Even when life seems to get a little bit messy, the memories imprinted in your heart will never fade;





"I was just drawing randomly sophomore year and everyone said I was amazing," said Roales, who then grew to love art.





































play a game I love with people that share the same love for it."












JUST AROUND















I believe in. On this trip, I realized life is the best gift we have been given." By accepting the Catholic faith, students like Schmitt are called to live as pro-life advocates.










