



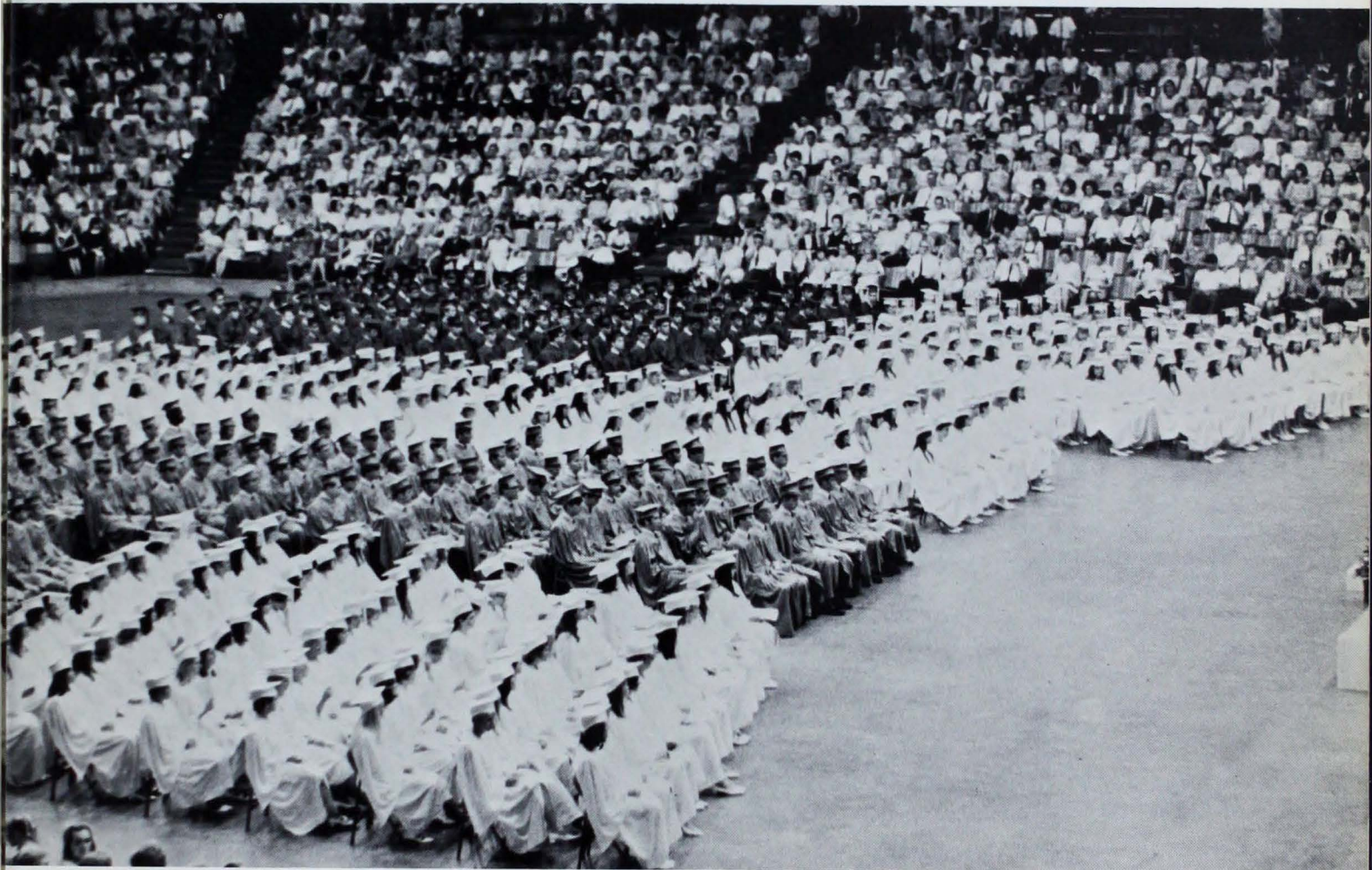

20th Anniversary year of notable achievements

High School is devoted entirely to fill the "Atmosphere of Youth." One learns not only the basic teachings of English, math, history and religion, but also how to meet people and to accept responsibility. Also one has a real chance to be acknowledged for the things he does for the school, city and self.

This yearbook was made for the students in order that they may remember the "Hi-Lights" of the school year. Some of the most memorable things that occurred were:

Mater Dei's first Homecoming, held during the Reitz football game, a 12-0 victory for the Wildcats. Three football players, Mike Forche, Ron Oliver and Steve Nurrenbern made All-City teams, with Nurrenbern also making All-State. In addition, six players received college scholarships.

Each school day begins with Jim Bengert raising the American flag.



Mr. Len Will, the "Cats Pa," retires after 20 years as the school's only football coach. Although he has retired from coaching sports, Mr. Will will assume the position of Dean of Students and will continue coaching students.

In other sports, the basketball team ended with an 11-7 record and managed to make the semifinals of the sectionals. Wrestling and cross country teams won sectionals, while cross country also grabbed the SIAC title. All told, six of the eight sports enjoyed winning seasons.

Mater Dei was again proclaimed as a suburb of Evansville. City Clerk Victor Funke gave the proclamation to Mayor Ken Wannemuehler during the Inauguration of the Student Council.

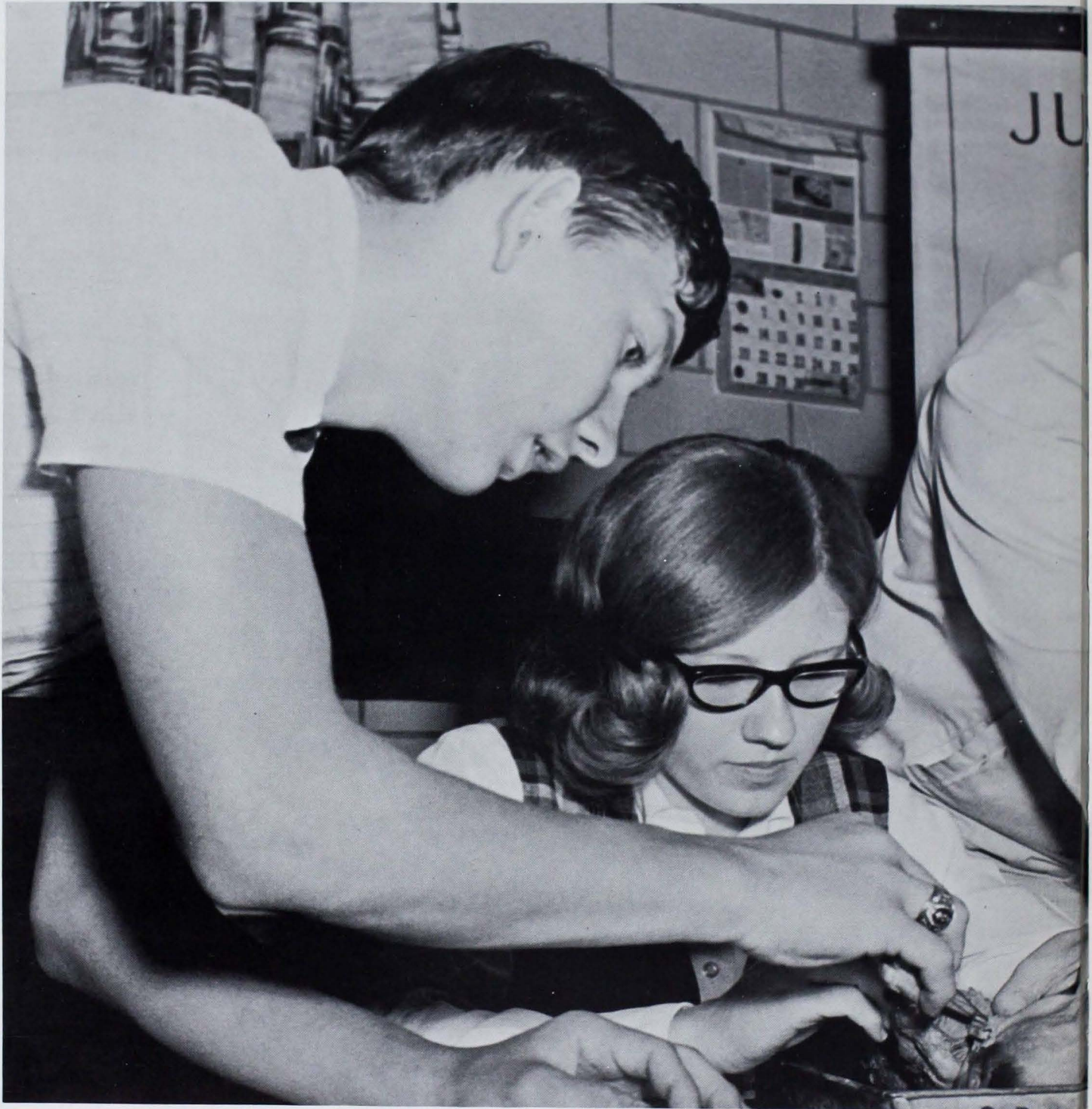
Contributing with the atmosphere of finer arts were the talented and outstanding "Singing Hoosiers" of Indiana University and the wonderful traveling group "Up with People." Both groups introduced different types of music so that the students may have a broader outlook in this medium.

In the scholastic atmosphere, the 1967-68 yearbook took a second place award in competition with books in the Tri-State area at the University of Evansville Journalism Day. The book won a first place award in photography. The Science Department had a field day in being outstanding. The Science Club conducted its own Science Fair and took field trips to Sterling Brewery, Angel Mounds and Bloomington, Ind. cave-sites. Science Fair winners went further to compete in the University of Evansville Science Fair and Tess Tavormina came out as the grand winner. As a result, she won a trip to Houston to compete in a nation-wide Science Fair.

The annual honor monograms and academic trophies were again distributed for scholastic achievement. Awards and scholarships were given to students during the spring and a complete list of winners may be found on Page 68.

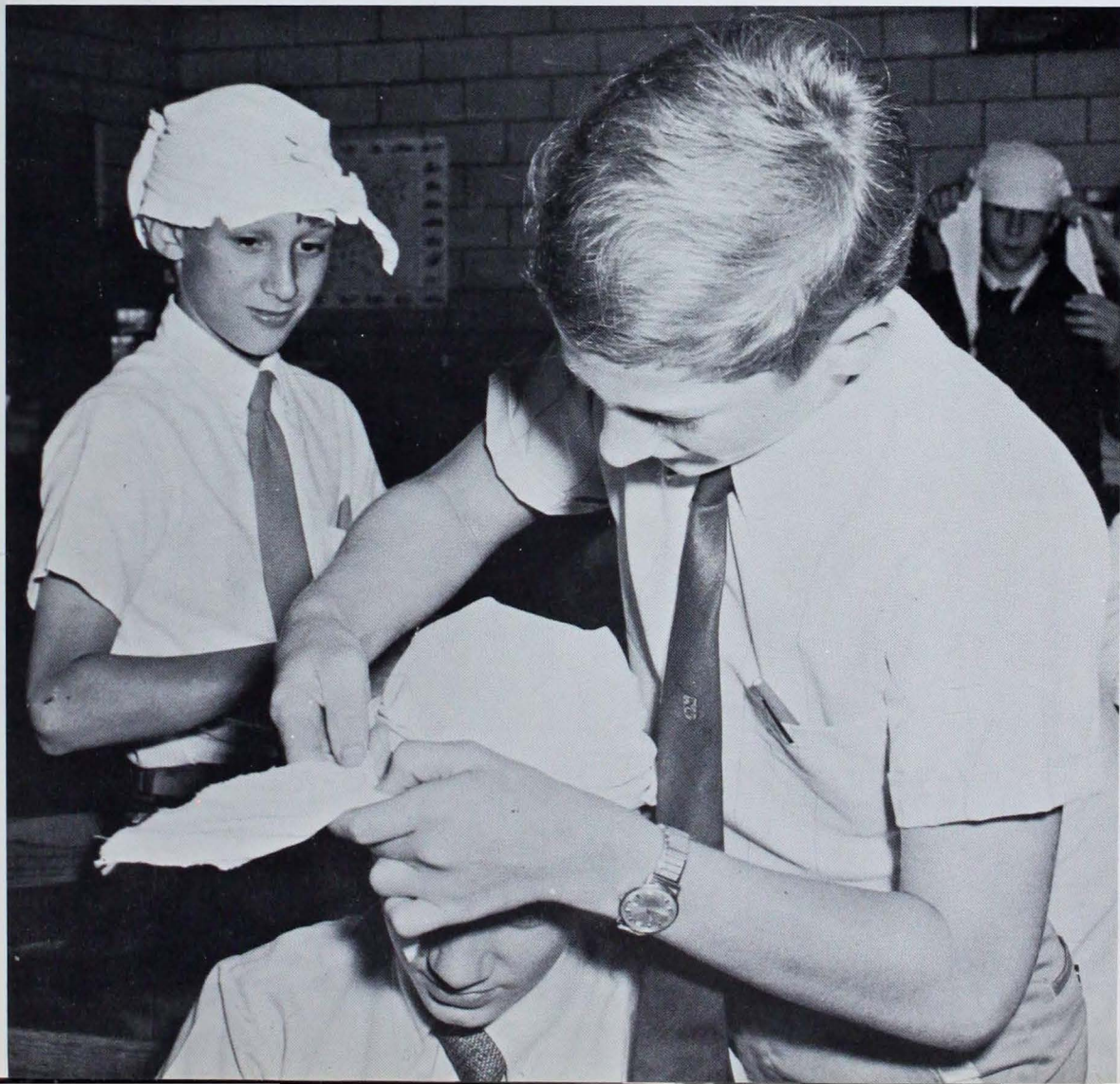

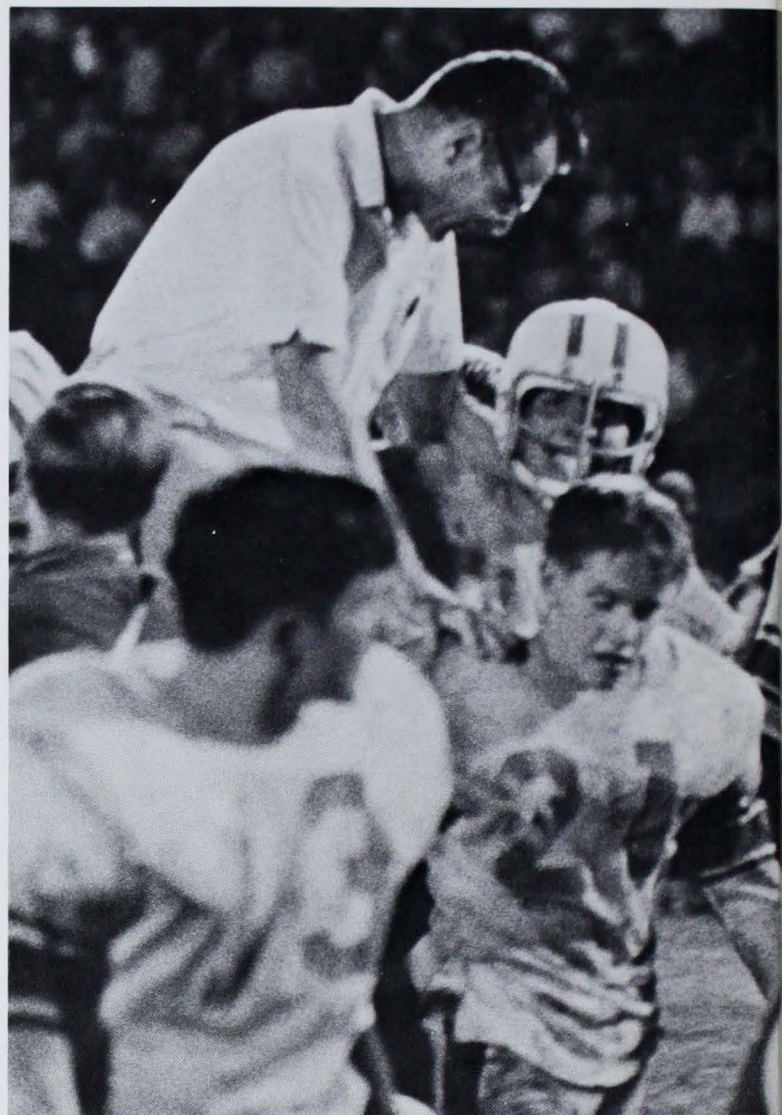
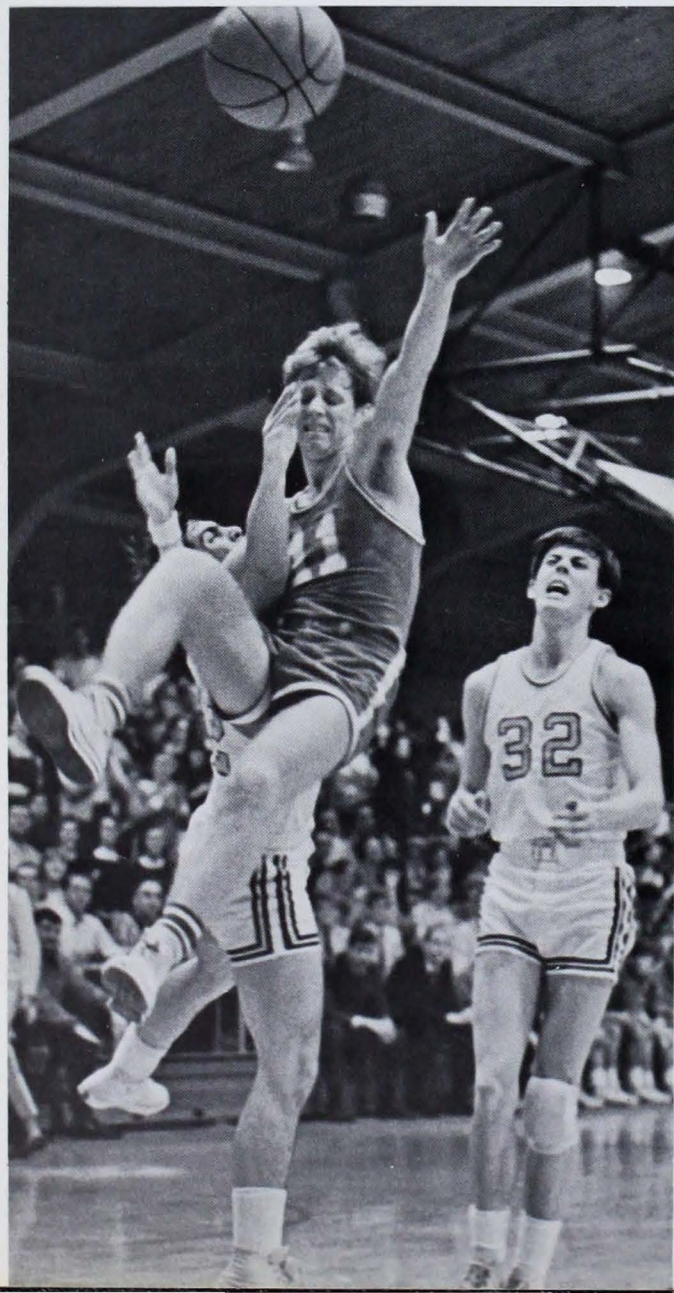

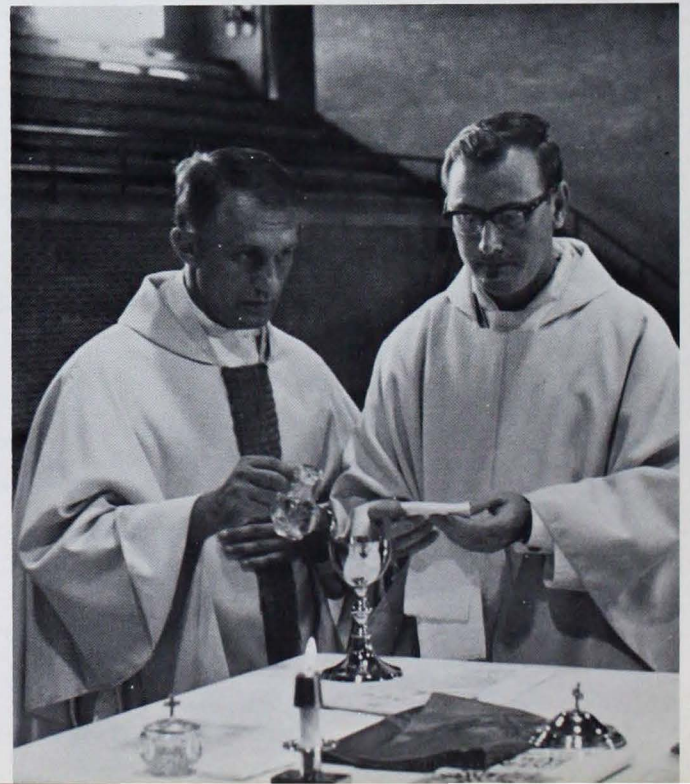

The English Department, headed by Sr. Mary Donald, offered a four-year program, oriented for college-bound and non-college students. The Freshman and Sophomore course is a survey concentrating largely on American literature with one Shakespearian play the freshman year and grammar for the sophomores. Speech is also offered for any interested sophomores, juniors, or seniors.

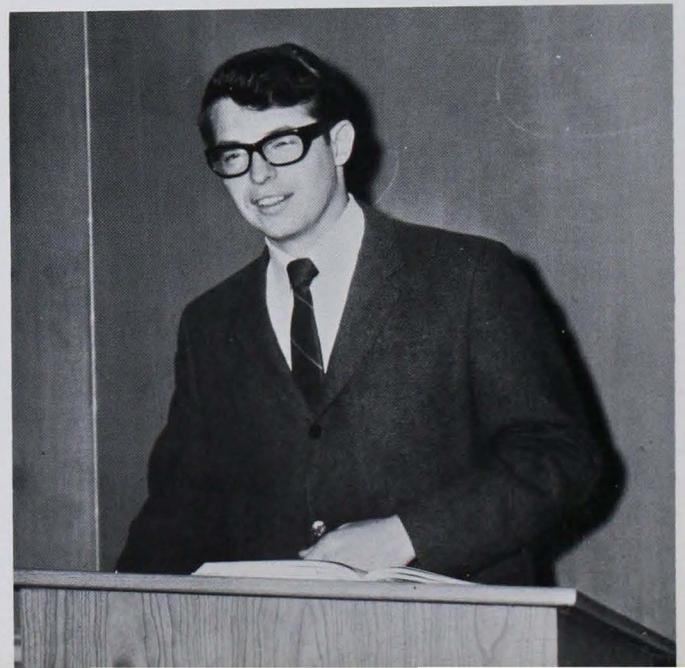
The junior college-bound level covers English literature from the Anglo-Saxons to contemporary playwrights. Seniors study a survey of world literature, starting with Greek and Roman writers and follows through to present-day best sellers.

During the course of the year, the Department produces "Literary Acorns," a collection of the students' best poetry. Susie Becker's poem "Gone" was given the top award and Tess Tavormina's "arid" was second. To make literature more alive, movies are shown quarterly, geared to suit individual classes.

Freshmen English students also study Developmental Reading for a six-week period, with better readers attaining speeds over 400 words per minute.

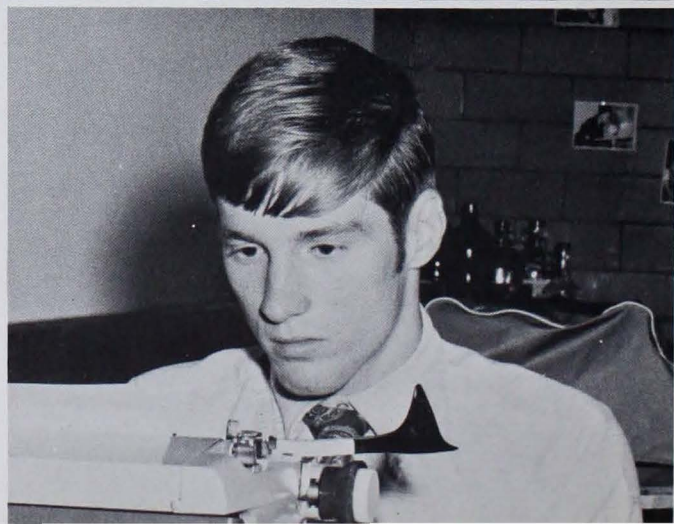


Journalism captures four Journalism Day awards

Change and addition was the atmosphere in the Journalism Department during the year. Even before the curriculum began over \$400 was spent on new photography equipment which enabled Mr. Halbig to create the school's first photography club for interested students. Also during the first hectic month of operation the department sponsored a yearbook party for anyone who wanted his 1968 yearbook a few days early.

A small yet vigorous Journalism II class handled the newspaper by rotation editors the first semester and captured four awards at the annual University of Evansville Journalism Day. First place honors came in yearbook photography and runner-up awards were received in yearbook layout and overall yearbook competition and also in sports writing for the paper.

In February Don Ulrich, Jerry Kay Wolf and Donna Herrall led the junior Journalism class in taking over the reins of the newspaper, leaving the seniors free to work on the yearbook.

Geometry is the next step from algebra, with advanced algebra offered for juniors. Seniors may take physics and a one-semester course in calculus.

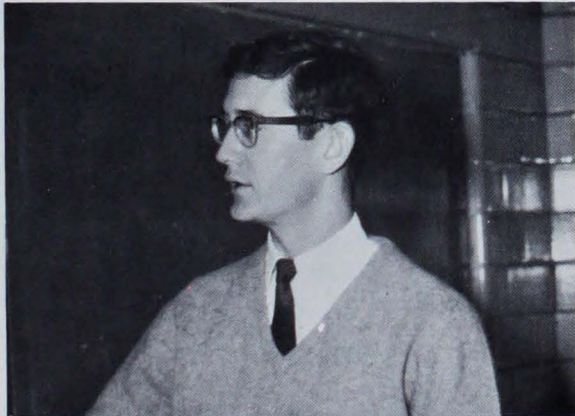

A number of underclassmen as well as upperclassmen also captured awards with their projects.

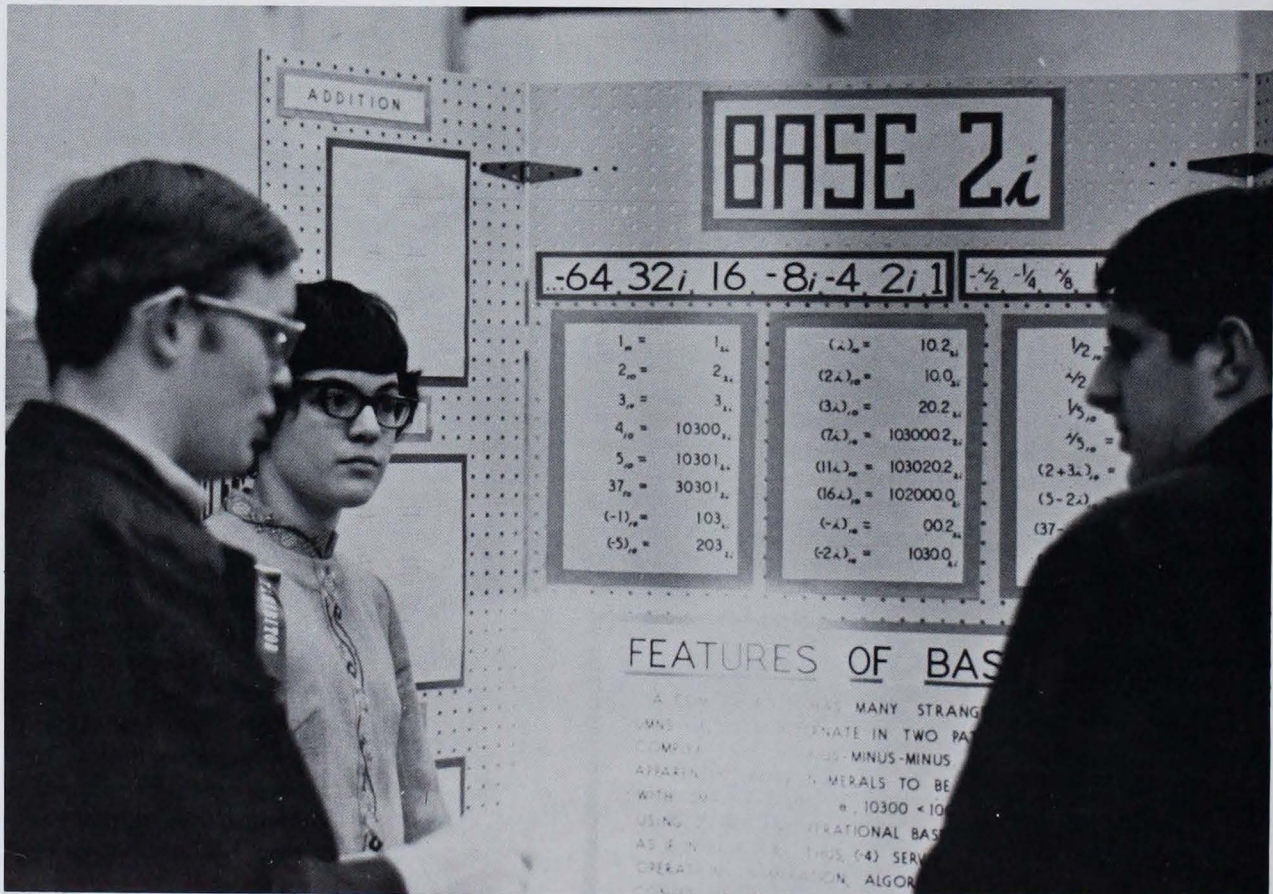
Science scholarships in various fields were presented to several students at the annual awards assembly including summer grants which went to Anna Tavormina in biology and Suzanne Crouch in geology.

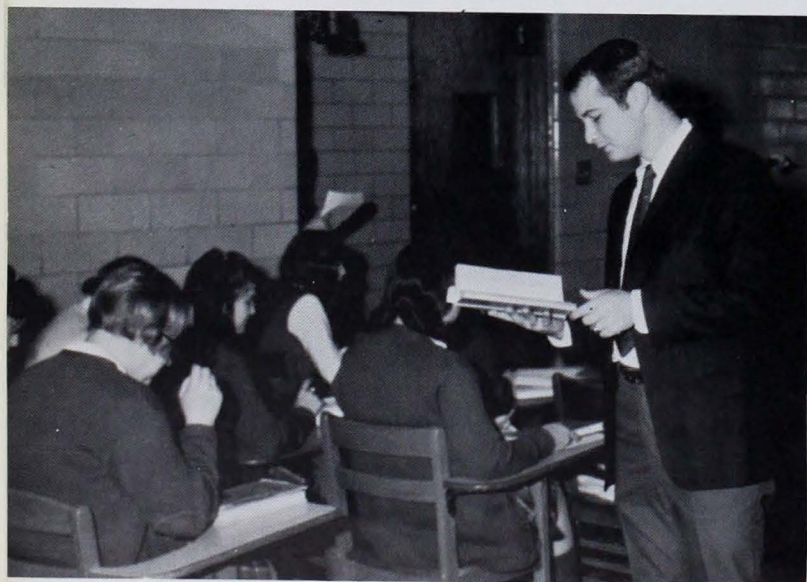


Language enthusiasts

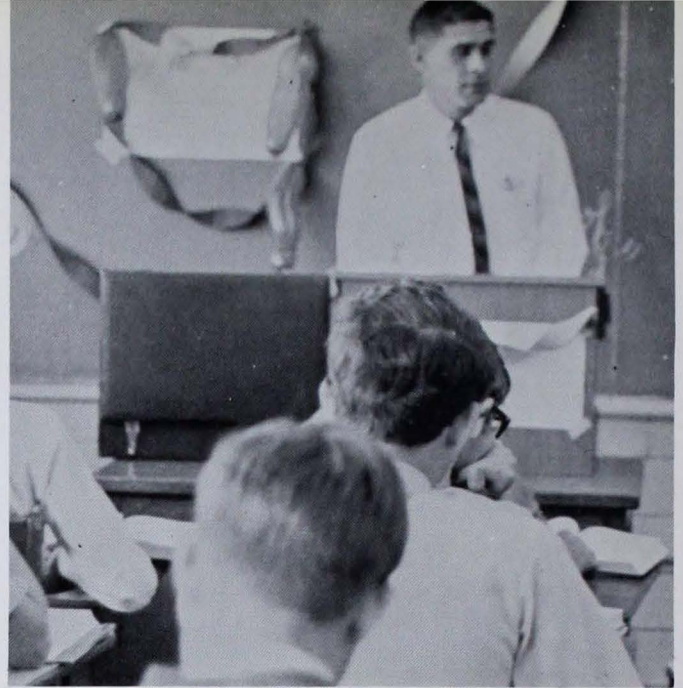


Social Studies tackles Controversial atmosphere

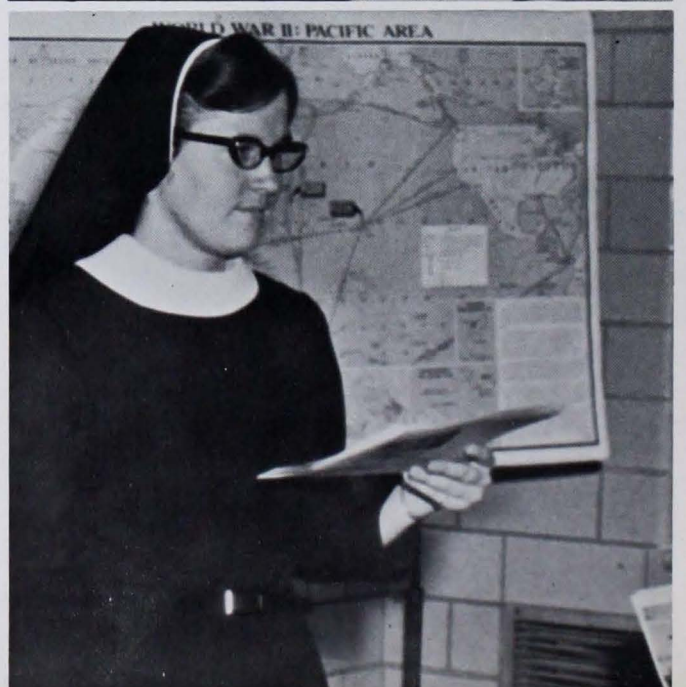
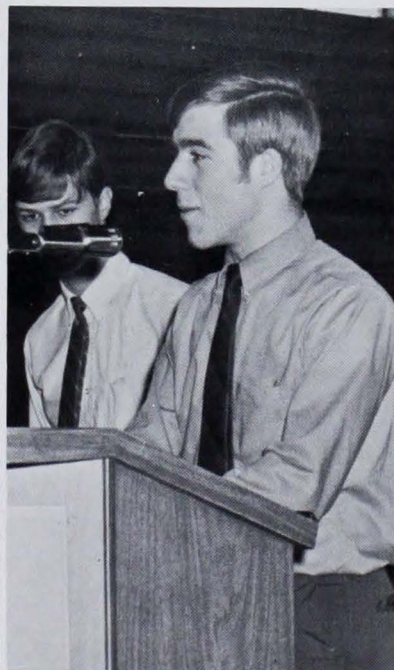
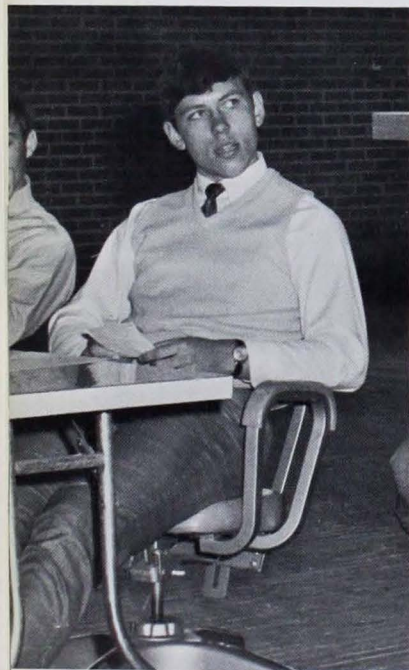
The Social Studies Department offers World History, U.S. History, required for juniors, and American Problems, required for seniors, all of which are two credit courses.

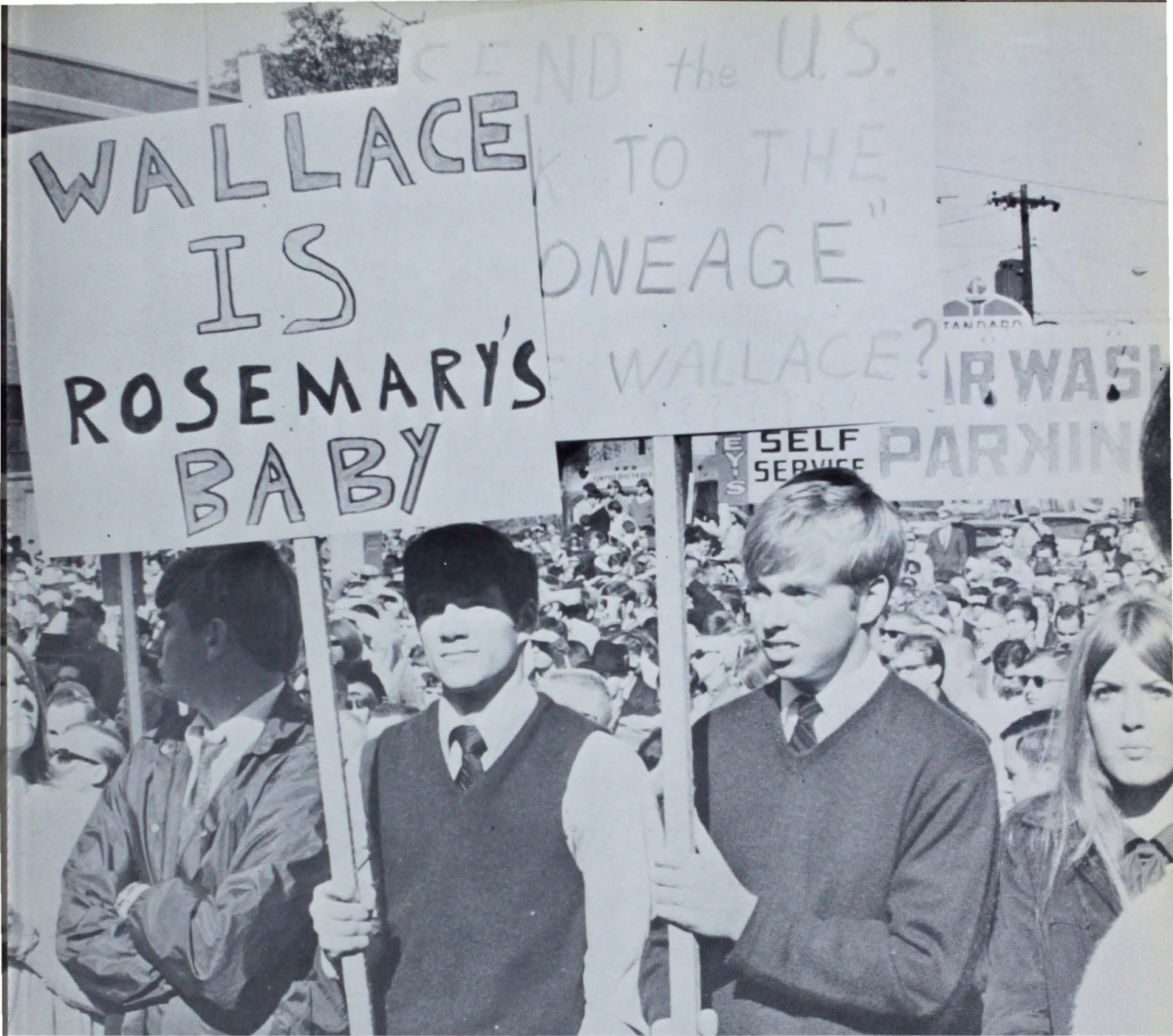
The department, headed by Sr. Mary Ann, viewed films, filmstrips and recordings as part of the class work.

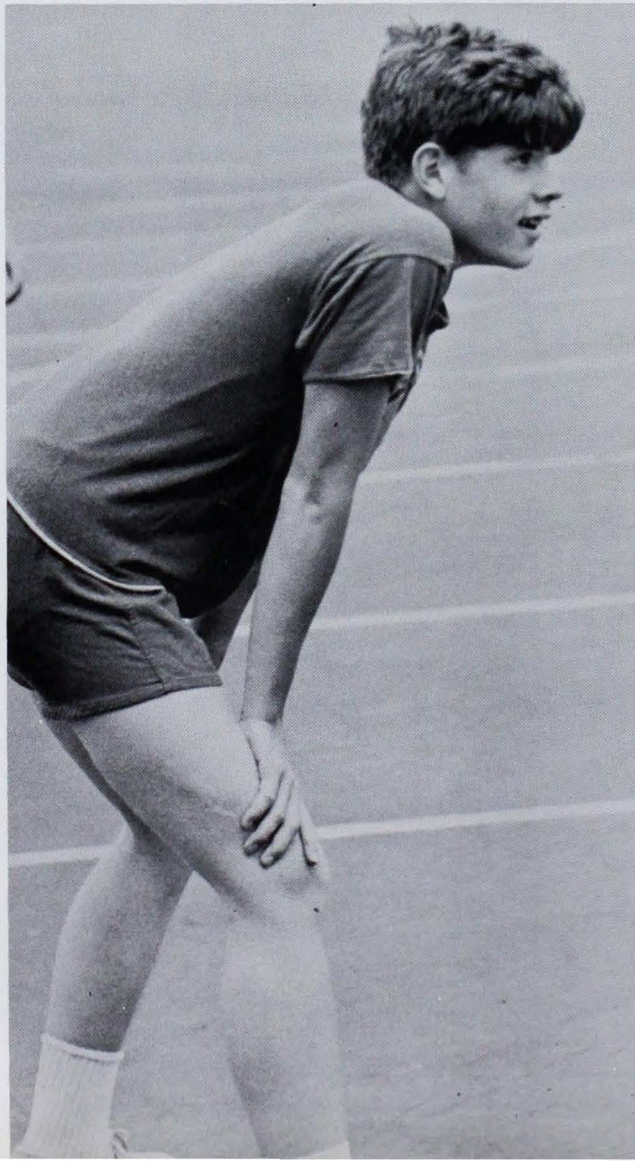
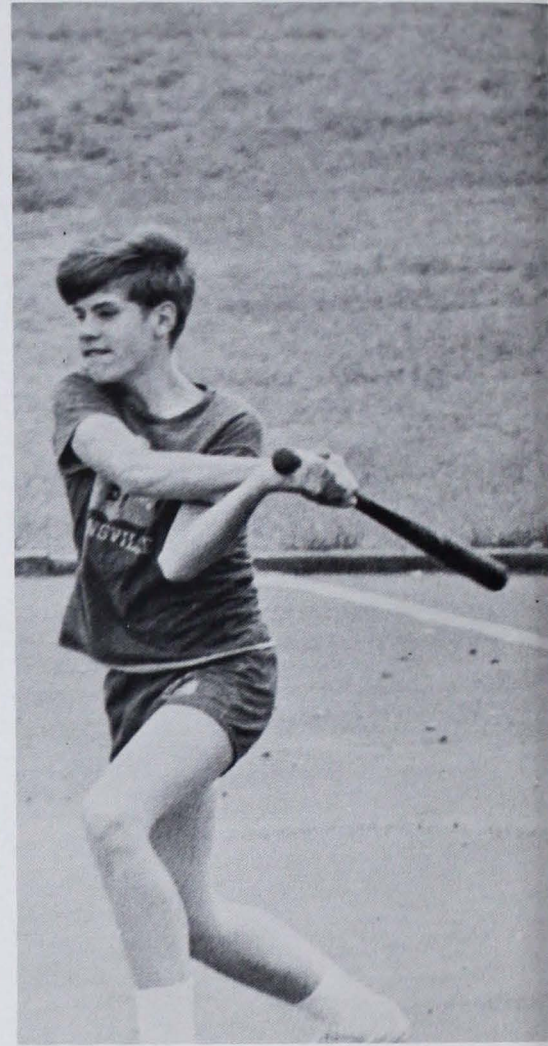
Physical Education Gives different slant

Gymnastics includes football, wrestling, basketball, track, and baseball in it's curriculum.

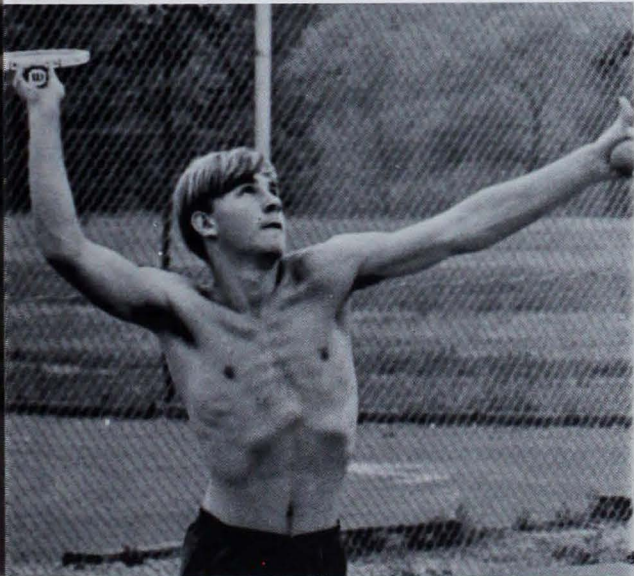

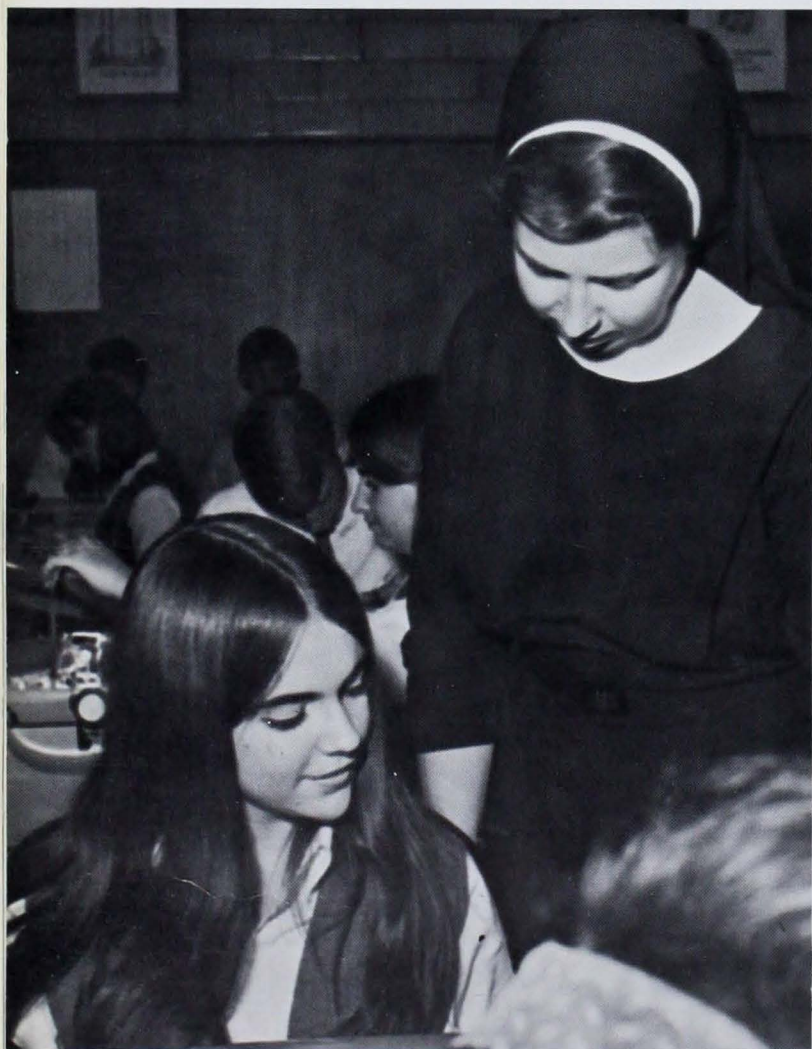

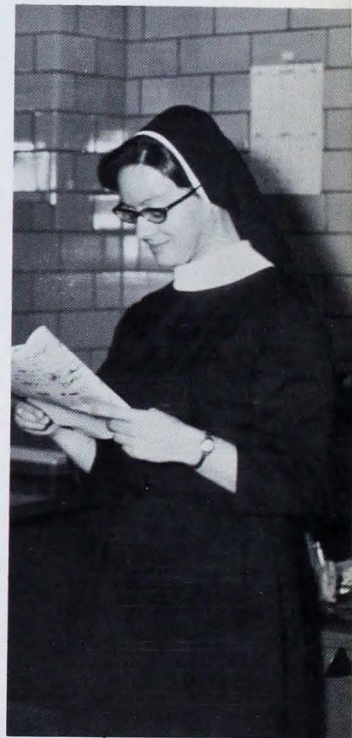
Secretarial skills link To promising careers

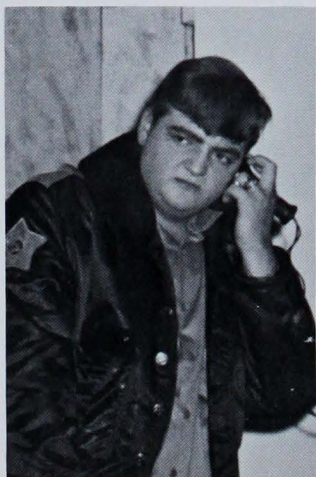
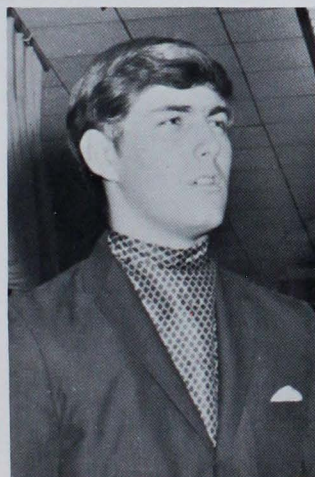


Drama Department theme: To build, change, grow In winter, spring plays

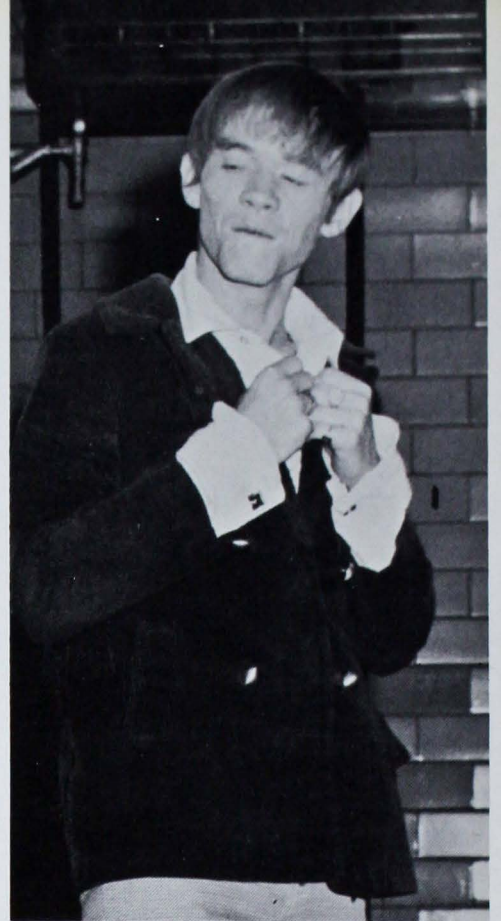

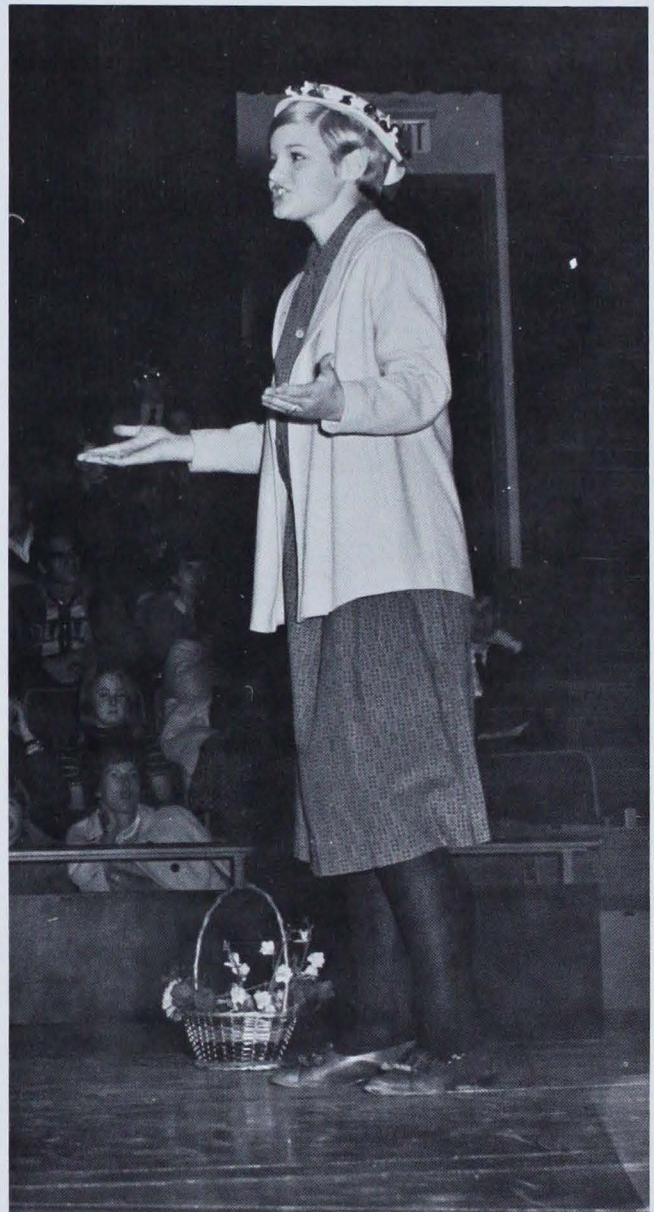

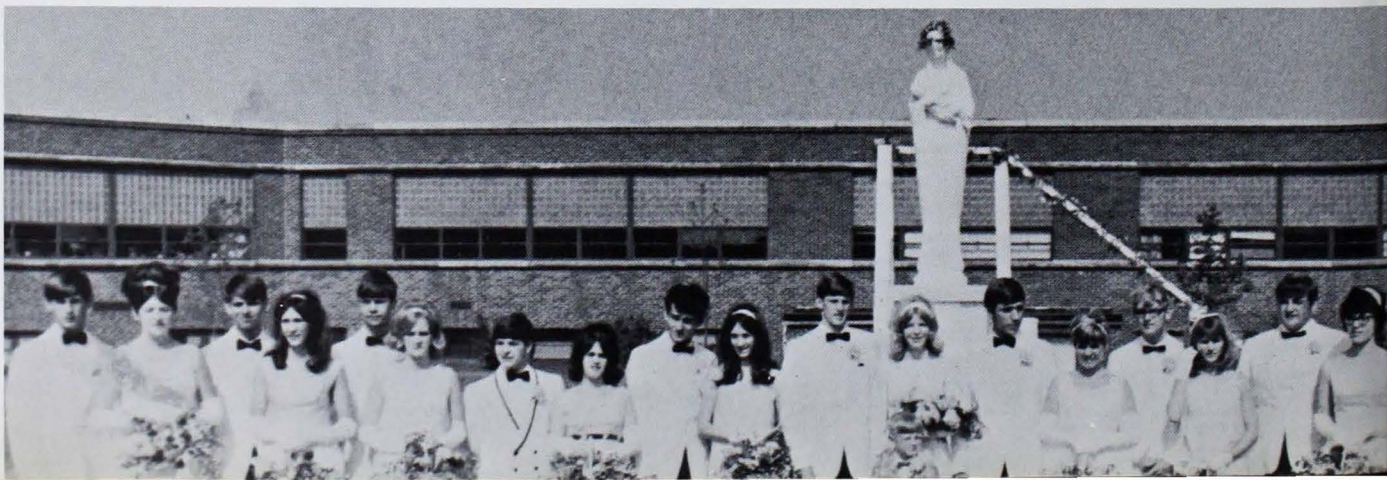

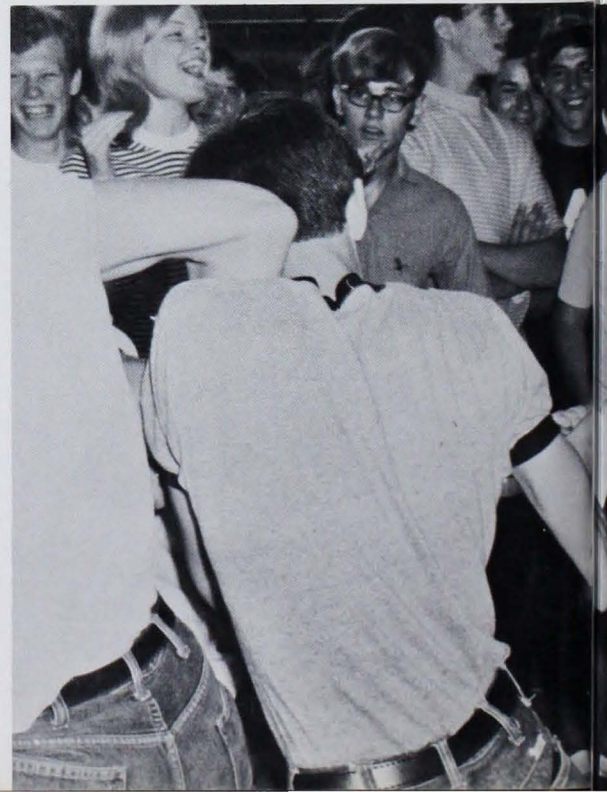

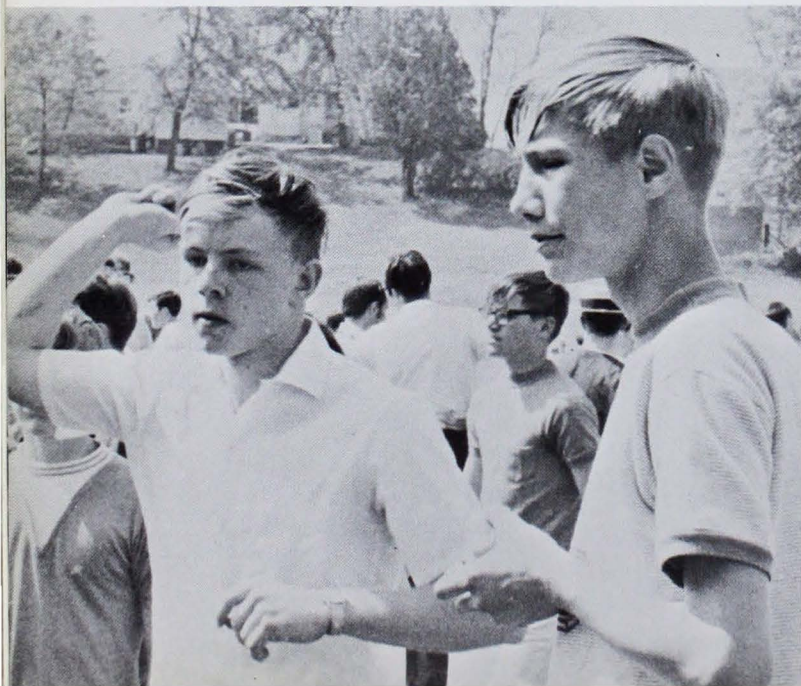

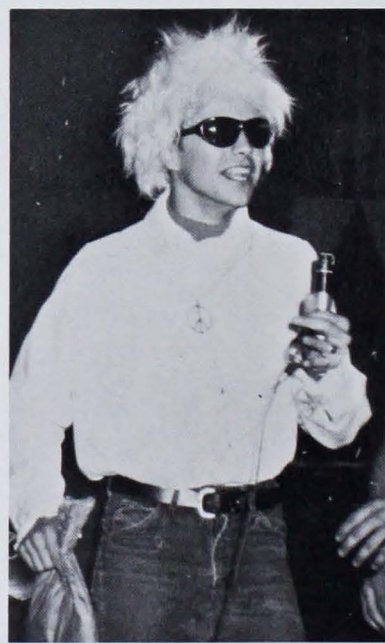

State ranked wildcats

Shut-out first seven

With record 263 points

Mater Dei's football team finished 7-3 for the season and shut-out their first seven opponents, compiling 263 points in the process. The Cats were state ranked through the first eight games. Bosse became the first team able to penetrate the granite defense and made a lone touchdown hold up for a 6-0 victory. Mater Dei then fell to Rex Mundi and Vincennes, with the Monarchs eventually winning the city crown.

Leading the Wildcats was All-City and All-State choice Steve Nurrenbern, a 220-pound mammoth tackle who topped the team in tackles. Although the Cats also landed quarterback John Hamilton, halfback Mike Forche and guard Ron Oliver on All-City teams, their wins were always team efforts.

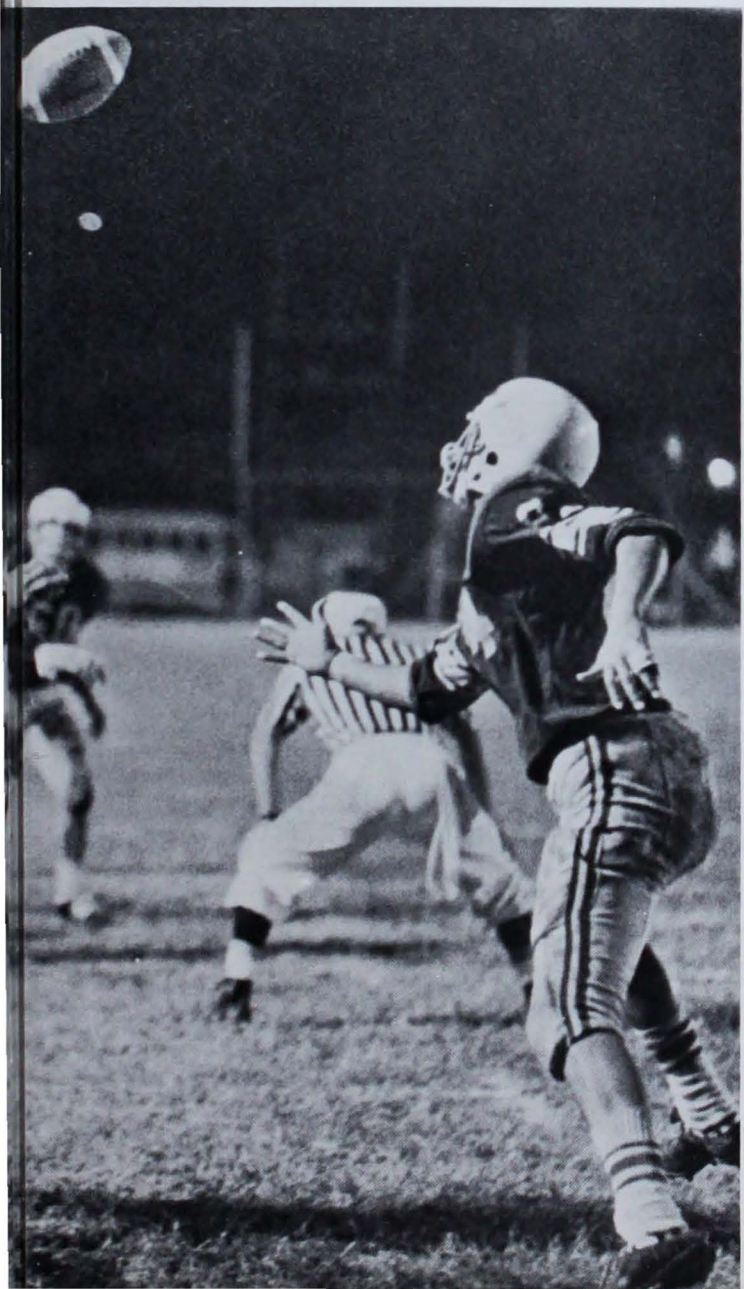
Forche and Hamilton were second and third in the city scoring race, respectively.

A crowd of 12,000 saw Mater Dei give Mr. Will a 12-0 retirement present over Reitz, the first time the Cats had defeated the Panthers since 1958. The Cats also knocked off North, 12-0, the first win over the Huskies since 1957.

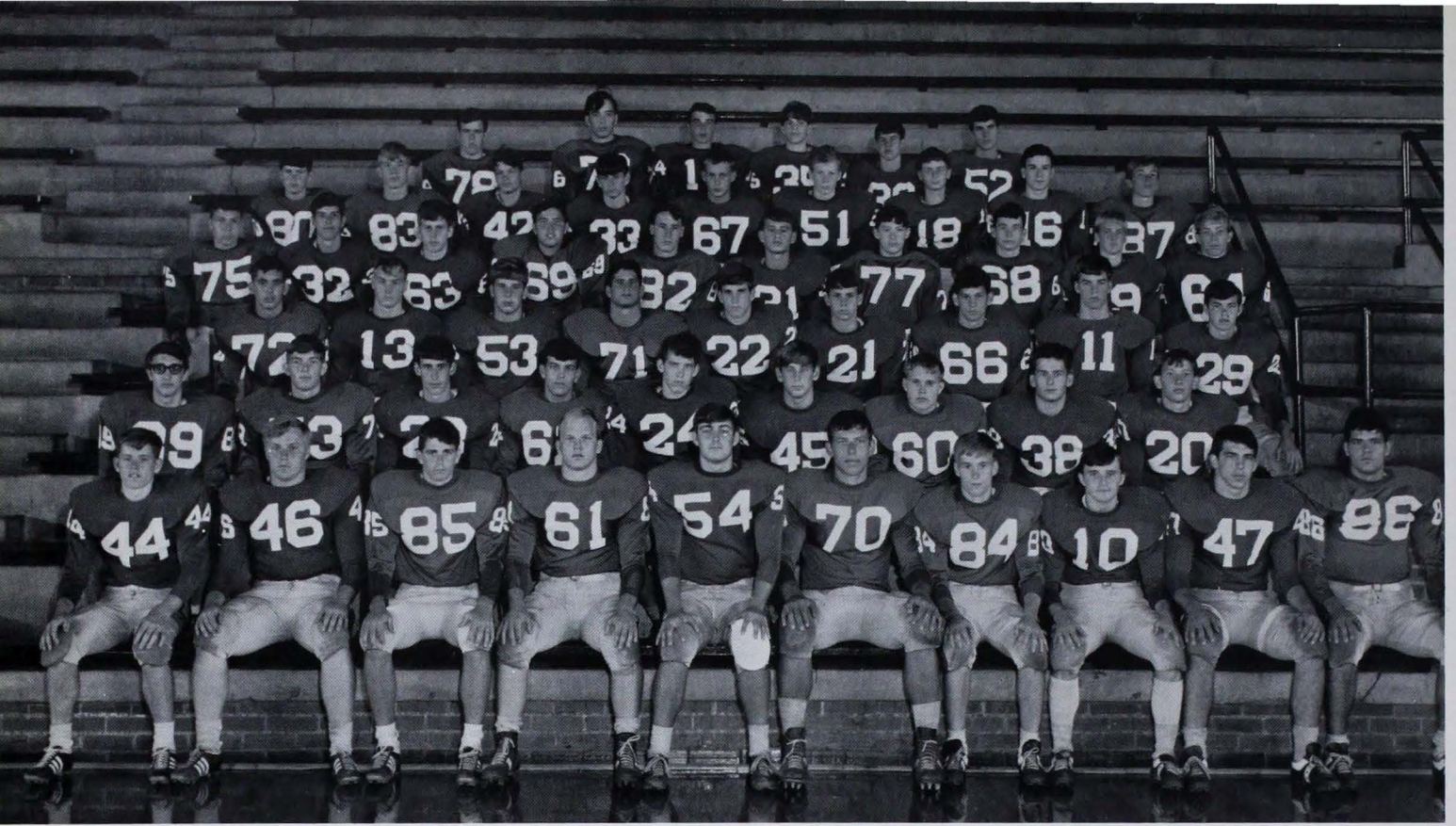
Breaking school records was the order of the day. In a 79-0 win over Central, the Cats broke the old mark of most points in one game (67). In total scoring, the Cats rolled to 283 points, compared to the old mark of 257. They also gave up the fewest points ever in one season—60.

The reserve football team under Mr. Gary Kuhlenhoelter gave hope for the future, as they won the city championship with a perfect 7-0 record, holding four of their seven opponents scoreless. Their closest contest was a 13-7 win over Reitz, which they won on the last play on a pass from Ron Singer to his brother Don.

The freshman team went 3-4 under Mr. Joe Dippel.

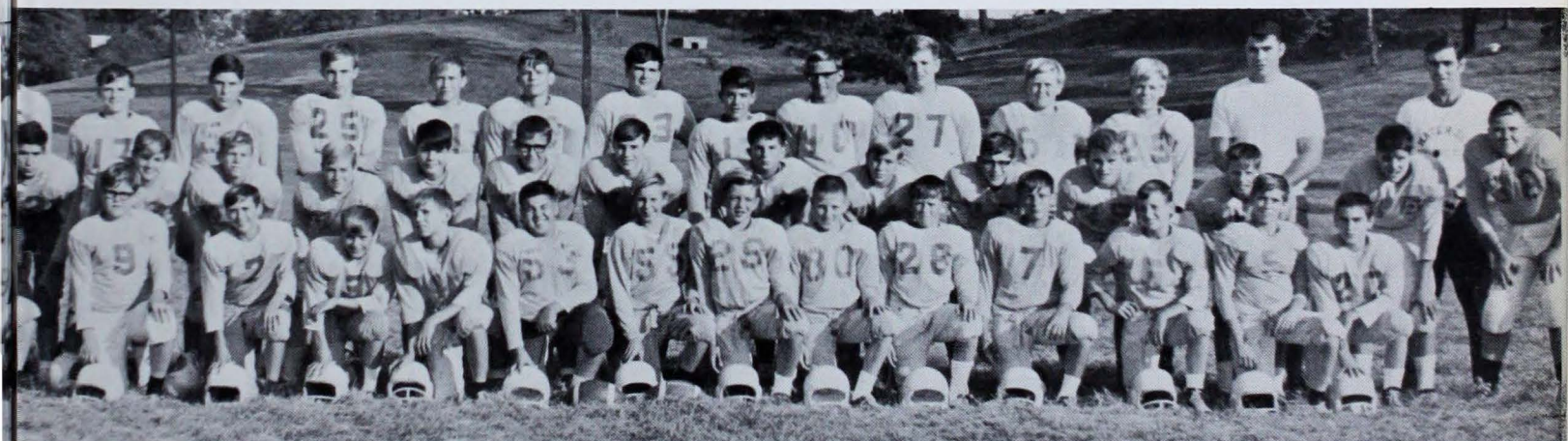

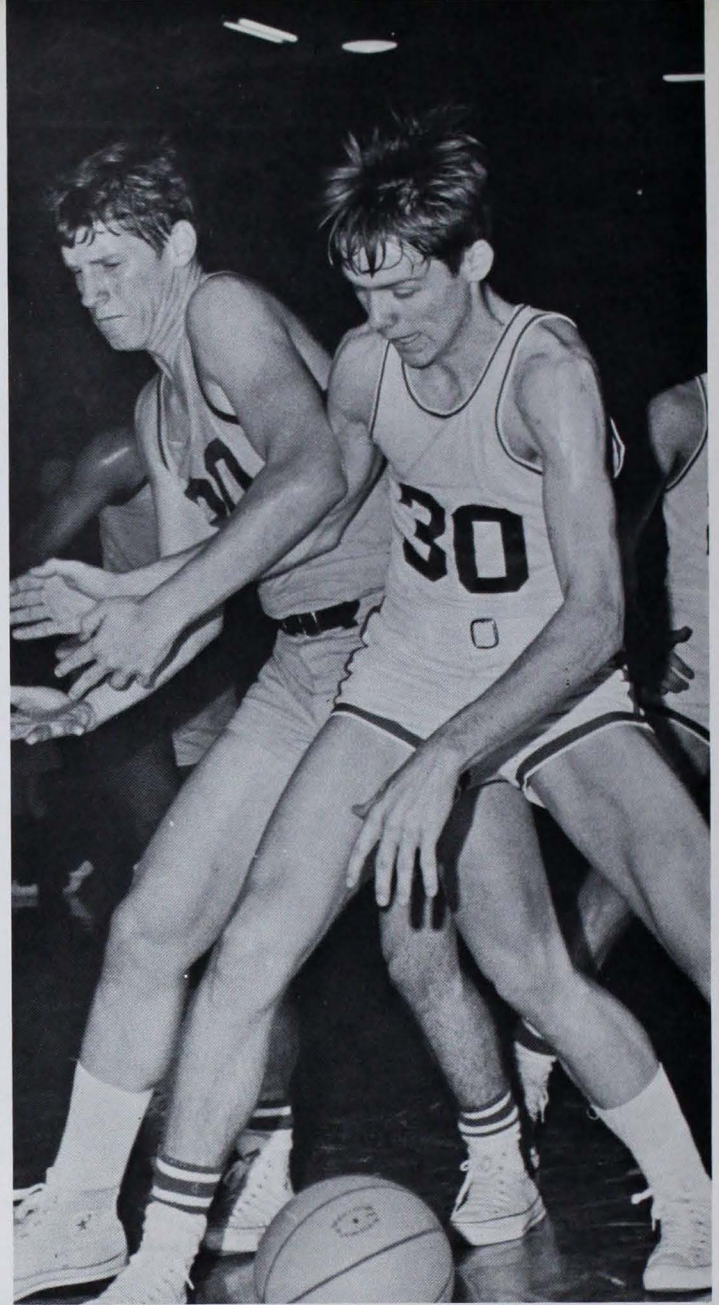
Barely miss Reitz

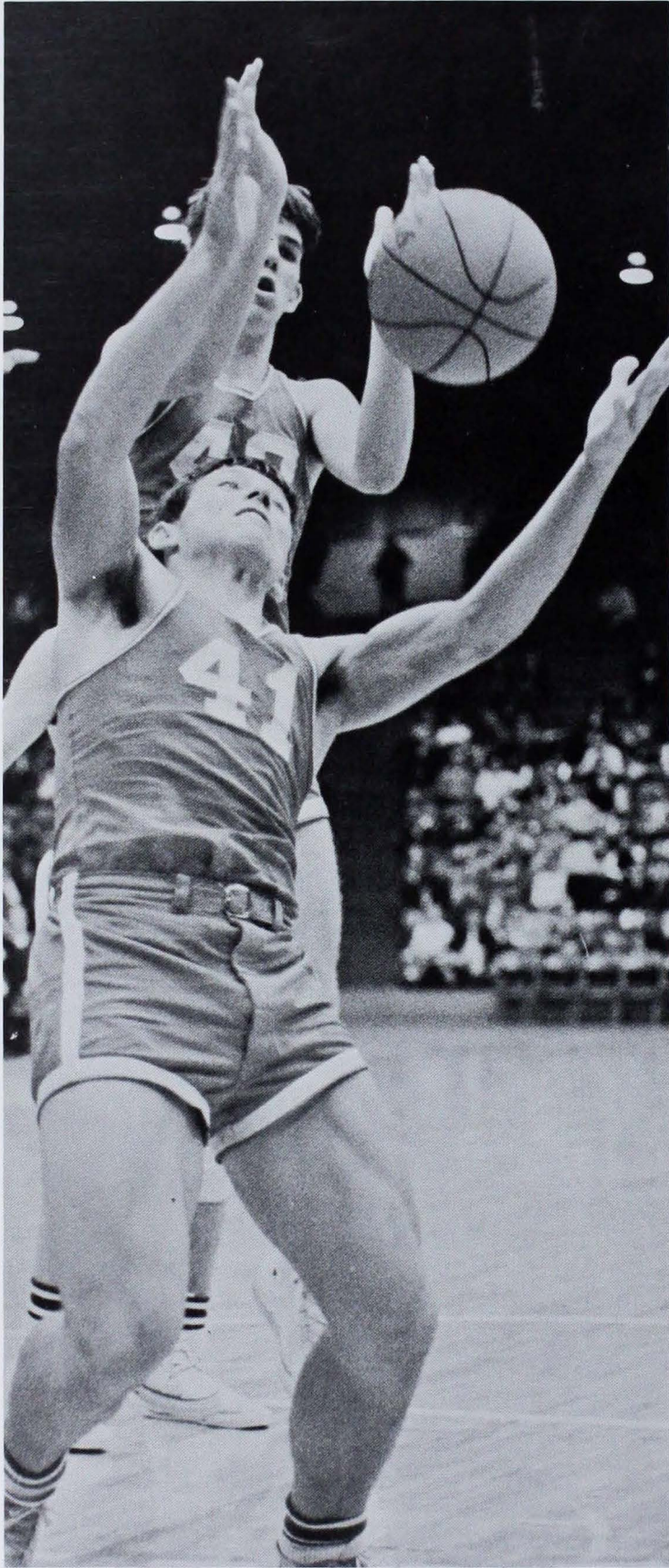

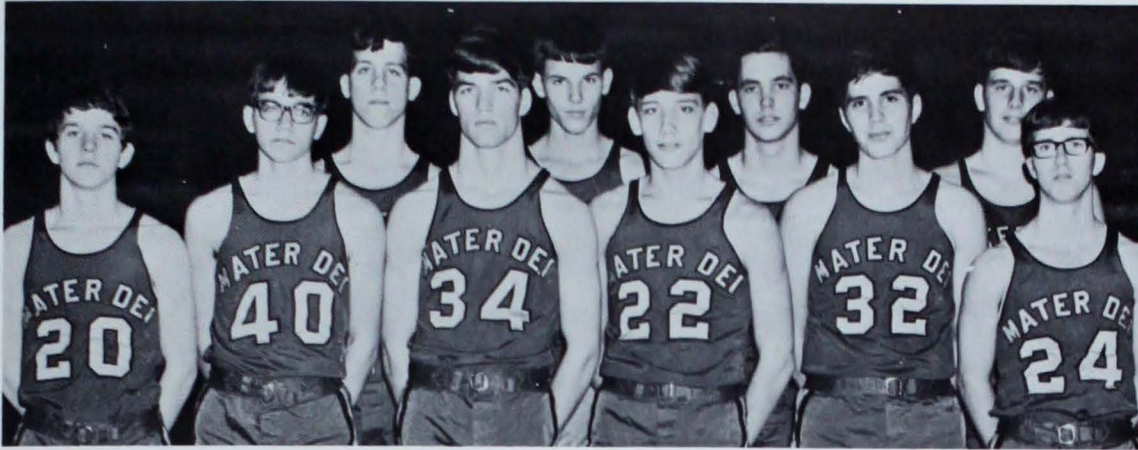

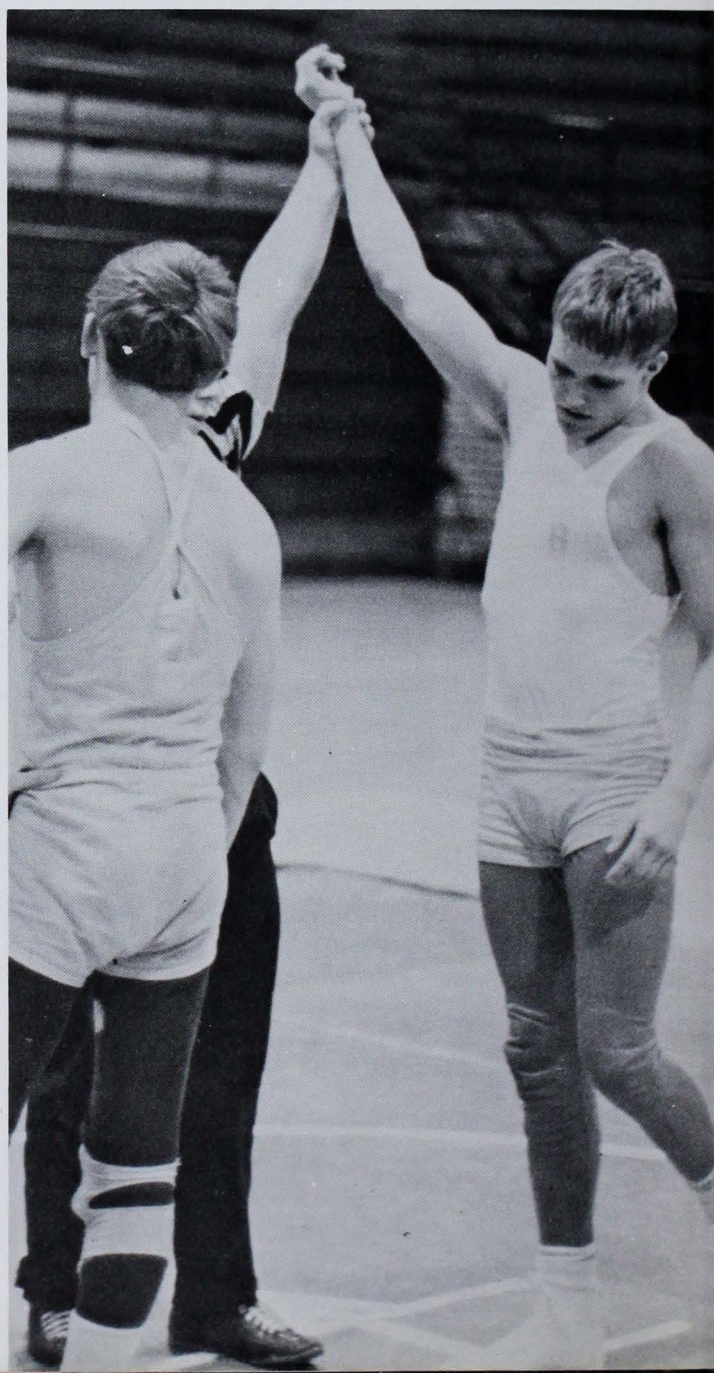
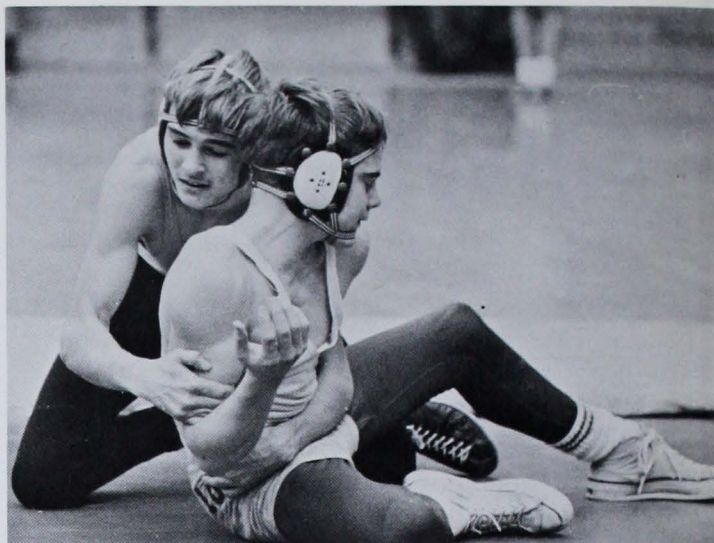
Returning from a troubled week of SIAC competition in New Albany after the Reitz met, the Matcats had only the sectionals left and a lot to prove.

The third team finished undefeated with a 5-0 mark. The freshman team captured the city title and showed plenty of promise for future years at Mater Dei.



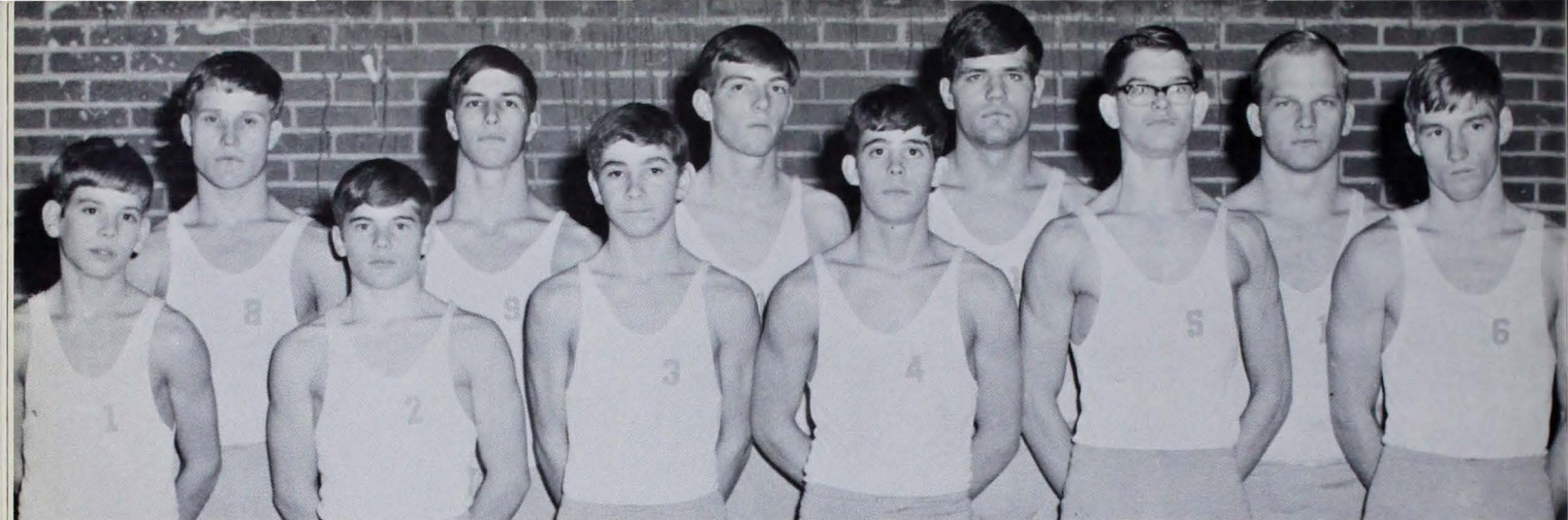

Emge Breaks City Record; Cross Country Wins Title

The track team closed out their season with a 3-5 record. Individuals told this year's track story more than a team. With few numbers it was hard to amass enough points to win many meets, although the few out produced outstanding results.

Mike Clark accumulated the most points, with John Hamilton and Joe Schoenbachler second and third respectively. Clark had his hand in three records this year. He first broke his own 440 record in 51 seconds flat, then the long jump record with a leap of 20 $\frac{1}{4}$ feet.

John Hamilton was also busy setting records. He eclipsed the 100 and 220, with 10.5 and 23.5 times respectively. Clark and Hamilton then combined with Bob Clayton and Mark Freeman to produce an undefeated 880 relay team. They entered the medley relay at the Petersburg relays, set a new field record at 3.51.1 and brought home the first track trophy since 1958. The injury-plagued cross country team posted a 4-1 record on their way to becoming Sectional and SIAC champions. The harriers also took a third in the Lincoln Trails, a second in the city, and a fifth in the Regionals.

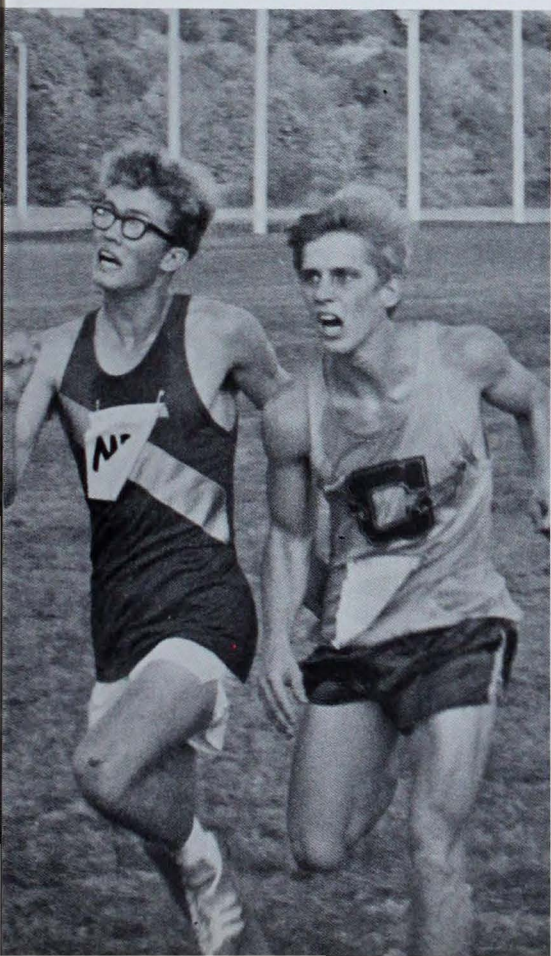

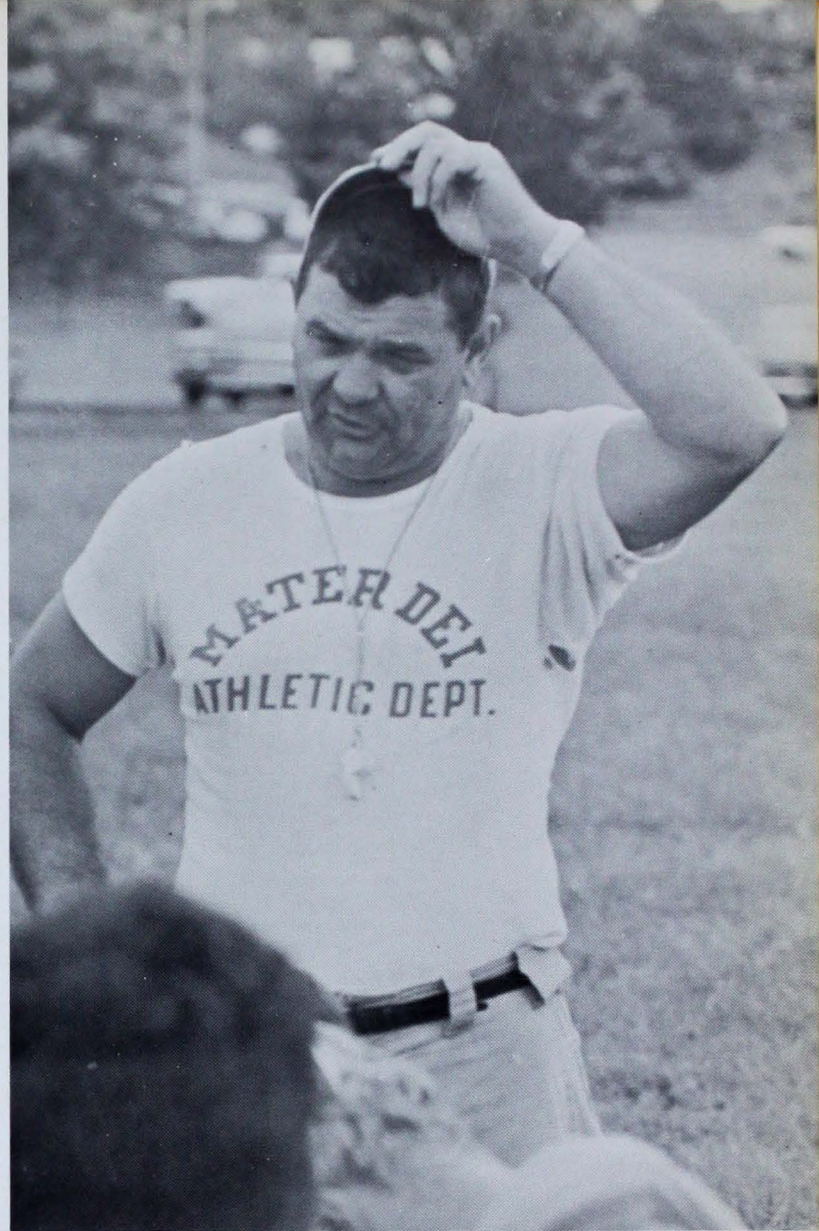
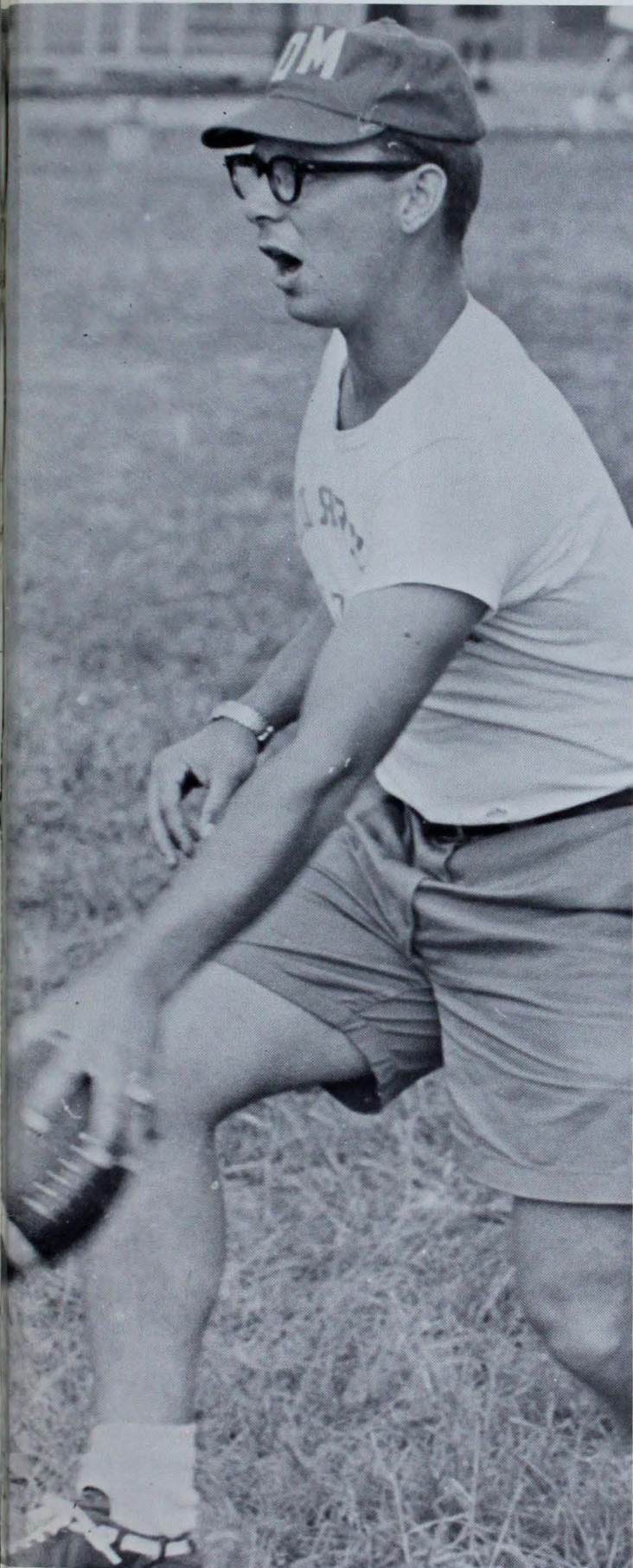

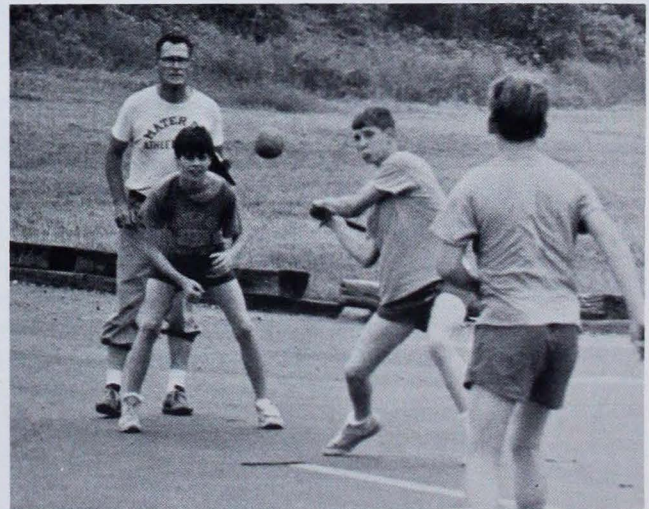
