










Mass participation reflects loyalty


















Skits spark super sales


Mater Dei's annual fund drive began royally with hilarious skits. Each class presented its original, spirited skit for a school competition.











Football Homecoming royalty reigns








Regal evening begins beautifully











adviser, Sr. Mary Dominic Frederick, managed to handle the pressure of keeping students on task.





Juan Pablo Tudela came to the U.S. from Bolivia to learn English and to visit family members who live in Evansville.






'And the band played on'












The setting of *The Miser* was in Paris, France, in the year 1668. The plot centered around the character

Forensic team flourishes; season includes great accomplishments

The Mater Dei forensic team had a tremendous 1994-1995 season.

Coached by Ms. Brenda Donofrio and Fr. Mark Kurzendoerfer, who were assisted by Ms. Carol Pigman and Ms. Angie Evans, the team worked its way to a 10th-place trophy at state competition.

The novice team began its season at Reitz where every MD competitor placed in the top 10. It joined the varsity team at North Posey where Stephen Schaefer received a first-place medal.

At IU, Melissa Kiefer and Chris Spahn placed fifth while Leigh Ritchie was an alternate. At Cincinnati, Melissa Kiefer placed fifth once again, and Leigh Ritchie brought home a first-place trophy, defeating almost 100 competitors.

The team also travelled to Warren Central and Rushville where it placed first and second. The season continued with the Reitz meet where Alex Zenthoefer received the first-place medal.

When tournament competition began in March, the team rose to the occasion. Mater Dei had two champions, Alex Zenthoefer and Leigh Ritchie, and placed second at the SWIFA meet. At the sectional, the team placed second and advanced 23 competitors to regionals. The regional competition proved to be a success-filled meet. Six students advanced to state competition. Again, MD received a second-place trophy, defeated only by the eventual state champion team, Reitz.

Debaters prove point











MD closes season in RCA Dome

For the 1994 Football Wildcats, it was a year filled with joy, happiness, accomplishment, and a state runner-up trophy. From the start of the season, the Wildcats showed promise. With a large number of seniors, there was an abundance of team leadership. If one of the leaders was not there, someone else would jump in and come up with some great words to inspire the team to keep going.

The Wildcats kicked off the season with a bang, beating Central 7 to 6. This started the ball rolling, and it kept going with only two minor setbacks during the season.

"The first eight games of the season were great, but I thought that the real fun started when sectionals began," said Don Mosby.

Mater Dei was expected to do well in the sectional and did. The Wildcats grabbed the sectional title by defeating Southridge, South Spencer, and, finally, North Posey.

The second game of the sectional was an eye-opener for the team. South Spencer played a great first half. The Wildcats went into halftime getting beat; in addition, they had lost some key players. Jeff McDurmon was still out from a knee injury that he received from the Southridge game. At the beginning of the second half, McDurmon stepped up and said that he was ready to play. This was the turning point of the ball game. After McDurmon came in and pulled the monkey wrench out of the MD football machine, Mater Dei then rallied, defeating South Spencer 38-28.

Regional competition put the Wildcats up

against Clarksville Providence. The last time Mater Dei played Clarksville Providence was in 1993, and the Pioneers beat Mater Dei in regionals. This time it was very different. Mater Dei departed Clarksville with the regional title, winning 20 to 14.

This placed the Wildcats in reaching distance of what every high school football player dreams about: a trip to the RCA Dome for the championship game. There was only one team standing in their way, unbeaten Indianapolis Scecina.

As the Wildcats took the field in front of one of the biggest crowds that they had ever seen, one could see the fire in their eyes. Coach Mike Goebel gave some inspiring words before the Wildcats took the field, and they worked. The Wildcats played one of the best games possible, defeating Scecina 14 to 13. This gave the Wildcats their first semi-state championship, and it gave the Crusaders a very long ride back to Indianapolis.

The semi-state victory took the Wildcats to the final game against the Bremen Lions. Mater Dei brought back its first-ever state runner-up trophy.

In the championship game, the Wildcats fell to Bremen. After the game in the locker room of the Dome, one player looked at Mr. Will and simply said "I'm sorry." Mr. Will replied, "Don't be sorry for anything. We did not get beat here today; we just did not win. Things do not always go your way, and this is a perfect example of that."





Seniors Jill Fehrenbacher, Heather Kissel, Ingrid Maier, and Shannon Masterson led the team.



Finishing strong, the 1994 girls golf team averaged fifty strokes better than last year in eighteen-hole meets.


Coach Charlie Braun led the Lady Wildcats to an unbeaten record in city dual meets and to the regional competition.









Losing nine seniors from last year's state team, being finally under rule of the IHSAA, having an exchange student on the team, and also being under the direction of two new coaches (Brad Schultheis and Larry Nohalty), the boys soccer team experienced '94-'95 season adjustments. The Cats had to pull all their resources together before they could be a team to be reckoned with.

"I had high expectations for this year," stated senior Andy Humm, who along with Ryan Kassenbrock and Nathan Smither, led the team to a highly respectable 6-8-1 season record. "We started out slow, but we all seemed to pull together by the end," commented Humm.

The Cats took victories over several respected teams, including a surprising upset over 17th ranked Jasper. "Most of our games were only lost by a one- or two-point margin"; stated senior Corey Thompson, "but in such a low scoring sport, one or two points make all the difference between a victory and a defeat. When sectionals

rolled around, that one or two points didn't exactly make us the favorites."

But the Wildcats showed everyone that they weren't ready to be counted out. In the first round of sectional play, the Cats took an easy 3-0 victory over New Harmony. But their next game was their hardest. It was against the Central Bears, a team that in the regular season had barely squeezed by the Cats with a 1-0 victory and a team against which the Cats were seeking revenge.

"We had the tools and the talent, and this time we knew what we were going to do with them," said Thompson. "Their earlier victory had caused a small bit of rivalry between, not only the teams, but the individual players as well. We weren't about to give up easily." The Wildcats fought valiantly, constantly being encouraged by the coaches. "Keep up the intensity. You've got to push yourselves harder if you really want to win," they advised.


By the end of regulation play, the Cats had proved they weren't going out easily.

They had tied the score at 2-2 and that meant the one word that players of every sport dread: "overtime." All the Wildcats needed was to last ten more minutes, but could they do it?

The personal rivalries and exhaustion began to take their toll. Player after player was either being warned or taken out by the refs. The team began to come apart at the seams. Central came in and scored a quick goal, then another. The Mater Dei bench became distraught. Before they knew what had happened, it was too late.






That wonderful feeling of camaraderie was felt throughout the whole team."





Looking up from the turf to see thousands of faces was an amazing experience that could never be put into words.





The coach, Fr. Mark Kurzendoerfer, commented, "I was surprised and impressed with the team. They did better than I expected."












Even though the victories were few, many were close games. The Cats were competitive; they learned to play together as a team.




Dance Cats step to music







the final game of the season, the Cats knocking off city rival, Memorial, 6-4.



The Wildcats ended the season impressively with strong senior leadership and optimism going into the sectional.





and Harrison and winning second place in the Wildcat Classic tourney.


The Lady Wildcats suffered a tough loss in the semifinal round of the sectional to Reitz 2-1.

The MD tennis players voted Leanna Werner and Sallie Ellison the most improved players while Jill Fehrenbacher received most valuable player honors.






Most of the girls improved their times and distances, including some dramatic improvements by juniors Sara Knapp, Kim Eickhoff, and freshman Jennifer Harris.

The season ended on a high note with


three girls advancing to regional. Sara Knapp advanced in the high jump while Jennifer Harris advanced in discus.








Wildcat golfers tee off


