
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Seniors

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In one face-paced year, Mater Dei has taken on a whole new appearancefrom landscaping to athletic department. As classes changed hands, as organizations gained new momentum and fresh leadership, as new teachers joined the faculty ranks, everywhere the reflection of youth augmented all phases of school life. During the summer the parking lot was freshly blacktopped with funds from the student candy sale. Maintenance custodian Meinie Schoenbachler highlighted the Mary statue with spotlights, put up lights to aid visibility for parking lot users and gave the landscape a face lifting with young shrubs. A modern \$100,000 convent and a new stone added to the view at the top of the hill. A darkroom supervised by Hi-Lights adviser Steve Halbig supplemented journalism newspaper and yearbook work. Students displayed hearty support when Mr. Stan Singer, drama coach, established Mater Dei's first Drama Club. As their first major project, participants built a small theatre in B104 for a series of one-act plays. Lastly, dances sponsored by the Booster Club raised sufficient funds to buy a baseball pitching machine and band members renovated the band room with paint and a new tile floor. The Rev. Eugene Dewig, superintendent, commenting on the year's accomplishments, said, "Yes, we've certainly made progress. We've corrected many problems and plan to do much more in the future."




prepare him for future responsibilities




a person's inner thoughts, attitudes

Library doubles book circulation in thirst for knowledge

A student's thirst for knowledge today seldom ends in the classroom. Homework, research papers, speech activities, themes and extra leisure time often blazes a path to the nearest library door.

Mater Dei's library is no exception. It has doubled its book circulation and increased its magazine circulation three times over the last year.

Sister Mary Raymond, who has been librarian at Mater Dei for two years, has degrees in education and library science from Indiana University. She composed a bibliography of recommended books for college-bound students which was distributed at the beginning of the 1967-68 school year.

With a gift from the National Defense Education Act commission the purchase of new hardback books on the subjects of foreign languages, careers and science, to name a few, have helped to bring the library more up-to-date.

The April 19-21 annual Book Fair sponsored by the library with the assistance of National Honor Society members, provided students with the opportunity to purchase their favorite books in almost any field from classics to light fiction.









Religion teachers for drill work

Freshmen, sophomore and junior religion teachers this year, took on a new approach to the outmoded question-and-answer style of teaching the subject. Courses on the Bible and the social effects of religion on persons were intertwined with the effects of history, art, music and literature on religion today.

Underclassmen teachers, Fathers Clements, Deering, Loehrlein, Loveall and Uebelhor, conducted discussions with the students on their personal feelings and attitudes on various topics relevant to youth. This new method, it is felt, lets religion come alive in the life of the student.

In the senior year a thorough marriage course and a study of apologetics was conducted by Father Eugene Dewig.

A first for the Catholic schools in Evansville provided Mater Dei seniors with the opportunity to experience a closed retreat at Sarto Retreat House conducted by Father James Basham, a Passionist priest from Kentucky. General agreement termed the opportunity "a rewarding experience." Underclassmen retreat masters were Rev. James Emge, who has given several student retreats, and Rev. Patrick Foster.

A Greek Rite Mass celebrated by priests from St. Meinrad and a Dec. 7 Mass honoring the patronness of the school and celebrated by Bishop Paul F. Leibold, highlighted the masses of the school year.



Four years of literature and English grammar, a composition course, Business English and two years of speech are offered in Mater Dei's English Department. Perhaps the most active department at Mater Dei, it is headed by Mr. Stan Singer and Sister Maria. Mr. Gary Kuhlenhoelter, a former graduate of Mater Dei, heads the Speech and Debate Club.

Activities of the departments include the entrance of several student creations in the National Poetry Contest. Movies, including THE BROTHERS KARAMAZOV and THE GOOD EARTH, were shown during class periods to supplement classroom teaching. Juniors and seniors viewed Shakespeare's HAMLET, the first production by the University of Evansville students in the new Shanklin Theater. Several students including Bob Angermeier, James Butler, Jackie Humphrey, Mark Schenk, Theresa Tavormina, Elana Weiss and Bob Whitehouse were active in various speech meets with other schools.

At the annual achievement assembly senior Janie McClure was awarded a trophy after receiving the academic monogram in English for three years.

Mr. Singer, in April, received his degree in English after attending summer school and night classes at Indiana University. Mr. Kuhlenhoelter also acquired his degree from I. U.



While both learning and having fun two senior journalism students spent two-action packed weeks last summer at the University of Detroit Yearbook Workshop. Diana Weiss and Vicki Wolf, 1967 Hi-Lights co-editors, were given training in the organization and publication of a good yearbook and various new layout and picture techniques.

Other workshops which Journalism I and II students attended during the year included a Newspaper Short Course and a Yearbook Workshop both sponsored by the Detroit Student Press Association at Marian College and a Journalism Day at the University of Evansville.

Through the combined efforts of the students and the adviser, Mr. Steve Halbig, a University of Evansville graduate, the Hi-Lights yearbook and paper were able to accept three recognitions for excellence. On Journalism Day the paper received two awards in the areas of features and editorials. The 1966 yearbook also received a first-place award from the University of Detroit critique service.






Eight math classes give wide range

Mathematics can almost be considered as a basic necessity today. Here, the Math Department under the direction of Mr. Paul Ellert, can boast of eight different classes ranging from general math to pre-college calculus—the newest addition to the department. Calculus involves an intensive study of the world of numbers, utilizing all previous knowledge. Pre-algebra also appeared as a new class this year. With its addition, first year mathematicians now face the choice of general math, pre-algebra and algebra I. Sister Mary Jane who attended Marquette University, handles two different phases of math-algebra I and geometry. Mr. Ellert, a former graduate of the University of Evansville, prepares students for the advanced aspect; he instructs students in advanced algebra, advanced math and calculus. Outside activities also characterized the advanced math classes as they toured the complex Computer Center at the University of Evansville. Slide rule seminars were conducted by the Science Club to aid in the use of the instrument.



Commercial arts expands to meet growing demands of business world

In the past eight years the commercial arts courses have been gaining more and more momentum and prestige at Mater Dei. The schedule of commercial arts formerly included only typing, shorthand and bookkeeping, but as the years have expanded so has the department. It now also includes consumer economics taught by Mr. Francis Hillenbrand; Business English by Mrs. Mary Patry; general business by Sister Mary Carmel, and business math by Sister Mary Charlene.

Sister Mary Lynn, Sister Mary Judith, and Sister Mary Carmel teach all areas of business at Mater Dei. Sister Lynn, who is studying at Notre Dame, teaches typing and shorthand. Sister Judith, who studied at Mount St. Scholastica, teaches first year bookkeeping, typing and shorthand. Sister Carmel, a Notre Dame graduate, is responsible for second year typing, shorthand and bookkeeping courses.

These courses are youth's beginning step in developing the skills one needs in today's business world—a world of vast and varied opportunities for advancement.

A foreign language, besides training the mind, introduces one to far-off lands and customs. During its short, three-year history, Mater Dei's language lab classes in French, German, Latin and Spanish have been greatly aided by the use of films, tapes and records and have introduced high school students to a better speaking and writing knowledge of the language. Mr. Eugene Moutoux, a graduate of St. Meinrad College and a conversational German summer course instructor at Bosse, teaches first, second and third year German. Mrs. Mary Patry, a University of Evansville graduate and mother of three, teaches first year Spanish while Miss Fatima Dean has second year students. Sister Mary Angele who now teaches three years of French, received her degree from St. Benedict's College. A third year of Spanish and a fourth year of French is currently being planned for the curriculum. Latin I and II, the class which offers a classical background, is taught by Mr. John Blankenburger.





Science is one field that never stops growing. Each day new discoveries are made in all phases. Here, classes which follow this new trend include chemistry, general science, physics and biology I and II.

Mr. Tom Dick, head of the science department and moderator of the Science Club, now in its second year, is a former graduate of Indiana University, and teacher of boys' first year biology. Sister Mary Corita from Catherine Spaulding College teaches chemistry, while Sister John Marie from St. Scholastica instructs the girls in the sophomore biology classes.

Besides the conventional topics and dissections, classes have also made family trees, studied genetics and watched cloud formations. The boys' biology classes undertook a spring project to plant young shrubs in front of school. Activities in the Science Club included a field trip to Mead Johnson and members played an instrumental role in helping other young scientists prepare their projects for the annual Science Fair here.

Out of the projects entered in the Mater Dei Science Fair, 15 were chosen to represent the school in the regionals at the University of Evansville. Ten of these were awarded pins and ribbons from various organizations.



Greatness, leadership and interest in one's country begin in the days of youth. At this time the basic qualities of love and patriotism for one's country are first instilled. Social studies in high school helps these qualities to grow and strengthen. These classes, United States and World Histories, World Geography and American Problems, are not merely the study of geographical and historical problems in the U. S. but of countries the world-over.

Mr. John Blankenburger who received his degree from Brescia College; Sister Mary Ann, a graduate of St. Scholastica; Sisters Mary Beth and Charlene, both graduates of the University of Dayton and Mr. Thom Gore from St. Edwards in Texas all collaborate in teaching the courses. Several guest speakers, films and tapes were secured to complement classroom material. Seniors also enacted a mock trial at the Courthouse to gain knowledge in courtroom procedures. Vocational classes, all taught by Sister Mary and Mr. Francis Hillenbrand, help round out the student to take his place in the home and the workaday world. The training consists of home economics, foods, clothing, and Christian family living for the girls and two years of mechanical drawing for the boys.



Perhaps the words of Mater Dei-ville's mayor, Dan Felstead, after a controversial HI-LIGHTS accusation that the Council was renigging on its platform promises best reveals the Student Council's achievements during the past year. On February 24, before the student body, Mayor Felstead stated in part, ". . . after all the things we've done and that are to be done, we still have some people who stand and deny we did them. . . . According to some, we may have a lousy Student Council and a deficient mayor, but I'll tell you, I'm proud of it and the kids on the Council are proud of it and I'll back it on anything. We accomplished much . . . : We've kept the campus cleaner than other Councils have—and there's more to keep clean. We've helped Father Dewig arrange for the candy sale and its publicity. We've held a dance for all the classes. We've held a clothing and food drive for the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Our law enforcement is better. We've put on an assembly for football. We've had a lady from the cafeteria to discuss the food situation with the Student Council. The senior members took it upon themselves to judge their classmates' actions at retreat; this isn't easy. . . . Beginning next year, several senior members from this year will come back to talk to the freshmen and explain high school to them in all phases-sports, academics, religion, counseling and the political programs. These are projects of merit . . ." This simple, forceful speech brought to light several of the Council's accomplishments and little-publicized goals and helped awaken in the school a sense of pride in its student government, its governing body, and its mayor.

























undefeated season; teams to come


For the first time since 1959, Evansville has crowned a new city wrestling champion. Reitz earned this distinction by up-ending Mater Dei, 26-13 to record their first victory over the Matcats since 1957 when they prevailed, 24-22.

The loss to Reitz not only foiled the Wildcats attempt for a seventh straight city crown but also snapped Coach Gossman's string of 38 consecutive city wins with the last defeat occurring in 1959 to North, 25-19.

Undaunted by the toughest schedule in the school's history, Mater Dei smacked city foes, Central, North and Memorial by scores of 46-6, 43-2 and 43-5, respectively, while coasting to a second place finish in the SIAC and a third in the Sectionals.

Led by senior musclemen Gary Maritn (120), Jerry Morris (127), Dave Rodenberg (180) and junior Mike Schapker (112), the Matcats, as in past years, were regarded as one of the foremost state powers. Martin and Schapker doubled as Sectional and SIAC champions while Morris won the Sectional and Rodenberg the SIAC championship.

The reserves continued the fabled Wildcat tradition by completing their tenth straight unbeaten season in city dual meet competition with city reserve champions sophomore, Frank Buerger (HW), juniors, Danny Macke (112) and Dave Krietemeyer (145) being the most prominent.















Frosh lose all but one game



While compiling a dismal 6-15 record, the 1966-1967 Mater Dei basketball team was one of the most feared teams in Evansville by virtue of a controlled offense. Although being swamped by state powers Reitz 77-32, North 85-50, and Harrison 72-43, the Wildcats utilized ball control and precision shooting within close range to take city powers Bosse and Central "down to the wire."

Bosse prevailed, 57-43, when superstar Larry Weatherford knocked in 11 points in the final period to allay a 37-37 third-quarter tie. Central leading by only two points, 54-52, with less than a minute remaining, took advantage of a untimely Wildcat error and won "ridden out," 58-52.

Although dropping 15 contests this season, Coach Thom Gore contends, "Six games were lost on the foul line," where Mater Dei averaged a poor .510 percent.




After finishing the spring baseball season with a respectable 4-5 slate, Mater Dei faced a tough summer schedule which could conceivably project the Wildcats to a second city championship.

Supporting wins over city rivals Reitz and Harrison, Coach Steve Halbig's crew have been leveled but twice during city games, both to unbeaten sectional champion Rex Mundi. Surrendering to the Monarchs during the regular season, the Cats fought Rex Mundi toothand-nail in their sectional tilt, before yielding, 2-1.

North Knox and South Spencer have accounted for the Wildcats' remaining defeats, with the latter succeeding twice. Seniors Dick Martin, Bill Schenk, and Stan Weber, along with juniors John Stocker, Kenny Rietman, and Mike Schapker carry the brunt of the Wildcat's load. The reserves, who have wins over Harrison and Reitz against two setbacks to South Spencer, give hope of a promising future. 



Lackadaisical interest along with a shortage of manpower has constantly kept Mater Dei in the city's track catacombs, until bearded track coach Stan Singer stepped in to revamp the program. Nick-named "Stan the Builder," by a local sports editor, Singer took over the reins after a year's layoff and guided the Wildcats to four straight victories on the cinders, before being toppled by Tell City and South Spencer in a triangular meet for the Cats only defeat.

St. Meinrad was the first to taste Mater Dei's growing power as they succcumbed, 79-27. Following the inaugural victory the Wildcats dumped Rex Mundi, 63½-54¾, while handling the Monarchs for the third straight year on their own track.

Mater Dei amassed a total of 91½ points to easily outdistance Vincennes Catholic, Monroe City, and Washington Catholic during a quadrangular meet at Vincennes. The Wildcats then raced past Princeton, 64-52, before running into a road block at Rockport, falling short of an undefeated season by a mere 9½ points, 56⅓-47.

Led by high-stepping senior Gene Dunkel-barger, Mater Dei racked up 358 season points and shattered several school records in the process. Dunkelbarger smashed school marks in both the low (16.4), and high hurdles (21.1), while leading the squad in individual points, along with being the Wildcats only regional qualifier after a fourth place finish in the low hurdles during the sectional meet.

Senior Mike Raley proved prominent by resetting the school's half-mile at 2:10.7.


Coach Singer lost only senior pole vaulters Mike Hoefling and Paul Stewart, and senior highjumper Bob Barron, along with Dunkelbarger and Raley through graduation.

Returning to highlight next year's squad are record breaking juniors Steve Pfister and Don Miller, along with sophomore muscleman Steve Nurrenburn. Pfister zipped the 100 in 10.7 while Miller turned a quartermile in 55.5. Nurrenburn put the shot 45'3" along for a new school mark. Juniors Greg Quinn and Larry Crouch also return, having combined with Dunkelbarger and Miller to rewrite the mile relay record at 3:42.2.

Although the Mater Dei tennis team finished the year with a dismal 1-11 slate, Coach Gene Moutoux feels that some valuable experience was secured. The only seniors on the squad were Gary Seidl and John Sanderson who composed the second doubles team. The Wildcatnetters salvaged their only victory at the expense of Central, while dropping the remaining matches to the larger city schools. Returning next year will be sophomores John Mathis, and Kim Schiff, along with freshmen Rick Miller, and Randy Jochim. Mathis was the team's number-one singles player and was awarded the trophy for being the most improved. The young Wildcat netters hope to next year provide living testimony to the fact that experience does pay.

After a rousing start which inspired dreams of a third Mater Dei city golf championship, the Wildcats cooled off to finish the season with a 3-3-1 record. Three early victories sent Coach Gary Kuhlenhoelter's linksmen to the top of the city standings, but a tie with Bosse, 6-6, reversed the direction of the Cats as they dropped three straight to North, Harrison, and Memorial. Mater Dei did rally somewhat, though. Taking a sixth-place finish in the sectionals with a score of 345, only 14 strokes behind the victorious North squad. Senior Stan Logel, and sophomore Bob Angermeier proved to be the squad's top golfers, with Logel posting the lowest scores in the city and sectional tournaments, while Angermeier was low man in almost all other matches. Senior Jim Boories, and Logel departed because of graduation, but juniors Charles Guetling, Bob Alstadt, Kenny Jarboe, and Dave Krietemeyer, along with sophomores Rick Weighmen, and Angermeier, plus freshman Wayne Emge return to form an experienced nucleus for the next year's squad.








