
Extra curricular events provide outlet for teens

Two of Mater Dei's biggest athletic conquests came in football and wrestling when the Cats knocked off defending city champions.

In football, Mater Dei clawed its way to a 12-6 victory over Memorial, while the grapplers soundly trounced Reitz to retain its hold on the city wrestling crown.

Jim Schroeder, who capped a brilliant career by earning a football scholarship to Ball State University, proved instrumental in both wins.

Another big victory came in basketball when the cagers edged southern power South Spencer on the Rebels home court.







Tina Alcorn for May Day crowning




May Day took on a little different look. Instead of the traditional May crowning outside followed by an indoor mass, all ceremonies were held in the gym.


















A new concept in student teaching was brought about in various literature classes this year. This was the forming of student committees to teach English novels.





Languages emphasize new teaching concepts









A new first in journalism this year was the students printing the paper on their own press, given to the school by Clarence Altstadt.


During the early part of the year, the paper was printed by the letterpress method, but was later switched over to offset. By the end of the year, the students

Hi-Lighting the Science Department was the construction of an 8-inch High Powered Telescope by the Earth Science Students.


The telescope has a two-fold purpose: to show the students different telescopes and to acquaint them with the methods of astronomy.


Lab sessions often proved the most interesting facet for students, especially in Advanced Biology class where students engaged in dissecting a shark and a fetus pig.














For the first time in the school's history, a retreat was not held here, but emphasis was put on the parishes' role in the life of the student. Several retreats were held

Schroeder heads All-City honor

Coach Gossman's second varsity football team attained another winning season with a 5-4-1 record.

Senior Jim Schroeder led the rushers with 1,075 yards, caught 24 passes for 271 yards, to lead the receivers and was the city's third leading scorer with 70 points. Classmate Tom Spahn was second in rushing with 621 yards, and was ninth in the city with 56 points.

Schroeder made both All-City teams, was All-SIAC, and received honorable mention in the state lineup. Junior Gerard Boots was All-SIAC, and second string state at defensive guard.


Four Wildcats were singled out for their outstanding showmanship during the season. Senior Tom Goebel was cited as the team's most improved player, while classmate Gene Scott received the award for most tackles. Schroeder and Boots received the best back and best lineman awards, respectively.

The 'Cats did some evening up this year, trouncing North, a team which beat them 15-14 the year before, 27-7. Along with keeping the homecoming streak perfect with three wins, this game was the third time Mater Dei has defeated North in 13 years. They also defeated a powerful Memorial team, ranked third in the city, 12-6 in a hard-nosed game which proved that the Wildcats could play with anybody.

Two of the Cats' losses were to state-ranked Rex Mundi, who won the City and SIAC titles with a 10-0 record, the best team they had in years, and to Harrison, who finished second behind Rex Mundi in city competition.



The freshman finished their season with 1-6 record.










Reserves finish third in city

The freshman team, under coach Ken Reising, ended 1-6, but gave up more than two touchdowns in only one game.
















The Wildcats cagers lost to Reitz, 55-54, the first game of the sectionals, which will be remembered as the "game of the un-called foul."




first SIAC title, 13th city crown









tion as Judge.








Tina Alcorn and Juli Helfrich were also in the senior court while the crowning was done by comptroller Ed Johnstone.


