
For most of us, dinners that week included


In Television, Rosanne Bar was the comic star of the year. She took material from a normal day which we could all relate to and perform it in her own special way.



One other weather-related carastrophe was Hurricane Hugo. It hit South Carolina in late September, and its waters flooded entire cities along the Atlantic coast.


In world affairs, Russia opened up even further with Gorbachev's Glastnost program.


(Top) A young German boy and his mother have their hammers ready as East Berlin announces that the Berlin Wall will be torn down.







Casey Wilson, who works at Welborn Clinic, also has a job that will help her in her career.


"I am getting a lot of experience working as a student nurse. I'm sure it will help me in college and also in finding a job."
















Discovering Health Facts





As freshmen, most students are in a Language Arts class. "We learned about different writing skills," said freshman Jennifer Freeman.



Naturalism, Transcendentalism, Realism, and Symbolism and how they influence literary works," commented junior Tony Bacon.




Seniors can also take Advanced Placement English. "I enjoyed the class," said Brad Will. "Mrs. Hobgood makes things interesting."

Some of those methods include playing a fake stock market game and the infamous "Jeaopardy" game.






Mr. Rode's goals for the class were to make students aware of the problems of the world. He also taught what shapes society and what is needed to be done.


Mr. Rode hopes that when the students become tax payers they have a better understanding of society and are more informed.

The computer is an everyday part of our world. Bruce Hosrtman said that because of taking PASCAL, "I feel it gave me more of an understanding about computers and how they work."








Sophomore April Martin stated, "I though Driv-



Math is so much a part of the curriculum at Mater Dei that sometimes we don't stop to think about the great variety of courses that can be taken.








Miss Rooney stated she concentrated on more ''individualized working with the girls on skills'' to prepare them for their own track meet, mainly of running events.

Of course, P.E. can also be fun. Most students felt learning to square dance wasn't "square" at all. "It was kind of refreshing," said one anonymous young man.







Mrs. Joanne Sawyer, the French teacher, said that it is important to know French because it is an international language and it is found everywhere.



For starters, they just don't get to be


on the team because they want to. They have to audition with many others.







Junior Marc Halbig had a rough season. Coach Kopp said that, "Marc was put through the lion's den, but this will help him greatly next season."



















(Above) Freshman Brian Reine heads towards the finish line.









The Wildcars, who faced a very difficult schedule, were never really challenged in the dual meet season with no opponent scoring more than 22 points against them. The Marmen also held the opponent to less than ten points on ten separate occasions.





Coach Sills.


As the Wildcars entered Sectional play, expectations were high because of the team's improvement. The team's dream was cut short, though, by Bosse, the eventual Regional Champions.










"During the first game of the rourney we really came rogether and started working the ball inside for the good shot, and that catapulted us into the finals," stated liunior Carrie Push





Sometimes the rain did make for one advantage. Explained sophomore Brent


Hayden, "There would be more time to practice, and sometimes I was relieved because I was nervous, but most of the time I like to play."

Earth Day, which Mr. Bowman's Physics class


organized, began with an assembly in the aym.

Sunday evening, they headed for Panama City Beach, where they did their first dives on Monday morning. On Tuesday they had the rare experience of being filmed underwater.


"Scuba diving opens up a whole new world. It shows you what it is really like to get personal with the marine life," said junior Mart Wargel.





The Service Board collected over \$1,000 through homerooms during the Rice Bowl Season.


The money was given to area services — The House of Bread and Peace, for example — who use it to help the unfortunate.

In December, the Board encouraged everyone


to bring clothing for the Coat-A-Kid Project that was conducted city wide.

Considering the competition, qualifying for Nationals was quite an accomplishment for Paula. "She really had to have her act together," said Fr. Mark



Though these seniors will be missed, the ream's prospects look good. Cathy Kirsch stated, "With all of our talent, — we can go get 'em."












One of those seniors was Kevin Corcoran, Drum Major for the last two years, who was "in charge











played the processional.


The Invocation was given by Fr. Mark Kurzendoerfer, Marer Dei Chaplain.






The newspaper had to be cut back to six issues because of financial problems. This made covering everns even



Our giving came in two's — in rehearsals, in posters, in problems, and in fun.


Our giving came in groups — in choir, in classes, and in teams.
