

We are all a part of the Mater Dei community, and Mater Dei will forever be a part of us.






Many people try different ways to overcome the boredom of school. Gathering together in the hallway or the parking lot to talk to their friends may help relieve some of the stress.







With so many different activities offered at Mater Dei, it's easy to forget what we are all here for.


Quite simply, Mater Dei has one of the most challenging academic standards in the city. This doesn't always go over well with students, who are kept very busy.


Mrs. Harrington said, "It is necessary to study each of the body systems and how they interrelate with each other in order to maintain that proper balance of systems that produce good health."

Sr. Geraldine explained, "The change also lets students take electives that alternate classes wouldn't allow for."


Junior Ron Emmert liked it because, "It offers a more in-depth study and is less distracting than alternate classes."





The classes offered are Pascal 1 and 2, Computer Usage, Data Processing, General Business, Accounting, Economics, Business Law, and Typing 1 and 2.









Other classes offered different learning experiences. Senior Deanna Stagg said, "Learning about the developing fetus and the harm that can come to it was my favorite part of Child Care."



The Science teachers seemed to have a great effect on many students' success in their classes.


Junior Denise Dippel said, "The teachers make the classes easy to understand by the way they explain the material."



For example, senior Glenn Baumgart said that "Mr. Senn gave us a basic outlook of psychology and different methods of study."


Senior Allison Moll explained further that she found psychology "interesting because you know how you thought and why you reacted the way you did. It was the basis of human behavior."

Senior Mindy Coomes thought the most interesting parts were learning about the brain and studying about dreams. Dream interpretation involved


learning the stages of dreaming and knowing symbols.



In learning about other cultures, we can learn about our own. Junior Mike Breidenbach cited the class system of India as being different from our own. Julie was impressed (in a negative way)


by the "skinheads" of England, and why they felt some people are inferior.




Jeremy Adler spent the week of April 23-29 studying parliamentary procedures in Washington, D.C., with other high schoolers.


Jeremy's bill, the "Welfare Bill," was intended to reform welfare. It passed.

Students take the class first or second semester depending on whose birthday comes first. The class is also offered as a summer school course.











"I believe my best learning experience in high school so far would be German class because there is so much to learn and it is very interesting," said junior Matt Hillenbrand.





The Art Department is divided into art and mechanical drawing.




Junior Denise Dippel said, "My favorite part of mechanical drawing was designing my own house plans."




Freshman San Hertel said, "Gym class is fun because it gives me a chance to relax and have some fun."

Freshmen have gym class every day, while sophomores take it every other day as a co-ed class.




There are a variety of sports offered, such as soccer, basketball, and even square-dancing. Students are graded by their skills in the sport and their scores on written tests.








Although math requires hard work and effort on the part of the student, many students attribute their understanding of math to their teachers.


Senor David Ankrom felt, "The curriculum compares evenly to other schools, but the teachers take more interest in the material and the students."

When asked how Mater Dei's Math Department stood out from other schools', Mr. Sheridan commented, "Our math scores on the SAT are above those of other schools."









1989 sports season was very successful. Mrs. Janis Phillips, the coach, said, "The fans showed great support this year and helped to make our job much easier."







better in the years to come."







Marc Halbig, a sophomore, commented, "We were always prepared for our matches. We lost a lot, but we learned what will make us better in the future."













Other finalists were Mark Alvey; Matt Goebel, who received Most Improved; and Dan Ritzert, who received Best Mental Attitude.


"This year was the best year ever for me. I never thought I'd make it all the way to State. I was very pleased," commented Dan.


Not only did the Matcats send six people to State, they also captured the first place title in Sectionals, Regionals, and Semi-State.




















The team also defeated Vincennes Rivet early in the season.







Coach Baumgart is very optimistic about the future: "We should be really strong." Jason Hamilton agreed: "We should be just as good, if not better."



The second champion was Senior Dana Rainey. Dana advanced to the state finals by winning the shotput with a distance of $36'1\frac{1}{4}''$.


Dana stated, "Winning the SIAC helped to get me better prepared for the rest of the season."

The team ended the season by winning the Sectional Championship.





took charge and led the team. It was a good game."



Head Coach Carl Voegel commented, "I would like to thank the students, faculty, friends, and family of our players who helped us to represent our school and make the season successful."


The team is involved in many activities to ensure the success of future teams.

The team also holds a baseball camp which helps give future team members important pointers on their game and prepares team for play at Mater Dei.








(Above) The Mater Dei Batcats prepare in the dugout for their game.









The flood was just one of the many instances that proved the hard work and dedication of the Janitorial Staff.





When Mr. Joe Dipple started his new job as Athletic Director of Mater Dei in the spring of 1989, he had a tough transition.


"They (the coaches) knew me as a former coach and then all of a sudden I was their supervisor. It was hard for them to adjust," he explained.


The job of Athletic Director has many different responsibilities to it. Along with the responsibilities of keeping the sports records and selling tickets, there is also the job of scheduling sporting events.






In this version, Eurydice has come to Pluto's domain as a result of choking





Tom Williams felt a key reason for


their success at competition was Mr. Gerald Grannan's leadership: "He keeps our energy so high at competitions, you have to look down to see up."





For the second year, Mater Dei participated in the Academic Decathlon tournament, held this year in January at Jasper.

The Decathlon, open only to juniors and seniors who are to be of A, B, and C averages, was challenging, according to Coach Miss Rose Rogge, "because it was the most complicated and most difficult" of all the competitions. Senior Mike Knapp agreed: "The total learning experience was mindnumbing and totally exhilarating in itself."

Preparation actually began the previous school year when students were given general outlines.

"Kids are to do their own research," explained Miss Rogge. "We're just here to provide the materials."

Actually, she was being modest since team members and coaches started back in September meeting three days a week after school and on Sunday afternoons until the competition.

Coached by Miss Rogge and Sr. Jean Marie, eight students took part in the event by competing in written tests in Geography, Economics, Math, Science, Literature, and Fine Arts. They were also required to write an essay, do a three-minute impromptu speech, complete an interview with a judge, and conclude with a "Super Quiz"

Those winning individual medals were: Jason Martin, silver in Science and Math and a bronze in Economics; Kevin Corcoran, bronze in Social Science and Math; Sarah Kirsch, bronze in Literature; and Mike Moran, bronze in Science.

Steve Masterson agreed that "there was less pressure sitting writing instead of a lot of people watching you."



Freshman Craig Elpers said, "I especially liked the discussion groups because it gave me a chance to learn more about my classmates."


Retreats are a part of what makes Catholic schools unique and memorable. They offered opportunities for students to share common concerns and to get to know each other better.





Bishop Gettelfinger came to Evansville from Indianapolis, where he was serving as chancellor and vicar general of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.


Bishop Gettelfinger was born in Ramsey, Indiana. He attended Sr. Meinrad and was ordained into the priesthood on May 7, 1961.











The Mass was co-celebrated by several priests from the feeder parishes.

The Mass ended with the Crowning of Mary by May Queen Mindy Coomes and the Prayer of Dedication led by Mayor Jeremy Adler.












All the officers felt very proud to be a part of the Mater Dei community and our unique Student Government program.










