

hile some people play with remote control vehicles for fun, the robotics team builds their own completely from scratch, adding unique lifts or conveyor belts to carry their creation to victory.

This was the fourth year the robotics team participated in the VEX Robotics Competition at Ivy Tech. The team built two robots, "Brobot" and "The Hungry Hippo." Although this competition was the only one the team participated in this year, they left their mark by navigating both of their robots over rumble strips, which very few teams could accomplish.

Some regulations that had to be met were that the robots were only allowed to be made entirely of VEX parts. Another was that each robot could not have more than five motors. Robot courses contained rumble strips, but they were later removed from the competition in order to give other teams a fair chance at winning. The team was one of very few schools whose robots

could successfully navigate over the rumble strips.

It takes the team two weeks to a month to complete the first version of a robot. After the first version is complete, the team continues to improve upon their designs. The tools needed to build these robots include allen's wrenches, zip ties, and VEX parts. The VEX parts include the wheels, the motors, and all of the gears needed to build a robot. Junior Canyon Zeman said, "Making the robot is always fun, and watching ideas form into actual creations is awesome."

The team walked away from Ivy Tech with their heads held high. The memories of the robotics season will be something that they carry forever. "Open House was my favorite part of the season because we had a working robot and we got to show the incoming students what we do. It's cool to see people take interest in the things you take a lot of time to build," said sophomore Grant Weiss.











# BOYS of Fall


or Mater Dei, football is the sport that defines the fall season. With a record of 15-1, this year's players did not disappoint their fans, and left them with a season that will never be forgotten.



















his year, the supermileage team entered three cars in the annual Shell Eco-Marathon competition in Detroit: an urban concept gasoline car, an electric prototype car, and a gas prototype car. The team's hard work and dedication paid off when the urban concept car placed first in the competition at 484 miles per gallon. The electric prototype car also placed first at 449 miles per kilowatt-hours, and the gas prototype car placed third.


To build their vehicles, the team had to first start with the bodies of the cars. They built the bodies with foam then covered them with resin and sanded them down to fit the aerodynamics of the vehicles. After the mold was assembled, the frame, the seat, and the wheels were made and all of the electrical work was completed. The time it took to construct these vehicles varied. "Each car is different, so building an urban car will take longer than a gas or electric prototype," said sophomore Grace Cox.

This year, the Shell Eco-Marathon took place in Detroit, Michigan. The team was one of only eighteen high schools to compete in the event; however, thirty-six universities also competed. Every year, a new set of rules and regulations is produced to ensure the safety and fairness of all of the competing teams. One new regulation this year involved installing a method of fire prevention in case a car caught on fire during the competition. Teams also have to follow their own rules and regulations. Sophomore Ema Quinn said, "We try to use the lightest materials for our cars so they don't weigh a lot."











"I've learned how to organize events and how to work with students in all grades, as well as staff members," senior Megan Pritchett said.












