. Dick also took his Advanced Biology class on a field trip to Angel Mounds.

Veteran Sister Mary Corita, a graduate of Catherine Spaulding College, is a six-year Chemistry teacher at Mater Dei, while Sister John Marie from St. Scholastica is in her third year as a girls' Biology teacher.

Due to the work of the teachers in the Math and Science fields, this year's Science Fair was one of the best ever, with Teresa Tavormina taking first place in Math.

There was a three way tie for first place honors in Chemistry, Francis Buamgart, Ken Schapker and Bob Angermier all placing first.

Tony Bruce and Becky Kramer tied for first place in Physics with Darrel Hupfer, Karen Schoenbachler, Janet Walter and the twosome of Beth Beyer and Pat Bray and Mary Beth Will and Fran Reisinger all placing first in Biology.

## Public trials, student jury spark campus interest

Evansville Courier columnist, Joe Aaron, publicly complimented Mater Dei's mock trail presented at the Vanderburgh County Superior Court Room in the County Courthouse, at Superior Court Judge Benjamin Buente's invitation.

Again this year the majority of senior student councilmen and officials actively participated in the trial sponsored by the City of Evansville.

Our Town displayed its own political initiative as registered citizens of Mater Dei-ville went to the polls to vote for Mayor, Clerk, Judge, Councilmen-at-large and Student Advocate. Giving the citizens a louder voice in the affairs of their government prompted the erection of "Your Student Government In Action" bulletin board and suggestion box, and numerous court sessions and political campaigns reflected a growing interest in judicial procedure.

The top two per cent of the senior leaders of Mater Dei were chosen as "Leaders of Tomorrow" by the Evansville Chamber of Commerce and given special recognition at a banquet in the Student Union building of the University of Evansville. # 'Scapin the Scamp' begins Thespian season as Drama 

## Department offers wide range of entertainment

The inauguration of the city's Civic Center brings a new cultural attraction to Evansville in the form of entertainment. Mater Dei-ville, too, followed up with the Drama Club's presentations in the school's Little Theater. Directed by Mr. Stan Singer, English and World Literature teacher, the plays ranged from a seventeenth-century farce by Moliere, to a night of horror and melodramatic productions. Thom Liffick starred in the seventeenth-century "Scapin the Scamp," the Drama Club's first endeavor of the school year. A crook and conman, Scapin observes life and the conflicts that can occur between fathers and sons. Others contributing to the action were Jerry Deig, Tony Bruce, Jim Butler, Terri Helfrich, Don Ulrich, Diane Dunkelbarger and Ed Stone.

The setting then switched from the seventeenthcentury atmosphere of Naples to the Nazi era in Germany's 1930's for the club's second undertaking during the spring. "Jacob Comes Home", the first of three one-act horror plays, was an account about Jewish situations during Hitler's reign. Characters were Jerry Deig, Jim Butler, Martha Shelton, Marty Tennyson and Marcia Coomes. A famous killer of London's late nineteenth century supplied the mystery and suspense for the "Mother of Jack the Ripper." The lead role was carried by freshman Diane Gutzweiler while supporting dramatists were Jackie Drone, Jamie Waelde, Bob Angermeier, Mike Forche and Jane Tenbarge. The part of a deranged spinster offered Teresa Tavormina her first acting assignment in "Still Stands the House," the last of the three horror productions. She was joined by fellow-actors, Diane Dunkelbarger, Ed Stone and Thom Liffick, in the eerie performance.

A new feature was interjected here with the arrial of the "Coffee House." At two of the horror shows, the Little Theater was decorated with a "Coffee House" theme accented by horror decorations, Red-and-white checkered tablecloths covered card tables, while waitresses scurried throughout the theater serving refreshments. The walls were adorned with large posters of such personalities as "Bonnie and Clyde." Plastic skulls and orange and black crepe paper hung from the ceiling.

Towards the end of the year, a reverse effect of the
horror dramas was put into action in the form of three comedies. "Nobody Sleeps" revolves around a burglar's unusual experiences in the house he was about to plunder. The actors were Bob Clayton, Chris Borries, Vickie Yaser, Marcia Coomes and Donna Hoffman. A man's peculia hobby and a cluster of landladies composed "A Little Bird of a Woman," starring Susie McCallister, Don Ulrich, Barb Nix, Susie Becker and Karen Holder. In a more serious mood was "The Day After," the account of a young daughter finally meeting her mother who is really an ex-convict. Diane Dunkelbarger was the ex-convict and Terri Helfrich starred as the daughter, adopted by Jamie Waelde, at the time her real mother was not present.

The "Coffee House" idea was also used at these final performances. One hundred seats were available for each showing, again using card tables. Since one-act comedies were staged, the decorations, in turn, displayed a comedy motif. Balloons were hung from the ceiling and the walls were framed with large posters of famous comedians. As in the previous "Coffee House," waitresses served refreshments, but at this showing, they were attired in clown costumes.

Between the first and second plays, folk-flavored songs were presented by the guitars of Steve Lankford and Kenny Goans. The climax of the evenings then occurred between the last two performances, where a 15 -minute color film was shown. The melodramatic effect was strengthened by the actors, members of the Drama Club. Scenes were shot at various vantage points throughout Evansville. "The Assassination of Julius Caesar" was filmed on the steps of the city's coliseum, amid many onlookers and staring spectators. The old Henderson bridge was the scene of an exciting chase for Tony Bruce, Chuck Hamilton and Jerry Deig. Other comical effects were used in the "Capture of Baby-Face Nelson" and a "Black Magic Pie Scene." Although no sound was added during the actual filming, records of popular music were played during the showings in the Little Theater. Making their debut in Mater Dei's first film were Chuck Hamilton, Jerry Deig, Ed Stone, Joe Stratman, Paul Jourdan, Tony Bruce, George Brenner, Jack Schenk, Charlie Jourdan, Chris Hamilton and Bob Angermeier.

Cross Country this year was undoubtedly the best year for the sport in the school's history, as the team ran its way to ninth place in the Regionals and finished unbeaten in the regular season.

The top five runners for the Cats were senior Steve Sammet, juniors Kenny Goans, Steve Markin, Dan Alvey and sophomore Wayne Emge, along with backup runners junior Joe Schoenbachler and sophomores Pat Raley, and Gerry Ellsperman.
Goans and Sammet were the top individual record breakers. Goans holds the fastest time, a 10:21 clocking, while Sammet recorded the best time ever for the City meet at 10:24.

Team records go something like this: the first to get past the Sectionals and qualify for the Regionals; the first to have an undefeated regular season; the first to get the top five runners under 10:45 in the same meet; the first to take better than fifth in the SIAC with a third; and the first squad to get three finishers in the top ten in the City meet with Sammet, Goans, and Emge.

Juniors lead the Track team with six broken records. Junior Steve Nurrenbern, who took second in the sectional, broke his own shot put record with a heave of $50^{\prime} 21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. Mike Clark set the 440 at 53.2 , while junior distance men Dan Alvey and Ken Goans put new tabs on the mile and 2 mile runs with clockings of 4.49 and 10:40, respectively. Seniors Don Miller and Dan Payne tied the 100 mark at 10.7 and Miller equalled the 220 at 23.6 . Both the mile relay and half mile relay have new timings at $3: 25$ and $1: 37.5$, respectively. Members of the mile relay are Seniors Larry Crouch, Dan Payne, Don Miller and junior Mike Clark, half mile team are Juniors Mike Forche, Bob Clayton, John Hamilton and sophomore Mark Freeman. Although the team established eight new records it won only one meet in six.

At the half-way mark of the season when the yearbook went to press, the baseball team was in first place in the city and SIAC, winning nine of twelve contests. A slight favorite to win the Evansville Sectionals, the Cats instead suffered a 2-1 setback to Harrison. Memorial eventually captured the crown.

During the first half of the campaign, the Cats racked up some impressive statistics, outscoring the opposition, 60-25, and outhitting them .250 to .190 . Junior Ken Wannemuehler, who had a disastrous sophomore year, bounced back to lead the club in hitting with a . 375 mark. Sophomore Paul Martin, juniors Jim Schiff and Tom Schapker and seniors John Stocker and Mike Schapker were in the .250 to .275 category.
