

"I ATTEND CTM TO DEEPEN MY RELIGIOUS FAITH AND SPIRITUALITY AND TO SHARE MY THOUGHTS ABOUT MY FAITH WITH OTHERS MY AGE," SAID SENIOR TEGAN RUSH.

CTM WAS FOUNDED ABOUT SIX YEARS AGO BY ELAINE ELPERS AND CURRENTLY MEETS ONCE EVERY MONTH. HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS FROM ACROSS THE DIOCESE ATTEND.

A TWO-WEEK PROGRAM HELD AT DEACONESS HOSPITAL THAT GIVES HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS A FIRST-HAND LOOK AT THE FIELD OF MEDICINE.

"UNLIKE MOST JOBS, IT'S HARD TO JOB SHADOW SOMEONE IN THE MEDICAL FIELD BE-CAUSE OF ALL THE RESTRICTIONS HEALTH PRO-FESSIONALS HAVE TO FOLLOW," SAID WALKER. "HOWEVER, HSI ALLOWED ME TO DO THAT." BEFORE ATTENDING HSI, FUNKE, SCHELLER, AND WALKER ALL HAD A RELATIVELY SPECIFIC CAREER IN MIND. AFTER TWO WEEKS, ONLY ONE IN THREE HAD A CHANGE OF HEART.

"BEFORE I WENT TO HSI, I WANTED TO BE A PEDIATRIC NURSE PRACTITIONER." SCHELL ER SAID. "BUT AFTER VISITING THE PEDIATRIC UNIT, I DECIDED THAT I DIDN'T WANT TO BE IN A PROFESSION THAT DEALT SOLELY WITH SICK KIDS. I CHANGED MY CAREER PATH TO BECOME AN EMERGENCY ROOM NURSE."

JOBS IN THE MEDICAL FIELD ARE NOT FOR THOSE WITH WEAK STOMACHS. DURING THE TWO-WEEK ROTATIONS, FUNKE, SCHELLER, AND WALKER SAW THINGS SUCH AS LIVE BIRTHS, HEART SURGERIES, COLONOSCODIES, SPINAL SURGERIES, AND CADAVERS.

"I SAW IT ALL, CADAVERS, BLOOD, SUI-

CIDAL PEOPLE, AND STROKE VICTIMS. THE BEST PART OF HSI, THOUGH, WAS DEFINITELY THE SIX-HOUR OPEN HEART SURGERY," WALKER SAID.

AFTER TWO WEEKS, THE STUDENTS DISCOVERED MANY THINGS ABOUT MEDICINE AND EVEN THEMSELVES THAT THEY WOULDN'T OTHER-WISE HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO.

"I DISCOVERED THAT I REALLY LIKED TALKING ONE-ON-ONE WITH THE PATIENTS ABOUT THEIR LIVES AND INTERESTS," SAID FUNKE. "IT MADE ME FEEL LIKE I WAS MAKING THEIR HOSPI-TAL STAY MORE ENJOYABLE AND TOLERABLE."

ALTHOUGH THE HEALTH SCIENCE IN-STITUTE STOLE TWO WEEKS OF FUNKE, SCHELL-ER, AND WALKER'S SUMMER VACATIONS, ALL THREE DISCOVERED VALUABLE LESSONS THAT WILL BENEFIT THEM IN THE FUTURE.





DUE TO THE PHYSICS PROJECTS, MRS. SCHORT IS A BUSY TEACHER. MOST STUDENTS NEED A LITTLE EX-TRA HELP WITH THE PROJECTS. THESE STUDENTS TEND TO RECEIVE THE HELP THEY NEED DURING WILDCAT BLOCK. MRS. SCHORT'S HOMEROOM STUDENTS TAKE NOTCE OF THEIR HOMEROOM SLOWLY FILLING WITH PHYSICS STU-DENTS NEEDING HELP OR EXTRA TIME TO COMPLETE THEIR PROJECTS.









GAVE ADAM AND ME OUR ONLY TWO WINS," SAID -LANNERT. "THESE WERE MY HIGHLIGHTS."







BEFORE EVERY FOOTBALL SEASON, RUMORS FLY ABOUT HOW THE PRESENT YEAR'S TEAM WILL COMPETE COMPARED TO THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S TEAM. FOR THE 2005-2006 FOOTBALL TEAM, THERE WAS A LOT TO LIVE UPTO. WITH THE LOSS OF MANY SENIORS, THE WILDCATS KNEW THEY HAD TO PROVE THEMSELVES.

"GOING INTO THE SEASON, WE WERE AN INEXPERIENCED TEAM," SAID SENIOR QUARTERBACK BRANDON DEIG. "BUT WE REALLY CAME TOGETHER DURING TWO-A-DAYS AND STARTED WORKING AS A TEAM."

TO THE SENIOR PLAYERS, CERTAIN GAMES STUCK OUT AS HIGH AND LOW POINTS OF THE SEASON. THE FIRST WAS THE SEASON OPENER AGAINST OWENSBORO. THE WILDCATS FELL 12-18, BUT THE LOSS ONLY MOTIVATED THE TEAM TO WORK HARDER.

"AFTER OUR FIRST LOSS, EVERYONE WORKED REALLY HARD TO BEAT CENTRAL IN OUR NEXT GAME," SAID SENIOR RECEIVER ANDY TEKOPPEL. "WE ALL WANTED A GOOD SEASON, SO WE PULLED IT TOGETHER."

MANY AGREE THAT THE CENTRAL GAME WAS THE HIGHLIGHT OF THE SEASON, WITH THE WILDCATS WINNING 20-6.



"THE CENTRAL GAME WAS AN ALL-AROUND GOOD MORAL VICTORY," SAID SENIOR LINEWAN JASON WIRE, WHO WAS VOTED THE MOST IMPROVED OFFENSIVE PLAYER, "PEOPLE HAD THEIR DOUBTS ABOUT US, BUT WE CAME TOGETHER TO PROVE OURSELVES."

AS THE SEASON PROGRESSED, IT BECAME EVIDENT THAT THE WILDCATS WERE GOING TO BE A FORCE ON BOTH SIDES OF THE BALL. THE OFFENSE, LED BY DEIG AND SENIOR RUNNINGBACK NATHAN MILLER, WAS WELL KNOWN FOR ITS SUCCESSFUL PASSING, HAVING COMPLETED 1,847 YARDS THROUGHOUT THE SEASON. DESPITE THE HARD WORK PUT FORTH BY THE OFFENSE AND DEFENSE, THE WILDCATS FELL TO THE HERITAGE HILLS PATRIOTS AT THE SECTIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP.


























