## Wildcat-Monarch gridders unite to end

This was to be our year for attaining glory. When twenty-three lettermen took the practice field in August, the prognosticators had the Cats tabbed as the top city contender.
The Monarch contribution helped the Wildcat cause considerably as twelve of the twenty-three lettermen were from Rex Mundi. Also affected was the coaching staff. Veteran head coach Joe Gossman was assisted by the former Rex Mundi head coach Frank Will.

Living up to early expectations, the gridders streaked to a 4-0 record defeating Princeton, Mt. Vernon, Terre Haute South and Memorial before falling to the claws of the underdog Bosse Bulldogs 7-6 on a field anything but dry.

The Cats went on to pound Castle 51-0.
The next two games were disastrous for the squad's chances at either City or SIAC titles. Losing to North in another one-pointer 15-14, and being beaten by Reitz at Homecoming 31-13, left the Cats with a 5-3 mark.

As the season closed, the team beat Harrison 28-6 and in the finale defeated the much improved Central team 13-6.

The gridders finished the year with a 7-3 record and received many post-season awards. Seniors Mark Lemond, Dave Gossman, Bob Koressel and John Williams were selected for various AllCity teams.

Kiwanis Award winner was Bob Ludwig.

Mater Dei once again held a tight grip in wrestling honors as the Matcats captured City, SIAC and Sectional titles. This was the squad's third straight year of attaining City and SIAC crowns. It was the fifteenth city crown, third SIAC win, and seventh Sectional title, but it was the first time that any school has achieved all three honors in a single season. It was also the third straight year the grapplers finished undefeated in dual competition.

In winning the Sectionals, five Matcats clinched first places, Seniors Randy Helfrich, Jim Dewig, and John Williams, junior Paul Hillenbrand, and sophomore Tom Mayer each won in his respective weight division.

SIAC competition saw the Cats finish with four champions. They were seniors, Jim Dewig and John Williams, junior Matt Muensterman, and freshman Jim Schenk.

The reserve wrestlers showed that the future outlook is good as they took the City crown while going unbeaten. The grapplers outstandingly defeated such teams as Memorial 59-7, and Mt. Vernon 69-2.
