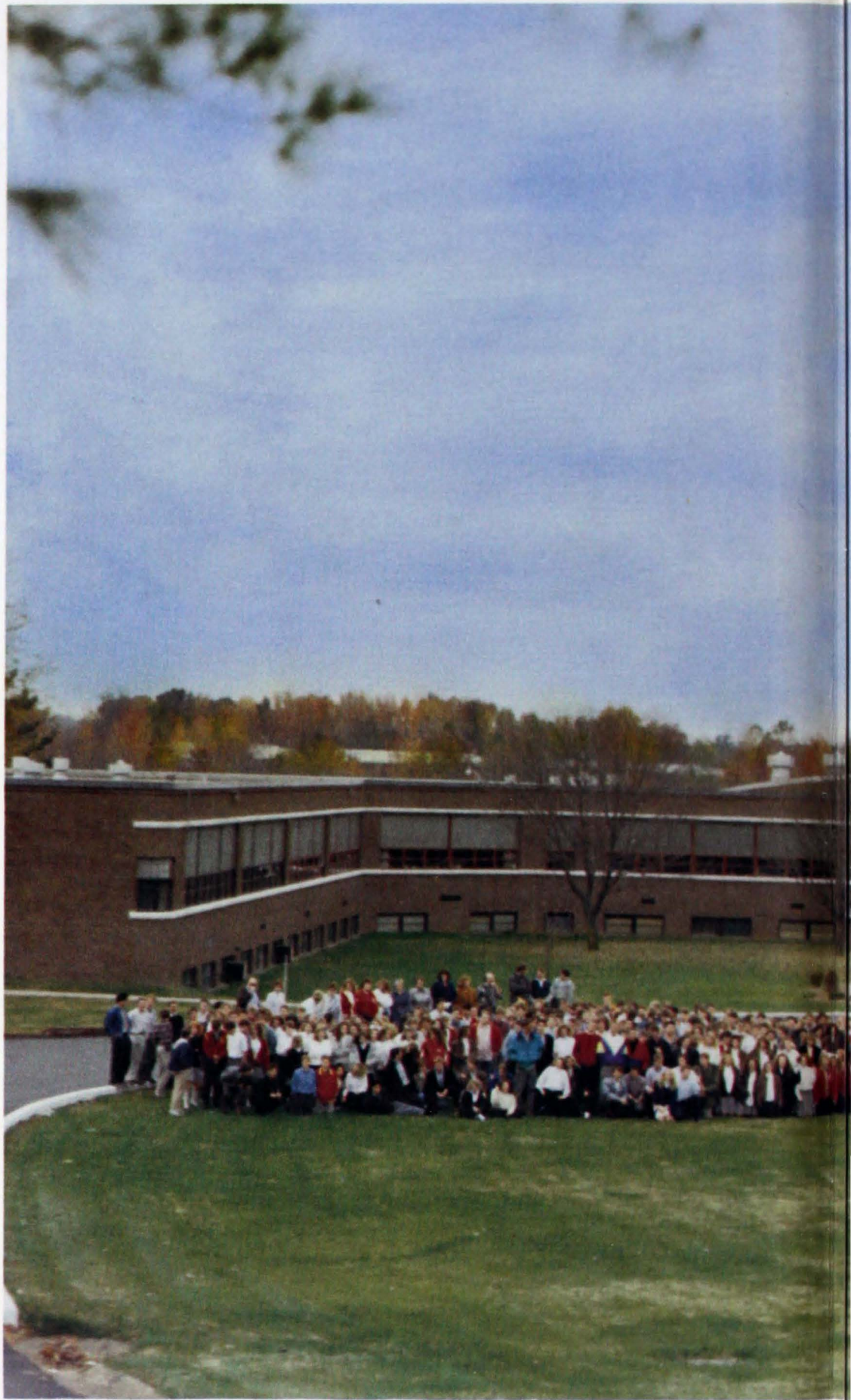

Mr. Neighbors, the first alumnus to be named principal, stressed the need for communication and togetherness throughout the 1990-91 school year.

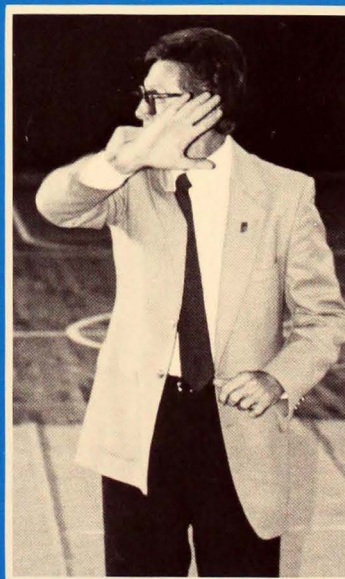
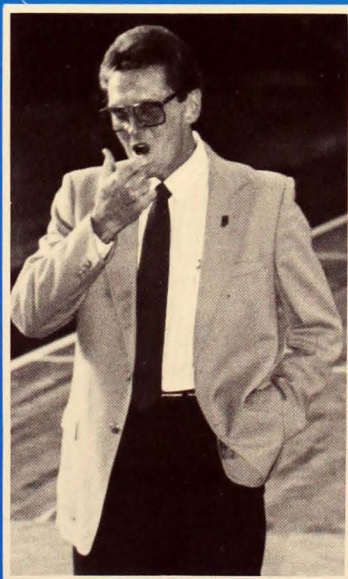
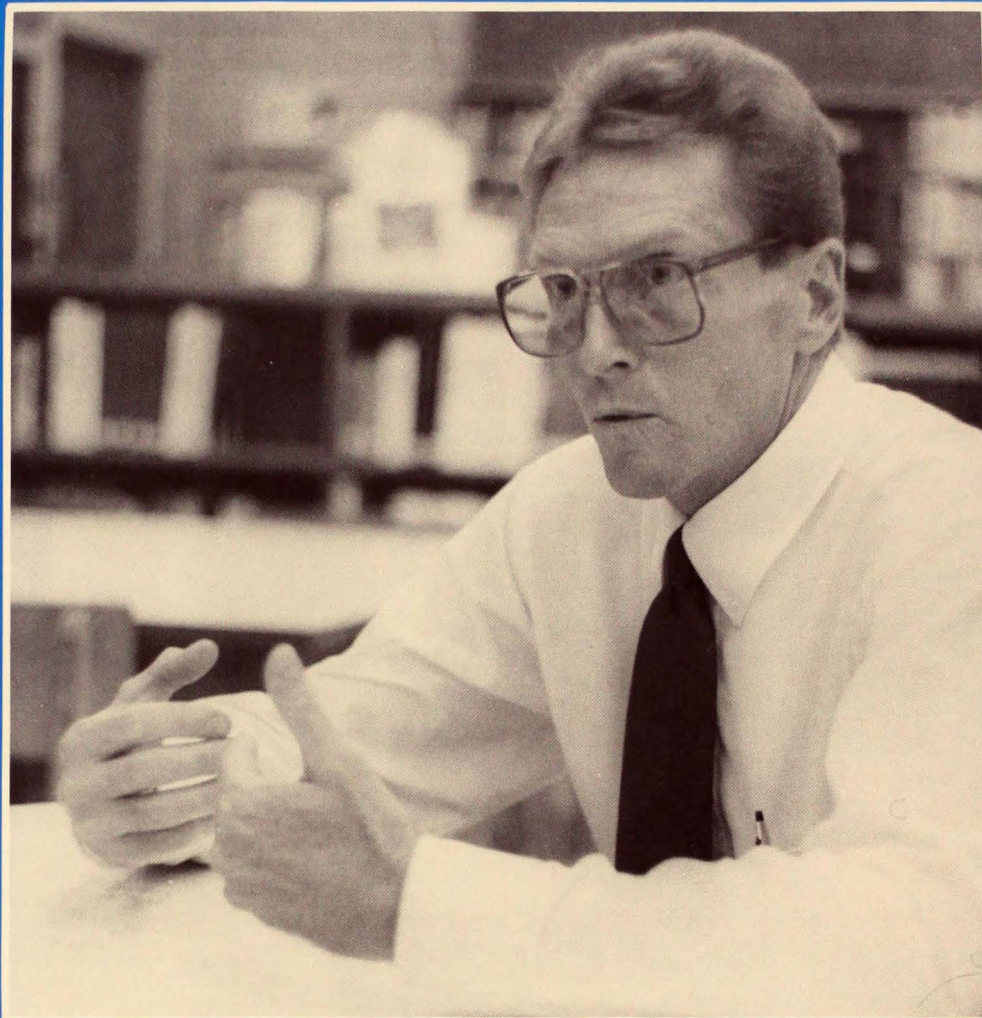
Mr. Neighbors also stated that leadership from the seniors would help it be a successful year.

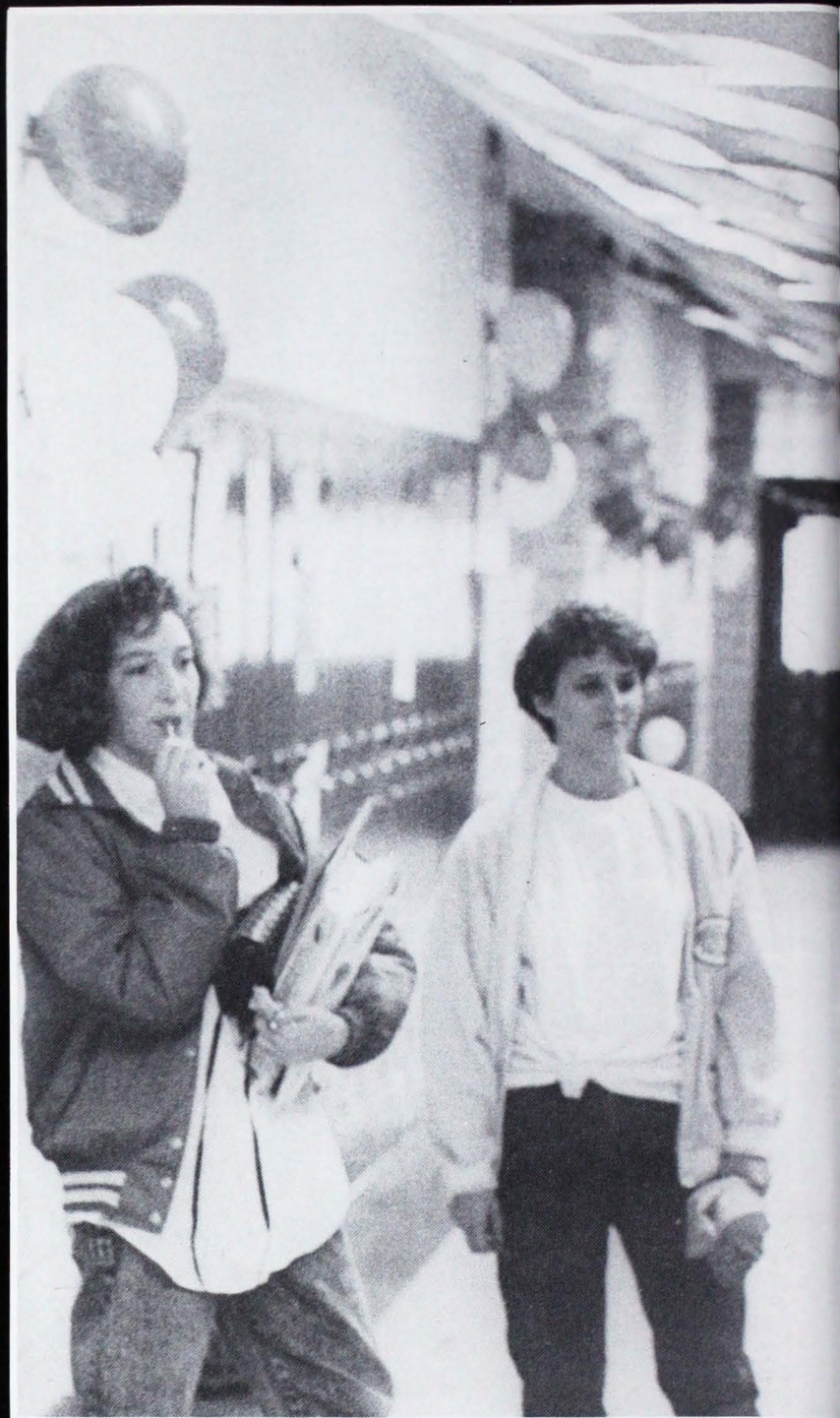

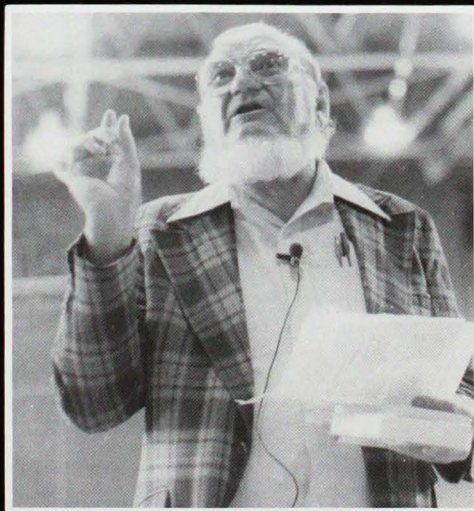

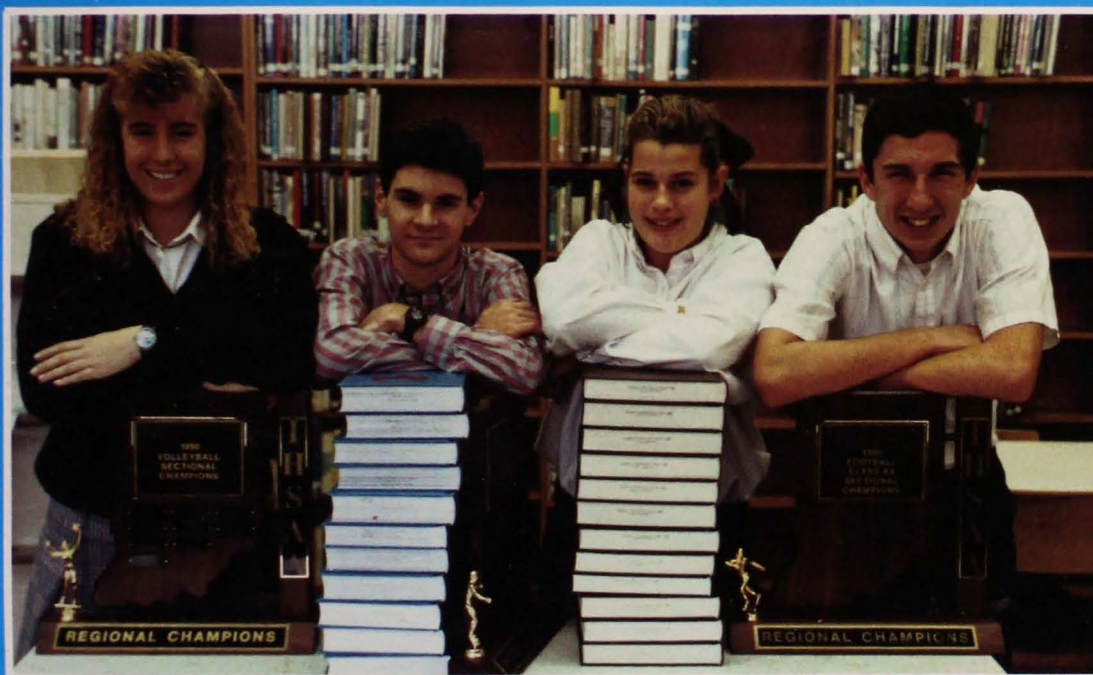

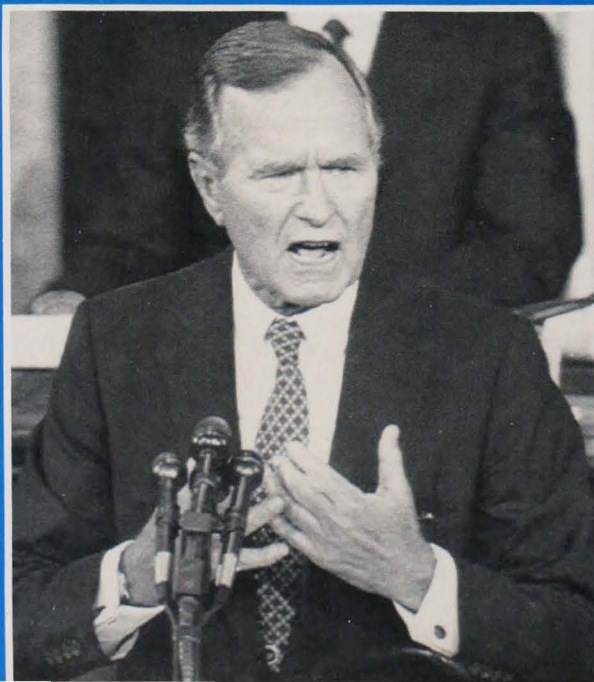
It also was a year when 51-year-old David Souter became the 105th

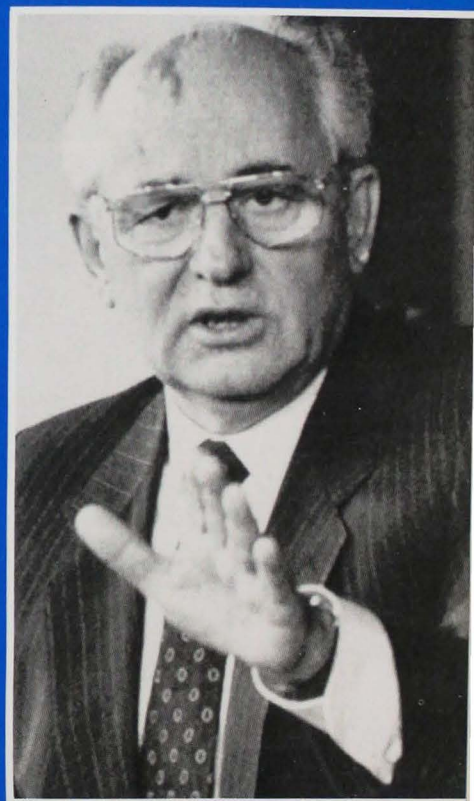
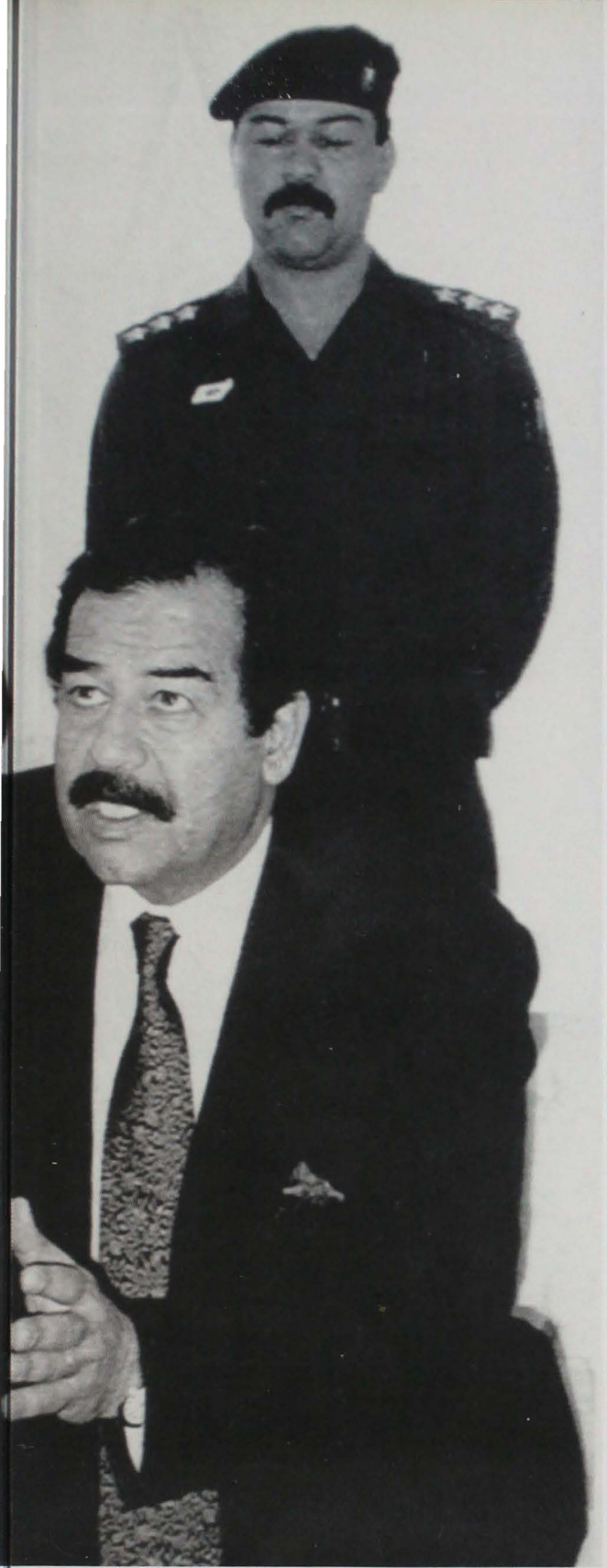
justice of the Supreme Court and Margaret Thatcher stepped down as prime minister of Britain.

"The classes really participated this year, which made my job easy," said cheerleader Becky Titzer.

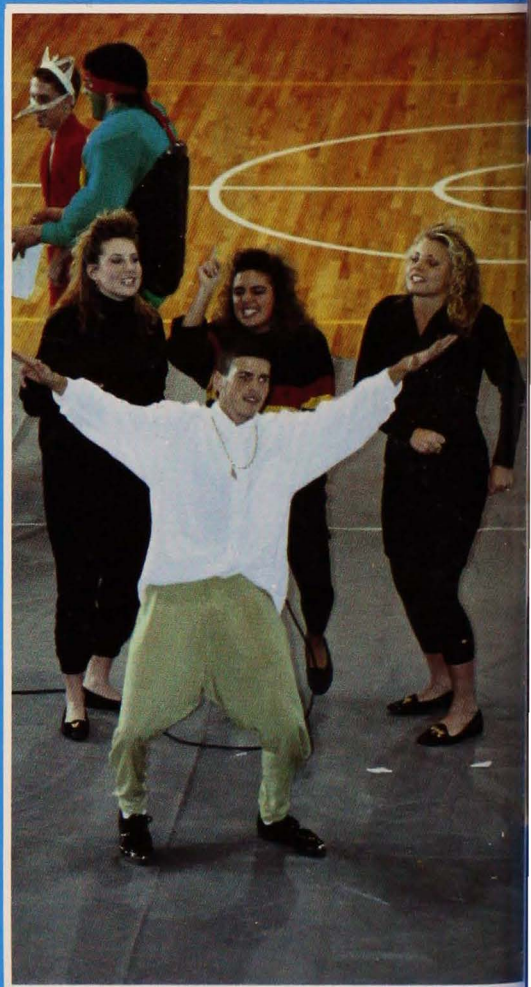
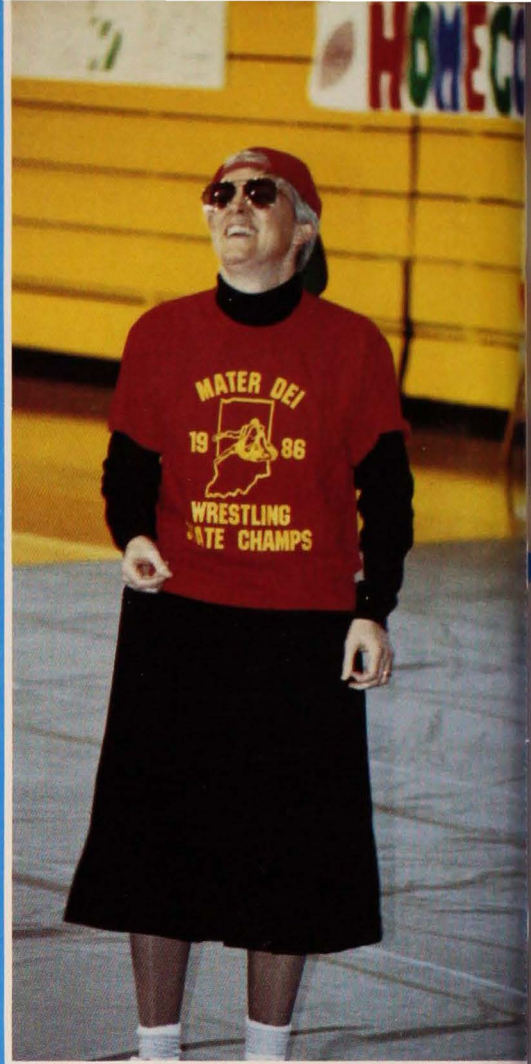

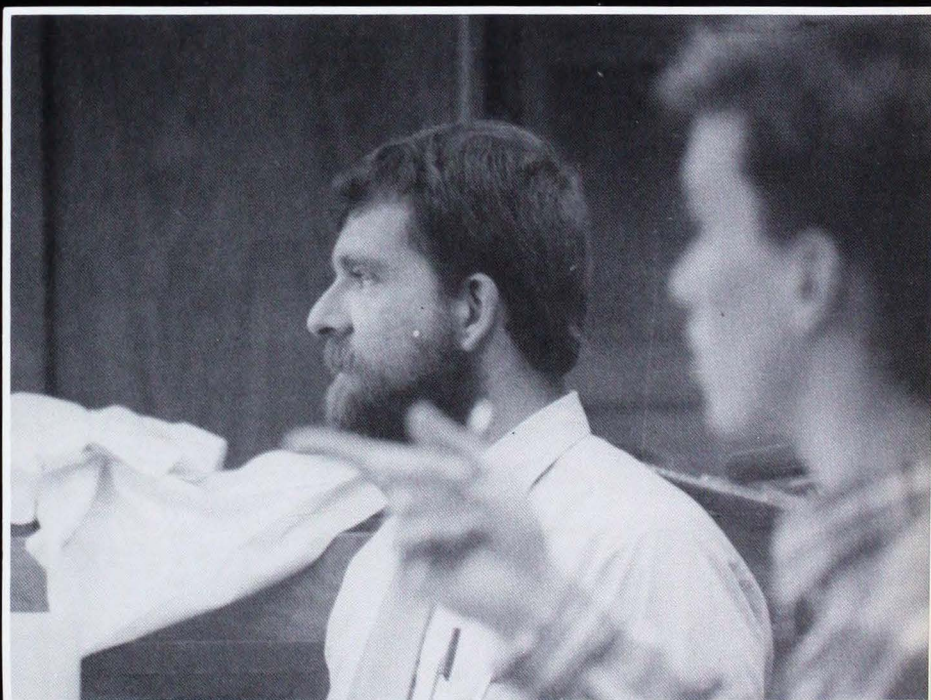

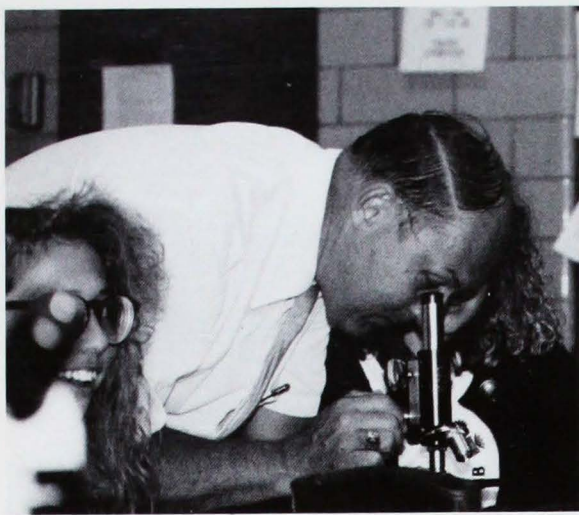

Courses at Mater Dei are geared to prepare the students for further education after high school. Eighty five percent of MD graduates attend college.

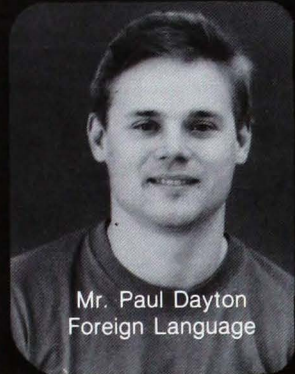
With an average SAT score of 925-950, most students are accepted at the school

of their choice.

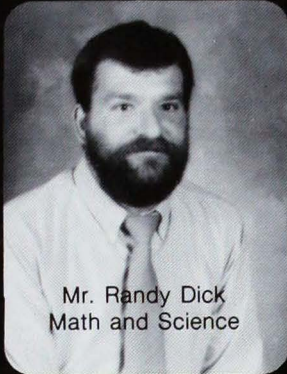

Besides the required Religion courses, seniors can also enroll in Life Ethics, where they will be able to discuss their Christian beliefs and strengthen their faith on a mature level.

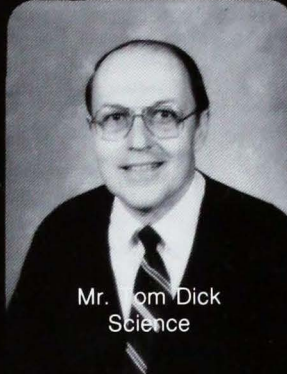

In every field of study, there are classes designed for students who do not plan to attend higher education, classes that show that Mater Dei is more than a place to learn; it is also a place to learn how to live.

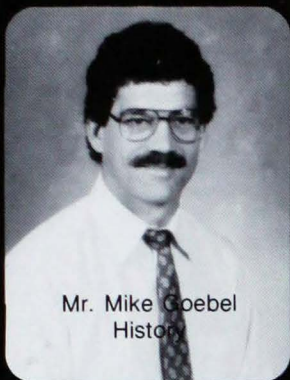
Mater Dei has many facilities to assist students in their studying. The library has a new FAX system which can help obtain

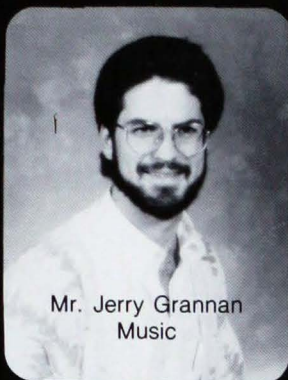
The shining success of MD graduates is proof of Mater Dei's superior academic standards. There is confidence of an even brighter future as the school roars toward the year 2000.



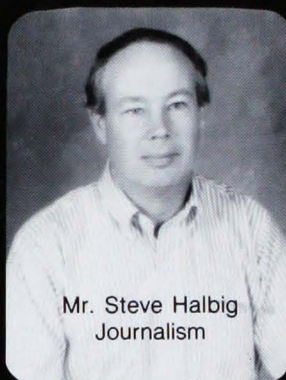

award.

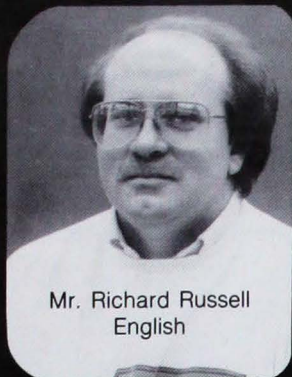
Up for that award were Ms. Mary Pattison, Mrs. Debbie Haton, Mrs. Pat Welsh and Mrs. Jayne Hobgood.

Mrs. Patry, who teaches Spanish, commented on why she enjoys teaching: "I just like teaching, every part of it. It's not a drag to come to work."

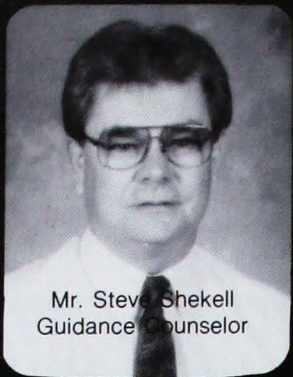
Students say Mrs. Patry cares about them as a student and as a person.

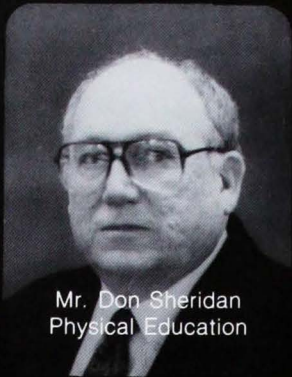
She added, "I really feel deeply about Mater Dei. It's a big part of my life."



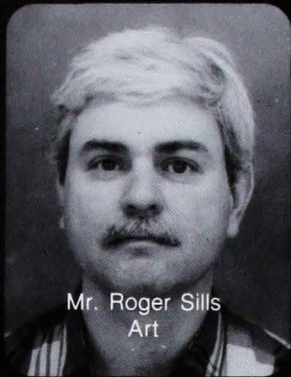

School 'adopts' families

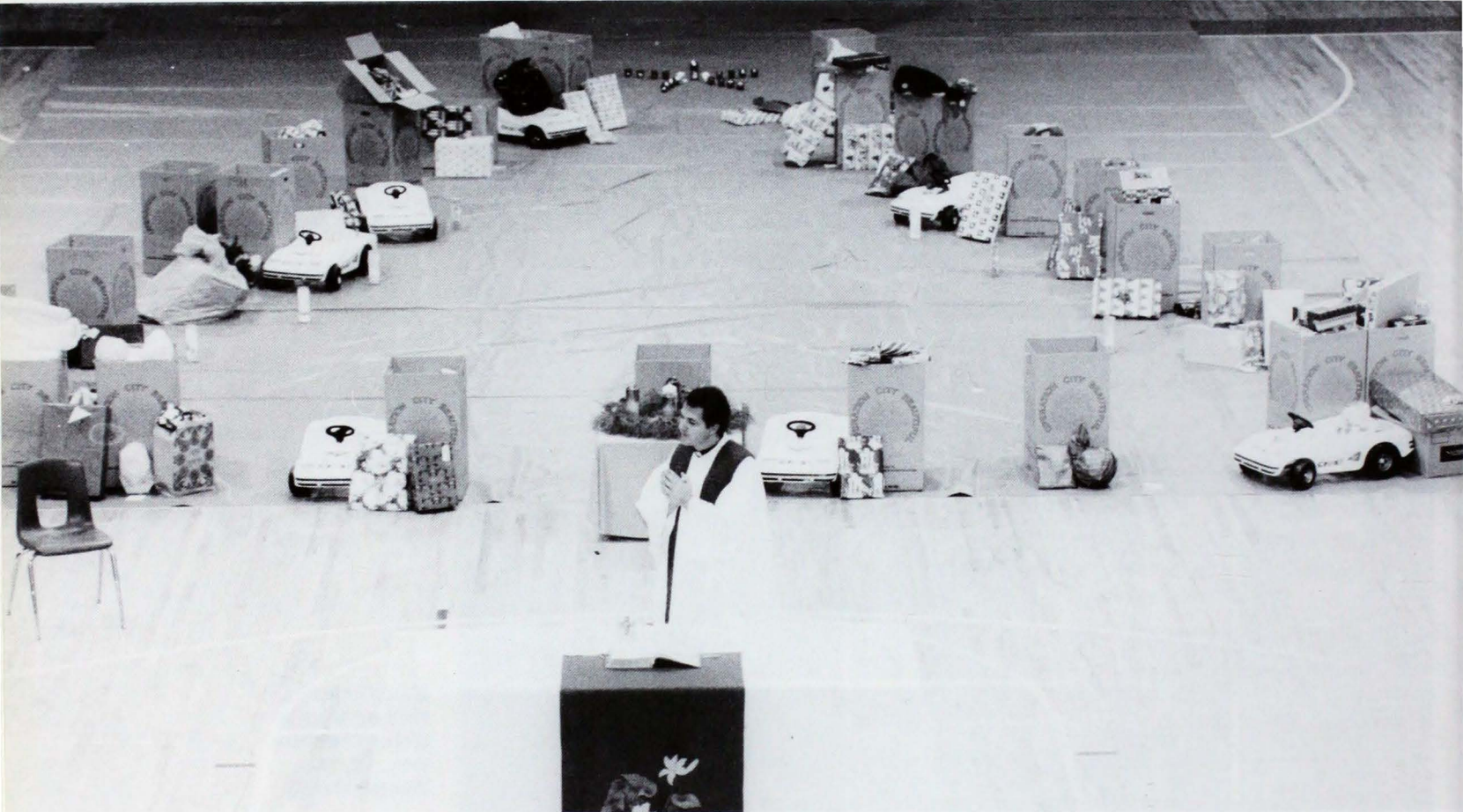

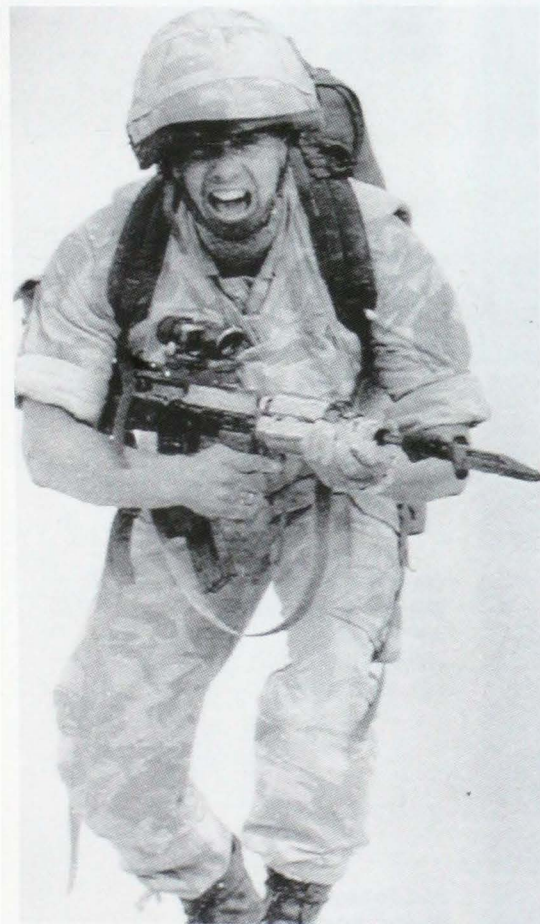
This time, we won.

First, the U.S.-led coalition softened up Iraq with countless bombing raids. Then the ground forces moved in for the kill.

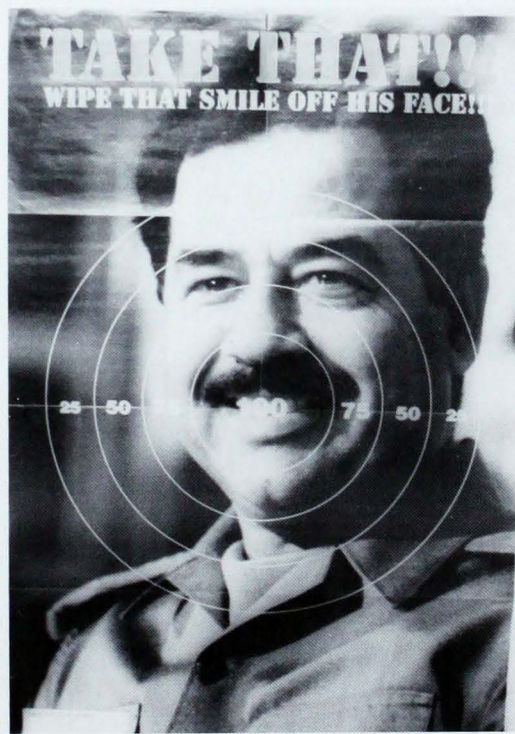
And 100 hours after the ground war started in earnest, the allies had Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's military in shreds.

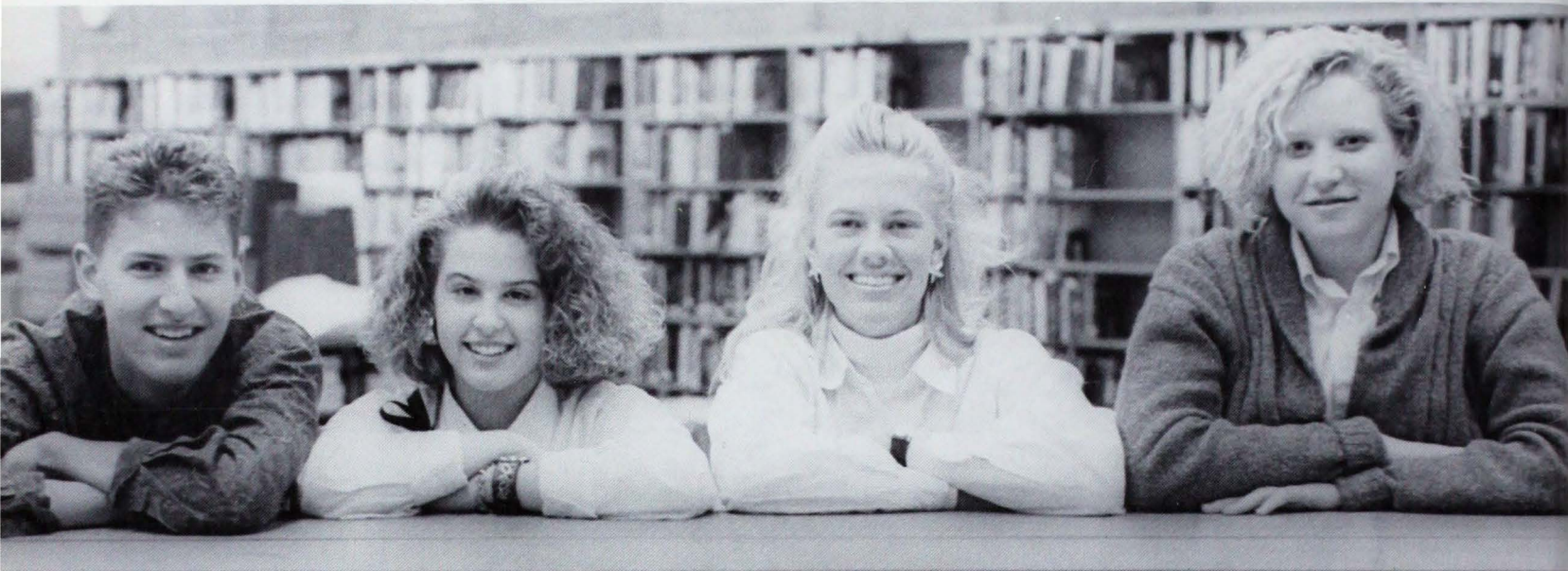

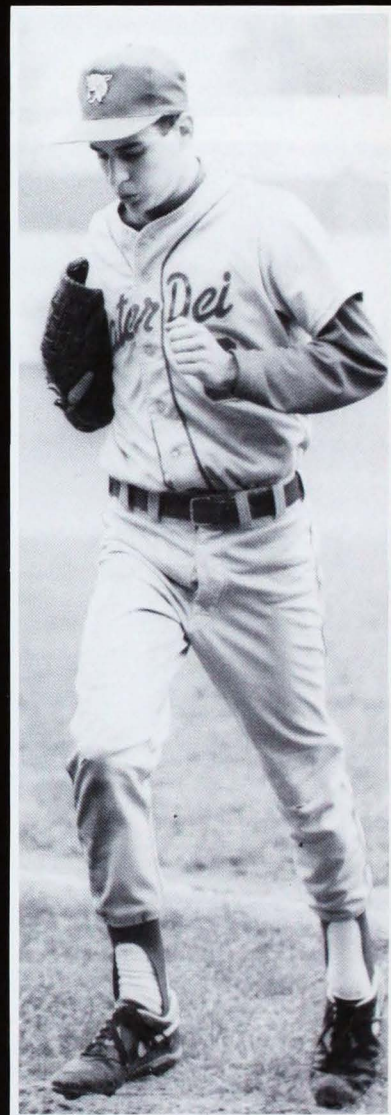

The boys' tennis team had an exciting year. It started the year off by placing fifth in the eight-team Washington Catholic tourney and then scored a 5-0 win over Boonville.

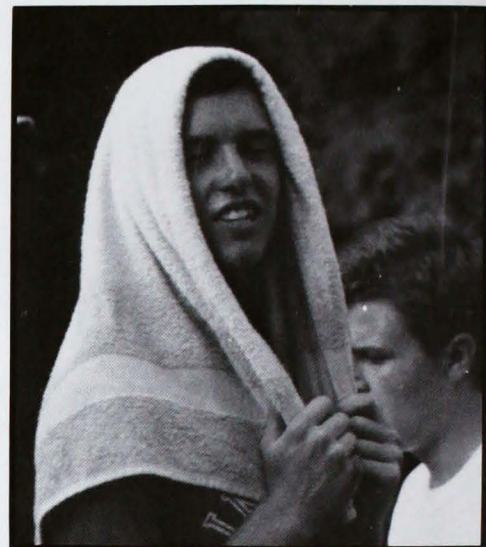

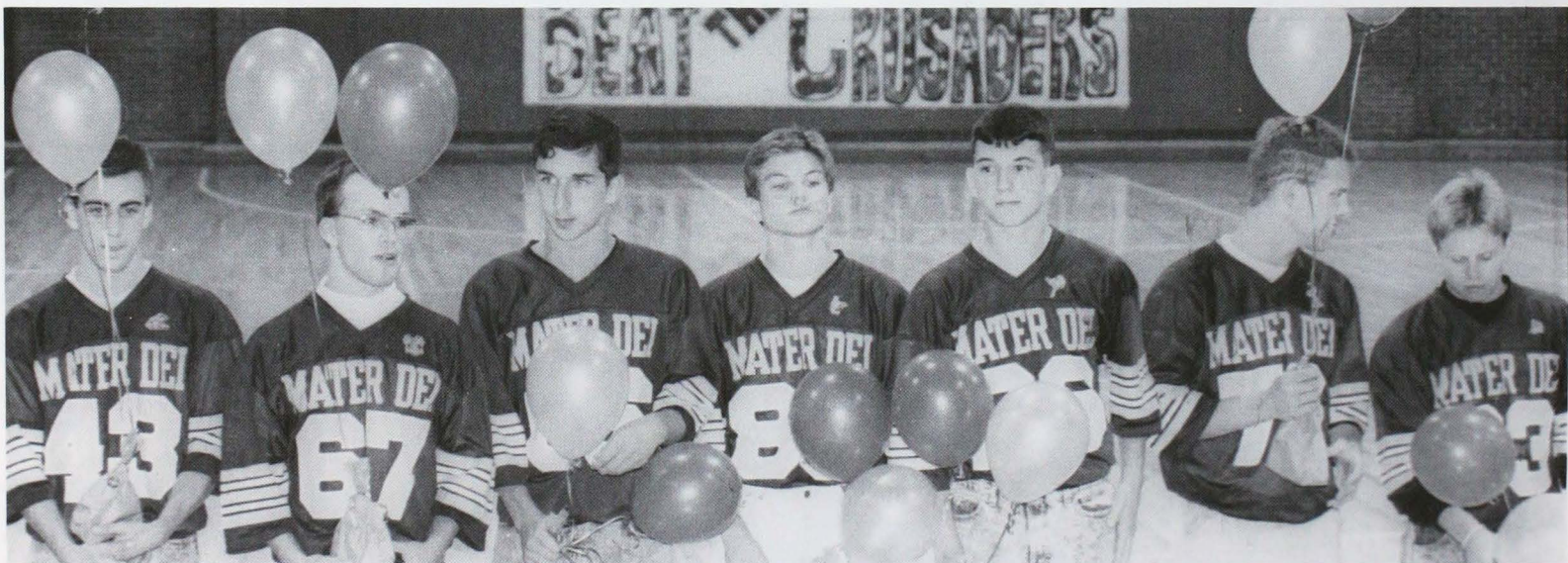
That would be the Wildcats last taste of victory though. The dream ended the next week at home in Reitz Bowl in front of a packed house.

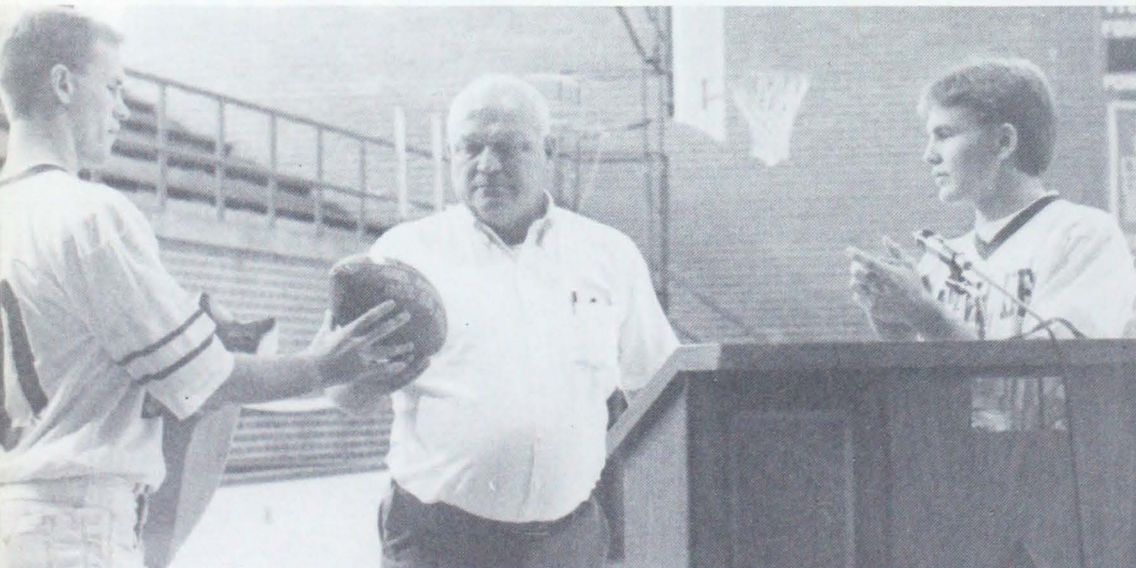

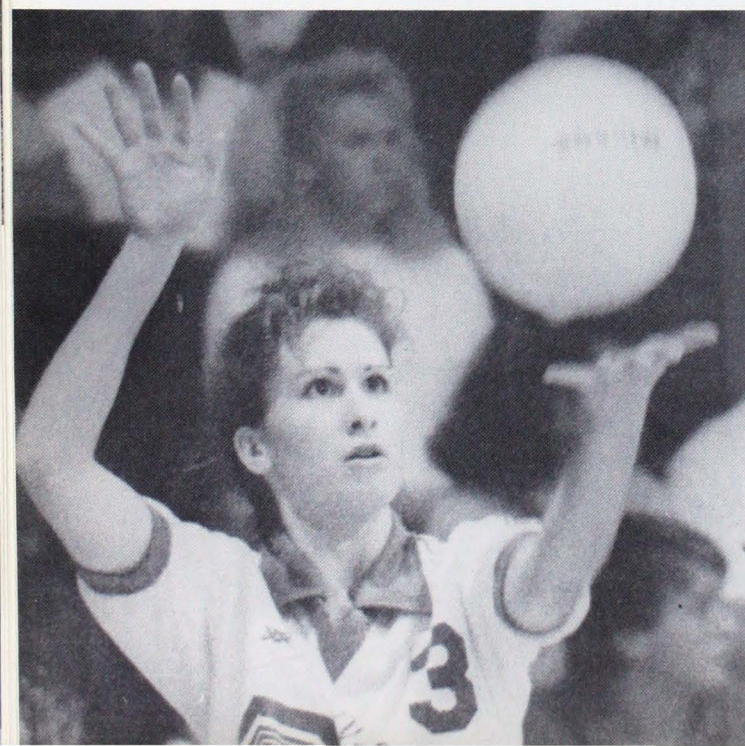

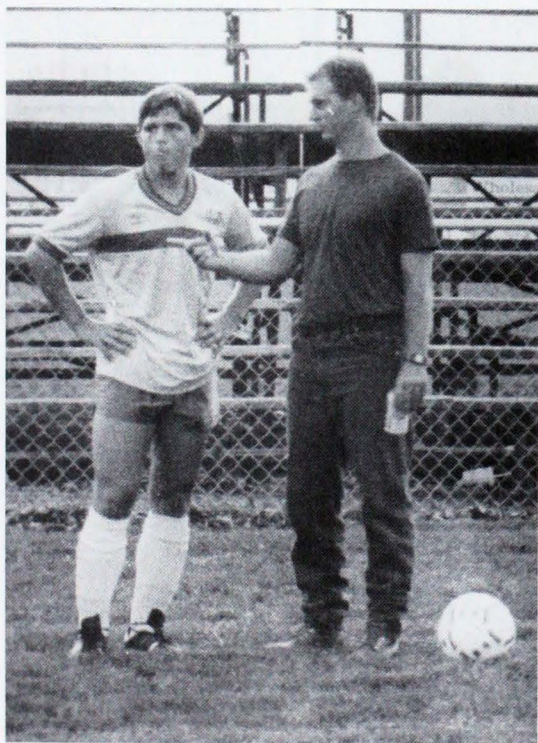

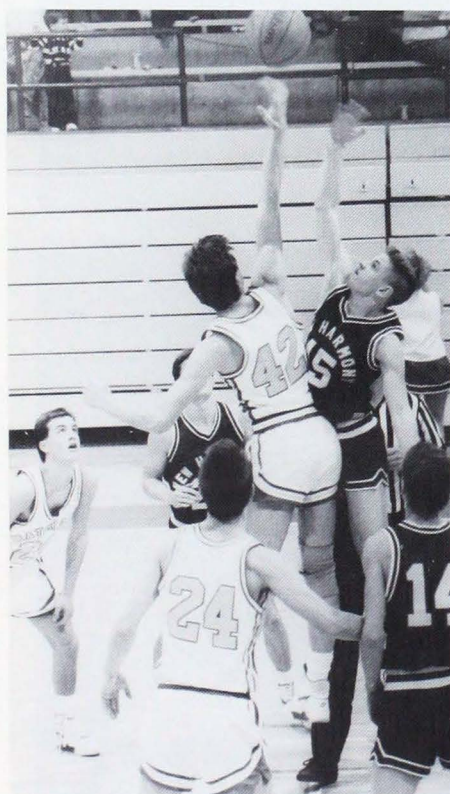
Wathen means new beginning

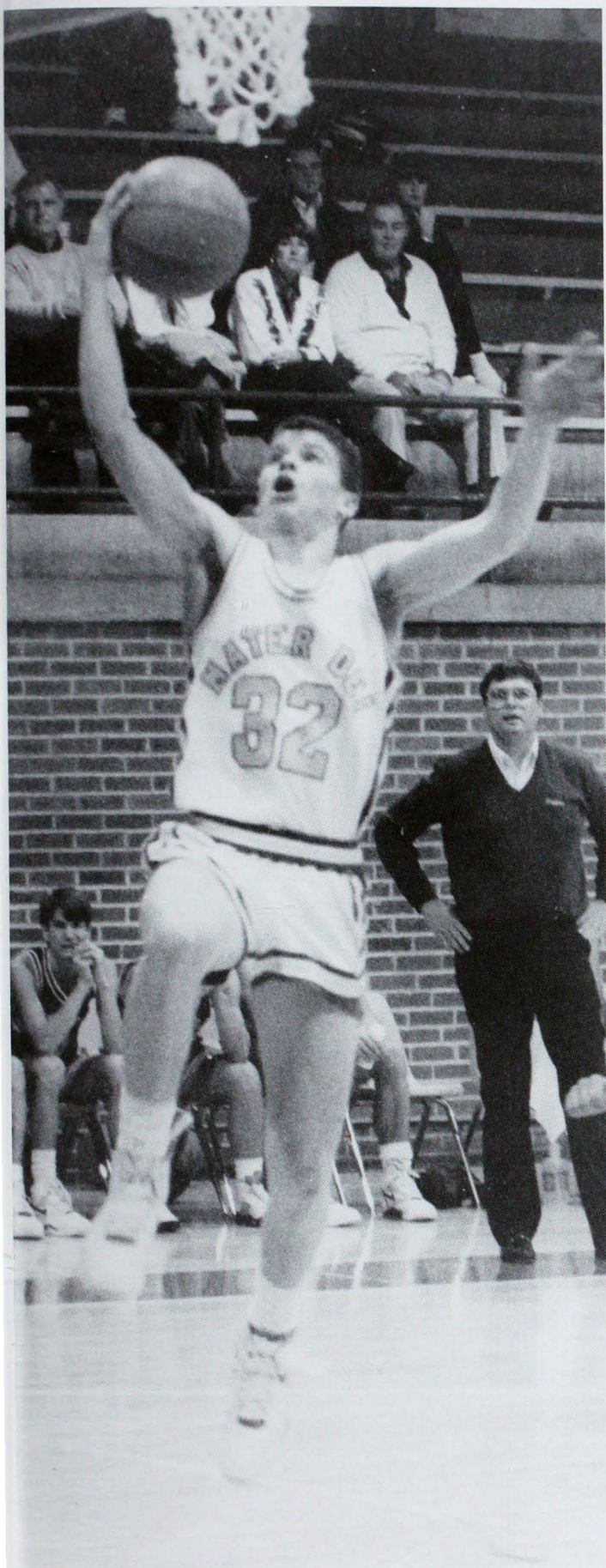

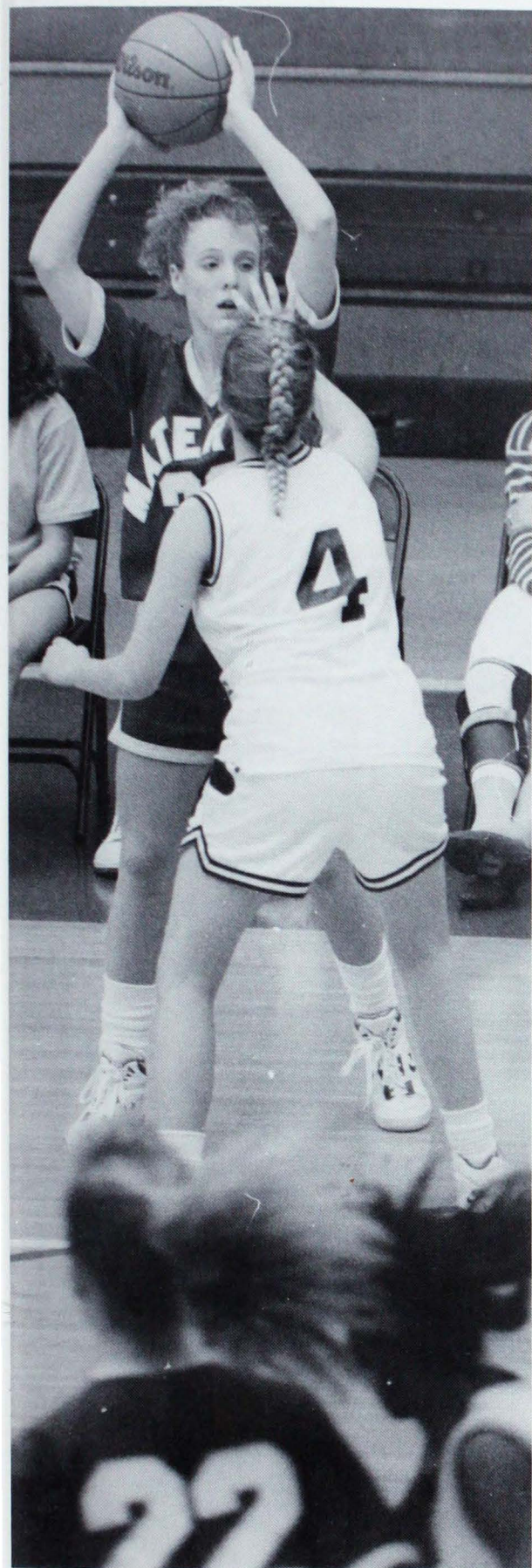

Matcats pin opposition

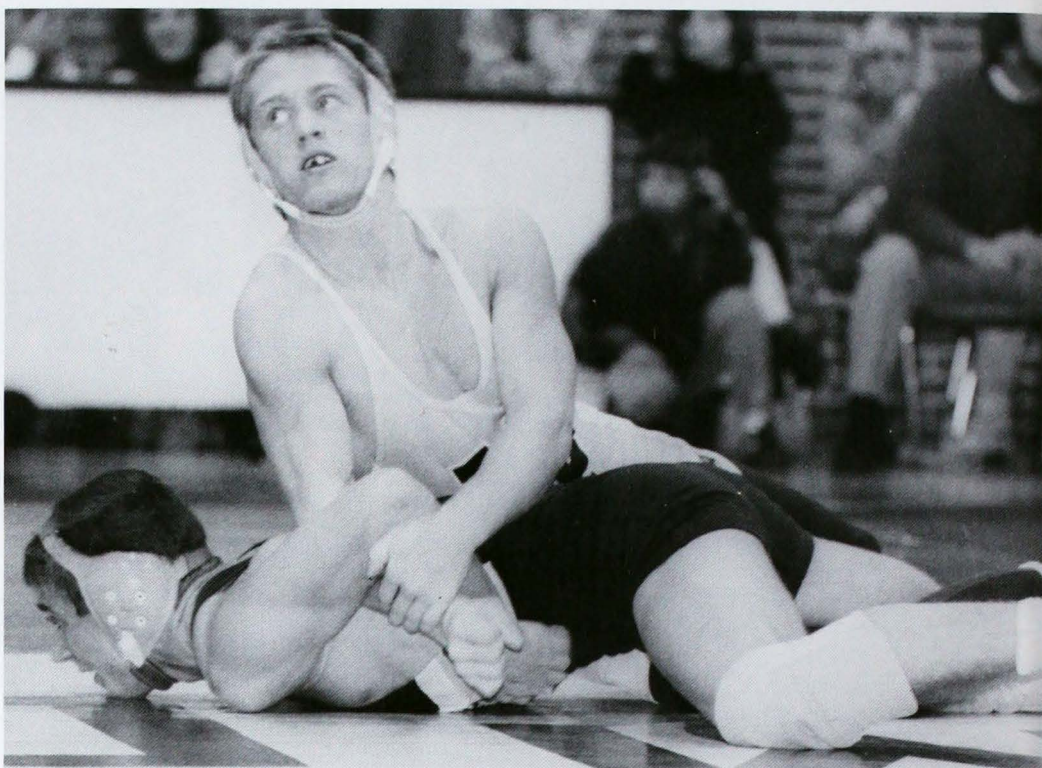
Once again the Matcats proved they are the perennial Southwestern Indiana power by posting a 14-1 varsity record.

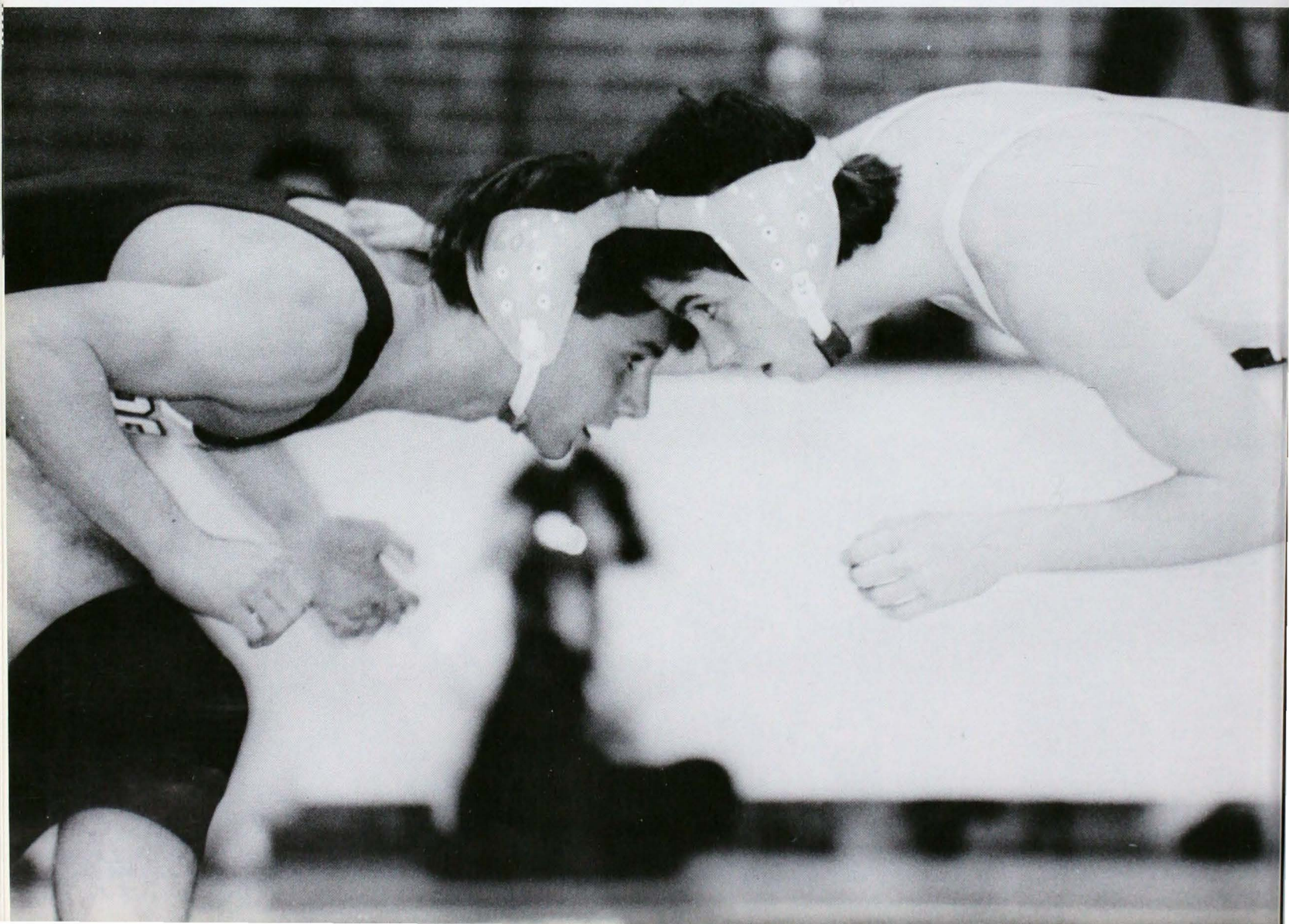
"Our seniors really grew up and showed some leadership. They wanted this year to really count," Mr. Goebel said.

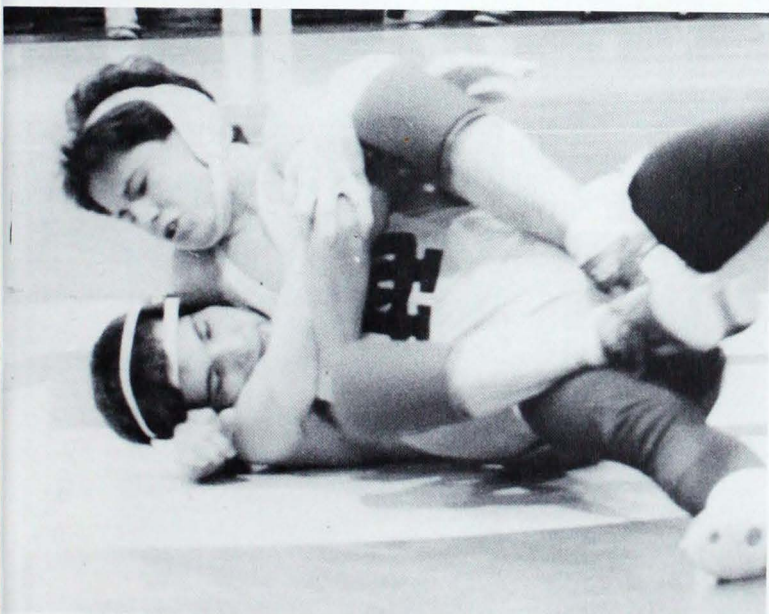
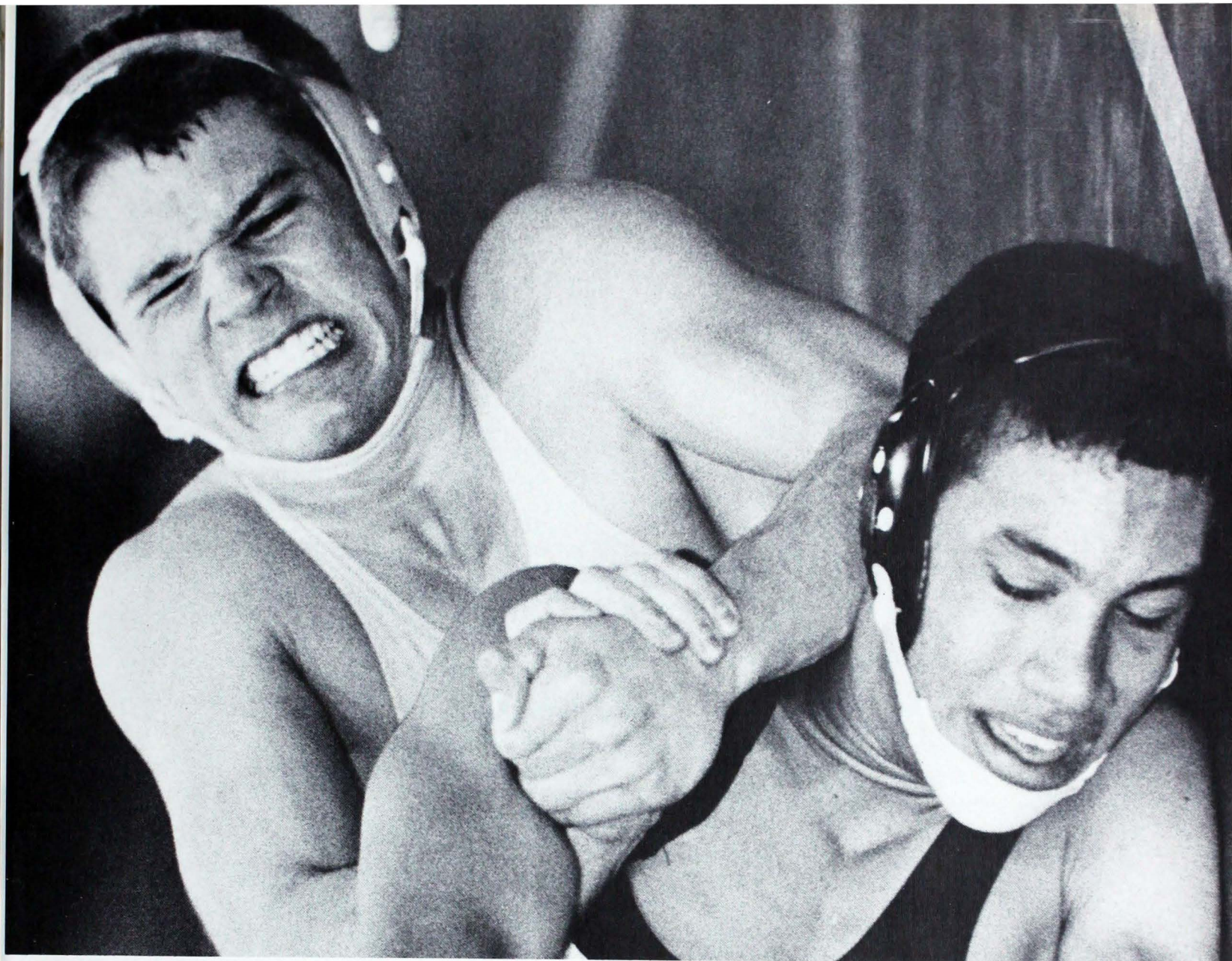

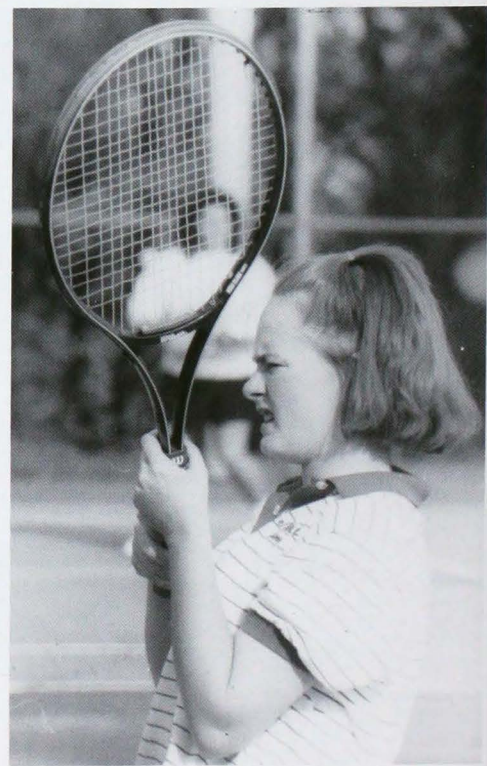
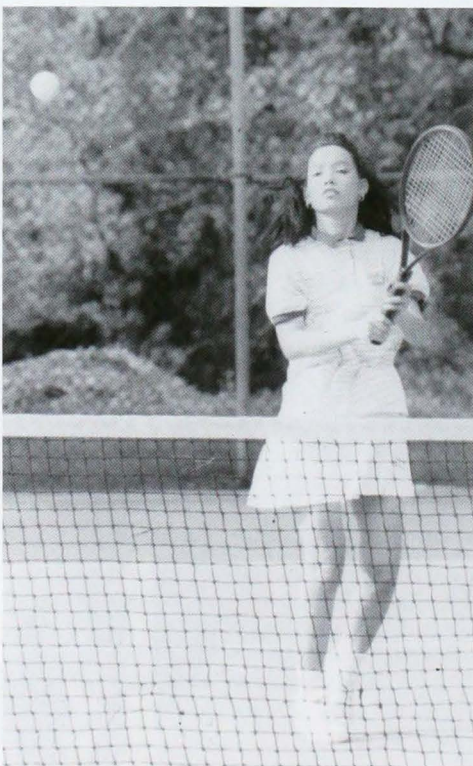
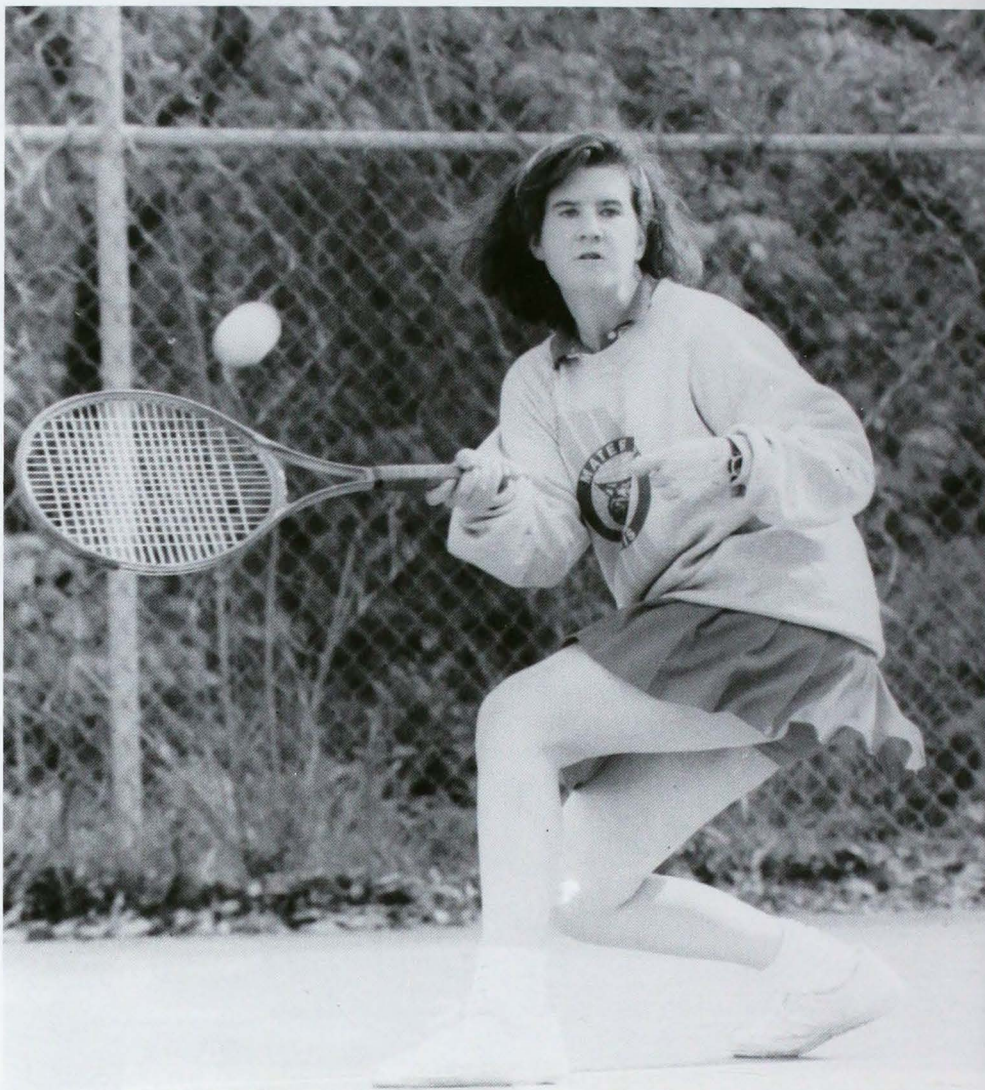
The team had an up-and-down season, with a few highlights being victories over North Posey and Boonville. Their final record was 4-8.

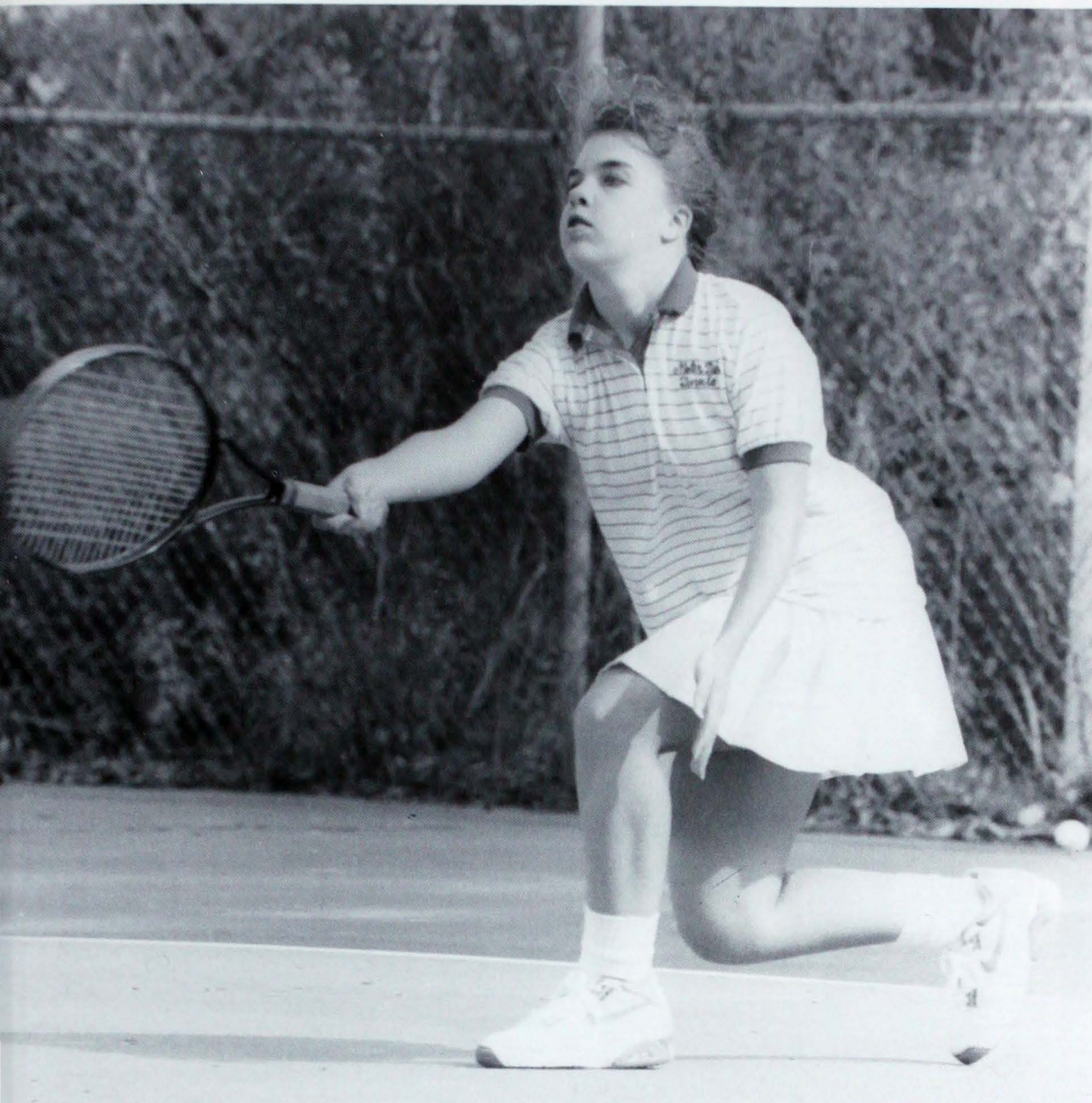

Young Cats share title in softball

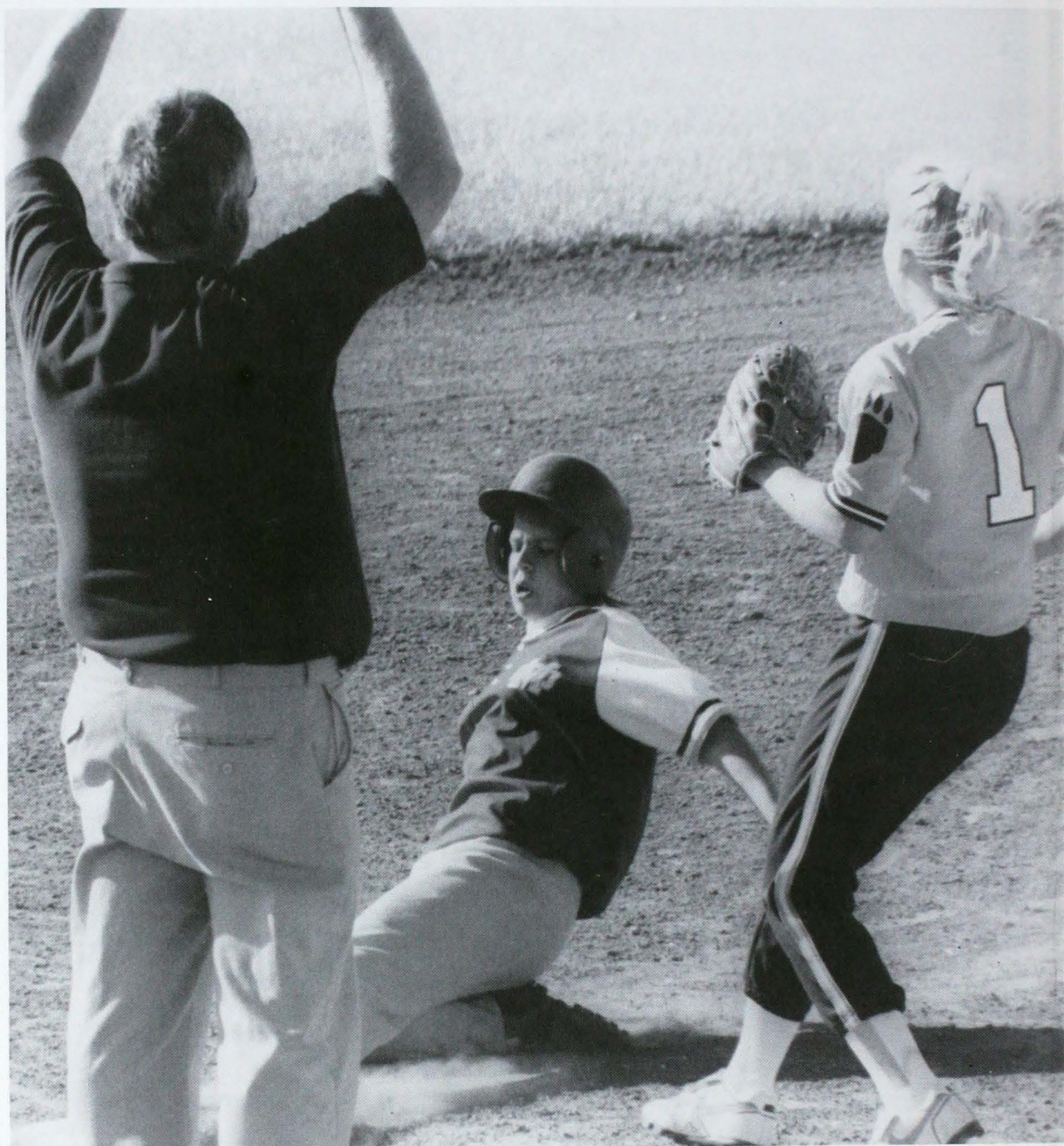
In the first year of girls fast-pitch softball in Evansville, Mater Dei's young Cats tied for the city championship.

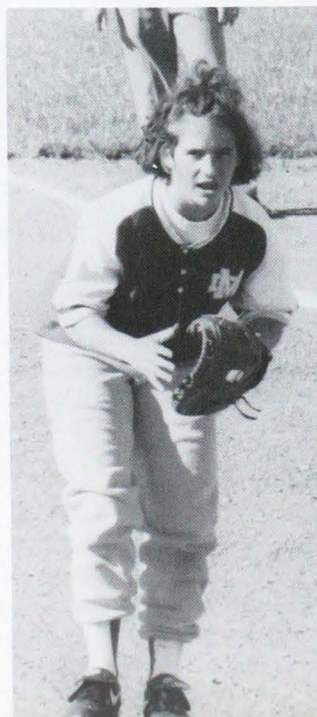

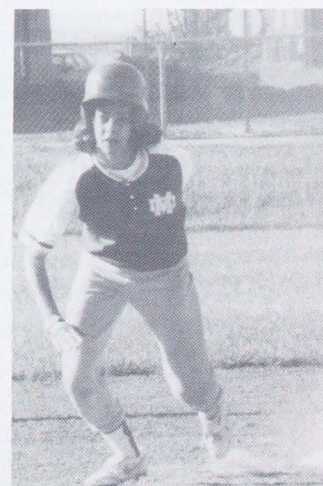
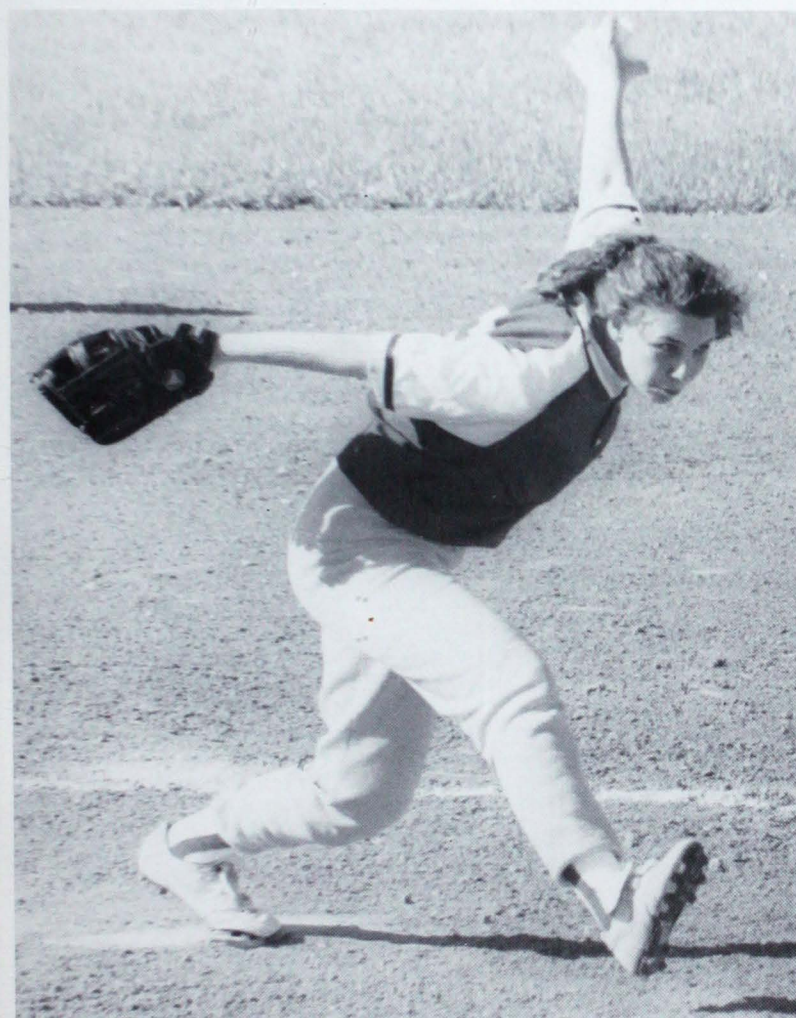

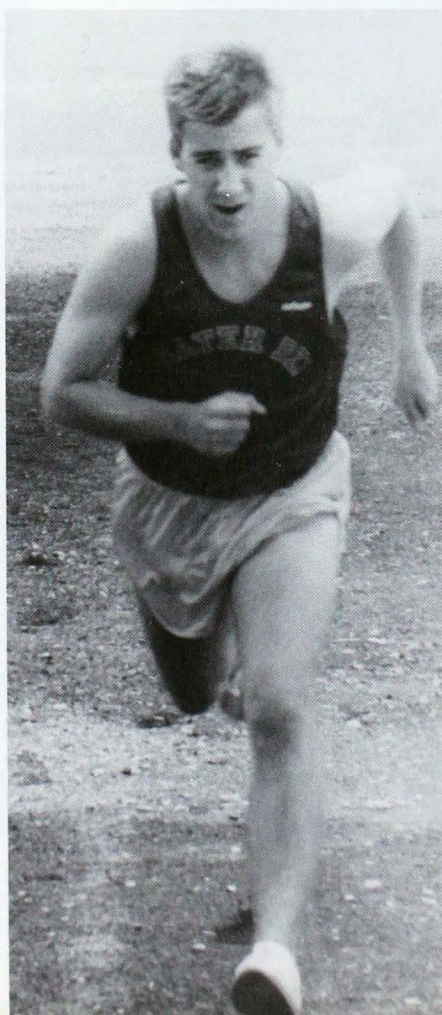
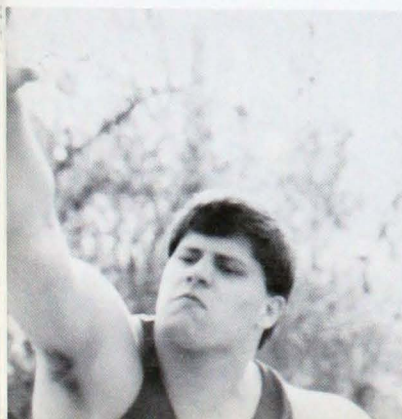
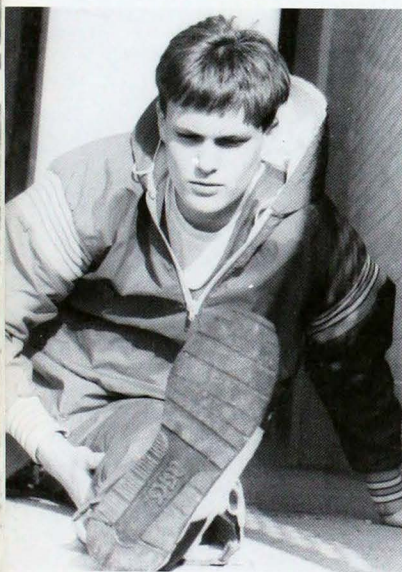
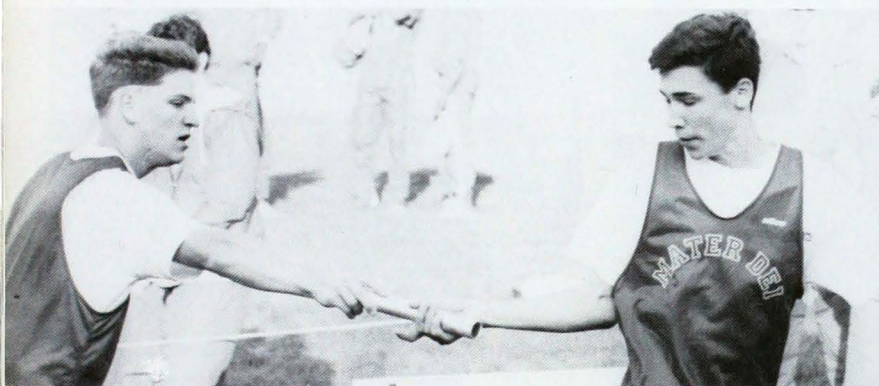
The outcome of the boys track season every year may not break record books for number of wins, but it might in number of hours of hard work and dedication to the sport.

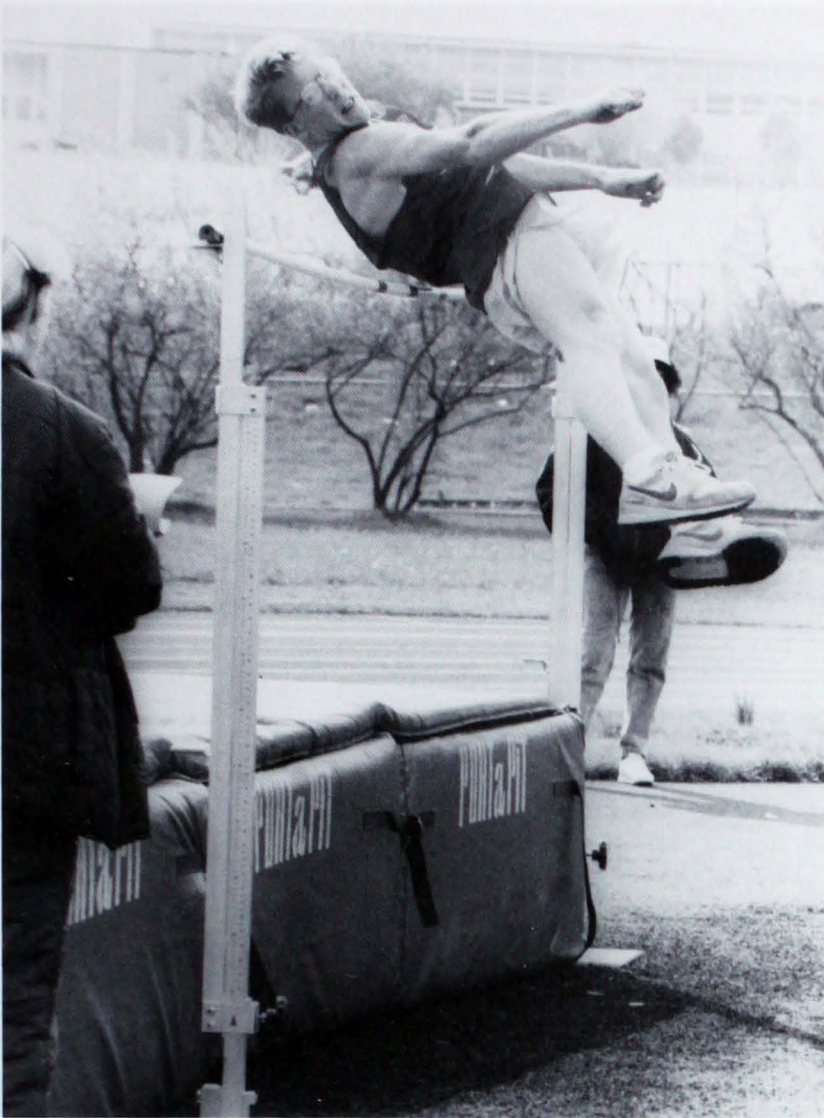

Marching Wildcats win many honors

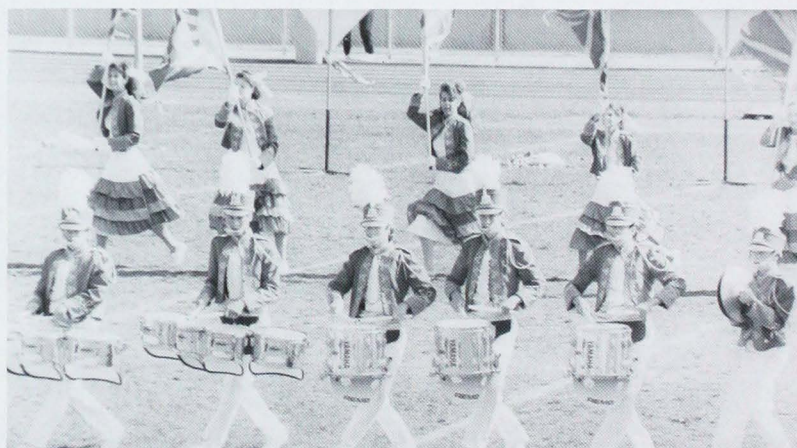

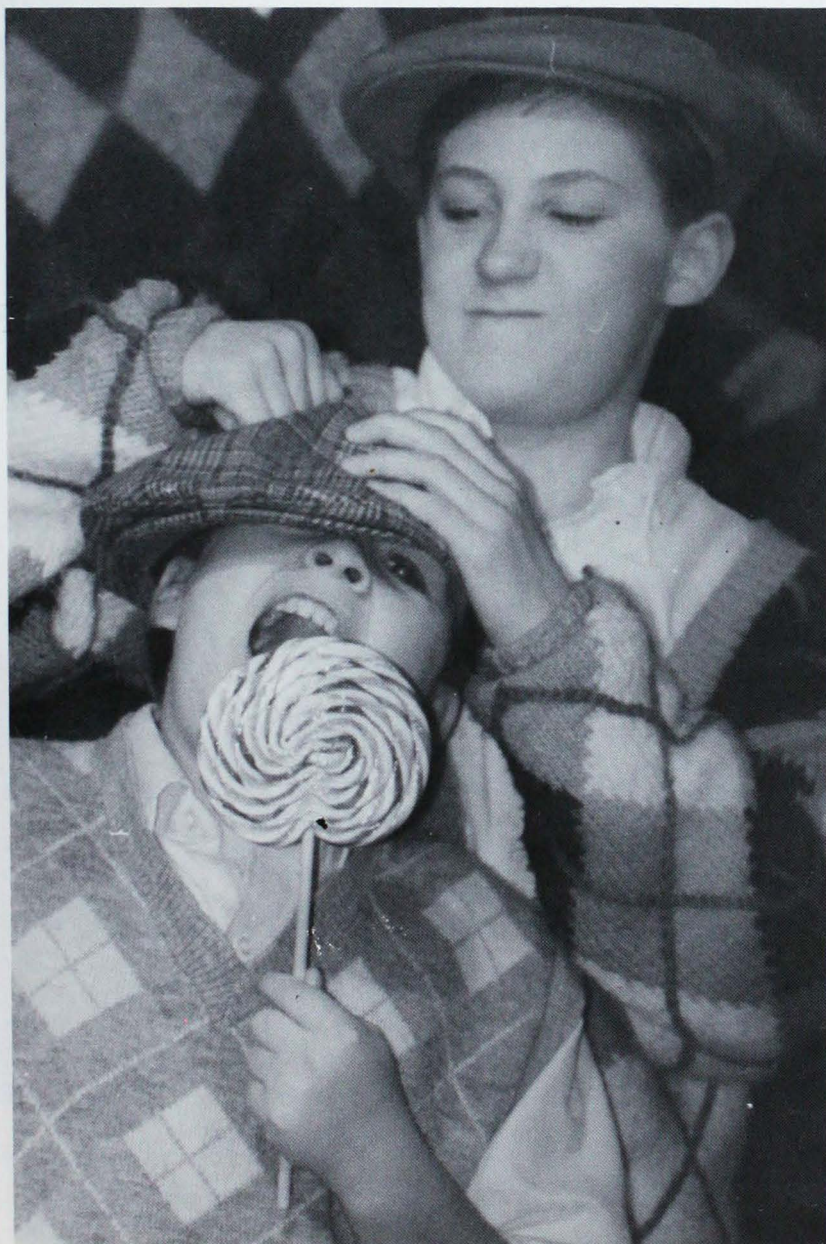
'Cheaper by the Dozen' huge success

So she did what any other daughter would do — rebel. But while doing so she realized how much what her father said was true. And how wise he really was. But she realized it too late.



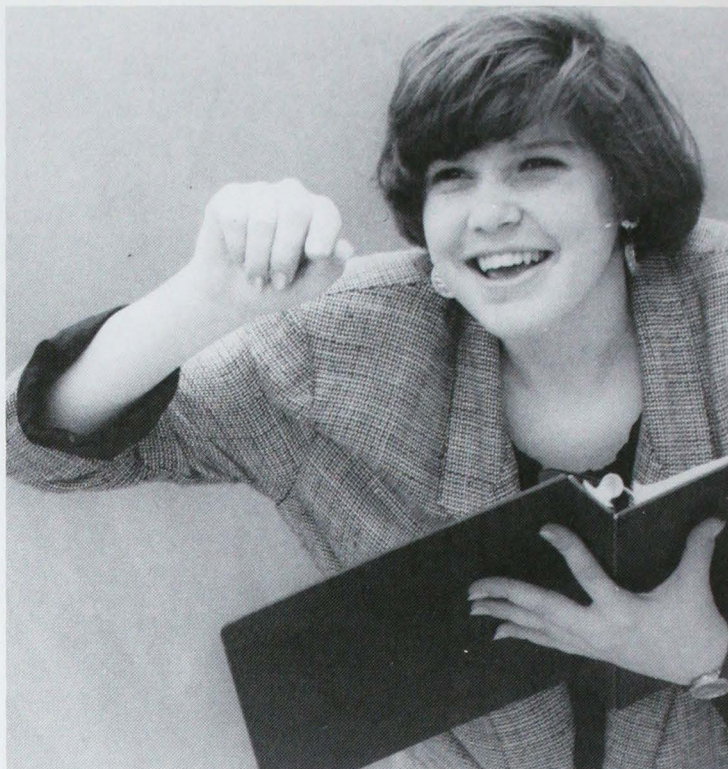

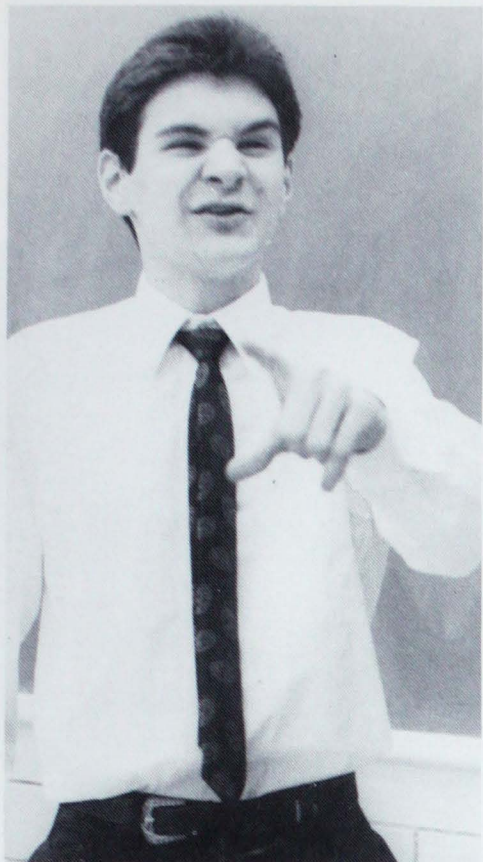

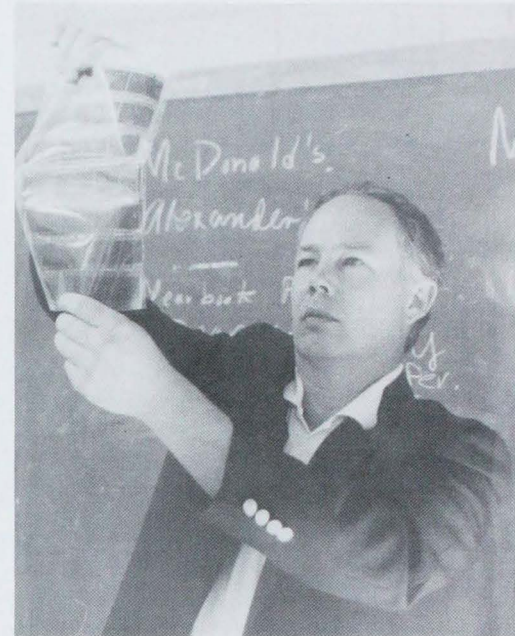

Yearbook editor Matt Wargel said, "The staff strove to make this the best book yet, and I think we accomplished our task!"

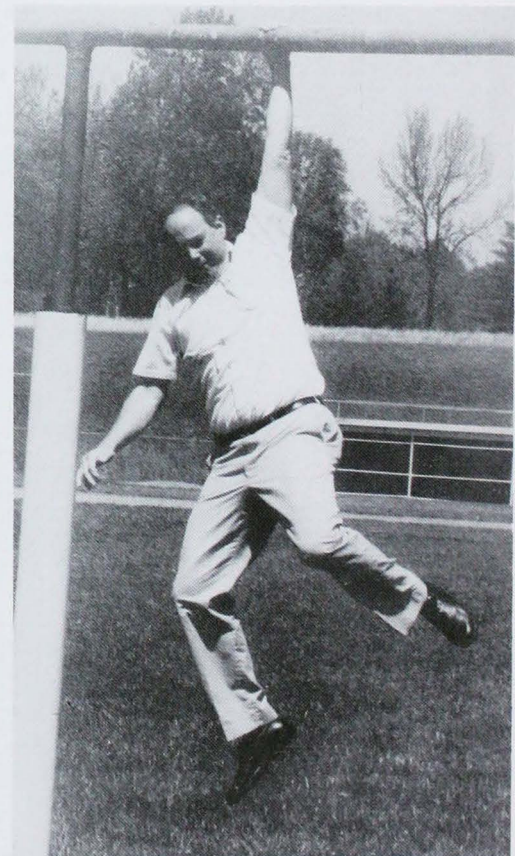

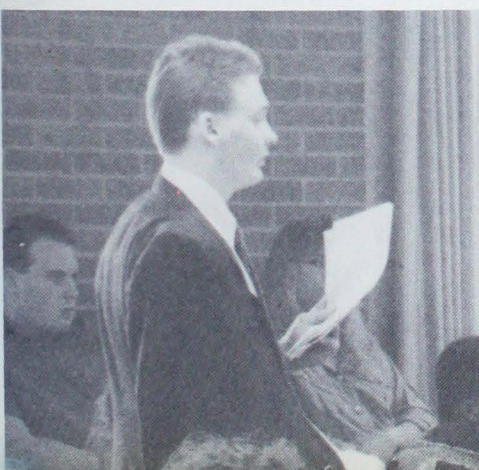
Law Day brings legal system up close

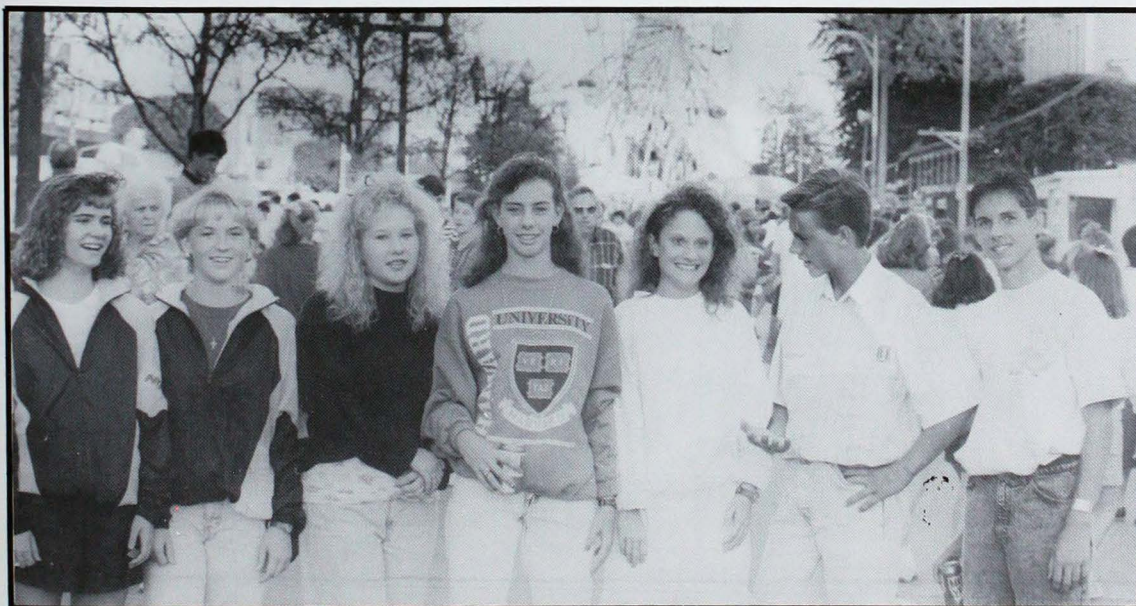

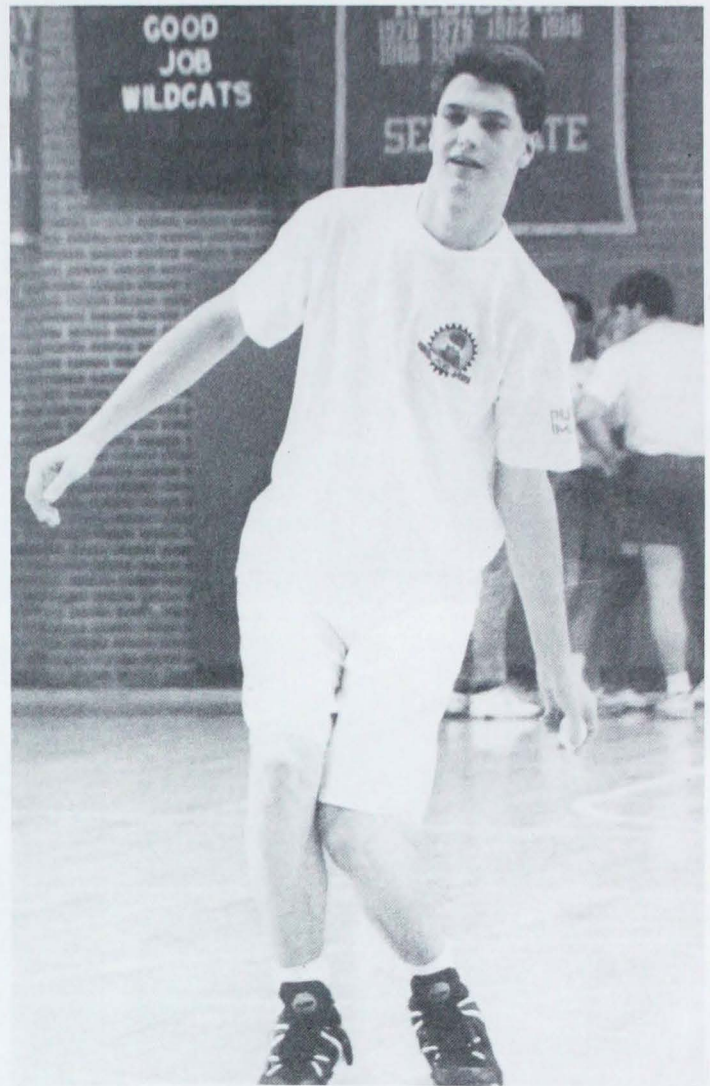

The most obvious, of course, is patronizing an advertiser's business. When that's impossible, the next best thing is, "Hey, Joe,

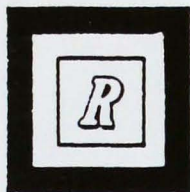
thanks for advertising in the Mater Dei yearbook."
