


For most sophomores in high school, the biggest worries they may be presented with most likely involve

grades and drama. However, in 2007, one sophomore at Mater Dei was presented with a worry in his life that a person of any age would have trouble managing. That worry was osteosarcoma, a form of bone cancer.

Zach Tromley, a junior this year, discovered he had a tumor mass on his femur November 12, 2007. He was diagnosed with cancer the following day. "My first reaction to finding out that I had cancer was 'shock.' I remember overhearing my mort laking to the nurse from Tri-State Orthopedics on the phone and she was crying. I asked her 'what's wrong with me?' I couldn't believe it was something so serious," Tromley said.

on November 18, 2007, Tromley had an appointment with Dr. Bruce Rougraff, who he believes saved his leg. Within a week, he underwent scans, tests, a bone biopsy, and the placement of a central line for chemo. Tromley confessed, "Our four-day Thanksgiving weekend was overshadowed by fear and anticipation of what was to come over the next nine months. However, we decided as a family to face this challenge head-on







of the state of th

and do what we had to do to beat the cancer. Our relationship as a family immediately became stronger."

Tromley tried to be like any other boy his age, but having cancer makes one wonder about survival and the toll it takes on one's body, as well as the disappointment of not being with friends. However, Tromley's time was not spent without fun. 'Angie, the child-life specialist, would drag me down to the children's play room every day to do crafts with the younger kids. When I was too sick to get out of bed, she would bring me anything I wanted. When I wanted to play games or watch movies, she would bring me a TV, a DVD player, an X-Box, a Playstation 2, and even a Wii,' Tromley explained.

Any experience such as Tromley's would alter one's life in tremendous ways, and he is no exception. "have learned to accept certain things in life, and no matter how big a problem can be, you have to find a way to get through it and move on." Though cancer is never a blessing to have, Tromley and his family are undoubtedly feeling extremely blessed to have pulled through all the turmoil and hardships they were presented with.

"Cancer survivor" is a title only the strongest of the strong can claim, and Tromley has learned many important lessons throughout his struggle with the disease. "I've learned to live life to the fullest because you never know what life is going to throw at you."



The members of Mater Dei's academic teams, that's who. The academic teams at Mater Dei include the Spell Bowl as well as Super Bowl teams like science, social studies, mathematics. English, and fine arts.





With two of the girls advancing to Regionals and one qualifying for the State Competition, the girls' golf team definitely earned the recognition they received this year.





It's obvious that the boys fuel themselves on fun and lightheartedness. They set the standards by perfecting the pace













Diving into the crisp, clear water makes it all seem worthwhile for the Mater Dei boys' swim team.



Senior Heather Wargel, who played in the powder puff football game, said, "I did it because some of my friends were doing it, but I also like watching football and wanted to try it myself."


Whatever the reason for playing intramural sports, students benefit in many ways. It's terrific exercise and a great way to have fun outside of school.






